Newark sees little damage after storm

The City of Newark announced on Tuesday that it experienced a low number of incidents during Hurricane Irene's passage through Delaware this past weekend.

According to Dana Johnston, Community Affairs Officer, "The City of Newark encountered few major issues during the storm as a result of programs already in place on a routine basis to protect and prevent damage to its services and infrastructure. These programs include clearing the creeks of debris and obstructions, keeping storm drains clear of debris, tree trimming and removal of dead trees in a timely fashion. These programs had a direct impact on city services being maintained throughout the storm."

Johnston stated that additional measures such as the regular two-month inspections of the Christina Creek

New Castle County Police locate missing friends

New Castle County Police, members of the New Castle County Fire Service Surface Water Rescue Team, Office of Emergency Management, Hockessin Fire Department, Delaware State Police Trooper 4, Delmarva Search and Rescue, have located both victims, 25 year old Christopher Valentine, who resides in the 300 block of Sheringham Drive in Hockessin, and 25 year old Jean Baptista, who resides in the unit block of James Avenue in Clark, New Jersey. Both men were found deceased in the Mill Creek Branch at 1:50 p.m. on Monday afternoon.

The investigation revealed the two friends were at a restaurant located in the Shops at Limestone Hills in the late evening on Saturday, August 27, before receiving a ride to a friend's house in Cameron Hills. They left the home on foot just before midnight and then sent a text message to another friend just after midnight advising that they were running through the hurricane.

The vehicle they drove to the restaurant, a GMC Envoy bearing a New Jersey registration, was located in the parking lot.

Detectives learned, through additional phone records, that the last time their phones were used was in the Lancaster Pike area in Hockessin near the Delaware/Pennsylvania line, in the area of Campbell Road (Route 82) and Centerville Road.

Once the information was obtained, police organized a search crew consisting of the above personnel. After an extensive search, both victims were found by two separate search groups in the Mill Creek Branch south of Valley Road.

The bodies were turned over to the Delaware State's Medical Examiner's Office who will determine the manner and cause of death.

Gov. Jack Markell commented on the deaths of the two men:

"While we had hoped and prayed our state would get through this dangerous hurricane without the loss of life, we now know that is not the case. I offer my condolences to the families and friends of Christopher Valentine and Jean Baptista, as I know this will be a time of great difficulty for their families and those close to them."



Traffic stop leads to arrest of Elkton man on drug charges

New Castle County Police have arrested Devine Bullock, 27, of the 500 block of Booth Street in Elkton, Md. He has been charged with traffic and drug offenses after police found him in possession of marijuana and a large amount of cash.

At 12:50 a.m., Saturday, an officer was on routine patrol in the area of the community of Four Seasons, south of Newark, when he noticed a green Chevrolet Suburban, fail to use a turn signal while the vehicle traveled on Autumn Horseshoe and made a right turn onto Leafy Lane. He also observed the vehicle had heavily tinted windows.

When the officer approached the SUV, the driver quickly opened the door and at first would not listen to the officer's verbal com-



mands. During that time, an unknown passenger fled from the vehicle. A computer inquiry revealed the driver, who was later identified as Devine Bullock. was driving with a suspended license and was a local fugitive. During a search incident at the time of arrest, the officer located a small amount of marijuana in the vehicle and \$4,287 of suspected drug money in his possession. Both were seized.

Bullock was charged with the following: Driving with a Suspended License, Failure to Signal, Maintaining a Vehicle Keeping Controlled tances, Operating a for Substances, Vehicle with Improper Window Tint, Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, and Possession of Marijuana.

Bullock was arraigned and committed to the Howard Young Correctional Institute after failing to post \$3,750 cash bail.

Police investigate attempted robbery

The Newark Police Department is investigating an attempted armed robbery, which occurred on August 27, at approximately 3:25 a.m. at the 7-11 convenience store located at 202 Elkton Road. During this incident a black male suspect entered the store, approached the counter and displayed what appeared to be a handgun at the clerk. The suspect then demanded money from the clerk before walking around the counter and striking him in the head

several times with the handgun. The robbery attempt was then interrupted by a witness who began to enter the store causing the suspect to flee out of the store towards Barksdale Road. No money was removed during the robbery attempt.

The clerk, a 56 year-old male, suffered a slight contusion to the head, but was otherwise uninjured.

The suspect is described as a black male, approximately 5'6" to 5'11", 20-40 years of age and slightly overweight. He wore dark pants, a black hat, and a dark long sleeve striped shirt.

Suspect takes large amount of cash in residential robbery

A resident in the 500 block of Capitol Trail, Newark, reported that an unknown suspect forced his way into the house and made off with over \$1,400 in cash.

The event happened on Friday night, August 26, and was reported by the owner, who found that several bedroom dresser drawers were left open. A search of the house showed that the screen to the rear door

had been cut and that someone had punched through the window to unlock it. Blood droplets were found near the door and at various points in the house.

The owner escorted officers to the bedroom closet, where a safe had been forced open and emptied. It had contained approximately \$1,400 in cash.

A search of the exterior showed several footprints located near the rear door and an adjacent rear window. A K-9 officer found additional prints in the grass on the southwest side of the yard, but could not follow the track any further.

Though the owner said that there has been no suspicious activity near the house recently, he does have a friend who has asked for money and also has a drug problem. Police received the friend's name and are contacting the man for questioning.

Copper wire, appliances taken from rental unit

The landlord of a rental property in the unit block of Madison Drive reported that unknown suspects had removed an unknown quantity of copper wire, a washer and dryer, and an exterior air conditioning unit from the residence.

Police were contacted by a recently hired manager for the property who stated that she had been notified by a contractor, hired to clean the place up, that no electricity or water was working at the site. A search showed that the copper wiring in the basement had been pulled out. The owner told officers

that the washer and dryer, as well as the air conditioning unit, had been in place when she last visited the place in June. The manager stated that she had not seen these items in the house, since she had been hired.

A search by police showed that there were no signs of forced entry. A canvass of neighbors produced negative results, as all who were questioned reported that they had not seen anything suspicious at the house, and that the manager was the only person seen going into or out of the house during the time frame.

Victim has money taken, car stolen

Newark Police were called in to investigate a residential burglary in the unit block of South Chapel Street on last Tuesday.

The victim said that he had returned from work the previous day and deposited approximately \$280 in tips into a dresser drawer in his bedroom. He had left and spent the night at a friend's house, but found that the money, as well as his car keys, was missing. He then went to where he parked his car, a green 2000 Volkswagen Passat with Delaware registration, and found that it too was missing.

The victim told police that he is the only resident at the house and that he was pretty sure that he locked all doors to the house, though he admitted that several windows had been left open. A search revealed that none of the windows showed signs of tampering. A fingerprint was found on the dresser, which authorities recovered. No suspects have been named so far.

Traffic signs taken

Representatives with the Newark Department of Public Works stated that, after an inventory, they had discovered that six traffic signs from the construction on Academy and Courtney Streets had gone missing sometime between May 22 and 23.

A review of video surveillance footage from that timeframe showed a group of five or six people walking southbound on Academy Street. Just before the intersection of Academy and Courtney, two males are seen separating from the group. One male is seen walking into the bushes near the University of Delaware parking garage and taking a sign. Another male comes back into the frame carrying a different sign. Both are viewed walking towards E. Park Place. Around 2:00 a.m., a sign at E. Park Place and Academy Street goes missing, though police are unsure if it was the same suspects.

A photo of one of the suspects, listed as an Asian male, 18 to 22 years-old, was released to Newark Police for identification. The value of the six signs is estimated at \$480.

Main Street business get robbed

Employees at Dr. Neil S. Kalin, MD, an eye-care specialist located in the 300 block of Main Street, told authorities that sometime on the evening of Tuesday, August 23, an unknown suspect had broken into the office and taken an amount of cash and several

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checks endorsed to the busi-Workers with the firm told police that the office had been

locked and the alarm activated when they left after work. When they came in the next morning, a cash envelope that was kept in a desk drawer was found to be missing, along with a deposit bag containing more cash and several checks made out to the clinic. A box holding \$100 in petty cash was also taken. Though computer equipment and prescription pads were in plain view, these items were not taken. The alarm company stated that there was no activity during the timeframe of the robbery.

The point of entry was an exterior window, which had its screen damaged. The suspect exited the premises through the front door by unlocking the dead bolt. Additional entrances to the business were found to be secure.

Glasgow High looks to win on and off the field

Shannon Riley took over the Glasgow High football program five years ago with a goal to make his players winners - on the field, in the classroom and throughout the community

He's accomplished two-thirds of his goal.

"I feel we have changed the culture of the program in my six years," Riley said shortly after his team opened up preseason practice. "We have guys who do Adopt-a-Highway clean-ups, A.I. Children Hospital visits and other charity events. Our team grade point average is always around a 3.0. That is what is most important to me."

The numbers in the win column in recent years haven't been as impressive as those on the players' report cards. On the field, the Dragons kick off the 2011 season having won just four games the previous two years. Despite this, Riley is confident this year's team has the ability to get the Glasgow program back to the winning ways it experienced early in his coaching tenure.

"Our greatest strength will be our team speed," Riley pointed out. "We are fast at every position. We also have

experience at almost every position. We return eight starters on offense and nine on defense. Every player has bought into the team philosophy. We have a tight, hardworking group of guys."

Those "guys" include returning starting quarterback Khari Ngozi, a junior poised to shatter nearly every passing record in the state. Ngozi enters the season having thrown for 3,693 yards his first two seasons under center at Glasgow, leaving him just 2,778 shy of Corey Phelan's (Wilmington Charter) record 6,471 passing yards.

"I think about the record all the time," Ngozi said. "Coach Riley push-es me to be the best and if I slack he gets on my case. He's always reminding me about the other quarterbacks who get mentioned all the time and that makes me push myself."

"Khari has excellent vision, a strong arm and good mobility in the pocket," Riley said of the 5-foot-8, 157-pound right-hander. "He has all the skills to be the best quarterback the state has ever seen, and yet the great thing about him is he would trade all the records and stats in for a state championship."

If he's going to break the record this year or get that coveted state championship trophy, Ngozi will need the help of two inexperienced receivers, seniors Shaquille Lewis and Craig Stennis. Both played cornerback last season, but neither has extensive varsity experience as a receiver. Ngozi says the key for him and his receivers will be communication, and that, in fact, that's the key for the entire team to have a successful season.

"Preseason has been better than I expected," he said last Friday shortly after learning that the Dragons' scrimmage against Salesianum was canceled due to the forecasted hurricane. "The team is gelling well. Communication is better than it has been, and it will need to be in order for us to have a winning season. We are more focused than the past couple years and chem-istry is real good. The coaches have been emphasizing becoming a team rather than just being individuals.

Glasgow also welcomes back returning starters Sierre Matthews (sr., RB), Ivory Drewery (sr., TE/OLB), Robert Brown, (jr., DE) and Zachary Wilson, (jr., center). In addition, the Dragons will look to several first-year varsity players to help add depth to the roster: Maliek Beckford, (so., WR), Michael Helton (fr., WR) and Loyal Ricks (fr., LB).

"Our biggest weakness is depth on the offensive and defensive lines," Riley said. "We are thin after our first group on both sides of the ball.'

Riley said the team's early practices have gone very well and that he's looking forward to seeing the final product when the Dragons debut against Christiana on September 10. And while the coach hopes that his team's first game in early September is a prelude to a playoff game in late November, it's watching his kids succeed in an even bigger game - the game of life, that the sixth-year coach looks forward to the most.

"We will be very solid on the field this year, but seeing them grow from boys to young men is the most rewarding."


Back to School – ies Beware

Over the next few weeks, many drivers will get acclimated to seeing the big yellow school busses on the roads again. After a relaxing and enjoyable summer, many children of all ages are eager to return to their old friends, new teachers, and exciting new adventures that the 2011-2012 school year has in store.

However, not all children are as excited to return to school as others. Those youth who experience bullying tend to be more reluctant about attending school, especially




tion, bullying is using supestrength or influence, aggressive behavior, or negative, unwanted actions. These Vogl behaviors are

usually repro-

duced over time and are generally used to force a person to do what the bully wants.

Effective in January 2008, Delaware passed a law against bullying. Although the law



Although much is done within the school to help reduce the occurrence of bullying, the help of parents is needed as well. If you suspect that your child is being bullied, there are a few helping steps you can take. First, give your child time to open up to you. You need to be empathetic when your child begins to discuss the incident, because it can be very painful to recall.

Once your child has opened the door, help your child begin to problem-solve. You can role-play different situations and encourage your children to respond in a positive manner. You can also help your child meet new friends or join a new team or club.

In order to avoid a "hesaid, she-said" type argument with the parent of the accused bully, you should refrain from contacting the other parent. Instead, school personnel should be involved. You want to report the situation so the teachers and administrators of your children are aware of the brewing issue and can keep a closer eye while they are on school grounds.

Encourage your child to make friends with positive people so he or she can avoid being another statistic of bullying. Below are some statistics reported from a 2009 **Bully Prevention Study:**

· 30% of children grades six through ten reported being either a victim or perpetrator in a bully situation.

• An average of 160,000 kids per day miss school in fear of being bullied.

· 43% of children grades six through twelve fear being bullied in the bathroom at school

Don't let your child be another bully statistic. Teach your child how to avoid bullying and what to do if bullying occurs. If your child is involved in a bully situation, call the Delaware Attorney General's School Crime and Bullying hotline at 1-800-220-5414.

Statewide yard waste disposal ban temporarily lifted in storm's aftermath

Due to the many downed trees and fallen limbs statewide caused by Hurricane Irene, DNREC has given temporary approval allowing Delaware residents to dispose of stormrelated yard waste along with their household trash through Tuesday, September 6. The statewide yard waste ban that went into effect earlier this year has been rescinded for eight days to help residents clean up their property after the storm.

Delawareans are still encouraged to keep their yard waste separated from their household trash and to take it to a DSWA facility, yard waste drop-off site, or to a private company that accepts yard waste in order to preserve land fill space and to provide valuable material to the mulch and composting industries.

However, as part of a vigorous effort to clean up the state quickly from Hurricane Irene, residents may put yard waste in with their household trash for disposal until Sept. 6. (Please note that residents who live in municipalities that already have a separate yard waste collection program should continue to use that service rather than put their storm debris in with their household trash. Also, DNREC's yard waste drop-off sites in New Castle County, the Polly Hill Drummond site and DART Mid-County site, will

be open every day this week.) Questions on the temporary lifting of the yard waste ban can be answered by DNREC's Solid & Hazardous Waste Management Section by calling 302-739-9403 or by the Delaware Solid Waste Authority at 1-800-404-7080. This week's Out of the Attic item is a 1952 picture of the E. J. Hollingsworth Co. that was printed in the 1953 Clark's Newark Classified Directory. Hollingsworth, located at 65 North College Avenue at the southwest corner of North College and West Cleveland Avenues, dealt in lumber, millwork, building supplies, coal, fuel oil, hardware, and paint. The company also had yards in Newport and Marshallton, Delaware. Most Newark homes and businesses were still heated by coalfired furnaces.


In this decade the approximately 8,000-resident town experienced a huge growth in residents, businesses, and industries, and annexation brought surrounding areas into the expanded town limits. Most new construction turned to oil-based heating and many coal-fired units were replaced with oil units. Newark had had 3-digit phone numbers (Hollingsworth was 507) and was starting to get 4-digit numbers. 5-digit numbers were being introduced in the Wilmington area. In



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
