



There are some ingenious lessons here for all of us, plus some reassurance that some of our teen gers are outstanding. Here are how some of our interprising young folks licked their unemploy-ment and lack-of-money problems.

Next... an 18-year-old boy read about the tons of pure silver lost annually in photographic solutions which are spilled down the drain after use in developing pictures. After many hours of work

this lad perfected a means of retrieving the survivalent in the from the chemical solutions. He asked local developers to store their waste solutions and he split his profits with them. This boy, now 20 years old, now owns a plant worth \$150,000 and makes around \$50,000 a year.

About the most imaginative idea and one I'd love About the most imaginative trea and onle 1 to twee to try myself was that of a 13-year-old Florida boy. He saved up enough money to buy an army surplus portable mine detector and what do you think he did with it? He'd get up early every morning and exweet the back page trip bow.

Can it be," Professor Burns asks, "that the Russians have overed one of the main secrets of Western economic ss, while we have allowed our idealistic impulses to re the sources of our own great achievements?

That is a pertinent question, Professor Burns. We would to see it brought up at the next session of Congress.




