UD student shot to death

A 20-year-old University of Delaware student was shot in his Newark apartment complex Monday night, and as of press time, police were still looking for the two suspects involved in the killing, police said.

Peter DiSabatino, 20, was fatally shot Monday in Studio Green West Apartments complex on Thorn Lane off Elkton Road, said New Castle County Police Cpl. John Weglarz.

DiSabatino was a student in the University of Delaware's Associate in Arts Program in Wilmington, the University of Delaware website.

Missing Newark woman possibly found in Toronto

Police believe Linda Hegg, the local woman Newark Nov. 5, could be the same Linda who showed up at a shelter in Toronto, Canada two months ago, providing no information about herself except her first name.

Toronto Police Department said Nov. 9 that his department is working with Newark Police to determine through physical evidence whether the "mysery woman Linda" in Toronto is in fact Linda Hegg of Newark.

Hegg, who lived alone in an apartment on Country Club Drive in Newark, suffers from an undisclosed medical condition.

Newark Police first released information about her disappearance Nov. 6 after a case worker from a local mental-health organization who routinely checks on Hegg at her apartment reported to police that she had not seen or heard from Hegg in more than a month.

"They've made frequent checks at her home over the last month and have not been able to make contact with her," Lt. Mark Farrall, a spokesman for the Newark Police Department, said Nov. 6.

At that point, investigators from the department's

Criminal Division were heading up the search for Hegg, who has no known family in the area, Farrall said.

Then, in an interesting turn Police reported as missing of events, the Toronto Star newspaper in Canada ran an article on its website Nov. 7 asking for the public's help in identifying a "mysery woman Linda" who had shown up at a Toronto homeless shelter Sept. Det. Chris Burke of the 5, "claiming to know nothing except her first name."

The article begins:

"It's been two months since Linda appeared in a Toronto shelter with no idea who she is or where she came from.

Toronto police are again asking people throughout the country to look at Linda's picture to see if they recognize her and can fill in the blanks.

The woman, who police have estimated is between the ages of 55 and 60, walked into a downtown Toronto shelter on Sept. 5, claiming to know nothing other than her first name.

Since then, the only major piece of information Linda has told investigators has to do with Barrington St. and Spring Garden Rd., a busy intersection in Halifax."

"She ... had been getting around by public transit," Burke said. "She had no belongings on her. Nothing at all.'

The headshot of Hegg that Newark Police released to the public Nov. 6 came from the Department of Motor Vehicle, from an old driver's license of Hegg's, Farrall said. He did not know exactly what year the photo was taken, but he said it was not recent.

That could explain why the woman in the photo on the left looks younger, and has shorter hair than the photo of "Linda" Toronto Police released to the public. That photo was taken after Hegg showed up at the shelter in September.

Burke said Friday that indeed, the resemblance between the photos of the two Lindas is promising.

"It's an absolute likeness," he said. "... The two certainly appear to be one in the same; however, as you are aware, due to mental-health issues, we are going to rely on physical evidence to confirm identification."





Man arrested for peeping, stealing lingerie Motorcycle gang busted in major cocaine raid

Eight people were arrested last week during raids that yielded about 4 1/2 pounds of cocaine with a street value of \$100,000, according to Delaware State Police.

More than 100 law enforcement officers from various police agencies in Delaware and Maryland searched 10 homes late last Monday and early Tuesday - the latest development in a three-month-long investigation into a cocaine distribution ring by the Thunderguards Motorcycle Club, reported Sgt. Paul Shavack, a DSP spokesman.

In addition to the homes in Bear, Middletown, Newark, New Castle and Elkton, they also raided the Thunderguards Motorcycle Club Clubhouse in the 2800 block of Northeast Blvd. in Wilmington, he reported.

Investigators confiscated a total of 2,378 grams of cocaine, an amount that exceeds two kilos, and is valued at about \$100,000 on the street, accord-



Newark also won the overall Blue Hen Conference championship and competed successfully at four invitational meets in Delaware and one each in New York and Virginia.

Things only got better on Saturday. By the end of the day, the Yellowjackets had secured the school's best season in 22 years with a second-place finish at Brandywine Creek State Park. The Yellowjackets' 51 points were second-best to Salesianum, which captured its fifth-consecutive Division I title with 26 points.

"The team had a number of tests this season: winning all of our dual meets; traveling to out-of-state competitions; a very tough win at the conference championship," said coach Michael Mooney. "Through all of that, the guys on the team became a band of brothers. They did it for each other. Running as well as we did at the state meet and being runner-up in Division I, it was sweet icing on the cake."

Running in the front of the pack for the Yellowjackets Saturday, as he has all season, was senior Ken Fontal, who raced to a fourth-place finish in a time of 17:15.86 despite not feeling 100 percent.

"I had to run with a pretty bad cold," said Fontal, an all-state selection last year. "But almost everyone was feeling some type of soreness or pain going into the race. Despite that, we believed in each other and held onto the bond we built this season as we took on our last challenge."

Junior Andew Milham, who placed 13th with a time of 17:43.83, was quick to praise his teammates.

"This team's success was based around a group of guys who each wanted to win as much as the next, all striving for success," Milham said. "Having a returning all-state runner like Ken and then adding Kyle (senior Kyle Gerhart, a varsity soccer player running cross-country for the first time) was just the tip

of the iceberg as you could see from the power of our pack."

The power of the pack Milham referred to was the fact that three of Newark's seven runners finished in the Top 10, five in the Top 16, and all seven crossed the finish line in the Top 25. Junior Chris Kitson (17:38.87) and Gerhart (17:40.97) finished eighth and 10th, respectively.

"I planned to conserve energy for the second half of the race because it was going to be a battle for whoever wanted it the most," Gerhart explained. "I'm happy with my performance and it was a great way to end my senior season. It was a very successful season going undefeated and winning the conference championship."

Sophomore Jarod Wilson (17:59.65) finished 16th, while freshman Daniel Mwaniki (18:04.05) placed 21st and sophomore Brandon Holveck (18:17.70) crossed the finish line in 25th place to secure the Yellowjackets' second-place finish, capping a remarkable season.

"The state meet was the realization of something that had been building all season," said Mooney, who has been at the helm of the Newark program since 1997.

Of the seven harriers, five

return next season, meaning the future is bright for Newark.

"We should be just as competitive as this year," Milham said confidently about next season.

There will be no next season for Fontal and Gerhart. Instead, they will take solace in knowing they were part of one of the most successful cross-country seasons in school history.

"I'll always remember this team," Fontal said. "It felt amazing to end as well as we did."

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

City adds 5 new parking spaces to Main Street



Could add up to 25 more spaces if the pilot program goes well

added five new metered-parking spaces in front of the Galleria, at 45 East Main St., as part of a new pilot program.

The program will allow drivers to park within a designated loading zone outside of normal delivery hours of 1 a.m. to 4 p.m. Delivery trucks will still need to use the spaces between 1 a.m. and 4 p.m. daily.
