The Honorable Lorin B. Sebrell House of Representatives Legislative Hall Dover, Delaware Dear Representative Sebrell:

I wish to support House Bill No. 18, which would make a supplementary appropriation for study of standards of construction and of basic specifications for new school construction or additions which would take into consideration the different education requirements at the various grade levels. Some of the reasons for support of this bill would be as follows:

1. There has been no attempt to standardize school construction requirements and policies in terms of specific specifications for about fifteen (15) years. During this time, there have been many concepts developed in all phases of school construction. The proposed study would establish or revise the minimum standards for school buildings and sites which the State would require and support. It would be expected that these standards would be above average in materials and designs so that there would be no question that school buildings in Delaware would rank with the better school buildings of the nation.

2. At the present time, school construction funds are allocated to school districts on the basis of formula and square foot costs, however, there are no rigid specification standards with respect to such things as materials to be used. Example: copper tubing vs. galvanized pipe in plumbing, structural tile vs. concrete block with spray glaze, etc. In short, it would be hoped that this study would establish a firm base upon which architects would design and plan the buildings.

3. The study would also examine the wisdom of bidding the basic construction of a building under one major contractor or under four or five major contractors. At the present time, Delaware construction is awarded on the basis of one contractor to a general contractor, with sub-contractors in such major areas as mechanical, electrical and plumbing being within the broad general contract. The study should question the wisdom of this procedure and make recommendations relative to it.

4. Another phase of the study would be to provide a base for reimbursement for the costs of school construction to the local school districts. At the present time, a total amount is estimated for a school district and set up within the budgeting procedures. However, a total amount is not specifier in terms of the amount to be used for actual construction, the amount to be used for movable equipment, or an amount to be used for instructional supplies. This study should give consideration to this problem.

5. The problem of reasonable fees for architects, auditing and inspection should be studied also.

The amount of \$25,000 proposed for this bill comes as a result of proposals with the firm of McKee-Berger-Mansueto. They assure us that this appears to be a reasonable budget estimate. (See enclosures). Representatives from the McKee firm state that they would not be in a position to bid on such a proposal since they are professional consultants and as professionals, do not bid their services.

The question concerning the utilization of present standardized specifications emanating from the American Institute of Architects is a possibility, however, these specifications are now being used but do not serve Delaware adequately since they are very generalized and broadley based. It would be the hope of this study that specific Delaware needs and Delaware standards would be considered within the broad framework of standards proposed by the A.I.A.

ON TEACHING HUMAN REPRODUCTION

John R. Stenger

A Teacher of Biology

As a member of the National Science Teachers Association I would like to present what has become the official stand of that organization on the subject of the biology of human reproduction as taught in schools. A public release of the oganization's position appeaed in it's journal The Science Teacher last Fall. I want to outline the statement policy as issued by the NSTA for the benefit of those concerned with legislation or educational matters, school board members, administrators and teachers. At a time when legislation has been proposed which woold in effect restrain biology teachers who are presently modernizing their courses to include more human biology as it relates to reproduction of our species, the following statement from an association of science teachers should serve a purpose.

"We are concerned primarily with the biological aspects of human reproduction, which are most often clearly distinct from social or moral issues. Without intending to prescribe or limit, we identify the following topics as being properly part of the biological subject-matter of human reproduction.

- Genetic and endocrine foundations of sexuality
- Anatomy and physiology of male and female reproductive systems
- Nature and development of secondary sex characteristics
- Puberty, menopause, and other sex-related phenomena of the life cycle
- Sperm and egg maturation, including menstrual cycles

- Mating, fertilization, and the events of pregnancy
- Developments of embryo and fetus, including polyembryony
- Birth, lactation, and postnatal development
- Relation of reproduction to population biology and the ecology of man
- Reproductive hygiene and the principal reproductive diseases"

"We regard instruction in the biology of human reproduction to be essential in the education of every person and to represent a legitimate component of any teaching program in the life sciences. We hold that education in this field is feasible at the earliest grade or age level."

"The appropriately qualified teacher is trained to provide instruction in the biology of human reproduction. Therefore he should be free from external restrictions, implied or expressed, that cannot be justified on strictly biological or scientific grounds. We strongly support and encourage all efforts, including particularly those of school boards and school administrators, that aid and facilitate this free exercise of the teacher's educational function."

You may be interested to know the results of a survey of parents of my own biology students. Over 95% of the parents of 95 ninth grade biology students from four classes signed permission slips for their children to see the State Department of Public Instruction film titled HUMAN RE-PRODUCTION.

After the students viewed the film 95% said the film mas "worth seeing." 96% said they "recommend the film to other teenagers." 92% said the film should have been viewed by their class. 79% felt the film was appropriate to be seen at a grade level range between the sixth and ninth grades. Only 73% felt that the film answered the "types of questions that they wanted answered". The students were asked to write the questions they thought should have been discussed in the film on the back of a 4 x 5 card. It is anticipated that these questions will be submitted to a panel of physicians, ministers, teachers counselors, phys. ed. teachers etc. and their responses to those questions printed and returned to the students in booklet form. It was interesting to note tha those questions covered nearly all the topics outlined above by the NATIONAL SCIENCE TEACHERS AS-SOCIATION.

REMARKS RELATING TO HB 187

This Budget Bill lists the appropriations to all the agencies providing services to the people of Delaware as well as the funds needed for the administration of the State government itself. A summary of factors pertaining to the budget follows:

The services provided to the people of Delaware are rendered by

(a) over 9000 public school employees;

(b) over 6000 general employees classified under the Merit System; and

(c) over 700 employees of the courts, police, and others not under the Merit System.

More than 102,000,00 or 52% of the budget goes to pay the salaries of employees of the State. Other major categories of the budget appropriation are:

Let's look at the budget from another point of view. There is a fixed cost in operating the government of the State of Delaware that carries over from year to year. This fixed cost, commonly described as mandated expenses, makes up a sizeable portion of this budget. The Joint Finance Committee or even this Legislature has little option in these areas. Items found in this category are the expenses that are prescribed by existing Delaware laws, such as salaries of the Governor, the other elected officials, including the members of the General Assembly, the Judges of the various courts of the State, and the staffing and operation of the entire public school system according to the unit formula based on the number of children that show up for school each September.

Concerning debt, the General Assembly has pledged the "Integrity and Faith" of the citizens of Delaware to the repayment of bonds and interest applicable to building schools, highways and other public facilities dating backward as much as 20 years. These obligations take precedence over all other commitments.

The State of Delaware also has very specific obligations to pay its pensioners. As an employer, the State has a definite commitment to pay its share of Social Security taxes to the federal government.

These mandated expenses total approximately 128,000,000 or 65% of the budget. The major items are:

From these figures it is apparent that the variable factor over which judgment can be exercised applies to only 35% of the budget.

Let us now place the budget in perspective. In October 1968 each agency of the State prepared, according to custom, detailed estimates of the money needed to operate for next year starting July 1st.

When all the requests were added together, the agencies asked for \$220 million. This represented a \$46 million increase, or 26.4% gain over last year.

The budget proposed in HB 187 is the result of diligent efforts by the members of your Joint Finance Committee to meet the essential needs of the State of Delaware consistent with prudence and concern for the taxpayers who pay the bill.

HB 187 details appropriations to the agencies totalling \$197 million for a gain over last year of about 13%.

Since introduction of HB 187, the agencies and other interested parties have had a chance to look it over carefully. The chairman has received considerable correspondence and a number of visits from agency personnel concerning the appropriations that apply to them. Some have reiterated their need for dollar of their original request, and a few have even asked for more.

Some members of the General Assembly and personnel from a few of the agencies have pointed out minor corrections that should be made.

To this end a bill is now being prepared which will incorporate current thinking. This bill will be introduced in a few days.

This question has been presented to me: In view of known changes, why consider HB 187 now?

There are several good reasons, it seems to me:---

(1) The corrections affect only a few agencies and will involve less than 1% of the budget.

(2) There is precedence in making the corrections by a separate omnibus bill. The most recent was SB 196 used in the 1968 appropriation.

(3) The amendment route is not attractive from the preparation and stenographic point of view inasmuch as a change in one category in the heart of the bill involves agency totals, group totals, sub-totals and grand total.

(4) It would be comforting to most of the agencies to know where they stand on the bulk of their funds for next year. The sooner they know the better they can plan.

(5) Even at this late date, the chairman does not have in hand all of the information pertaining to a few areas where changes seem appropriate. For example, just yesterday recalculation of the Social Security obligation for next year indicates the estimate made last October was short by about \$450,000. In addition, the chairman has asked for a new calculation of pension requirements which indicate the October estimate was perhaps \$100,000 too low. Certainly the General Assembly will want the best current estimates before moving forward.

June 9, 1969

To: Members of the House of Representatives From: Delaware Concerned Students

Our country was founded upon dissent. Through the years we have learned to express this dissent in a non-violent form at the ballot box.

But today we are faced with the fact that a sizable proportion of the populous is denied the privilege of such dissent. We feel that society demand of us much maturity and responsibility. We feel that due to this greater social activity the youth of today has gained much insight and knowledge into world, national, and local affairs. In the classroom today we find a variety of topics being discussed, from racial ambiguities and Vietnam to selective service and urban problems, we feel that today's youth has received a unique understanding of these problems.

We feel that through the greater involvement of youth in governmental affairs, a more rapidly growing and moving society, and a better education the nineteen year old of today is as mature, informed, and knowledgable, if not more so, as the twenty-one year old of decades past. Why was it right for them to vote but it is not right for us?

Our society has no qualms about asking young people between the ages of nineteen and twenty-one to give their lives in the defense of this nation's policies. But this same society will not grant this sizable segment of the population the privilege of voting. Why?

People between the ages of nineteen and twenty-one are allowed to get married without the parent's consent, own an automobile, and sign contracts in Delaware .This same group of citizens is denied the right of suffrage. Why?

The Delaware Legislature now has pending an amendment which would enable persons between the ages of nineteen and twenty-one to vote. The Delaware Concerned Students emphatically reccommends the passage of this amendment. It will help build a better Delaware: indeed, it will help build a better nation. Let us turn from a voice in the streets to a voice at the ballot box.

The procedures in that Court are more formal than in the Magistrates' system the Judges are still operating on a part-time basis; and the delays add up to a serious impediment to prompt enforcement of County regulations. There will be a saving in time, attorneys fees, and in the patience of the affected members of the public and the County officials involved if this legislation is adopted.

Section 4940 & 5002-A (all relate to same subject) While the objections noted above are few in number they are, in my opinion, of such a serious nature that I must oppose these and any other legislation which would make it more difficult for a person to register, stay registered and cast a ballot.

Congratulations on your election to the State Senate of Delaware!

We are sure that you will be an asset to the area you are representing.

I would like to take this opportunity to call to your attention an area where the State of Delaware is possibly losing a certain amount of revenue on gasoline tax because Delaware laws do not coincide with laws that are in effect on Road Use Tax in Pennsylvania and Maryland.

The fact that Delaware does not have this law forces our company to purchase most of the running gas we need for our fleet in Pennsylvania to avoid double taxation.

As an example, if we would fuel one of our transports at Wilmington where our cost for product is the least, and this truck would travel through Delaware into Pennsylvania to make a delivery, we would be required to pay the State of Pennsylvania gasoline tax on the miles run on Pennsylvania roads. Making this purchase at Wilmington would require us to pay the State of Delaware the full tax on the gasoline. To avoid this situation, we gas our equipment in Pennsylvania except if we are going to make long runs in Delaware, then the gas is purchased at Wilmington.

I have no idea of how many gallons of gasoline your State may be losing in taxes because of the difference in laws.

Delaware could be assured of receiving its fair share of gasoline taxes if it would enact a similar Road Use Tax as Pennsylvania and Maryland now have.

The Governor approved the following legislation on the indicated dates:

HB 270 — 6-23-69 - making a number of changes in the Corporation Code.

HB 290 — 6-23-69 - removing the words "preferred or special" before the word "stock" in two subsections of Section 243 of the Corporation Code.

HB 252 — 6-23-69 - changing the rates of various corporation fees.

HB 164 as amended by **HA 2** and **HA 4** — 6-23-69 - setting up a new Real Estate Commission with increased regulatory powers and functions.

HB 238 — 6-23-69 - amending the wage collection law so as to allow employers to credit employee checking accounts, etc.

HB 236 — 6-23-69 - eliminating the counties as middlemen in payment by fire insurance companies of their special tax to local fire departments and companies.

HB 209 — 6-23-69 - increasing from \$7,500 to \$20,000 in maximum allowable death benefits available from membership in the mutual benefit association.

SB 295 — 6-23-69 - providing a new subchapter in the Education Code covering the interstate agreement on qualification of educational personnel.

SB 255 and SB 256 — 6-23-69 - amending the motor vehicle installment sales law and the general installment sales law to put Delaware in conformity with the federal truth in lending law.

SB 266 - 6-23-69 - amending the law to provide for increased fees for the Delaware River and Bay pilots.

SB 186 — 6-20-69 - providing an additional sum of \$568,000 for the Laurel Special School District to complete some school construction.

SB 281 - 6-19-69 - extending the date by which various school districts must enter into contract and commerce construction.

HB 201 — 6-19-69 - repealing the present criminal law dealing with abortions so that all violations will now come under the new abortion law.

SB 231 — 6-19-69 - amending 21 Del. C. $\S2733(c)$ so as to cite the proper section dealing with the suspension or revocation of drivers' licenses.

SB 30 - 6-19-69 - appropriating \$1,350,000 to the Secretary of Transportation to be used by the Greater Wilmington Transportation Authority.

HB 58 — 6-19-69 - placing the Governor and Lt. Governor in the same position so that they must be elected jointly rather than separately as in the last election.

Letter from the Governor dated June 23, 1969.

June 23, 1969

To the House of Representatives of the 125th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On June 12, 1969, I received House Bill No. 12 entitled: "An Act to Amend §704(f), Title 7, Delaware Code, Re-

lating to the Use of Dogs for Hunting Deer in Sussex County."

I return this bill without my approval for the following reasons:

1. The text of this bill is too broad, even if the basic purpose of this amendment to the Conservation Code were acceptable. The way the bill is drafted, it extends the special exception for Sussex County to an entire statute which sets forth the prohibited devices and methods of hunting and trapping. This goes far beyond pursuing deer with dogs. By saying that "The provisions of this section" are inapplicable to hunting deer with dogs in Sussex County, it extends the ambit of the bill to practices other than the use of dogs to hunt deer. The bill would appear to legalize in Sussex County a number of other unsportsman-like hunting practices presently prohibited including:

(a) spotlighting or "jacking" deer by use of artificial lights[\$704(e)];

(b) use of salt licks, baited areas, etc., and other such devices to lure deer [\$704(a)];

(c) use of deadfalls, traps, snares, nets, etc. [\$704(a)];

(d) use of a poison, chemicals or any weapon not fired from the shoulder [\$704(a) and (c)].

2. This bill is plainly discriminatory in that it would allow individuals hunting in Sussex County to pursue hunting methods which are considered criminal conduct in the other two counties and for which a fine is provided. For example, differing hunting seasons in different parts of the State may be justified; but the kind of disparity this bill would create does not appear warranted solely on the basis of geography.

3. As a matter of conservation practice this bill would be a step backward for Delaware. I have been informed that a majority of the Board of Game and Fish Commissioners are opposed to this legislation (eight opposed; one for). Norman G. Wilder, Director of the Board of Game and Fish Commissioners, is firmly opposed and states that such is the opinion of his entire staff. He has stated to me that "At a public hearing conducted by the Commission on April 15, 1969, deer hunting with dogs was supported by only three persons in an audience of nearly 100." The sportsmen's clubs in Delaware appear to be opposed to the bill as well. These organizations include DP&L Sportsmen's Club, Inc., The Nanticoke Sportsman Club, Inc., Rehoboth Sportsman Club, Duck Creek Sportsman's Club, Delaware Wildlife Federation. The SPCA is unalterably opposed to the concept of this bill.

In short, those best informed on matters of sport hunting and conservation urge that this bill be vetoed.

4. I have been informed that enactment of this legislation may cause widespread closing of Sussex County farmland to deer hunting in any form. Such, for example, is the position taken by Delaware Wild Lands, Inc., which owns substantial hunting acreage within the county.

Because of the above-listed factors, I find I have no reasonable alternative other than vetoing House Bill No. 12, and I therefore return it herewith unsigned.
