Determined Lebreton one of racing's few female trainers

"Most trainers are 50 years old and smoke cigars," says Tracy Lebreton. Not all though. Lebreton is a trainer, and she is only 21.

And she doesn't smoke

She does bring a fresh approach to her field. As a graduate of the University of Delaware with a degree in animal science, she takes a scientific approach to training

scientific approach to training thoroughbred race horses. Currently, she has five horses at Delaware Park in Stanton.

"There are a lot of people here that have been trainers for 30 years and still believe in

witchcraft and practice things that are totally unscientific," Lebreton said.

Lebreton said.

Her education is often her guide. "There's many things that pertain to training, like anatomy and physiology of the animal. Those go hand in hand with the training of the thoroghbred race horse."

It has done her well so far. In the first start of her career, she won a race. Pokey Lady, a first

the first start of her career, she won a race. Pokey Lady, a first time starter herself, bred and owned by Tracy's father. Leon, won the fifth race on Sept. 7, only a week after Lebreton received her trainer's license.

All of the horses Lebreton trains currently were bred and are owned by her family. The family started developing the farm, now Pilottown Stables Inc., in Harbeson, Del. 10 years ago. That was her first major

exposure to thoroughbred race horses; before and after school she would take care of the animals. For a while she did it all herself. "When I was in my last year

of junior high and my first year of high school, my father had a massive coronary. He was in the hospital for over a year after surgery. I would have to go every morning before school and take care of horses.

"At that time my brother

"At that time my brother wasn't much help (he has alergies and asthma that prevent him from being with animals for any length of time) and my mom is from Brooklyn; she's not a real farm girl."

see spent the breaks in bet-ween semesters working as a groom for George Hayes, a trainer on the Maryland cir-cuit. "He's been training for 25 years, he knows a lot of tricks of the trade."

She trained horses for other owners this summer, before she received her own license, turning them over to licensed trainers when they were ready to run in races because only a licensed trainers can start a

horse in a race.

She does most of the work herself. She has no hot walkers or grooms. "Since I'm young and aspiring, I can't really be choosy."

choosy."
She does have an exercise rider, who takes the horses on their morning workouts. But that is out of necessity.

"The summer after my freshman year at college I was galloping a horse and the horse went through a fence and I broke my back. After that, I never really had the nerve to do too much riding. I lack that little bit of nerve you really must have to be a good rider."

As it is now, the care of five horses make for a long day.

horses make for a long day. From 6:30 in the morning to about noon she takes care of about noon she takes care of the horses — seeing that they get out to the track for their ex-ercise, mucking out their stalls, hotwalking (walking a horse after exercise to help it cool down) and grooming them. And then she comes back in the evening to feed them and put them away for the night. Seven days a week. Some days are even longer. "Days when you have a horse

"Days when you have a horse running, you're here all day. Days when I go downstate (to the farm) to get my hay are usually 6 (a.m.) to 8 (p.m.)

days.

It's certainly not a nine-toit's certainly not a nine-to-five job, but as far as Lebreton is concerned, "That's one of the advantages. It's never routine, except maybe when you've got horses running, and there's always the added pleasure when it's your own horse. That's the thing I like about having my own horses rather than someone else's.

She says there was little thought of doing anything outside of working with horses. "I guess I never thought of doing anything else. It's always been my life. I grew up with it.

"At one time I thought maybe I'd like to actually run my own business, but something like that takes a lot of financial backing and I'd have to control it myself because I really don't like the idea of working for somebody else."

"But in a way, this is a business; I'm pretty much running my own business here." Hard work, long hours, and too little help are not the only obstacles Lebreton has had to overcome. In the old fashioned world of thoroughbred racing, her age and gender go against

world of thoroughbred racing, her age and gender go against tradition.

"Classically, trainers are from the older generation and male. When you get up to the management positions, people with more power, it's very male dominated."

"There's quite a few female riders and female grooms, but

when you get to the trainers, the ratio goes way up for the

"Some trainers take me seriously, some don't. Some think I'll probably be here maybe a year at the most. Others would like to see me have a very successful career out of it.

"When you apply for your trainer's license, you have to go talk to the stewards and when I went in to speak to them they more or less had the attitude of 'what makes you think you're going to be a trainer.' "

"(There are) a lot of people saying you'll never be able to do that,' but Delaware Park is small, people like to see somebody moving up more. There are a handful (of people) on this track who have given me a lot of very appreciated support."

She has no qualms about go-ing against the odds and mak-ing a career as a trainer.

"I believe that after four years of college and working with horses for a large majori-ty of my life that I couldn't see any reason why not."



A Will is the vehicle necessary to make sure your assets are distributed the way you want them to be. A Will can apportion your assets according to what you see as your family's needs or merits instead of following a legal formula (interstate laws) that would prescribe how your property would be distributed. You are correct that property held jointly does pass by operation of law to the surviving spouse. Your Will will only dispose of property held in your sole name. Other kinds of property such as life insurance and property held in trust also pass according to their own provisions. It is still important, however, to have a Will in order to make provisions for your children in the event of a simultaneous death. A guardian should be named and trusts should be considered for the management of your assets for the benefit of your children. Other factors that must be considered when drafting your Will are: choosing an estate administrator, and letters of instruction for specific bequests. Everyone wants a simple Will. But a simple Will may not be enough if your estate is large and if you own a substantial amount of life insurance. We suggest you meet with a financial planner to discuss your estate planning goals and objectives as part of your overall financial plan.




