FINANCES OF TOWN IN EXCELLENT CONDITION

Council Submits Report Showing Cash Balance Of \$45,845.24

Members of Town Council of Newark met in monthly session at 26 Academy Street Monday evening, December 6, with Councilmen Hubert Ramsey, Wollaston, Richards and Battersby, in attendance.

Council authorized payment of \$2,000 to the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company representing \$500 due them for the year 1942 and their \$1,500 allowance for 1943. Justice of the Peace Wm. H. Brown was designated as town magistrate.

The report of the Town Treasurer revealed cash receipts for November in the amount of \$19,311.67 with disbursements of \$11,334.60 leaving a cash balance on hand of \$45,845.21. This, together with the \$30,000 in bonds purchased a couple of months ago leaves the town's finances in excellent shape.

Water consumption in November was 14,674,100 gallons which was a decrease of 1,057,300 gallons from the month of November.

Chief of Police Wm. H. Cunningham reported nineteen arrests classified as follows: parking and speeding, one arrest; no operators license and assault and battery, two arrests each; drunk and disorderly, three arrests; drunk and reckless driving, five arrests.

Fines collected in November amounted to \$126.50. Investigations were conducted in accidents, larceny and breaking and entering. One was committed to the workhouse, one held for the Court of General Sessions and one held for Court of Common Pleas. One stolen bicycle was returned to its owner.

Four new tires and tubes were put in the police car which patrolled 2,873 miles during the month. The police answered 161 calls in November.

OVERSEAS MAIL MUST BE SEALED

Greeting Cards Must Carry First Class Postage

Persons mailing Christmas greeting cards or other mail to soldiers or sailors overseas are warned that such must be sealed and bear first-class postage instead of local rates. Postmaster C. E. Rittenhouse advised today.

A deluge of cards and unsealed mail bearing only local postage already has been received at the Newark Post-office. Mr. Rittenhouse stated, which will not be deliverable unless the sender call at the post office, identify their mail and pay the additional postage required.

Ordinarily, unsealed greetings require only third class postage. But postal authorities are not permitted to accept such mail for overseas delivery. All overseas mail MUST be sealed and bear first-class postage.

If those who have mailed such material unsealed wish them to be delivered they will have to visit the Newark Post office at once to reclaim and pay the additional postage on their mail, otherwise they will be sent to the dead letter office.

Funeral services for George G. Porter, 75, a pioneer resident of Newark, were held Saturday afternoon, December 4, 1943, at 2:30 o'clock from the Shellendorf Funeral Home. PRACTICE AIR RAID DRILL IS SUCCESS

Friday's Test Comes As A Complete Surprise

The test air raid originally scheduled for last month caught everyone by surprise when the Yellow signal was flashed Friday morning at 9:56 o'clock. The practice drill, designed principally to test the air raid facilities of our public school system came through as a complete surprise and proved that the present setup in our school system was functioning 100 percent.

Mrs. Robert J. Davis and Mrs. C. R. Runk were on duty at the Warning Center when the Yellow or first warning signal was flashed at 9:56. They immediately sent out the proper warning calls and by the time the first Blue signal came at 10:12 Newark's Civilian Defense organizations were on the job and according to Harry L. Bonham, general chairman of the Newark Council for Civilian Defense, had the situation well in hand despite the fact that it was a day time test and found many of the C-D personnel at work.

The Red or Danger signal came at 10:24 and lasted until 10:35 when the second Blue signal was flashed. The All-Clear was given at 10:45.

Tin Can and Rubbish Collections Next Week

Tin can collections for November will be made on Monday, December 13, the Town Council authorized at its meeting Monday evening. All residents having properly cleaned and flattened tin cans to be collected are requested to put them in containers in front of their property before eight o'clock Monday morning as the truck will make only one collection.

Residents are requested to place their rubbish in front of their homes early on Wednesday as town truck makes collection in one section of town on Wednesday and in another on Thursday. Again, only one collection will be made.

No Fire Loss In Newark During Month Of November

Elmer J. Ellison was nominated for the office of Fire Chief without opposition at the regular monthly meeting of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company last Friday night.

Edwin Shakespeare was nominated without opposition for the office of First Assistant Chief; Charles Eissner and Robert H. Crowe were nominated for the office of Second Assistant Chief; Charles E. Moore was nominated Fire Recorder and Clifford Moore Chief Pipeman.

Chief Ellison reported that there were five ambulance runs for the past month traveling a distance of 237 miles.

Fire Recorder Charles Moore reported that during the month of November there were eight fires in town with no loss; 20 fires in the district with a loss of \$1,025 and the company responded to the two fires out of the district.

During the past month two new coats were purchased for the assistant chiefs and fourteen new helmets were delivered to the fire house.

OLD SAFE OPENED AT COUNCIL

Box Discloses \$150,000 In Old Sewer Bonds

A seventy-five year old safe, unopened for the past seven or eight years, was forced open by a safe expert from Washington at Town Council offices last Friday and revealed a number of interesting documents.

An old five-tumbler combination made the work of opening the safe extremely difficult but persistent drilling finally accomplished the job and the strong box revealed \$150,000 in old sewer and water bonds with a maturity date due in 1957 but which had been paid off in 1935. Other old records and papers consisted of financial reports dating back to around 1924 when the Town owed about \$300,000.

Town Supervisor George Ramsey, Councilman C. C. Hubert and Harriet Ferguson accumulated the old bonds and officiated at a ceremony dedicated to burning them. The old safe will now be used for storage of books and other records.

WM. H. BROWN NEW JUSTICE OF PEACE

Appointment Is For Full Four Year Term

William H. Brown, 274 East Main Street, was appointed last Friday, November 3, as Justice of the Peace for Newark, by Gov. Walter W. Bacon, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Clarence S. Foster who took a position as Inspector in the Wilmington office of the Delaware Liquor Commission.

The father of two boys serving in the U. S. Army, Mr. Brown was appointed to a full four-year term subject to confirmation by the State Senate when it meets in January. Mr. Brown is presently conducting his office at his residence until a more central location, in the business section of town, can be obtained.

His two sons are Captain Lawrence B. Brown, recently promoted from First Lieutenant who is pre-flight instructor at the University of Akron, Ohio, and Major Harvey Newton Brown, head of the military department at Bard College located at Amundale on the Hudson, just above Poughkeepsie, N. Y. Both boys have been in service about two years.

QUARTET HERE NEXT WEDNESDAY

Famous Curtis String Quartet To Give Concert

The second feature in the series of concerts sponsored by the Newark Music Society will be presented on the Mitchell Hall stage at 8:15 Wednesday evening, December 15, when the Curtis String Quartet makes its appearance here.

The program to be presented consists of "Dittersdorf" — quartet in E flat, Smetana — quartet in E minor (from My Life) and Schumann — piano quartet, Opus 44, accompanied by Anthony J. Loudis.

The Curtis String Quartet is composed of Jascha Brodsky, violin; Charles Jaffe, violin; Max Aronoff, viola and Orlando Cole, cello; who have traveled more than 150,000 miles together playing in the greatest concert halls of Europe and America.

The quartet uses one of the most famous collections of rare old Cremona instruments in the world today. The four lutes include two Stradivarius violins, a viola made by Nicola Amati, Stradivarius' teacher in 1677 and a cello of Domenico Montagnana, Stradivarius' pupil in 1720.
