1ST LEGISLATIVE DAY

Pursuant to Article 2, Section 4, the Constitution, the 124th General Assembly, State of Delaware, convened on the first Tuesday of January, 1967, it being the third day of January, 1967, at 1:25 P.M.

The House was called to order by Rep. David Benson, Representative-elect of the 12th Representative District.

The salute of the Flag was led by Rep. David Benson.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Reverend Percy F. Rex, Rector of Trinity Episcopal Parish of Wilmington, Delaware, as follows:

God of our fathers, we pause in silence to remember that you are our Father and our God: we are grateful to thee for our inheritance: for the good soil, and the tools of agriculture and industry; for churches, synagogues, schools, and public and private agencies; and all of the blessings we enjoy in the State of Delaware.

Now, our Father, we are met here to preserve to all of our people the liberty and justice of this great land so richly endowed by thee.

We are mindful that we represent all of the people of our state - let all that we say and do in this 124th General Assembly be for the welfare of all of our people, and thy glory.

O God, there are wonders in our land unimagined by our fathers which have so increased the speed of our living that our human minds and bodies falter as we try to keep up:

The glitter of new automobiles blinds our eyes to the demands they make upon us to learn how to operate safely the power we have purchased;

While we prepare to blast off to the moon, help us to learn how to resolve our differences without blasting each other into eternity.

We are mindful that many of our people through the lack of incentive and/or skill are unable to enjoy the rewards of steady work:

Our fathers worked and we work, help us to do nothing here that will destroy the necessity and dignity of honest work:

Show us how to really help the poor, how to relieve the oppressed, and how to restore those convicted of crime to useful lives.

O God, the problems arising from the needs of the people of this State are a burden upon all who serve in this legislature:

Give us wisdom in the place of hasty opinion;

Give us goodwill in the place of prejudice;

Give us thy peace in the place of our violence;

And, in the heat of our discussions and debates, let the cooling winds of thy spirit of justice, mercy, and truth sweep through these halls.

We praise thee, O God,

Let all the people praise thee. Amen

Mr. Everette Hale, Representative-elect of the 14th Representative District, moved that Mr. Benson be elected temporary Speaker of the House of Representative to serve until the election of the permanent speaker. The motion was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Everette Hale, moved that Mrs. Clarice Heckert, Representative-elect of the 11th Representative District, be elected temporary Clerk of the House of Representatives. The motion was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Everette Hale moved that the Certificates of Election be received and that a committee of two members be appointed to receive and examine the certificates. The motion was_ adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Benson appointed Messrs. Hale and Zimmerman, Representatives-elect of the 14th and 26th Representative Districts, to receive and examine the Certificates of Election of the members. Mr. Benson declared a short recess to enable the Committee to examine the Certificates of Election.

The members reconvened at the call of Mr. Benson. Messrs. Hale and Zimmerman reported that they had examined the Certificates of Election and found that they were in order.

The Certificate of Election for Mr. David S. Benson was then read, as follows:

THE STATE OF DELAWARE, NEW CASTLE COUNTY, ss. BE IT REMEMBERED, That at the General Election held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-six, for New Castle County, according to the Constitution and Laws of the State of Delaware, David S. Benson was duly elected Representative of Representative District Number Twelve in said County in the General Assembly, which is manifest by calculating and ascertaining the aggregate amount of all the votes given for each person voted for in all the hundreds of election districts of the County, according to the provisions made by law in this behalf.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, We, the undersigned Judges constituting the Superior Court in New Castle County, who have met and ascertained the state of the election throughout the said County, as the law requires, have hereunto set our hands and caused the seal of the said Superior Court to be hereunto affixed at the Court House in said County on this 8th day of November, A.D. 1966.

Mr. Hale moved that the reading of one Certificate of Election constitute the reading of all. The motion was adopted by a unanimous voice vote.

Mr. Hale moved that Mr. Harry C. McSherry of Dover, a Notary Public of the State of Delaware, give the oath of office as Representative to Mr. Benson and to Mrs. Heckert, and also give them the oath of office as Temporary Speaker and Temporary Clerk, respectively. The motion was adopted by a unanimous voice vote. Mr. McSherry then administered the following oath to Mr. Benson.

HR 1 — In Reference to the Election of the Speaker of the House.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware that George C. Hering, III be and he is hereby elected to the Office of Speaker of the House for the duration of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware.

Mr. Hale moved the adoption of HR 1.

HR 1 was then unanimously adopted by a voice vote.

Mr. Hale moved that Mr. Benson, the Temporary Speaker, appoint two members to escort the Speaker-elect, Mr. Hering, to the rostrum. Mr. Benson, the Temporary Speaker, appointed Mr. Hale and Mr. Zimmerman to escort Mr. Hering to the rostrum.

Mr. Benson proceeded to administer the oath as Speaker of the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly to Mr. Hering. The oath was taken by Mr. Hering as follows:

Mr. Hering then made some remarks on his election as Speaker.

Mr. Hale moved that Maurice A. Hartnett III, Esquire, of Dover, be elected temporary bill clerk and temporary reading clerk of the House of Representatives to serve until the elections of the permanent bill clerk and permanent reading clerk. The motion was unanimously adopted by a voice vote.

Mrs. Heckert then proceeded to administer the employees' oath to Mr. Hartnett, the form of which was as previously administered to Mr. Benson as Temporary Speaker.

Mr. Hale requested the privilege of the floor and placed in the record a copy of his remarks before a group of Educators in New Castle County. Mr. Joseph T. Cashman introduced the following resolution which was co-sponsored by all the members of the House:

HR 2 — Expressing the Regrets of the Members of the House Of Representatives Of The 124th General Assembly On the Death of Former Representative James Quigley.

WHEREAS, Jim Quigley, found in peaceful death Monday, November 7, 1966, was placed to his well-earned rest on Thursday, November 10,

WHEREAS, by nature a combatant of fearsome degree in the role of procuring for his constituents their just rights and earnest dues, it would take far more than this reverent resolution to extol the qualities he brought to this arena. Suffice it to say: Woe betide any ill-equipped fellow representative who had the temerity, audacity and misfortune to attempt to cross sabres in words and reasoning on the floor of this House with this redoubtable warrior,

NOW THEREFORE.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives, that the membership of the newly constituted 124th General Assembly in session assembled, go on record as to expressing its extreme sorrow at the loss of this outstanding legislator, a quondam speaker and member of the House for 22 years, an outstanding citizen of the State, a devoted husband and father, a comrade and friend to those on either side of the aisle in good or bad times.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the Journal of the House, distributed to the Press and that an embossed copy, signed by the proper authorities, be presented to the bereaved family.

Mr. Hale moved for the adoption of HR 2. HR 2 was then unanimously adopted by voice vote.

Mr. Hale introduced the following resolution:

HR 3 — In Reference to Temporary Rules of the House of Representatives.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly that the Rules of the House of Representatives in effect at the end of the second regular session of the 123rd General Assembly be and they are hereby adopted as the temporary rules for the governing of the present Session.

Mr. Hale moved for the adoption of HR 3 and it was seconded by Mr. Dodge. HR 3 was unanimously adopted by a voice vote.

Mr. Hale introduced the following resolutions:

HR 4 — Appointing A Committee to Notify the Governor that the House of Representatives Is Organized.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware, that the Speaker of the House appoint a committee of 2 members on the part of the House to notify the Governor of the State of Delaware, of the convening of the first regular session of the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly, and to inform him that the House is ready to receive any communication that he may desire to present, or to receive any message that he may choose to deliver at such time as he may designate.

HR 5 — Notifying the Senate that the House of Repre-

sentatives is Organized and Ready for Business.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware, that the Clerk of said House notify the Senate that the House is organized and ready to receive business.

HR 6 — Authorizing the Legislative Reference Bureau

to Furnish Stationery and Other Supplies.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware, that the Legislative Reference Bureau is hereby authorized and directed to furnish, during the 124th General Assembly, to the Members of the House of Representatives, stationery and other supplies, the cost of which shall not exceed the sum of \$25.00 for each for use during the 124th General Assembly.

HR 7 — Authorizing the Chief Clerk to Obtain Supplies.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly that the Chief Clerk of the House of Representatives be and hereby is authorized and directed to procure from the Legislative Reference Bureau all necessary books, forms, seals, blanks, stamps and stationery as may be required for the proper conducting of the business of the House.

Mr. Hale moved HR 4, HR 5, HR 6 and HR 7 be adopted and Mr. Dodge seconded the motion. All the above resolutions were adopted by a unanimous vote.

The House adjourned until 1:30 P.M., January 4, 1967.

2ND LEGISLATIVE DAY

The House met pursuant to adjournment at 1:35 P.M., on January 4, 1967.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Reverend Oliver Spence.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag.

AND WHEREAS, the Governor of the State and Mayor of the City of Wilmington have been unable to effectively get both sides to enter into meaningful collective bargaining talks;

AND WHEREAS, it is the duty of this General Assembly to protect the public welfare;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this General Assembly that the intent of this body, urging both sides to immediately enter into effective and continuous bargaining talks to reach an agreement which protects the public welfare as well as their own private needs, be transmitted to the parties involved.

On motion of Mr. Castle HR 13 was adopted by voice vote.

The following bill was introduced, given first reading, by title only, and assigned to committee as follows:

HB 1 — An Act Agreeing To A Proposed Amendment To Article X Of The Constitution Of The State Of Delaware By Providing That The General Assembly May Provide For The Transportation Of Students Of Non-Public, Non-Profit Elementary and High Schools.

WHEREAS, an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Delaware was proposed to the 123rd General Assembly as follows:

"An Act Proposing An Amendment To Article X Of The Constitution Of The State Of Delaware By Providing That The General Assembly May Provide For The Transportation Of Students Of Non-Public, Non-Profit Elementary And High Schools.

Be It Enacted By The General Assembly Of The State Of Delaware (Two-Thirds Of All Members Elected To Each Branch Thereof Concurring Therein):

Section 1. Article X of the Constitution of the State of Delaware is amended by adding thereto a new section to read:

§5. Transportation of non-public school students

Section 5. The General Assembly, notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, may provide by an Act of the General Assembly, passed with the concurrence of a majority of all the members elected to each House, for the transportation of students of non-public, nonprofit Elementary and High Schools.", AND

WHEREAS, the said proposed amendment was agreed to by two-thirds of all the Members elected to each House in the said 123rd General Assembly, NOW, THEREFORE

Be It Enacted By The General Assembly Of The State Of Delaware (Two-Thirds Of All The Members Elected To Each Branch Thereof Concurring Therein): Section 1. The said proposed amendment is agreed to and adopted and shall forthwith become a part of the Constitution.

Introduced by Messrs. Slawik, Ferguson, Zimmerman, McMahon and Phillips. Referred to the committee on Revised Statutes.

On motion of Mr. Hale the House recessed at call of the chair at 5:23 P.M.

The House reconvened at 1:39 P.M., and adjourned at 1:40 P.M., ending the 2nd Legislative Day.

3RD LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Speaker called the House to order at 1:40 P.M., on January 12, 1967.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Reverend David B-Mulford.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag.

The Speaker asked if there were any additions or corrections to the Minutes of the previous session. There being none, the Minutes were approved as posted.

The House recessed at 1:49 P.M.

At 2:10 P.M. the Sergeant-at-Arms announced the President and Members of the Senate. They were admitted and seated. The Speaker invited the President of the Senate to a seat on the rostrum.

JOINT SESSION

Mr. Hale moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Hale moved that the Speaker of the House preside over the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Mr. Hale moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate act as Secretaries for the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

The Chair appointed the following committee to escort the Governor to the House: Mrs. Gooding, Mrs. Heckert, Senators Steele and Robbins.

The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed Committee to the House Chamber.

The Speaker invited the Governor to the rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Mr. Speaker Mr. President

Mr. President Pro Tem

Members of the 124th General Assembly

Fellow Citizens:

Ours is a vital task for we are meeting at a time of our state's greatest growth, at a time of its most significant contribution in this union of states in which we played a founding role and in the aftermath of one of the most productive General Assemblies that Delaware has ever known.

We come together at a time of division in the political make up of our state government. All Delaware is aware of that fact and is watching us to see if out of that division we can fashion harmony, if out of that split we can build creatively, if out of our differences we can construct a spirit of Bipartisan cooperation founded on the hand of friendship and a mutual desire to bring to this state a progressive, dynamic government that will serve the needs and demands of our citizens in a constructive and enduring way.

This administration will continue to pursue that end.

I know personally or by reputation all of the new members of this General Assembly and I know each of you to be honorable and substantial citizens dedicated not to political advantage but to positive achievement through meaningful and productive decisions. Accordingly, we can proceed with confidence in each other from this very moment.

As in the past one of our overriding concerns will be the finances of the state.

You are aware that I have stressed and this administration has practiced financial responsibility during its first two years in office. My firm intent is that this same philosophy shall prevail for the next two years. In order that there be no later misunderstanding, I should like to set forth here some important guidelines.

- 1. We must continue to progress. Many areas of service for our citizens need substantial improvement and require increased funds. At this time the highest priorities are in the prevention of air and water pollution, the expansion of higher education, the improvement of certain phases of our mental health programs, the development of certain recreational areas and increased emphasis on highway safety.
- 2. We must continue to improve the structure of state government. The present priorities in this area are the implementation of the merit system, the expansion of our voluntary bulk purchasing program into a modified central purchasing office, the creation of a state architect's office, and the functional reorganization of state agencies.

- 3. In each priority area, we must continue to advance in positive but planned and controlled steps. We do not foresee any "crash" programs. The agencies can take advantage of an effective program and utilize moderate budgetary increases each year for several years. Crash programs in these areas can only lead to waste and inefficiency.
- 4. The Governor, as Chief Executive, is the chief fiscal officer in the state. It will be expected during the next two years, as during the past two, that all executive agencies will direct their requests for change in the recommended executive budget or for supplementary appropriations to the governor and to the budget director for consideration prior to placing such requests before the General Assembly.
- 5. Except for bona fide emergencies beyond the control of the agency, it is expected that all executive agencies will live within their budget appropriation. This is especially true in the area of employees' salary increases. It has been, and will continue to be, the policy of this administration to oppose supplementary appropriations for the purpose of increasing salaries midway through a fiscal year.
- 6. We must continue to adopt fiscal programs that assure the state of an adequate annual cash balance in the General Fund. We must not revert to fiscal policies which permit a General Fund deficit. Our budget proposals should carefully weigh our needs and resources with this guideline in mind in this regard, it is my determination, for the duration of this administration, to meet our increased automatic requirements and advance all priority programs without any tax increases. No tax increases will be recommended or anticipated by me.
- 7. We must continue to evaluate our annual capital improvement act primarily in terms of priority needs and our six-year capital improvement program. We must give close attention to the effect this act will have on our total bonded debt. We must also take into consideration the impact that increased debt service costs will have on our annual operating budget. During the next two years it is important that we limit our capital improvement acts to a maximum of \$40 million annually.
- 8. We must continue to safeguard the divestiture revenue principal in the Capital Investment Fund. This money is a legitimate receipt from the personal income tax, but it constitutes a fiscal oddity since a large sum of non-recurring revenue came to the state in a short period of time. If we permit substantial parts of the principal of this fund to be used for routine operations, the state may be less prudent in evaluating needs and will certainly face a financial crisis when the fund is exhausted. For this reason, I propose that

the uncommitted balance of these divestiture monies, plus additional principal collected as tax receipts under the law, be constitutionally protected so that the principal may only be expended on approval of two-thirds of the members of the General Assembly. During the current year, an excess of \$1.7 million earnings from the Capital Investment Fund are being applied toward the interest on our bonded debt. I propose that next year, and for each year in the future, the earnings from the fund be wholly applied toward the interest on our bonded debt.

- 9. On several occasions in the past, I have publicly expressed my views on the level of passenger motor vehicle registration fees and I should like to repeat them now so that there will be no misconception. If these fees are returned to their 1965 level and a flat \$5.00 increase applied, the state will lose about \$750,000 in revenue next year. The administration can live with such a decrease and I would approve such a measure, if enacted. At the same time, I feel compelled to warn that any additional appropriations beyond those recommended here will require even more careful scrutiny.
- 10. While this picture is one of restraint and tight budgetary control, I want to emphasize that I am not shutting the door on any new programs that the General Assembly might advocate. I think it necessary to state, however, that any new program requiring a substantial expenditure will have to come to my desk accompanied by a revenue measure designed to raise the funds needed for putting the program into effect. That is a responsible and businesslike procedure.

I turn now to the current fiscal year, fiscal 1967. At the time I became Governor two years ago, it was the projection of the budget director that there would be a deficit of almost \$9 million in the General Fund on June 30, 1967, and the Governor's Revenue Study Committee foresaw a deficit of \$10 million on June 30, 1967, and of \$28.4 million on June 30, 1968. I am happy to report to you that we now estimate a cash balance of \$22 million on June 30, 1967. It is to the lasting credit of the 123rd General Assembly that it performed its duty in the most difficult area in state government and legislation.

The cash balance of \$22 million will be approximately the same as the balance that existed on June 30, 1966. Thus, our current estimate is that we will complete the current fiscal year with a balanced budget.

This achievement has been made possible by a combination of several factors including the use of \$1.7 million of Capital Investment Fund earnings, a calculated delay in the sale of authorized bonds, increased interest on our deposits in the Farmers Bank, and the continued economic growth of our community. While our inheritance and state tax revenue has been above average and is now estimated at \$3.7 million during the current fiscal year, it should be noted that this estimated figure is the lowest since fiscal 1962 and thus our achievement has not been marked by unusual reliance on this revenue source.

In pursuing the successful completion of this fiscal year, we should be alert to legitimate emergency needs. There are several small but vitally important supplementary appropriations needed during the current year. These include \$15,000.00 for the new Personnel Commission which was established with no appropriation, \$50,000.00 for the new Water and Air Resources Commission which was established with no funds for its additional responsibilities, \$25,000.00 for the Delaware Arts Council, \$62,650.00 for the State Park Commission for current operations on the Indian River Park prior to the beginning of the summer season. These supplementary appropriations have been taken into account in recommending—the budget act for fiscal 1968 and do not measurably affect the \$22 million estimate of our cash balance on June 30, 1967.

For fiscal year 1968, automatic appropriations and the request of the various agencies totaled \$169.1 million. This represents nearly \$27 million over what we expect to disburse this year.

My estimates of General Fund revenue for fiscal 1968, including \$3 million for Estate and Inheritance Taxes, total \$147 million. Thus, once again, it is the obvious and inescapable fact that all agency requests cannot be recommended by me

After a careful review of our present agency programs and proposed new programs, I am recommending for fiscal 1968 a General Fund Budget Act of \$149 million. When automatic appropriations of \$7 million and routine Grants-In-Aid of \$1.4 million are added and \$3 million in estimated reversions is deleted, the anticipated General Fund cash disbursement will be \$154.4 million. This is about \$7.4 million more than our \$147 million estimate of revenue for fiscal 1968 and will reduce our estimated cash balance to \$14.6 million on June 30, 1968.

This recommended cash disbursement of \$154.4 million for fiscal 1968 is a \$12.4 million increase over the \$142 million expected to be disbursed during the current year. A substantial part of this increase, \$7.6 million, falls within areas over which we have little control as follows:

- \$.7 Decrease In Earnings Available From Capital Investment Fund
- \$.9 Statutory Salary Schedule Increases To School Teacher And Employees
- \$.7 Statutory Salary Increments To School Teachers And Employees
- \$ 1.5 Increase In Number Of Public School Pupil

\$ 7.6

In addition, I have recommended an increase of \$1.2 million for higher education; \$712,000 for the public schools including increased transportation costs, additional clerical personnel, additional teacher substitutes and additional specialists, and an increase in the unit allotment to \$900.00. If we count money made available to the school districts during the current fiscal year and recommended to them in the budget for the next fiscal year for routine maintenance and repairs, the unit allotment would average about \$1,000 in our school districts.

Additional increases include \$883,000 for improving the mental health program, especially at Stockley; and \$845,000 for our other health and welfare agencies. The balance of my recommended increase is spread out over all the remaining agencies, and, except for the Park Commission, the new Water And Air Resources Commission, the new Personnel Commission, the new Arts Council and the new Uniform Commercial Code Division, is intended primarily to improve employees' salaries and cover inflationary increases in the purchase of materials and service.

In concluding this outline of our present financial condition and the executive budget recommendation for fiscal 1968, I must impart a few words of caution.

It has been assumed that the economic growth of the past five years will continue throughout fiscal 1968; even a minor recession could drastically reduce the estimates of revenue from personal and corporate income taxes.

Although our budgets are annual, it is important that we look beyond the next fiscal year. The members of this body will have the responsibility for enactment of the budget act for fiscal 1969, and there is one unusual matter which dims the prospects for that year. On July 1, 1968, the first day of fiscal 1969, we will have to pay the full principal on a \$2.5 million highway improvement bond issue, the only bond issue in modern Delaware history that was not amortized.

Not withstanding the difficulties that lie ahead, my administration is determined to keep the following commitments over the "Biennium:"

- 1. Meet all priority needs in areas of public service within the limits of efficient expansion.
 - 2. Enact no tax increases.

3. Leave the next administration and General Assembly with a substantial cash balance on June 30, 1969.

On balance, we can face the immediate future with cautious optimism. While the prospects are not as favorable as we ideally desire, they are considerably better than they were and they insure our continued progress. As I see it, this is the fiscal picture as we begin what I hope will prove to be another historic session of the Delaware General Assembly.

Let us constantly remember that we are following upon the heels of a truly great legislature which enacted landmark reforms and programs that have been advocated for decades but which, for one reason or another, had previously failed of adoption.

It is not my intent to rest on the laurels of that General

Assembly and become a passive Chief of State.

Accordingly, I strongly urge you to follow through with the dynamic activity that the 123rd General Assembly so

auspiciously generated.

That includes implementation of the Merit System, strengthening of the Water And Air Resources Commission so that it can act vigorously to deliver us from present pollution and preserve us from the health threat that has scared our neighboring states, and the establishment in fact of Technical-Community Schools in Sussex and New Castle counties.

The technical school Board of Trustees has been working diligently and their comprehensive report, together with recommended legislation, will be ready for submittal in the near future.

In the past few weeks we have read much about the Wolcott Committee Report which has been released after more than a year of preparation. Public hearings on that report, under a team of concerned citizens, are about to begin.

Unquestionably, some school consolidation is imperative as an adjunct to the good education of our children in the secondary grades. I am calling upon the people, the General Assembly and the school districts to work together toward the establishment of districts which will be meaningful in terms of the best modern educational knowledge of finance and curriculum. What we seek is the best possible educational foundation for our young people.

Constructive consolidation of inefficient small districts would not only make improved educational programs pos-

sible but would also effect savings by:

1. Allowing greater flexibility in the use of school buildings.

- 2. Permit greater flexibility in scheduling pupil transportation.
- 3. Help to equalize the property tax base by bringing the extremes closer together.
- 4. Increase bulk purchasing of many supplies and materials.

Before I depart from the realm of education, I want to say during the current fiscal year we will finance our schools by \$1,228,000 over and above normal growth and will spend at least \$1,168,000 over normal growth during the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

It is a pleasure to report here that the Governor's Goals Committee, which has been steadfastly at work for most of my two years in office, has its report regarding consolidation of state agencies nearly ready to submit.

I am familiar, in general terms, with its recommendations which I believe will be of great value and importance to the progress of our government. Legislation to accompany the report is also being prepared.

When it is ready, I intend to come before the General Assembly, with the concurrence of the two Houses, and present the proposals to you in their entirety.

Along those lines, I want to say here that with your kind indulgence it will be my policy, as it was throughout the life of the 123rd General Assembly, to speak in this forum whenever a major program is to be introduced in the form of legislation or at any other such time when I might have information or suggestions that, in my opinion, will be useful to each of you as you go about your important deliberations.

As in past years, there will be several governor's conferences to be held during 1967 to which all of you, as members of the General Assembly, will be invited. A conference on travel and recreation is already scheduled for March under the sponsorship of the State Development Department. Tourism is a multi-million dollar industry in Delaware, particularly when related to recreation, and it is essential for us to encourage its promotion and development. Our theme of "Wonderful Delaware" is beginning to show beneficial results in economic terms and I hope that we can continue the effort even more dynamically in the future.

Industrial development is also at a high level and I think it significant that since 1965, Delaware has added 35 new or vastly expanded industrial operations to its vibrant economy.

Shortly after the first of the year, I added to my staff a management analyst. His major responsibility will be in the area of state-federal relationships, especially in so far as obtaining federal funds for Delaware is concerned. Already his employment has produced beneficial results and I fully expect our state to realize a greater share of revenue from federal programs. Delaware taxpayers remit more than \$1 billion annually to the federal government in taxes and receive less than \$50 million in return for state supported programs.

A capital budget act is being prepared and will be submitted to this Assembly much earlier than has been the case in the past. At the time of its submission, I expect to come before the General Assembly and explain its major provisions and the motivation used in making our selections of which programs to pursue and which to postpone. However, I want to explain to you at this time the clear and present need for immediate authorization by the General Assembly of three projects.

These projects are a part of my recommended capital budget. They have been carefully evaluated and I believe the failure to authorize them immediately will result in serious curtailment of our progress and service to the people of Delaware.

The projects include patient treatment facilities for the Department of Mental Health, a conversion of William Jason High School into facilities for the Delaware Technical and Community College and improvement and development of recreational facilities in the Indian River Inlet area of our Beachlands. Appropriate legislation will be submitted within two weeks.

The recent fire in the New Castle building of the State Hospital has created a severe patient housing and treatment problem for the Department of Mental Health. Funds in the amount of \$2,750,000 have been requested to construct a Sussex Treament Unit of 150 beds and provide for the construction of space for an additional 50 beds in the presently authorized Kent Treatment Unit. I recommend that these funds be authorized immediately through the use of general obligation bonds since patients at the State Hospital are currently in very crowded quarters which precludes giving them the care and treatment that their situation warrants.

The last General Assembly created the Delaware Institute of Technology for post high school students. While I plan to speak to you in the near future on the total recommendations of the board of trustees of that organization, it is appropriate to point out here that its plans include conversion of the William Jason High School at Georgetown into a technical and community college. By making available immediately funds in the amount of \$1,540,000, it is anticipated that this college may be open for student enrollment in September of this year. Since such a program will immeasurably assist industries already operating in Delaware and

serve as an inducement to other business and industry to locate within our borders, it is imperative that you give immediate consideration to this recommendation.

During the past summer, the public beachlands were transferred from the State Highway Department to the jurisdiction of the State Park Commission. There is a great demand for improvement of the beachlands for recreational purposes since thousands of our own citizens, plus hundreds from out-of-state, take advantage of the availability of the state-owned facilities. In order to make the use of the area accessible to the public this summer with the necessary parking, sanitary and related facilities, construction must begin very soon. An entire recreation season will be lost if this authorization were to become effective on July 1, 1967, instead of now. I am recommending, therefore, that funds in the amount of \$600,000 be authorized at this time and that the funds be taken from the Capital Investment Fund.

A Legislative Building Committee was appointed by Joint Resolution of the last General Assembly. The committee has been hard at work with the services of an architect and has made a report calling for the expansion of Legislative Hall. It is important that this work continue unimpeded and to that end it is necessary to authorize funds for the project. The entire state is served by Legislative Hall and members of the General Assembly should be provided with adequate office space. The state has constructed numerous new buildings for various state agencies but has neglected the provision of necessary facilities for the Legislature. For these reasons, I recommend the passage of legislation which will provide funds in the amount of \$1,320,000 for the expansion of Legislative Hall from the Capital Investment Fund at an early date. As I said earlier, I will come before this session at a later date with recommendations regarding other provisions of the capital budget.

A later message will also be forthcoming from me containing recommendations for election reform including the establishment of a bipartisan statewide election system. Legislation to achieve that effect is being prepared.

Ladies and gentlemen, I have endeavored here to set the tone for some of the things which we must achieve during 1967-68 if Delaware is to continue to be, as she has consistently been in the past, a leader among the states of the union. We are one of the fastest growing, one of the richest, one of the most attractive and one of the leaders among the states in providing employment for our people. That situation has not just come about, for in natural resources we are not abundant. But it is in human resources that our greatness is preeminent and triumphant. The task of government is to

utilize those human resources in the most effective manner possible and to provide an atmosphere in which productivity, imagination and creativeness may flourish.

The new year opens to the last third of the 20th century. a period of almost unbelievable accomplishment, yet a time of stress and turmoil that has deeply involved and significantly influenced our entire civilization. Today, we in Delaware, as do people throughout the nation, look across the miles to south east Asia where young citizens from our beloved state are standing firm with heroic bravery and sacrifice against a tide of aggression, which if left unchecked would eventually and surely sweep to our own shores. All that we can do in their behalf is scarcely enough. We may debate and discuss the nation's policies in this time of trial and challenge but even the towering strength of our democracy cannot - permit national division. Let us steadfastly hope and earnestly pray that violence of conflict will soon abate and the conference table will replace the savagery and bitterness of the battlefield. To this end we continue to pledge our enduring efforts.

There are other projects and proposals which I would have liked to discuss here today but my speech, because of the necessity to brief you fully on the financial prospectus, has already been long and I must close.

Let me finish as I began with a reminder that we are all Delawareans, all involved deeply and irrevocably with one another and that it is in our common interest to work together, irrespective of party, to retain for our state that coveted position of "First" which was bequeathed to us by our far-seeing ancestors of an earlier generation.

The previously named Committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber.

On motion the House recessed to the call of the chair at 3:05 P.M.

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States has established as firm national policy that such orders must be responsive to the wishes of the farmers supplying the marketing area; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Agriculture has advanced as its only reason for desiring a change in said Order its self-asserted inability to insure said Order against minimum price violations; and

WHEREAS, recently Federal courts have demonstrated a total willingness to cooperate with the Department of Agriculture to enforce compliance when the Department seeks such enforcement; and

WHEREAS, Amendment of the said order other than to strengthen its handler pool by enforcement features would result in irreparable damage to Order No. 4 farmers and thus to the economy of this area; and

WHEREAS, such loss to the economy of the Delaware Valley is patently unnecessary and indefensible in view of the aforesaid evidences of the full enforcement cooperation of the courts.

NOW THEREFORE.

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives that the Chief Clerk of the House be instructed to mail copies of this Resolution to members of the Delaware delegation in Congress and to the United States Secretary of Agriculture to the end that they be advised that it is the sense of this House that the handler pool of Milk Marketing Order No. 4 should be retained and diligently enforced.

Report to the General Assembly of the State of Delaware by the Insurance Study and Revision Committee.

A REPORT TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE

THE INSURANCE STUDY AND REVISION COMMITTEE To the Members of the General Assembly:

The Insurance Study and Revision Committee was created by Chapter 306, Volume 55, Laws of Delaware, as amended, and was therein authorized to cause to be prepared a revision and recodification of the laws of the State of Delaware relating to the business of insurance, and to report back to the General Assembly upon the convening of its Session for 1967.

Pursuant to the foregoing, your Committee hereby reports as follows:

(1) Organization of Committee. Your Committee is comprised of the following individuals:

Shortly after its appointment, your Committee met and selected Mr. Harry S. Smith as Chairman and Mr. Harry S. Wilson as Secretary. Your Committee has held meetings from time to time as required for the discharge of its responsibilities.

Special Counsel. After extended search for and consideration of persons possessing requisite experience and abilities, coupled with interviews conducted by the Committee with various of such persons, your Committee, under date of September 9, 1966, entered into a contract with Mr. Robert D. Williams for the performance of the detailed work involved in the revision and recodification. Mr. Williams is an Attorney at Law with extensive experience in the insurance law and legislative field, and in the revision and recodification of state insurance codes, having prepared the insurance codes which are now in force in the States of Washington, Kentucky, Arizona, Florida, Arkansas, Montana, and Idaho, and in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. Mr. Williams also recodified its insurance laws for the State of Michigan, and has just completed a revision and recodification of its insurance laws for the State of Wyoming. Under the contract

- Mr. Williams, as Special Counsel to your Committee, has assumed responsibility for the research to accompany the revision and recodification project, the drafting of the proposed chapters, the review of such drafts with your Committee, and the further review of the proposed draft by all who may be concerned therewith in the insurance business and among the general public of the State of Delaware through a series of public hearings to be conducted by your Committee before presentation of the proposed revised and recodified insurance laws to the General Assembly as a Bill for its consideration. By the contract, Mr. Williams is required to have a preliminary draft of the proposed revised and recodified Delaware Insurance Code completed not later than June 1st, 1967. By the contract, Mr. Williams is required to consult with your Committee with respect to the general plan and the details of the revision and recodification, and to comply with the decisions of your Committee in the disposition of issues which may arise as to form and contents.
- General Scope and Contents of Proposed Revised **Insurance Code.** The project undertaken by your Committee contemplates the presentation to the General Assembly for its consideration of a comprehensive and fully modern body of insurance laws for the State of Delaware. The proposed revised Delaware Insurance Code will be made up of approximately thirty chapters, in which the law will be presented in an orderly and readily accessible manner. The thirty chapters will cover the general powers and duties of the Insurance Commissioner, basic requirements of insurers of all types for authority to transact business in the State of Delaware, the financial affairs of such insurers, qualification and licensing of insurance representatives, operations in the State as to insurers not authorized to transact business here, insurance rates and rating, insurance transactions of all kinds, the internal affairs of Delaware insurance corporations, fraternal organizations and the handling of the affairs of insurance companies and organizations in financial distress.

Without attempting to list more than a few, the proposed revised Delaware Insurance Code will contain the necessary provisions for accomplishment of definite objectives, some of which are as follows:

- (a) Insurance Commissioner. Adequate powers for the Insurance Commissioner, for better protection of the public interest in the business of insurance.
- (b) Administrative Procedures. Comprehensive provisions governing the administrative procedures of the Insurance Commissioner, to insure full consideration and due process in matters handled by the Insurance Commissioner, and with full right of appeal to the Courts by aggrieved parties.

- (c) Financial Requirements. Strengthened financial and other requirements for insurance companies transacting or desiring to transact business in Delaware.
- (d) **Investments.** More comprehensive and effective provisions governing the investments of domestic insurance companies.
- (e) Insurance Representatives. Modernization of qualification and licensing laws for insurance representatives, incorporating, among others, an efficient and economical permanent licensing system which will increase the net revenues for the State from this source.
- (f) Insurance contracts. Provisions dealing with insurance contracts in general, designed to facilitate the making of insurance contracts and the payment of proceeds and claims thereunder.
- (g) Cancellations. Reasonable protection of the public against unwarranted cancellation of automobile insurance policies.
- (h) Insurance Corporations. A strengthening of laws governing internal affairs of domestic insurance corporations in respects in which the general corporation laws are found either inappropriate or inadequate as applied to the insurance business.
- (i) Mergers and Amalgamations. Comprehensive and modern provisions governing the merger, bulk reinsurance, and other transformations and amalgamations of insurance companies, in order to provide these desirable facilities for Delaware insurance corporations.
- (j) Rehabilitation and Conservation. Comprehensive provisions governing rehabilitation and conservation of insurance companies, designed to require efficient and economic handling of the affairs of financially distressed insurance companies to the end that policyholders, wherever located, shall receive maximum protection.
- (k) Unauthorized Insurers. Effective new provisions extending jurisdiction within constitutional limits, as to the operations, by mail or otherwise, of unauthorized insurers in the State, providing for jurisdiction of Delaware courts in disputes arising under policies issued by such insurers to residents of Delaware, providing means for discouraging use of false and misleading advertising by such insurers in this State, and providing for taxation of certain coverages written in such unauthorized insurers on Delaware risks.
- (4) Progress to date. Mr. Williams has delivered to your Committee preliminary drafts of several chapters of the proposed revised insurance code and shortly will have ready for delivery several additional chapters. Both the Committee and Mr. Williams have every reason to believe that the en-

tire proposed revised insurance code in preliminary draft form will be in the hands of the Committee by June 1, 1967. Your Committee is meeting with Mr. Williams from time to time for review of the details of proposed chapters and for the making of such changes therein or additions thereto as your Committee deems advisable. Your Committee expects to hold public hearings on the entire proposed revised code in late summer or early fall of 1967, and to have the revised code in the form of a legislative Bill ready for consideration and enactment by the General Assembly within the year 1967.

Your Committee is conscious of its responsibilities to the General Assembly and to the people of the State of Delaware. It is proceeding in the manner determined by it, after much consideration, as necessary for the production of a revised insurance code for Delaware which will represent thorough and expert work, and will, when enacted, be a body of insurance laws adapted to the needs of our State, which in general character and in the quality of protection extended to the public, will be unexcelled by those of any other State.

Your Committee requests the acceptance of this, its report, and the granting of such authority, if any, as may be requisite to the completion of its undertaking in accordance with the plans above set forth.

The Speaker announced that he had invited Mr. Abbott, President of Local 842, Amalgamated Transit Union; Mr. Harold Springer, President, Delaware Coach Co.; Mr. Conner, County Executive of New Castle County Council and Mayor John Bariarz to present their views on the current bus strike by the Delaware Coach Co., in the Wilmington area.

Mr. Abbott spoke first stating the four demands of the Union. He stated that the Union had started negotiations approximately seven days before termination of their contract. They continued for 45 days after the contract expired. Mr. Abbott said that the Delaware Coach Co. refused to arbitrate. The four issues are: 1) Inadequate living wage, (2) Escalator clause comparison, (3) Trusteeship and founding of pension plan, and (4) Trusteeship of all health and welfare benefits. Mr. Abbott stated there was some question on the part of the pension recipients as to whether or not they will receive their pensions this month or not.

Several Representatives asked questions of Mr. Abbott including: Reps. Castle, Hale, Cicione, Evans, Lesher, Brown, Ferguson, Murphy, Pagano, Fonville and Heckert.

Mr. Springer spoke on behalf of the Delaware Coach Co. — The Delaware Coach Co. grosses \$1,600,000 per annum and the Delaware Bus Co. (interstate charter) \$1,900,000 per annum. Mr. Springer said the company was a small one and that they would not arbitrate because they had offered their ultimate and there was no way to improve their productivity. Questions were asked by Reps. Castle, Heckert, Cashman, Gooding, Ferguson, Lesher, Riddagh, Blendt, Cicione, Evans and Shockley.

STATEMENT OF WILLIAM J. CONNER COUNTY EXECUTIVE FOR NEW CASTLE COUNTY BEFORE THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES DOVER, DELAWARE — FEBRUARY 14, 1967

On behalf of the citizens of New Castle County I would like to thank the House of Representatives for this opportunity to bring to the public's attention our view of the impasse which has been reached between the Delaware Coach Company and the Union at this 90th day of the bus strike. Let me say at the beginning that I cannot offer any easy solution to this difficult problem. I do not think that either party is all right or the other all wrong. I only know that the people in Wilmington least able to protect themselves are the ones most grievously affected by the total lack of bus service. For this reason we must all bend every effort to find a prompt solution.

Mayor Babiarz and I have joined in bringing action before the Public Service Commission asking that the Certificate of Convenience and Necessity held by the Bus Company be revoked. This action was not taken lightly; it was taken only after many weeks of patient mediation on the part of the Mayor and the federal mediator. It was taken after the Governor intervened repeatedly to attempt a settlement. It was taken after I had talked several times with each party, and had been unable even to bring them to the table together. It was taken only after the combined effort of state, county, and city to assure the parties that we would be glad to consider public subsidies, tax relief, federal assistance, and even public ownership was brushed aside.

The fact is that collective bargaining has ceased in this dispute. The Union has made severe economic demands upon the Company, and in addition has insisted on the principle of cost of living adjustments and funded benefit plans which are controversial issues having national significance far beyond the borders of New Castle County. The Coach Company on its part has insisted that it can only offer a specified number of dollars, which according to its calculations will afford it a minimum return from its local operations. No account has been taken in these figures of the various possible forms of assistance which the public authorities are willing to consider.

The most compelling evidence that true collective bargaining has ended is that the Coach Company has offered to sell out to the public authorities, but resists surrendering its franchise and resists selling to any other private operator. It is quite clear what these facts imply. This means that the Coach Company wants to use its Certificate, which is a privilege and not a right, to foreclose other private companies from entering the field and at the same time to force the public authorities to buy the assets of the Coach Company at a price favorable to them by continuing to deny service to the people of New Castle County. This is a tactic which we cannot permit. If the Coach Company cannot provide service, it should surrender the privilege of providing service and should deal on equal terms in disposing of its assets with any public or private group which is prepared to provide service. We will continue to pursue this remedy in the Public Service Commission with all the power at our command.

I said earlier that I had no panacea to offer for this difficult problem. It is not entirely clear how the Legislature can help us. Compulsory arbitration is a tempting possibility, yet experience elsewhere has indicated that it is often unfair to one party and tends to discourage honest collective bargaining. There are two areas where the Legislature might be able to help. If the Public Service Commission could be given

the necessary staff and could be encouraged to take a more active role in following the current operations of the Transit Company, they might be able to shed more light on the real ability of the Company to meet the demands of its employees. The information presently available from the Commission's files is wholly inadequate for this purpose. I might say that in order to fill this gap, the Mayor and I suggested to the Coach Company that the independent firm of Day and Zimmerman, of Philadelphia, be permitted to look at the Coach Company's records to establish whether their estimates as to future income and ability to pay were accurate and based on proper assumptions. This request has been refused, which leads us to a natural suspicion that some of the assumptions may not be well founded, and we have therefore asked the Commission to direct the Coach Company to make these figures available.

My other suggestions relates to Title 19, Sections 801 through 804, of the Delaware Code. This 1964 statute requires that before any public body may acquire and operate any property of a privately owned mass transportation system, it must agree to take over any existing union contract intact, and must assure employment and seniority to all employees of the system.

This statute was passed at a time when no transit strike was in progress and with little public discussion. I would suggest that the Legislature re-examine it to see whether they feel that a statute so restrictive is in the public interest. We have a more recent statute which requires all public bodies to bargain collectively with their employees, as we will begin doing tomorrow in New Castle County, and it would seem to me that this more general statute provides the protection to which the employees are entitled without the very stringent restrictions of the 1964 statute.

It goes without saying that all of these difficult problems could be avoided if the parties would honestly resume collective bargaining and would realize that the Union's monopoly of jobs and the Company's monopoly on service carry with them a corresponding responsibility to provide transportation to the public of New Castle County. If they would bargain on the purely local issues and bear in mind these obligations, the buses could be rolling this week.

I appreciate this opportunity to state our views to the House. I would be happy to try to answer any questions which the Representatives may have.

Mayor Barbiarz spoke on what steps he had taken in efforts to end the strike.

Mr. Walter J. Bierwagen, Vice President of International Amalgamated Union spoke for the Union.

WHEREAS, the United States District Court in the case of Sincock etal., vs. Gately etal., has directed the 124th General Assembly to enact a statute providing for a new apportionment of the State in accordance with the principle of "one man, one vote"; and

WHEREAS, the basis of the court's ruling that the present apportionment of the General Assembly violates the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution as interpreted by the U. S. Supreme Court, rests on the fact that population deviations from the norms laid down by the courts have resulted in underrepresentation in some areas; and

WHEREAS, tremendous growth patterns have occurred in all three counties, since the completion of the 1960 Census making that data unreliable as a basis for arriving at a fair apportionment under the principle, "one man, one vote"; and

WHEREAS, any apportionment based on this unreliable data might result in the further violation of this principle and thus cause possibly further court action; and

WHEREAS, the court specifically states in its opinion

that:

"Our State is a forward-looking and prosperous one. It is our view that a survey should be made of Kent and Sussex Counties and that clearly defined boundaries of General Assembly districts should be established so that our individual citizens' right of franchise may be clearly established. Moreover, a census of the two Counties, allocated to the survey, would be of great assistance in making sure that the fundamental principle established by the Supreme Court of "one person, one vote" is not impaired or abrogated."

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the House of the 124th General Assembly, and the Senate concurring therein, empower the Legislative Council of the General Assembly to take whatever action is necessary, including expenditure of the necessary funds, to begin and complete an immediate census of the State of Delaware in order to provide accurate data as a bisis for the reapportionment of the General Assembly in accordance with the decision rendered by the courts and the principle of "one man, one vote".

Introduced by Mr. Benson. Referred to the Committee on Revised Statutes.

The Village Improvement Association of Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, Sussex County, Delaware, representing a membership of two hundred sixty-five Delaware Federated Club Women interested in the preservation and beauty of our Beach Lands have gone on record at a regular meeting on April 5, 1967, protesting the passage of Senate Bill 22. Evaluation made by Civil Defense and Red Cross after the disastrous storm of March 1962, stressed the dangers to safety of campers and loss of lives. We recommend that a public hearing be held at which Sussex Countians who would be most affected could express their opinions and concern and urge postponment of the passage of this bill until further consideration. We request that this telegram be read on the floor of the House.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly, the Senate concurring therein, that this General Assembly respectfully applies to the Congress of the United States to call a convention for the purpose of proposing the following article as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States:

ARTICLE

"Section 1. Nothing in this Constitution shall prohibit any state which shall have a bicameral legislature from apportioning the membership of one house of such legislature on factors other than population, provided that the plan of such apportionment shall have been submitted to and approved by a vote of the electorate of that state.

Section 2. Nothing in this Constitution shall restrict or limit a state in its determination of how membership of governing bodies of its subordinate units shall be apportioned.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that if Congress shall have proposed an amendment to the Constitution identical with that contained in this resolution prior to December 31, 1967, this application for a convention shall no longer be of any force or effect.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a duly attested copy of this resolution be immediately transmitted to the Secretary of the Senate of the United States, the Clerk of the House of Representatives of the United States and to each member of the Congress from this State.

Introduced by Rep. Zimmerman. Read until Mr. Zimmerman moved that so much be considered a reading. Seconded by Mr. Slawik. Mr. Zimmerman then moved that HCR 10 be kept on Speaker's Desk. Mr. Speaker asked for an opinion from Mr. Zimmerman as to which committee he wished the Resolution to be placed. Mr. Zimmerman asked that HCR 10 be stricken. Mr. Speaker ordered HCR 10 stricken.

HCR 11 — Relating to referring problem of conflict of interest to Legislative Council.

WHEREAS, Section 20 of Article II of the Delaware Constitution states: "any member of the General Assembly who has a personal or private interest in any measure or bill pending in the General Assembly shall disclose the fact to the House of which he is a member and shall not vote thereon," and

WHEREAS, there is evidence that this constitutional provision has never been strictly adhered to by members of this or preceding General Assemblies, and

WHEREAS, the possibility of a conflict of interest contrary to the constitutional provision does exist in all fields or employment and activity, whether public or private, and

WHEREAS, members of the General Assembly should have a better definition of what constitutes a conflict so that they may determine when to declare their interest and when not to vote upon a measure, and

WHEREAS, all members of the 124th General Assembly are conscientiously concerned with good government so that they may render better service to their constituents and all citizens of the State of Delaware.

NOW THEREFORE:

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly, the Senate concurring therein, that the Legislative Council be, and it hereby is, empowered to establish guidelines to be used by members of the General Assembly in personally interpreting their responsibilities and course of action under Section 20 of Article II of the Constitution, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council submit its report and recommendations to the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate for dissemination to all members of the 124th General Assembly within sixty (60) days of the enactment of this Concurrent Resolution, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the recommendations of the Council be debated by both Houses of the 124th General Assembly, and, upon a majority of votes of all members elected to each House, they be incorporated into the rules of each House.

Section 2. Nothing in this Constitution shall restrict or limit a state in its determination of how membership of governing bodies of its subordinate units shall be apportioned.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment of the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that if Congress shall have proposed an amendment to the Constitution identical with that contained in this resolution prior to June 30, 1967, this application for a convention shall no longer be of any force or effect.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a duly attested copy of this resolution be immediately transmitted to the Secretary of the Senate of the United States, the Clerk of the House of Representatives of the United States and to each member of the Congress from this State.

Gentlemen:

I have thought that the University's position was clear with respect to making a census on a sampling basis that would be of help in redistricting as ordered by the Court. However, since it apparently is not, I once again write you gentlemen who seem to be most concerned. Our Trustees have stated that the University, if it were to do a census, could undertake the work only if it were strongly urged to do so by both political parties. Quite obviously, this is not the circumstance and does not seem likely to be. For a university closely related to the State and indirectly, because of this, to the two political parties in the State Legislature, to do such work without the consent of all concerned would be to its general detriment.

Further, the University's charter directs that "The University shall never be managed or conducted in the interest of any party, sect, or denomination." To permit a service unit of the University to do this work unless the two major parties agree to the census undertaking, would, it seems clear, bring charges of favoritism or partialty, whether justified or not.

I think none of you, any more than our Trustees, would want to jeopardize the general respect and stature of this University by invading its freedom to either force it to do this census or not to do it. It is my hope that as responsible state officials you will respect the decision of the Trustees and others related to this matter and, for your part, you will be as concerned as we are about protecting the University's independence and will not involve it any further in this matter.

In accordance with our recent telephone conversation this is to advise you that the NASCAR Drag Race Division maintains a complete file of AMA shipping weights on all domestically produced automobiles and most foreign cars for purposes of competition classification.

Our interest, of course, is in safe and fair competition among auto enthusiasts and a ratio of horsepower to weight is the only way we can classify cars to insure close competition.

The weights we use are taken from the official AMA (Automobile Manufacturer's Association) bulletins issued for every model car produced each year. These bulletins are readily available from the manufacturers and are usually published prior to a model's release to the public.

The figures are also available from the National Association of Automobile Dealers (NADA) in Washington, D. C., in a handy booklet form. The NADA can also supply shipping weight figures on nearly all autos produced in the past.

There are several other groups besides NASCAR using shipping weights for classifying or categorizing automobiles and the gathering of such information poses no particular

problem.

It should be pointed out, however, that the shipping weights published for automobiles do not necessarily correspond with actual weight when in street operation. These weights are compiled by weighing individually all component parts of a car during assembly on a number of sample vehicles. The cars in full street trim with certain optional features and lubricants, etc. will weigh more.

The difference in actual weight to advertised shipping

weights will be proportional in most cars.

I hope this information will be of some assistance to you. If there is any other way that I can be of help please feel free to call.

Let's quit playing tags

One of the most durable amusements at this year's session of the General Assembly seems to be the game of tags.

Whenever there is a lull in all the other proceedings, some legislator comes up with a new variation on the theme of charging the flat \$20 fee for passenger car registration.

House Bill 22, introduced in February by a group of Republicans from all three counties, would undo the progress that was made two years ago in getting rid of "gross load weight" as a basis for setting fees. It would create four categories for passenger cars and two for station wagons, starting with \$12 for a car weighing less than 3,000 pounds and rising to \$24 for one weighing over 4,500 pounds.

Station wagons, for no apparent reason, would have paid only \$16 up to 4,500 pounds and \$24 above that figure. The result would have been that the owner of a 4,400-pound sedan would pay \$20 while a man with a station wagon of the same weight would pay only \$16.

Weight, as a basis for license fees, carries its own anomalies even if none are written into the bill. Should the car be weighed with a full gasoline tank or an empty one? Should it be weighed before or after the installation of extras such as radio, tape player, air conditioner, or optional trim features? Is it right for a medium-sized car with an aluminum engine to pay the same rate as a compact car with an iron engine block?

This week amendments to H.B. 22 were introduced to ease the anomalies without curing them. They would put a \$25 floor under the rates for trucks, which had been pegged at \$2 per 500 pounds in the original bill. Also, they would eliminate the separate category for station wagons, treating them as passenger cars—a belated bow in the direction of reality.

If the General Assembly is going to tinker with the auto registration fees at all, let it do a sensible job of it. Let the basis of sliding fees be the size of the vehicle, either wheelbase or bumper-to-bumper length. This can be measured easily in the inspection lanes and is not subject to change during the life of the vehicle. And let the new bill wipe out the PC category for station wagons along with the provision in H.B. 22 that says the application for a station wagon license "shall show the maximum load to be transported therein."

The state police have enough to do without trying to enforce a new law against driving an overloaded station wagon.

Mr. Bartleson asked that committee report and recommendations be read on **HB 137**.

REPORT BY THE MAJORITY MEMBERS OF THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE FINANCE COMMITTEE

In accordance with the law, the Joint Finance Committee studied **HB** 12, the Governor's recommended budget, and listened to many agencies, boards and commissions. All who sought hearings were heard. In addition, the Committee asked some agencies to appear.

Despite its controversial beginning, the Committee functioned normally, with all members participating in votes, suggestions, etc.

This report has three parts. The first examines the present general outlook on programs and funds. The second briefly capsules changes in the budget. The third concerns recommendations.

PROGRAMS AND FUNDS

The Governor's budget is deficient in two respects. First, it is out of balance by \$7 million. Second, despite this deficit, it fails to meet the urgent needs existing in Delaware at this time.

HB 137, the product of our work, does provide significantly more money for education through a \$125 increase in the unit allotment. It does not include new programs, however, because we believe such programs should be considered in separate legislation where the individual merits of the program can be well considered by all legislators.

We, as the majority members of this Committee, along with our Republican colleagues in the entire General Assembly, will devote priority attention in upcoming weeks and months to programs that will more adequately meet the urgent needs of our citizens, especially in the areas of education and human services. Such programs will be included in supplemental legislation.

We have noted that the Governor's budget is already \$7 million out of balance. This reveals a sad truth: this administration has shirked its fiscal responsibilities. It has passed the buck on thorny problems for political reasons.

Large windfalls from estate and inheritance taxes have kept this administration solvent despite the fact that it increased at least seven taxes in 1965.

The Governor says it is up to someone else — the General Assembly and, specifically for some reason, Republicans — to worry about State finance. He wants every program other than his own accompanied by a revenue-producing measure. He wants somebody else to do his work.

The Governor cannot duck his responsibilities. We realize we are not without such responsibilities, but we look to the chief executive for leadership, leadership he has not shown to date.

We thus recommend that for the balance of this legislative session intensive efforts be devoted to finding solutions to the State's fiscal problems.

FISCAL 1968 BUDGET

We recommend a budget of \$149,071,710 only \$22,084 more than the \$149,049,626 recommended in **HB** 12 and in subsequent requests from the Governor. The difference is less than one-tenth of one per cent.

The most important change, in our opinion, is increased funding for education. The unit allotment is now \$775. The Board of Education sought a \$200 increase. The Governor proposed an extra \$25, about \$1 per pupil. We propose it go up \$125, to \$900, to help meet the sharply-rising costs of education.

In this connection we note that the State's share of financing education in Delaware has declined. By increasing the unit allotment, we cannot only help the schools but perhaps help keep the local real estate taxes down.

While the Governor was miserly with our school children, he was generous to several state agency heads who received large increases through legislation approved less than a year ago. He sought raises of \$1,000 and more for some persons who only a few months ago received salary increases in the same range. While we appreciate the necessity of paying top officials adequately, we note that many other needs exist.

The Committee, in an effort to be fiscally responsible, trimmed what fat it could in the budget. Trimming occurred mostly in non-salary categories such as contractual services, personal services and travel. One area was in legal services, where the Attorney General informed us his staff can do much of the work which agencies now pay outside attorneys to do.

And in the event that an agency finds it requires more money in one of these non-salary categories, it can readily seek a transfer from another non-salary category through the Office of the Budget.

We are satisfied these cuts do not endanger any needed state service.

Some other points on the budget follow:

1. On a bipartisan vote and in accordance with past policy, the Committee agreed to a general policy of limiting annual increases to top officials to \$500 where the type of work does not change. In contrast to past years, however, no ceiling was put on increases to employees much further down the line and much less well paid.

Major adjustments in top salaries, we submit, should be handled by separate bills, as was done last year.

- 2. Many new line items were eliminated. Agencies have long been vocal in their concern that increased line-iteming dangerously limits their flexibility. We feel the agencies should have authority commensurate with their responsibility.
- 3. Two sections in the narrative portion of the budget were deleted. One was Section 13, which removes needed local authority over teacher salaries. The other was Section 18, which required quarterly reversions.

RECOMMENDATIONS

This Committee needs more and better information. It is obvious from our efforts thus far that Delaware can be run much more efficiently than is the case today. We saw many examples of where we feel money can be saved. We suspect the total would be large.

We therefore recommend to the General Assembly that it employ a management analyst to report to the Chairman of the Joint Finance Committee. This should be an experienced, well-trained person working full-time. We are convinced such a person could add greatly to efficiency in state government and that his salary, even if substantial, could be returned to the state many times.

We feel also that economies and efficiencies can be realized through consolidation of some state agencies. One example would be the Delaware Commission of Shell Fisheries and the Board of Game and Fish Commissioners. They could be merged or both included in a larger department.

Our final recommendation involves the mechanics of adopting this budget. We urge continuation of the recent practice of including any changes in one omnibus amendment. We discourage a flood of amendments to this bill, which could impede its prompt passage.

We shall welcome suggestions that will better enable the state agencies to do their job. We simply request that such changes be incorporated into a later bill.

- Mr. Speaker announced that the Governor would address both Houses on Thursday, May 4, 1967.

A messenger from the Senate delivered SCR 10, SCR 11, SCR, 12 SB 80, SB 62, SB 29, SS 1 for SB 28, SB 24; also, HCR 6, HCR 7, HCR 8, HCR 9 and HCR 13 all having passed the Senate.

Mr. Benson took the Chair as Acting Speaker. Mr. Hering asked for a final reading and consideration on the following:

SJR 2 — Directing the Legislative Council to contract for a Census of the State of Delaware. Introduced by Senator Cook.

Mr. Eskridge said that SJR 2 had never gone into committee and was tabled.

Mr. Hale replied that SJR 2 had been tabled only for the duration of the 16th Legislative Day. Mr. Hering also believed this to be true. Mr. Zimmerman asked to have the Minutes read pertaining to SJR 2. The Minutes read that the Resolution was tabled until the next legislative day. Mr. Acting Speaker asked for a Roll Call on Mr. Hering's motion to lift SJR 2 from table. Roll Call revealed:

Mr. Hering read a statement as follows:

Remarks delivered by George C. Hering, III before the House of Representatives, May 1, 1967

I think before we take action on Senate Joint Resolution No. 2, we should briefly review why we find ourselves in this present predicament. It will be recalled that court action was started in 1962. This brought about a reapportionment plan drawn by the Democrat controlled 122nd General Assembly. In June of 1964, the United States Supreme Court agreed with the District Court of Delaware that this new plan was invalid.

The Democrats then had another bite at the apple. The then Governor, also a Democrat, called a meeting of the leaders of both parties of the State Legislative for the purpose of setting in motion a new reapportionment plan. At that meeting, he stated, according to uncontradicted testimony, "... the majority party... was going to do the reapportionment." Joining him in the steamroller was the President Pro Tem, also a Democrat, who today is the Senate Majority Leader. He, like the Governor, took the totally partisan position that the Democrats "were the majority party and they were going to take care of the Democratic party in the redistricting". That statement was made on the Senate floor in July 1964 in the course of the limited debate immediately preceeding the passage of the two bills.

The Court struck down the second plan on January 10th of this year. Not only did the Democrats strike out twice, but the court clearly recognized that they politically gerrymandered many districts.

How can the people of Delaware realistically expect better treatment, when realizing the Democrat leaders in the Senate today are the same ones who called the shots in 1964? Already these same leaders have publicly stated that "they would just as soon run at-large statewide". Such an admission vividly shows their total disregard for the representative form of government based on geographic, social, economic and political differences that exists within our state. Past experience has too often shown that local elections are greatly influenced by Presidential candidates who run on issues totally unrelated to local problems. Should an at-large election be ordered by the District Court, as has been suggested, the electorate of Delaware would be the real losers. Such an election would more than likely bring 100% one-party rule to both the General Assembly and the Executive Office. Total Republican or Democrat control of our governmental process would be bad in either case.

This General Assembly gave to the Legislative Council the responsibility of proposing apportionment legislation. Seven meetings of the Council proved beyond any doubt that the Democrat members of that council not only had a closed mind against the University of Delaware but at the same time took the position 'the U.S. Census Bureau or nothing'. Cost to them was never a factor.

We have now come to the crossroads. The University of Delaware has withdrawn from consideration for reasons it believes to be in its best interest. I regret that such action was taken 1) without accepting the Senate's invitation to appear with a representative of the U.S. Bureau of Census, and 2) before any vote was taken by the full Senate membership. We can only conclude that their withdrawal was predicated, as they have stated, upon the political contentions which arose in the meetings of the Legislative Council. Let it be once again stated that at no time did the Republican Members of that Council, or of this General Assembly, ever criticize or find fault with the Division of Urban Affairs. The contentions referred to by the University are a direct result of public comments made not only by the Governor, but by the leaders of the Democratic Party in both Houses. The Governor, even though he was neither a voting member of the Legislative Council nor a member of the General Assembly in whom the court vested total responsibility for repportionment, made it abundantly clear that only the U.S. Bureau would conduct

Recently, a ranking Democrat Senator stated on television that the University of Delaware would give us a "second-rate product" if it conducted the census. A ranking member of the minority party in this House not only questioned the ability of the Division of Urban Affairs but its integrity as well when

he said "we want it (the census) to be accurate and impartial". He then heaped insult upon injury by declaring "the citizens of Delaware deserve a better deal than the University of Delaware".

Why all this sudden criticism of our state university? It is doubly confusing when we realize that the gentleman at the University who would have conducted this census and who has already conducted twelve separate school censuses, was called by the Democratic Party as an expert witness in its defense. One whom they formerly relied upon, they now attempt to totally discredit.

If the University of Delaware, Division of Urban Affairs, can repeatedly be requested by commissions or study groups created by the 123rd General Assembly and this administration 1) to conduct the basic research on the reorganization of the New Castle County Government, 2) to guide the Governor's Revenue Study Committee in April, 1965, and 3) to provide the basic information on the report recently released by the Governor's Goals Committee — why then do they suddenly become inept at conducting a census. Twelve school districts throughout the State — including the entire City of Wilmington — have requested and received from the University of Delaware a census of their respective school districts and not one has registered a complaint.

The opposition party has left us with but one choice — a federal agency to which we have never objected but only questioned its ability to produce on time. This factor of time — above all else — was a foremost concern. If the Democrats without any opposition whatever could not produce a satisfactory plan in three weeks in July of 1964, how can we realistically expect legislation to be drafted and accepted by a divided legislature during the busiest time of year?

But, let us try. Let us move forward immediately. Let us get on with the job for all Delawareans. I urge my fellow Republicans to join with the opposition to employ the U. S. Bureau of Census to complete the first leg of our responsibility in the reapportionment process.

Mr. Ferguson read Rule 24 of the Rule Book interpreting it to mean that Joint Resolutions must go to committee, unless rules were suspended. Mr. Hering said that suspension of rules was justified in emergencies and made a motion to suspend the rules. Motion carried. Mr. Hering asked for a roll call vote to adopt SJR 2. Roll Call revealed:

Mr. Hale asked Mr. Castle to speak for the bill. Mr. Castle's name had been added as a sponsor. Roll Call revealed:

Perhaps we should start by sending a telegram today to Mr. Eckler, Director of the Bureau of Census, advising him of our action and a desire to meet with representatives of his office at the earliest opportunity.

Would you join me in sending today the following proposed telegram:

"The General Assembly of the State of Delaware has directed the undersigned to engage the U.S. Bureau of Census to conduct at the earliest possible time a special census for the entire State of Delaware. Since reapportionment legislation must be passed and signed by the Governor not later than January 10, 1968, we respectfully request an opportunity to meet with designated representatives of your office to negotiate the terms of the contract. Members of the 124th General Assembly Fellow Citizens of the State of Delaware:

Today it is again my pleasure to appear before this distinguished forum to speak on a major program of the state. Thank you for the opportunity. The major program that I refer to is my adopted annual capital budget for fiscal year 1968 and capital improvement program for fiscal years 1968 through 1973.

In my state of state address in January, I announced that I would appear before you to explain the major provisions of the capital budget and capital improvement program. At that time I asked for immediate authorization of four projects in my recommended capital budget for fiscal year 1968. These projects included patient treatment facilities for the Department of Mental Health, conversion of William Jason High School into facilities for the Delaware Technical and Community College, improvement and development of recreational facilities in the Indian River Inlet area of our beachlands and expansion of Legislative Hall. I am happy to note that three of these projects have been authorized as of this date. I again

urge the passage of the remaining bill which is for the expansion of Legislative Hall. The immediacy of the need for this project is certainly not diminishing with the lapse of time.

Now to address myself to the capital budget and capital program. This year 67 state agencies and school districts submitted 580 capital projects requests for the six year capital program. This amounted to a request for state funds of \$82,-313,000 for the capital budget year and an amount of \$331,-264,000 for the total six year program. Last year 52 state agencies submitted 350 capital projects amounting to \$274,-864,000 for the total program. This year's requests show an increase of 56 million dollars over last year's, and an increase of 114 million dollars over my adopted capital program submitted to you last year. The state cannot conscientiously consider the funding of a program of this magnitude at this time. Normal revenue for fiscal year 1967 is estimated to be \$144,700,000. This amount establishes the bonded debt limitation at approximately 463 million dollars for fiscal year 1968. This would allow for an authorization of up to 117 million dollars for bonds next year. But an authorization of this amount would severely limit the authorization of additional funds in the subsequent five years of the program.

After carefully reviewing the revenue forecast and the capital project requests, I have adopted a six year capital program in the amount of \$229,640,000 with a capital budget of \$46,598,400. In keeping with the policy of prudently scheduling long-term debt within the state's bond debt limitation, the capital budget general obligation bond funding is limited to \$38,738,400. The balance of \$7,860,000 is recommended to be funded from the capital investment fund for the most part.

An "Advance Summary Report" explaining the adopted capital budget for 1968 and the six year capital program has been prepared and will be presented to you at this time. A review of this report will show that in the capital budget:

- (a) Higher education requested \$13,296,000— I recommend \$6,890,000.
- (b) Local schools requested \$15,935,000 I recommend \$9,157,000.
- (c) State Highways requested \$27,895,000 I recommend \$17,100,000.
- (d) Other state agencies requested \$25,187,000 I recommend \$13,452,000.

The recommendations presented above for the capital budget were developed within the framework of the limitations imposed on bonded debt by the General Assembly in 1965.

I have continued the policy of wherever feasible in the capital budget to fund certain capital projects, especially those amounting to twenty-five thousand dollars or less, from the state's General Fund. Projects in the capital budget falling in this category amount to \$294,000. Other policy considerations and innovations in the program are:

- 1. I have requested the immediate funding of certain projects which have priority because of the time element involved.
- 2. I have incorporated into the capital program for the first time a "Minor Capital Improvement Program" for schools. I recommend the funding of this program on the same basis as the major capital projects 60% to be provided by the state and 40% by the local school districts. I also believe that the local school districts should be allowed to raise the local matching share with or without holding referenda for these minor projects as they might choose.
- 3. I recommend the funding of certain unique and exceptional capital projects from the capital investment fund.
- 4. I recommend the establishment of an advanced land acquisition program to provide for the timely acquisition of property for public use. This fund would be established as a revolving fund similar to that established for advanced planning last year.
- 5. I recommend that master planning and topographical survey services be made available to state agencies.

The minor capital improvements program for schools replaces the old "Delayed Repairs" or "Capital Replacement" procedure this program with the major capital program and the maintenance program will provide for all phases of school physical facility needs including construction, repair, renovation, and maintenance.

The advanced land acquisition fund is recommended to be established within the capital investment fund. This recommendation is compatible with the policy of providing safeguards to protect the body of the capital investment fund. Funds withdrawn from the advanced land acquisition fund must be repaid. Funds not being utilized will be available for investment as part of the capital investment fund.

In order to effectuate the capital budget, legislation has been prepared and is available for your deliberation. This legislation will be presented in a package of bills. The major bill is the omnibus bond bill in the amount of \$34,448,400. Two companion fund bills to the omnibus bond bill are the capital investment fund bill for the Wilmington Civic Center State Office Building, amounting to \$5,000,000, and the general

fund capital budget bill amounting to \$294,000. In addition, a bill is being submitted to establish an advanced land acquisition program by earmarking \$3,000,000 of the capital investment fund. Again, I emphasize that the money will be earmarked within the capital investment fund. Other legislation which needs your attention is as follows:

- 1. The last General Assembly passed the first leg of a Constitutional Amendment by imposing a constitutional limit on the borrowing power of the state. This General Assembly should give further consideration to this matter.
- 2. Legislation passed by the 123rd General Assembly as Senate Substitute No. 1 for Senate Bill No. 163 which will amend Article VIII of the Constitution of the State by imposing a limitation of the borrowing power of the state.
- Legislation to amend various capital improvement acts of previous years for the purpose of making certain extensions and corrections. Some of these corrections and extensions are already included in bills now before the Senate.
- Legislation to improve the preparation of the Debt Statement, which must accompany all bond bills, by allowing for the accounting of the full amount of the revolving fund of the Delaware Industrial Building Commission.
- 5. The Bonding Counsel of the state has recommended certain minor and technical changes in the law relating to the issuance and sale of local school district bonds. This amendment will make it easier for the local school districts to sell their bonds in the New York Bond Market.

The Capital improvement program that I am presenting here today considers the needs of all state agencies, both large and small, within the limits of the state's fiscal capability. It provides for:

- A. Public schools
- B. Higher education
- C. Highways
- D. Health
- E. Mental health
- F. Welfare
- G. Safety
- H. Rehabilitation and corrections
- I. Recreation
- J. Historical sites
- K. Conservation
- L. Housing needs of state agencies

Some individuals will say that the capital budget and capital improvement program amounts are too high. There will be others that will say not enough funds are being provided. There will be special interests that feel that a certain area is not receiving enough money while other areas are receiving too much. I maintain that within present knowledge and policy from an overall viewpoint I have presented to you today a sound and progressive program for the physical development of state government.

There are three additional points that I wish to make before concluding. The first is that of the tremendous authorized but unissued bonds that remain on our books. As of today we have \$78,456,704 authorized for capital facilities but unissued. These projects were justified as needed at the time of authorization. I recognize that there are certain contingencies that result in delay, but I fear that in some cases that the impetus for developing a project is reduced substantially once the funds have been authorized projects are provided at the earliest possible time.

The second point is that if through your deliberations you conclude amendments should be made to the legislative package presented here today, I ask that I have an opportunity to review these amendments before they are introduced into the General Assembly.

Lastly, I wish to again emphasize my desire that all capital projects be processed through the capital improvement program.

I ask in concluding that we all remember that there is no such thing as one portion of a school, highway, or mental hygiene clinic being democrat and the other portion being Republican. If there is any program that should be considered on a bi-partisan basis, it is this one.

After his Budget Message, the Governor spoke briefly about the deplorable transportation situation in Wilmington. He said that he had been accused of being negligent but he had, in fact, negotiated for 100 hours with both sides and the Mayor and Executive of County Council had done likewise. He said that he had reached the conclusion that the states were going to have to run their own transportation. He is working on a plan to create a Department of Transportation headed by a Secretary with the power to buy busses and to hire men. He would issue bonds to pay for the plan. He would also get some Federal Aid.

The Governor was escorted from the Chamber by the previously named Committee at 2:36 P.M.

Senator Steen moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate compare their Journals. The Secretary of the Senate stated that they had done so and

found them to be in agreement.

Mr. President welcomed the Speaker of the Senate. Mr. Steen moved that the two Houses adjourn. Motion carried. Joint Session adjourned at 2:30 P.M.

The House reconvened at 3:13 P.M. Messrs. Hammond,

Stabler and Pagano asked to be marked present.

broadening and strengthening the Social Security system, in a way well within the means of a strong and affluent society;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly, the Senate concurring therein, that we call upon the 90th Congress to give prompt and favorable consideration to the Social Security improvements proposed by the President, so that the invaluable safeguards established by the Social Security system can fulfill their true purpose.

21ST LEGISLATIVE DAY

The Speaker called the House to order at 2:19 P.M. on May 16, 1967.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Reverend Oliver H. Spence.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag.

The Speaker asked if there were any additions or corrections to the Minutes of May 15, 1967. There being none, the Minutes were approved as posted.

The Speaker announced the Governor's request to address the House. Permission granted. Messrs. Evans and Harrington were appointed to excort the Governor to the Chamber. The Governor was welcomed by the Speaker.

Governor's Address:

Mr. Speaker

Ladies and Gentlemen of the House:

Thank you for the privilege of speaking to you today. My remarks will be brief. I have not come to spar for political advantage although I was amused by the ridiculous assertion made in this House yesterday that I was unfamiliar with the contents of House Bill 137. Certainly none of you are naive enough to believe that a governor doesn't have accurate sources of information regarding the preparation of a budget bill.

It is that budget bill I want to discuss with you.

The House Appropriation Committee chose to increase the unit allotment for education from the \$800 I proposed in House Bill 12 to \$900, despite the fact that both House Bill 12 and House Bill 137 contain a \$500,000 appropriation to the schools for routine maintenance work that is over and above the funding the schools received in any budget prior to the fiscal year we are now operating in. What it means is that the schools will receive about \$1,000 per unit, not \$900.00 which is substantially more than anyone has requested.

Good education is a vital concern of us all, and I shall not argue with the committee, although I believe the money they provided in increased unit allotments could have been better spent for higher teaching salaries.

But I must take exception with the committee regarding the cuts it made in several key agencies in order to raise the unit allotments. The simple truth is that these agencies cannot operate effectively unless the amounts recommended by me in House Bill 12 are substantially restored. An Amendment to effect that restoration has been prepared and will be introduced today for your consideration.

You know, it is important for the governor in an area where the opposite political party holds a majority, as it does in the House of Representatives, to have someone that he can work with in a spirit of confidence and harmony, knowing that such a person speaks for his colleagues with some degree of authority. I have had difficulty pinpointing that individual because the leadership of the Republican Party as represented by the national committeeman, the state chairman,

and the finance chairman, seem to speak a different language than the leadership of the House as represented by the House Appropriation Committee.

I am referring especially to the area of mental health and corrections. The cuts made in the budgets of those two agencies in House Bill 137 will impede their progress, and I urge you to appropriate the full amount recommended in House Bill 12.

You must also, increase the appropriations for several other important agencies. The custodian, for instance, is simply not going to be able to take care of the buildings assigned to him without more funds. Similarly, the Public Archives Commission, the State Park Commission, the State Distribution Agency, the Departments of Elections in Kent and New Castle Counties, the Department of Weights and Measures, the State Planning Office, the Budget Director's Office, the State Development Department, the Department of Public Welfare, the Mosquito Control Division, the Youth Services Commission, and the Delaware Commission of Shell Fisheries all need more money to do the job which you want to see done and which our fellow citizens expect to have done. In the case of the Shell Fisheries Commission, you have determined that legislative investigation should be held. Hold the investigation by all means, if you think it desirable, but in the meantime allow the agency sufficient funds to police and regulate the important industry within its jurisdiction.

The amendment which will be introduced today on behalf of the administration also restores some of the substantive provisions included in House Bill 12 but left out or changed in House Bill 137.

Ladies and gentlemen, these are important provisions which provide the machinery for effective safeguards over expenditures and personnel. Without them we are going to find ourselves spending at a higher and more accelerated rate than you anticipate, with the result that our budget for fiscal 1969 may by necessity be higher than you care to appropriate. Without the safeguards I propose, the Legislature could well find itself in the position of having to spend more than you deem either prudent or desirable. Please give these provisions your careful consideration and pass them in the interest of sound administration.

As for the monetary needs which I have mentioned, it seems to me that two alternatives are open to you. Let me repeat, however, that money to the agencies I have mentioned and a few others must be restored. We cannot bleed them to the extent where they are too weakened to perform their vital functions.

The alternatives are that you can take the \$500,000 provided in the budget for routine maintenance of the schools and use it to restore the urgent appropriations I have mentioned, or you can show the courage to add approximately \$650,000 to the grand total of your budget bill. Whatever you choose, the needs of the people must be met.

Finally, you members of the House are citizens of a high degree of education. Consequently, you are just as aware as I am that competence, ability and integrity are qualities which do not come cheaply. We induce good men and women into Delaware and attempt to persuade them to stay when our salaries and benefits are not competitive with those of other states.

We have a handful of key people who are woefully underpaid. Our recent experience in losing two of our top educators forcefully illustrates our problem. The state planner and the budget director are also not paid commensurate with either their ability or their awesome responsibilities. There are a few others. Our state archivist is one of the finest men in his field in the United States, and yet his remuneration is such that it is far from rewarding him for the magnitude of his contribution.

Perhaps, in the area of salaries I, too, have been remiss in not fighting for a general upgrading before this time. But we cannot delay longer.

Accordingly, I am preparing legislation to remedy the situation by authorizing a salary range for key employees, so that a top ranking position will have a maximum considerably higher than is now provided. The exact amount of the salary, under the bill, would be established by the board under which the executive functions with the approval of the governor.

Our state superintendent, for instance, has been paid a salary below that which is received by several district superintendents in Delaware. However, in spite of that, the House Appropriations Committee chose to trim \$500 from the \$1,000 increase I had recommended for him. That type of action on the part of Delawareans is horse-and-buggy thinking. I should have recommended a higher increase than I did, and the House should have granted it. Let us join together to right a wrong and enact legislation that will not narrowly limit what a brilliant and dedicated man can earn, but rather provide the means for giving him a salary that is worthy of someone with his experience, education, and other qualifications and that will also leave room for merit increases where they are clearly called for.

Members of the House, I thank you for your courtesy in listening to me. I hope earnestly that you will heed my mes-

sage and not pass your present budget bill without further review. The public is entitled to this consideration on your part.

Mr. Speaker thanked the Governor. The Governor was escorted from the Chamber by the same Representatives.

Mr. Hale asked if Mr. Zimmerman would like to distribute an amendment before caucus.

HB 137 — An Act making appropriations for the expense of the State Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968.

Mr. Speaker asked Mr. Benson to take the Chair. Mr. Hering, as spokesman for himself and his party, spoke from the floor about the reasons for the differences between HB 12 and HB 137.

The Governor's budget, House Bill 12, was introduced early in this session in January. The Joint Finance Committee, consisting of members of the Senate and House, Republicans and Democrats alike, considered this bill in depth for a period in excess of three months. The Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives introduced House Bill 137 which, in its judgment, incorporated the vast majority of the Governor's recommendations, but at the same time made considered evaluations in certain areas which it deemed to be in the best interest of the citizens of the entire State. This Committee, in my judgment, demonstrated good faith in working long and arduously in preparation of the bill now before this chamber.

The bill was introduced the first of this month. Two days later, after returning from South Carolina, the Governor in a press conference delivered a lengthy statement severely criticizing the efforts of the Joint Finance Committee.

The Republican members of the House sincerely reviewed the Governor's observations and responded in great measure in certain areas by introducing House Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 137. Yesterday it was announced on the floor that House Bill 137 would be brought before this chamber for a vote. The Governor requested that I go to his office following the session. At that time he requested the opportunity to speak before this chamber today prior to our consideration of the budget bill. His request was granted. We should always welcome the Chief Executive of our State when he speaks for all the people on a matter of statewide concern. There were, however, in my judgment, reflections upon individuals in his address that I do not believe were in the best interest of all the citizenry of the State.

The Governor speaks in his capacity as Chief Executive of the State. The members of the House of Representatives likewise speak on behalf of their individual constituents which comprise the total State. Our Constitution specifically provides for a division of powers between the Executive and Legislative branches. The voters on November 8 last indicated their confidence in the Republican party. We speak as representatives of the people and I submit are only exercising what we believe to be our true responsibility, just as the Governor feels he may have a like duty. Nevertheless, the system of checks and balances would not properly operate if we did not proceed in this manner.

The Governor's comments today are basically a rehash of his press conference of 13 days ago. He has in effect, through the introduction of House Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 137 merely attempted to reimpose upon this House, House Bill 12, which the majority members of this chamber have already rejected by submitting House Bill 137. I would like at this time to specifically comment as to why the Republican Party supports House Bill 137 with House Amendment No. 1 as it pertains to many of the agencies which the Governor claims have been "crippled".

In his May 3 press conference, Governor Terry referred to various state agencies which he said would be crippled if HB 137 were enacted.

Such is not the case by any stretch of the imagination, and the following is designed to prove the point. In fact, there are numerous examples of where the Joint Finance Committee helped State agencies.

DELAWARE COMMISSION ON SHELL FISHERIES

This agency received the most severe reduction in HB 137. There are several very valid reasons for this action.

In the first place, the executive secretary appeared before us without any information on his budget and saying "I'm a waterman, not a mathematician." What he should have said was that he was a close political associate of the Governor.
