 Theoretically, an area of charprevent decay, because charcoal does not decay, or encourage the growth of fungi. But the charred
area around a post is not usually area around a post is not usually
a solid covering. It is checked through in many places. If posts are seasoned before they are
charred, the charring does not
reach to the bottom of the season reach to the bottom of the season
checks which are alaways present. checks which are alaways present.
If green unchecked posts are charred, checks will open through
the charred part as the wood seasons. In either case the uncharred center of the post is exposed to
fungus infection and will decay
as rapidly as untreated wood. Charring deep enough to resist
