Wm. R. Diveley **Granted Patent** For Insecticides

Newark Man Develops New Composition For Insect Pest Control

Insect Pest Control

William R. Diveley of Newark is the recipient of U. S. Patent No. 2, 2333,805, entitled "Dithiophosphate Insecticides," issued on May 6. Insecticides are chemical or natural products, and without them it would be practically impossible to produce many agricultural crops on a commercial basis. For example, it is said that more than 10 per cent of all agricultural crops are control of a gricultural crops are lost annually from attacks of insects, and production fish-grade fruits and vegetables is possible only by the use of protective chemicals. Thus the mandacture of insecticides is one of the important branches of the chemical industry. Mr. Diveley has discovered a new composition of matter which is adapted particularly for use in the preparation of insecticides. This new composition may be obtained by processing certain phosphorous products, caustic soda, benzene and other ingredients, and it is termed to ethe in a 11 y a "dithiophophate" compound.






