## Former Resident Killed Near City As 2 Cars Collide

Four Others Injured  
In Route 2 Accident  
Early Sunday Morning

Delaware's November traffic death toll rose to 10 Sunday with the death of a Stanton man near Newark after midnight.

Richard A. Moore, 23, of 2011 Baird Street, Stanton, was killed on State Route 2, just south of the Du Pont Sine Laboratory, in a two-car accident that resulted in injury to four other persons, including the victim's widow.

Police said that Moore was a passenger in a car driven by William Scullion, 32, of Newport, who was heading south on Route 2, and started to make a left turn into Sandy Brae Road.

A northbound convertible, operated by Mrs. Jean Shockley, 22, of Newark, slammed broadside into the Scullion vehicle. The impact ripped off the right side of the Scullion car, tossing out Moore and killing him instantly, while the convertible overturned, pinning Mrs. Shockley beneath it. She was pulled out by state troopers and volunteer firemen from the Aetna Hose Hook and Ladder Company and was rushed to the Wilmington General Hospital along with Scullion, his wife, and Mrs. Moore.

Mrs. Shockley escaped with an abrasion of the knee and a laceration of the hand; Scullion sustained a contusion of the forehead; his wife, Virginia, was treated for a bruise of the hand, and Mrs. Mary Moore, suffered a deep laceration of the nose and forehead.

The alarm was turned in by Bud Duhamel at 4:37 p.m., and 31 volunteers with three engines led by Aetna Fire Chief Clifton Knotts responded.

A defective fire hose set fire to floor joists in the home of James Squires, 19 Davies Drive, Chestnut Hill Estates, last Tuesday, with damages estimated at \$300.

Deputy Chief Olaf Thomas led 25 volunteers with two trucks to the scene when the alarm was received at 6:30 p.m.

Thomas, with 18 Aetnamen and two trucks, extinguished a field fire off the South Chapel Street extension on Sunday after a 1:25 p.m. alarm, and last Friday, Chief Knotts led 24 men with two trucks in preventing major damage with an oil burner flame-up at the William Blanchfield residence at 43 Kenmar Drive.

## Sanitary Landfill Trial Ends; Satisfactory Results Reported

New Method Of Waste Disposal Cited By Francis Neide  
As Satisfactory After 3-Month Trial; City Council  
To Decide On Permanent Establishment Of Landfill

Newark's three-month trial with its sanitary landfill method of waste disposal ended Monday and the project has worked out "very satisfactorily," according to City Manager J. Francis Neide.

Whether or not it will continue as a permanent operation, he said, will be up to City Council.

When first proposed the project aroused considerable controversy, including petitions from property owners who maintained it would be a nuisance, and would depress property values.

But since the start of operation there have been no complaints from the general public "as far as I know," Neide said.

Need For New Dump  
Despite the original opposition, council approved the three-month trial because of pressure to find a new city dump.

The landfill eliminates a costly trash haul by city crews to the former dump site outside the city, with separate garbage collection by a private contractor.

City crews now make both collections at the same time and haul the waste to the landfill at the former municipal sewage disposal plant site on East Cleveland Avenue.

It also was anticipated the landfill would save the city money but Neide said that the three-month period was not long enough to provide adequate cost data, especially since start-up was the most costly phase. He said it might be as much as a year before a fair cost comparison could be made.

While the Phillies' left-hander will touch on the value of good physical condition, his visit will feature a picture of major league baseball through stories of his own personal experiences, as a pitcher, and as a friend of many stars of the game.

A product of American Legion junior baseball, Curt Simmons was one of the sport's best bonus players, coming to the Phillies from the Wilmington Blue Rocks at the end of the 1947 season.

In 1950 he helped the Phillies to the National League championship with a record of 17 wins in a season cut short by the draft.

Another high point in his career was his winning streak in 1956, when he pitched and won seven straight games, and finished the season with a 12-16 record.

Last season, an operation for an ailing elbow kept Simmons from seeing much service in the major leagues, but his return to the active list is expected this spring.

In spite of several interruptions to his career, including a year in military service, he has over 100 wins to his credit, and continues to rank as the Phillies' most valuable left-hander.

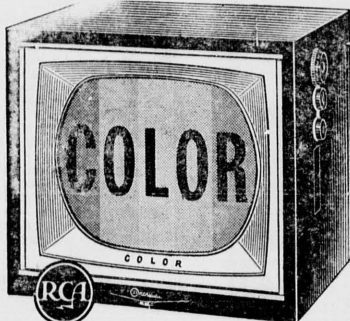

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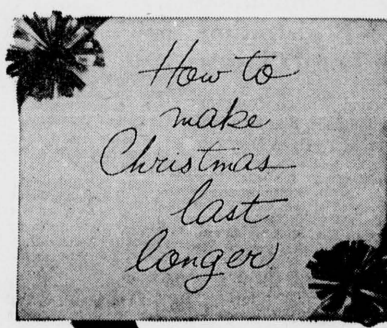

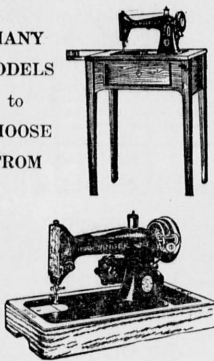

A novice coon hunter, even we could recognize immediately the change in tone when the dogs began baying at the den tree—and as a beginner, too, we discovered the real trick of racing through a black jungle at night to reach the distant dogs.

"Follow the big timber," Rip Smith cautioned, as we ran full tilt into a network of small saplings and briars—and we made out a lot better after that.

Ern Smith and Allen Brown were steering the night with flashlight beams around the den tree as we arrived, and coonhounds Pete and Joe were doing their best to climb the smooth bole of a forest giant that towered straight up some 30-ft. before branching out.

And above the first high branch, was the black mouth of a hollow—R. Coon's residence—and he still lives there.

It was a good hunt for all concerned—including the coon.

"Wish we could have seen him, though," Ern Smith said. And Pete and Joe were a bit put out at being called away from the coon tree.

"What more do they expect us to do?" Pete roared at Joe—with Rip Smith doing the interpreting.

A graduate of Philadelphia's Central High School, where he was a highly-regarded scholar-athlete, Heinecken also is a varsity baseball letterwinner at first base, and is a member of Sigma Nu social fraternity.
