Polio Immunization Campaign Planned For Sunday, Nov. 3

Statewide Effort Scheduled With Clinics To Immunize Entire Population Against Polio; Type 1 Sabin Vaccine To Be Administered Orally For Both Adults, Children

A statewide campaign will be conducted Sunday, Nov. 3, to immunize the entire population of Delaware against polio. Dr. William P. Preston, president of the Medical Society of Delaware, announced today that 31 clinics will be located throughout the state on that date for the issuance of vaccine to children and adults.

The vaccine will be the Sabin vaccine, which is given orally. It is a live, attenuated virus vaccine. It is given in two doses, one at the time of the clinic and a second one four to six weeks later. The vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used in millions of children and adults throughout the world.

Dr. Preston said that the vaccine is given to children at the age of two, four and six years. It is also given to adults who have not been vaccinated before.

Community Study Hall Provided Students With Volunteer Aides For School Work

Newark school pupils seeking help with their lessons may find it at a community study hall open four nights per week.

Set up late last month by Mr. and Mrs. Richard Wilson of 333 New London Avenue, "as a place where kids can come to study when they can't at home," the study hall has attracted 25 to 30 students per session.

Along with the Wilsons, some 15 adults have offered assistance as tutors during the study periods Mondays through Thursdays from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Some of these volunteer workers also have been able to give specific help in modern languages, mathematics, sciences, and civics.

Wilson, who teaches general science at Lincoln Junior High School in Wilmington, says he felt the study project was necessary because "many opportunities are coming for these young people, and we want to help prepare them for that time."

The study hall has been operating in the recreation room of St. John's AUM Church at the corner of West Cleveland and New London Avenues. It is open to children of all grades. However, the Wilsons and their volunteer assistants find that most of those who attend are in grades five through 12.

Individuals have donated books and equipment for the sessions, and the Newark school board has approved the work and indicated it will make more books available.

\$10,000 Budd Fire Engages Aetnemen Monday Morning

Major Damage Cited Due To Water From Sprinkler System For Newark Plant

A fire at the Budd Polytex plant in Newark caused damage estimated at \$10,000 last Monday morning, as Chief George W. Smith led 42 Aetnemen with seven engines to the plant on South Chapel Street after a 6:53 a.m. alarm. Much of the damage is reported due to water from the building sprinkler system. At 11:40 that same morning, Deputy Chief Andy Waly led 23 men with four engines in extinguishing a fire in the ceiling at 23 Kulekco, Becker Drive, Brookside. Damages were estimated at \$50.

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Mandatory Sidewalks Deferred In Protest By New Residents

Sidewalk requirements for Arbour Park homesites were deferred until next spring at the regular meeting of Newark City Council last Monday night; former Councilman George M. Wilson protested lack of law enforcement with sub-standard housing on New London Avenue and Corbit Street; and a proposed ordinance providing a 40-hour work week for the Newark police department was approved at a public hearing.

Residents of Arbour Park, a new housing development in the city, protested the city's requirement that sidewalks be installed on their lots. They argued that the city was not enforcing the law against sub-standard housing in the area, and that the city was not providing adequate law enforcement.

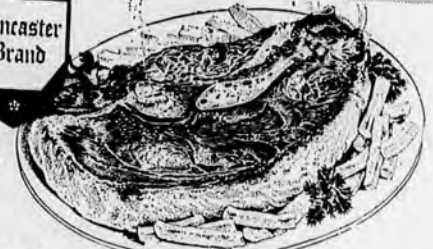

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Newark District School Enrollment Increases By 247

Enrollment in the Newark special school district has increased by 247 since schools opened Sept. 5, according to Sept. Wilmer E. Shue.

Total enrollment in the district's public schools is 6,583, Shue said. Projected enrollment this year was 6,603.

Enrollment by schools includes: Brookside, 750; Central Elementary, 670; Christian-Salem, 230; Eden, 200; Gailaher, 675; Medill, 771; Jennie Smith, 695; West Park, 644; Central Junior High, 369; Ogletown Junior High, 297; Christiana High, 1,100; and Newark High School, 1,216.

Shue said there are 1,040 first graders this year.

Label On Garment Cited Important As "Literature"

The label or hangtag is an important bit of "literature" on any garment you buy, according to Janet Reed, extension clothing and textiles specialist at the University of Delaware.

With the wide variety of fabrics available today, it isn't always possible to tell the kind of fabric you're buying by the "feel." Federal law requires that all textile fiber products — including pillows and mattresses — carry labels giving the generic names of fibers and percentages of each fiber in the product.

These generic names include natural fibers such as cotton, wool and silk and man-made fibers such as acrylics and polyesters, Miss Reed explains.

However, even though fiber content must be listed on the hangtag or label, a shopper can easily be misled by other statements on the label, Miss Reed notes.

Even such a common term as "dry clean" can be misleading, she points out.

"Although we usually think of 'dry clean' as meaning a garment which needs very little ironing," Miss Reed says, "a manufacturer can conceivably use this term to describe anything washable — because, after all, any fabric will 'dry clean.' The term itself says nothing about wrinkles or ironing."

Miss Reed explains that it's best to get your clues as to wrinkle-resistance and other features from fiber content and fabric finishes listed on the label.
