### **DEATH RATES** IN DELAWARE **SHOW SHARP DECLINE**

#### Communicable Diseases Of All Kinds Responsible For Deaths

Death rates in Delaware have shown sharp decline since 1920. According the records of the Bureau of Vital Statistics, State Board of Health, the

born in Delaware, but there were fewer maternal and child deaths reported

than in any other year.

Communicable diseases of all kinds have been responsible for a number of deaths each year, but the diptheria rate has been reduced to about one-minth of what it was in 1920, typhoid to about one-thirtieth, and tuberculosis 133 deaths as compared with 322

Meart disease, cancer and nephritis continue as the leading causes of death. In 1946 approximately 1,000 persons died of heart disease, 350 of can-cer, and 304 of nephritis. Nearly 8 per-cent of all the deaths in this state were found among persons over 65 years of age

Compared with other nations of the world. Delaware and all the United States are indeed fortunate. Serious outbreaks of disease are still being reported in Asia and Africa where the death toll during the first six months of this year from cholera, plague, small-payend the first between the control of the contr pox and typhus fever mounted to more than 200,000. In South America, just a hours away by plane, 20,000 per-s died from smallpox, and in Mexi-500 deaths were reported from the same disease.

### WOMEN LEARN FINE POINTS ON **FURNITURE**

### Women Should Be Better **Buyers Of** Furniture

Women who attended the upholstery of classes held this month throughout Kent County should be better buyers to furniture in the future, says Miss Louise Whitcomb, extension homenmanagement specialist for the University of Delaware.

sity of Delaware.

In tearing apart pieces of furniture before reconditioning them, these women, many of them for the first time, have found out the unseen qualities which make an upholstered sofa or chair a good piece of furniture.

In good furniture construction, observes Miss Whitcomb, both the visible and invisible portions of the frame should be of hardwood put together with either dowel or mortise and reinforced with corner blocks. The webbing under the springs should be of closely woven strips tacked close together, and the heavy cords that hold the springs in place should be tied from front to back of the chair, from side to side and diagonally both ways.

The stuffing should be made of hair or moss covered first by a layer of thick white cotton and then a muslin undercover. Loose cushions may be filled with 75 per cent down and 25 per cent feathers or of innerspring construction, a less soft and less expensive method. The down and feather filling should be encased in feather-proof ticking with at least three channels—that is, the filling should be divided with at least three partitions so that it cannot all himp into one side should be closely woven and neatly tallored.




