COUNTY SPENDS LARGE SUM ON ROAD REPAIRS

County Engineer Grubb Has
Distributed Copies Of A
Quarterly Report

NEW CONSTRUCTION

A total of \$182,208.00 was spent on the roads of New Castle county during the three months' period which ends on September 30th, according to the report submitted to the Levy Court.

Under the law the County Engineer is required to publish the list of the expenditures for road work and the information on the above mentioned period was distributed this week.

Of the amount spent \$140,846.75 was from the county budget appropriation and the remaining \$41,361.25 was procured from the various Hundred road accounts.

The First and Second Districts were the leaders in the matter of new road construction while the Third District had the highest expenditures for maintenance.

There was a total of \$45,843.31 spent on new road construction throughout the county and \$2,406.32 on new bridge construction. The unfinished construction contracts are listed as totaling \$15,124.60.

Of the funds spent from the various Hundred road accounts, \$14,854.53 was for routine maintenance of the roads and the balance was used for the purchase of materials.

NEW TAGS CAN BE USED SOON

Very Few Motorists Have Applied For Their Plates
Thus Far

Automobile license tags for 1930 will be legal on Delaware cars after December 17th. Through the use of these tags on cars it is hoped by the Titling Department officials that Delaware motorists will apply for their licenses early. Up to last week, only between five and six thousand license tags out of a possible 45,000 had been issued. Unless there is a big increase soon, this will mean that the rush around the first of the year will be similar to those of other years.

William Ball, auto license administrator, says:

"I wish Delaware motorists would realize that their 1929 license tags will not be legal after January 1. There will be no five days grace this time. Anyone driving after January 1 with a 1929 license tag will be liable to arrest."

A rather unusual incident occurred this week, when a magistrate wrote in to the Titling Department and asked if there would be five days grace this year. This magistrate had previously received a copy of the new automobile code. This code specifies that the last day for 1929 tags is December 31. He had failed to read the code.

Many persons evidently don't read the newspapers or only indifferently. Some of them have been sending in the money for their driver's license, which is not necessary until March 1, turned to the applicant.

In such instances, the money is refunded. Officials of the Titling Department are anxious that those who know about this change in the law should tell their friends and neighbors in order to lessen the confusion that will come the latter part of this month.

X-MAS HOLIDAYS AT THE U. OF D.

Will Extend From December
18th Until January 3rd;
Progress On Auditorium

The Christmas and New Year's holidays at the University of Delaware will be several days longer this year than ever before. All classes will end at 5 o'clock on the afternoon of December 18, which will be Wednesday of next week and will not reopen until the morning of Friday, January 3.

To get these several extra days for the Christmas season the Thanksgiving holiday was cut to one day this year. One reason for the long Christmas holiday is to give those students who are working their way through college more opportunity to make extra money during the Christmas season. Most of the students of Delaware College, however, seem to be opposed to the short Thanksgiving vacation even if it does lengthen the Christmas vacation.

Good progress is being made in the building operations at the University of Delaware. The new auditorium to be known as Mitchell Hall which is a gift from H. Rodney Sharp, will probably be entirely finished and ready for use by March. There remains but little exterior work to be done but the interior is not near finished.

While work on the addition to the Engineering building which is to be known as Evans Hall, was delayed early in the fall by lack of material, progress is now being made and it will also be finished in the spring.

PROF. BARKLEY IS SPEAKER AT CLUB MEETING

Tells Women About Honor
System Being Practiced At
The Workhouse

HEAR MRS. WOLF

The weekly meeting of the Newark New Century Club was held Monday afternoon, with a good attendance. Mrs. T. A. Neal was in charge. Professor James A. Barkley, of the History Department of the University of Delaware, gave an interesting talk on his work at the New Castle County Workhouse having one of the finest records in the country. Professor Barkley has five classes at the prison, classes of beginners and up through high school. The speaker said that he finds that he can get the inmates to teach and that in two of the prisoners he had found born teachers. He commented on the usefulness of the mechanical shop, which is complete in equipment. The library of the institution is good, containing 4000 books. It has a monthly circulation of 1300 books and it appears that the books are being used to good advantage.

In speaking of what the clubs and churches could do to aid the work at the Workhouse, Professor Barkley said that the need is for more parole officers. There are three in the State which he considers not enough to adequately take care of the situation. Petitions to the State Legislature from the various organizations for a larger appropriation for parole officers would be a constructive act, he said.

Mrs. Theodore R. Wolf, Jr., of New York City, gave a very interesting talk and showed a number of reels of pictures of the Holy Land, the Far East and other foreign parts. Mr. Wolf is the youngest son of Theodore R. Wolf, Professor of Chemistry of Delaware College from 1871 to 1909, and in whose honor Wolf Hall was named.

Next week's meeting will be in charge of Mrs. W. A. Wilkinson, Chairman of Education. Ira S. Brinser, principal of the Newark schools, will give a talk. Music will be furnished by the school children.

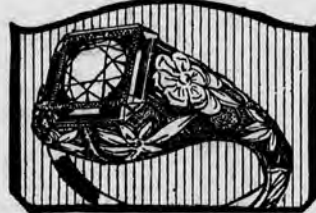

from the campaign this year.

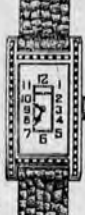

**GRAND JURY CLEARS
LOGAN IN FATAL SHOOTING**

The December term of the Circuit
Court for Cecil County, convened in
Elkton Monday, with Judges Wickes
and Keating on the bench, with indi-
cations for only a two weeks' session.
Sheriff G. Clinton Logan, of Cecil
county, was on Tuesday exonerated
of all blame in connection with the
fatal shooting of Harvey Crew, 24-
year-old farm hand, by the grand
jury of the court.

Sheriff Logan shot and killed Crew
a resident of the Red Hill section,
while attempting to arrest him, on
November 12.

On the following day Logan was
arrested by Coroner Howard Green,
on a charge of felonious assault. At
a hearing before Magistrate Gove S.
Jury in \$2500 bail. Since then he has
continued in charge of his department.

Early in the afternoon of Novem-
ber 12 Florence Jamison reported to
Sheriff Logan that Crew had forced
her automobile off the road. She
said the man was driving with an
improper license, was intoxicated and
driving his car in a reckless manner.

As the Sheriff started for his auto-
mobile Crew drove past. Logan gave
chase in his car. Two miles up the
road Crew abandoned his car and fled
across a field. The Sheriff caught
up with him and demanded to see the
license. Crew broke away and con-
tinued his flight.

The Sheriff later admitted that he
fired five times at the fugitive, but
had aimed at his legs. One bullet hit
him in the back and another in the
hip. He died instantly.

The grand jury first took up the
case late on Monday afternoon and
heard several witnesses. A number
of other witnesses were called before
the grand inquest Tuesday morning,
nearly all of them having testified at
the coroner's inquest and at Sheriff
Logan's preliminary hearing.

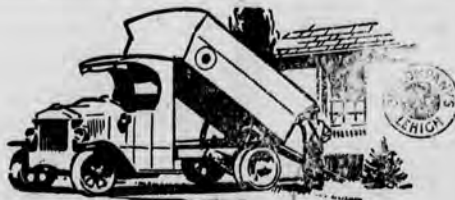
