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

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

The final decision will be up to Newark voters. A referendum on accepting the Glasgow proposal will be held here before next fall.

brought in the Pleasant Valley and
the Milford Crossroads schools in recent years. In both cases, only a few
citizes turned out to cast token ballots.

Interest was far from dormant, however, in the vote Saturday at Glasgow. Although the balloting was quiet, the community was sharply split as is indicated by the slim five vote margin favoring consolidation with Newark.

The final count showed 74 favoring and 69 against closing the school, This represents virtually every eligible voter in the district.

The slim majority was almost the exact reverse of last year's close vote at Glasgow when 71 opposed consoli-dation and 69 favored. Thirteen of Saturday's ballots were challenged due to a question as to whether the voters lived within the district bound-

Those favoring consolidation Those favoring consolidation claim the one-room school is outmoded and lacks proper facilities. They also contend it is dangerous for children to walk along the highway to and from classes. The school does not provide a bus service.

The thirty students currently attending the school will continue with classes there at least until June.
