It had been a long time since we fished with the Swede—a longer while since visiting Noxontown—but we returned last week with Axel Anderson to the old familiar millpond—caught up on both counts—and in addition to some delightful fishing, enjoyed a ringside seat at one of Nature's tableaux. Cradled in a setting of rolling woodland, the sparkling waters of Delaware's most famous millpond still offer some of the most pleasant and productive fishing in the state.

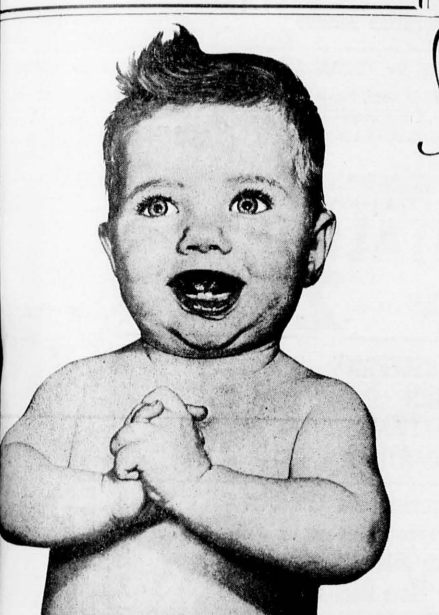

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve the quotas, they will remain in effect for 1959-crop wheat and price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at a national average of not less than \$1.81 per bushel, or 75 per cent of parity.
