In 1945, Dr. Drake was appointed acting head of the university's chemistry department for a brief period during which the consolidation of the chemistry departments of Delaware College and the University of Delaware was being completed.

In addition to her teaching duties, she has held many important extracurricular campus positions, including that of adviser to arts and science students, faculty representative on the committee on courses and curricula, and secretary of the Women's College faculty.

Upon learning of her decision to retire from active teaching, President John A. Perkins declared, "Dr. Drake has been an outstanding faculty member throughout the many years that she has served the university. Her growth in her field and her understanding of the function that higher education has had to perform not only have been commensurate with the growth and development of the university, but have contributed leadership to that growth and progress."

Dr. Drake plans to continue living in Newark at 721 Brook Drive, Silverbrook, and will devote most of her time to the completion of research projects in the fields of biochemistry and the history of chemistry. She will also be available for consultation with members of the chemistry faculty and student body.

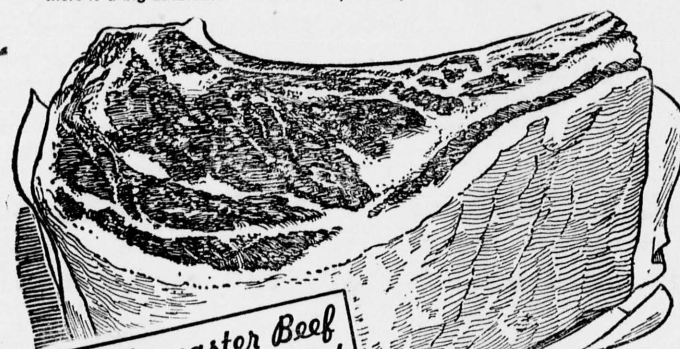

## Letters To The Editor

June 2, 1955  
Last Tuesday evening at a special meeting of City Council I voted against a motion that would have authorized the writing of an ordinance on existing open streets assessable for their curb and gutter, and on all new streets opened in the City of Newark, to make them assessable for curb, gutter and the paving of such streets. I have always been on record as not favoring this sort of plan, and I am positively opposed to this sort of plan.

There were only four men present at the meeting and I do not think an issue of this importance to the taxpayer should be resolved without a full representation of City Council.

My vote against the proposal created a tie and I was criticized for my action. I do not think we were not a progressive council. This I will argue against, as I do not think it is progressive to make people pay to pave streets in front of their property.

I am in favor of putting the whole paving program into the bond issue and have all taxpayers share the burden of the cost just as taxpayers have helped pay to curb and gutter and pave streets heretofore.

I AM AGAINST an assessable program for curb, gutters and streets.

If an issue of this importance were put up to the taxpayers, I doubt if it would get an affirmative vote and as long as I am a representative of the people I shall vote against putting the burden upon a small handful of property owners. Assessable paving laws have been a bone of contention wherever they have been passed. They will be in Newark, also.

I feel that I was elected to council to represent all the people and I shall continue to vote as I see each and every individual project.

June 3, 1955  
Your City Council met on May 31st to consider a proposal to assess property owners for street improvements. A proposal was made to charge for curb and gutter in certain areas. In an orderly fashion, the members freely expressed their opinions for and against the measure. When a vote was taken, it was evident that many questions were left unanswered, as the council members present were divided in opinion. The vote was a tie.

Unanswered questions like this one, "What promises were made to newly annexed areas relative to street improvements as an inducement to vote to come into the city?" I know that a series of meetings was held with these people. I was never invited to attend one by city officials. Some of the meetings were recorded, while others were oral promises. I do know of a particular area where a previous council apparently committed the city to improve public streets when they were needed to the city.

When inquiring about street improvements, the group that purchased homes in this area from the Federal Government, received vague, evasive answers and in one case an outright refusal to answer. For example, here are excerpts from a reply of the Public Housing Administration to these people dated April 2, 1949:

"Your request, that we obtain copies of correspondence between the PHA and the mayor and council of Newark, with reference to the dedication of streets in George Road Village and repair thereof, has been denied. While the dedication of these streets is a matter of public record, it is not considered advisable for a public agency to release information that may indicate or have the appearance that an individual or an organization should be fortified with data against a municipality..."

Correspondence will show that the city was requested to purchase the water and electrical distribution systems from the government. The city then replied that if the city had to buy these two utilities, the streets were to be improved by the government. The following is taken from a copy of a letter to the PHA dated March 17, 1947:

"The Council of Newark requires that the streets in the project be resurfaced by the government prior to being dedicated to the Town of Newark. It is estimated that the cost of resurfacing would be approximately \$5613.95."

Records further show that the final outcome was that the Federal government finally decided the two utilities mentioned above to the city in consideration of the fact that the City of Newark assume the repairs. The council must deal justly with any area where it can be established that prior commitments have been made.

Not liking the outcome of this meeting, one member of council apparently was taken over by his emotions, not by his better judgment, to the point where he bitterly declared, "I had thought this was a progressive-minded council."

Now, the judgment of this councilman who made the remark is not being questioned. At one time or another, we are all victims of our emotions and I think that is what happened in this case. Serving on

council will certainly prove to be the acid test of stability. If our emotions take over, we will never progress. Progress is the product of differences of opinion.

Since this member of council was quoted by the press as saying that the council's action was not progressive, I am compelled to use the same medium to clarify a point and what took place at that meeting. Otherwise, the mature thing to do would be to pass it over as one of those unfortunate things.

Progress means to go forward. It would be a backward step for the Council of Newark not to respect its obligations to any area of the city. To get unity, an element which is so essential to moving forward, the Council of Newark must consider the problems of each and every district of the city.

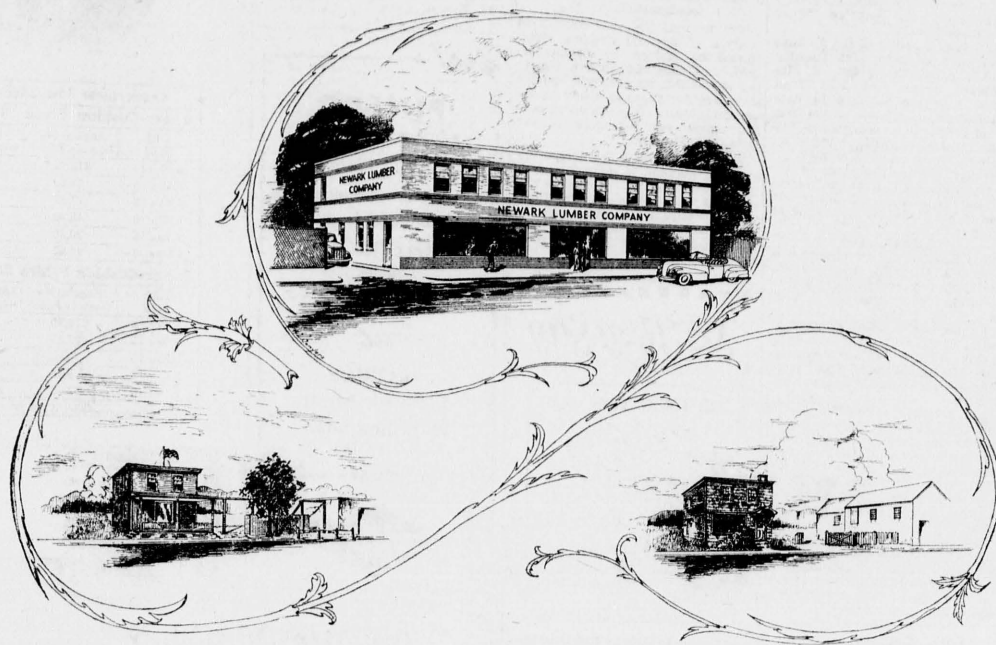

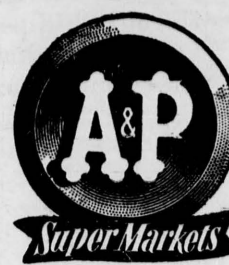
