DELAWARE FARM FRONT INSTALLED THIS WEEK

OPA Eliminates Cheese Quotas Effective Oct. 1

All three Delaware counties are included in additional areas which have just been named for supplemental dairy payments as a drouth relief measure. The supplemental payments are the same as those named carlier for other drouth relief areas—10 cents per hundred for milk and 1 cent per pound of butterfat. This brings the total dairy production payment for Delaware dairymen to 80 cents per hundred for milk and 11 cents per pound for butterfat. These supplemental payments are effective from September 1 on production, and will go to farmers during November and December when they apply for their payment for the September and October period, according to C. E. Ocheltree, chairman of the Delaware AAA committee. All counties in Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine are also included in the new drouth relief group as well as additional counties in Virginia, West Virginia Maryland, Pennsylvania, New York, Massachusetts, and Connecticut.

Quotas limiting the sale of cottage, pot, and baker's cheese to 100 per cent of the quantity sold in June 1943 have been eliminated by the WFA, effective October 1, 1944, Although whole milk and whole milk products are still in tight supply, roller-process nonfat dry milk solids supplies, since they can be utilized in manufacture of cottage cheese. Quotas for other fluid milk by-products, such as buttermilk and chocolate drink, remaip at 100 per cent of June 1943 sales. The action also is in line with the WFA policy to encourage development of all post-war markets for milk and dairy products as soon as possible. In line with a previously announced

In line with a previously announced In the with a previously announced reduction in support price on hogs for October 1, the WFA has established officially a support price of \$12.50 per hundredweight, Chicago basis, for Good and Choice butcher hogs weighing 200 to 200 records.

The rationing of farm machinery, with the exception of corn pickers, has been ended officially by an order of the War Food Administration. The the War Food Administration. The tiems released are combines, corn bin-ders, manure spreaders, mowers, side delivery rakes, hay loaders, pickup hay balers, wheel tractors, grain drills, po-tato planters, potato diggers, silo fil-lers, irrigation pumps, power sprayers, garden tractors, well-water systems, power pumps, farm milk coolers, sheet metal, well-casings, and farm scales.

power pumps, farm milk coolers, sheet metal well-casings, and farm scales. The action is in line with the War Food Administration's policy to remove wartime regulations as soon as possible. There were 27,000 corn pickers marketed in the United States during the present harvest season, compared with 14,668 last year and with a pre-war average of 10,134. County farm machinery rationing committees of the Agricultural Adjustment Agency will continue to issue purchase certificates and letters of eligibility for corn pickers to farmers on a war-food-producers to farmers on a war-food-produc-tion basis. Certificates and letters for other types of machines are now void.

Marketing quotas on Delaware farm production are not contemplated for 1945 by the WFA according to C. E. Ocheltree, chairman of the Delaware AAA state committee.

"We have adjusted our production downward and we have adjusted it inpward," says Mr. Ocheltree. "And for the first time in our national life we know that both can be done with definite economic benefits both to the producer and to the consumer. We have grown large acreages of war crops with which we were not familiar in pre-war days and have broken production records of all war crops in spite of war-time labor losses and demands for farm machinery which have exceeded an all-time high output of farm machines."

The Office of Defense Transportation has announced that under the dairy industry transportation program more than 397,400,000 tire miles, 7,225,000 gallons of motor fuel, and 4,817,000 man hours are being saved annually by commercial motor vehicles transporting dairy products from producers to assembly points and processing plants. More dairy products have been transported this year than in any previous year, despite the fact that less equipment has been available.
