

Delaware teens talk about social issues





KDSCOUNTinDelawareisdedicated to making our state abetter place for kids. We want to focus the attention of Delaware's policy makers, community leaders and parents on issues that affect the lives of children in our state.

Kids Voices Count provides the teen perspective. This writing project began as an assignment in three Newark High Schools ophomore social studies classes by teacher. James Doody. To present a wide representation of their opinions, excerpts were taken from many essays. Due to space constraints, some statements appear out of context but every effort has been made to include the true opinions of the students.



Over the last 36 years, America's economic strength has increased to unrivaled levels. But in those years, violent crime has increased 560 percent; births to single mothers are up 400 percent; divorce rates have quadrupled; children living in single-parent homes increased threefold; teen suicide has increased 200 percent; and average SAT test scores have dropped 80 points. In 1965 there was no drug problem, no AIDS epidemic, no public school collapse.

Why? What's going on here? What caused this? In there any connection between the phenomenal economic growth and the social regression? Can your generation even relate to a not so distant past and its values? What does the future hold?

Mr. Doody assigned us, his sophomore social studies classes, this prompt and told us to write an essay on our ideas. We then presented our ideas to the class so that we could hear our classmates' points of view Many different views emerged but approximately 3/4 of the 92 students said that the rising economy was a direct cause of our decaying society. People gave many aspects of our growing economy: greed, materialism, focus on work instead of home life, and increasing distance between the rich and the poor; as the culprit for social regression. The minority who did not blame the economy came up with several ideas such as the media, a change in people's principles or values, single parent families, and, in a few cases, the government, drugs, lack of gun control, and a change in national character since the war in Vietnam. One student pointed out that in the last ten years both the economy and social issues have improved.

Almost half blamed the social regression on bad parenting even though there was nothing regarding parenting in the prompt. Bad parenting included parents not spending enough time with their children because both of them are working, parents being too lenient with their kids or spoiling them, and parents not caring for their kids because they are too worried about other things.

There is a spectrum of our ideas printed on the following pages. Many excerpts were included and only three are printed in their entirety because of space constraints. You will notice that some ideas are contradictory to others while you are reading them; you can form your own opinions.

1965-2002: Economic Growth, Social Regression

The past thirty six years has brought great economic Pete growth in the United States of America; the stock market has soared, the job market has increased phenomenally, and the United States has risen to the greatest world power. In the nineteen sixties, success, for most families, meant having a two bedroom home with one car in the driveway. In two thousand two, for most families success means having a huge four or five bedroom home, with three cars in the driveway. This growth, for the most part is very good, however, there is a huge price involved. This price includes the increase of violent crime by over five hundred percent, the increase in births to single mothers, and the huge increase of divorces. Who or what can take the blame for these problems? A huge economic growth, such as the one that has occurred in the past thirty years, has many problems attached to it, and many causes for these problems; including

deteriorating family values, overall population increase, and excess money circulating among teens.

A deteriorating family is the start of a huge domino effect.

A child's family experience is extremely important. The first few years of a child's life revolve around his family, and what occurs during these first few years directly relates to what the child will amount to be. A deteriorating family is the start of a huge domino effect. Without a stable home, children can be severely damaged mentally, and from the start, they fall behind. As teenagers these children are more likely to get in to trouble and to worry less about school. One main factor that has contributed to the slump of family values is the increase of both parents in the work place. This can be attributed to families or individuals feeling the need for more money. A smaller house for a beginning family is no longer

acceptable, a bigger one is. Both parents working means more stress, and more stress means higher divorce rates. Studies have proven that a child will do much better in a two parent home, but if a single mother can make a one hundred thousand dollar salary, no one seems to care anymore. A child of this mother would have many of the same long lasting problems as a child growing up in a single parent home in the ghettos of an inner city. The problem is not a lack of money, it is a lack of basic family values that this country has been brought up on for hundreds of years.

The lack of family values is a main cause of the social regression, however there are more causes that need to be addressed. For example, the dynamics of the inner city have changed dramatically. In the early nineteen sixties the suburbs were nothing like what they are today. The same goes for cities; there was far less poverty, and crime rates were significantly lower. By the late sixties this all changed, most of the law abiding middle class citizens moved to the suburbs and lower class citizens and immigrants who were more likely to resort to crime moved in. The "ghetto" of how we think of it today was formed, and with this came a huge increase of crime, drugs, and births to single mothers.

Education in general has gotten so much better over the last thirty-five years, not worse. There are so many more opportunities today for any type of student. More students today are going to college then ever before, if not four year universities, then two year community colleges, or the armed forces. Any hard working high school student who desires

to go to college can go. If a family can not afford it, then it will be paid for. There is no relevance in the term "public school collapse" because the type of education a student gets is directly related to what kind of effort the student puts in. If a student wants a mediocre education at a public school, then they can get one, if they want the best education possible, they can get it, and if they want the worst education possible; they can also get that. It all depends on the effort of each individual student. It is impossible to measure the

just by looking at test scores. SAT scores have dropped slightly over the past thirty years, however this is good in some ways. The drop in no way means that the youth of America are getting dumber, it simply means more people are taking the exam. Many of the people taking the exam would not have had the chance to take it thirty years ago. If these students score a little lower on the exam, it does not matter, it is important that more and more students are getting the opportunity to take the test and go to college.

It is impossible to measure the success of a school or education in general just by looking at test scores.

Economic growth means more jobs all across the board and it filters down directly to teenagers. A teen today can have a part time job during school and earn a decent amount of money. Many employers are forced to pay teens the same as other employees because of minimum wage laws. This means that teenagers today are walking around with much more excess money to spend. All the factors of social regression affect one other; for example if a teen is stressed out about a recent divorce in the family then they are likely to resort to drugs. Drugs are readily available for any middle class teen that is willing to pay, and with their extra money, they buy drugs. More drugs in the suburbs leads to more violent crime in the inner cities.

There is definitely a direct connection between economic growth and social regression; families desire more money and split up, teens have more money and buy drugs. Many things need to be done in order to get this country back on the right track. Drug cartels need to be broken up, and solid family values need to be emphasized. On the other hand, not every family in the United States is dysfunctional, and not every teenager uses drugs. People in this category need to help those who have problems simply by setting good examples. It is wrong to believe that all of today's youth has lost its values. Many realize that in order for the future to be good, change needs to be made. The economy has grown and grown, and many basic values have been forgotten, but there needs to be some way that our country can thrive both socially and economically. Until this combination is met, there will still be work to be done.

Economic Strength and Social Regression

Over the last 36 years, America's economic strength has increased to unrivaled levels, but at the same time we have been pulled into a social regression. Why, with all of our technological advances and new economical knowledge have we been sucked in to so may social problems? The answer is that there must be some sort of relation between the economic boom and social regression.

One example is the correlation between single-parent homes and child poverty. When the War on Poverty began, 7.7% of American children were born out of wedlock. Today, this figure has increased to 33%. Since the 1960's, the percentage of births that were out-of-wedlock increased steadily nearly every year. This out-of-wedlock childbearing is a main cause of child poverty and welfare dependence in the U.S.

This carelessness and lack of responsibility on the parents' part takes its toll on their children. It has been proven that prolonged welfare dependence reduces a child's IQ level. It also has an effect on the child's future; the longer a child remains on welfare, the greater the chance that his earnings as an adult will be lower Children raised

longer a child remains on welfare, the greater the chance that his earnings as an adult will be lower. Children raised in single-parent homes are more likely to experience behavioral and emotional problems, suffer from physical abuse,

engage in early sexual activity, and do poorly in school. Lack of married parents, rather than race or poverty, is a key factor in the crime rate. In a study of 11,000 individuals in 1988, researchers found that the percentage of single-parent households with children between the ages of 12 and 20 is significantly associated with the high rates of violent crime and burglary. The key factor here is not race, but rather the absence of 2 married parents and the failure to form family values and maintain a stable family. Also, poverty is not as key in the crime issue as nonexistence of married parents. A study showed that a

man raised in a single-parent home was twice as likely to be involved in crime related activities as a man who was raised in a home with two parents living at home. This proved true even after taking in a range of variables such as family income, urban residence, neighborhood environment, and parents' education.

You can see from this information that though our economy is reaching an all time high, or society is facing some negative feedback. In the new age of technology and freedom, we have become more and more dependant upon computers and machines to do the work for us and we ourselves have become lazy and careless. Essentially the rich are getting richer and the poor are getting poorer, thus defeating the whole "equal opportunity" that America is known for. We have gone against our personal morals and given up on the whole idea of a "family". We have proved that we are too ashamed to seek help when we need it and we refuse to work things out and be in the least bit reasonable. It is up to our upcoming generation to improve the conditions of the present. The time is now to start making changes. We need to share our knowledge with others so that the "oh so distant past" will be not be in the past anymore, but rather the present and the future.

What's going on here?



Economic Growth & Social Problems

It may seem surprising that while the economy has grown over the past thirty-six years new social problems have developed and some long lasting problems have actually gotten worse. When we think about the relationship between economic growth and social problems, however, we should not be surprised. Economic growth refers to the increased production of goods and services in the U.S. It does not tell us what is being produced, it does not tell us who gets income and wealth, and it does not tell us about how different groups of people live their lives. To understand the problems that have grown, we have to look at more than how much the economy has grown.



One of the big changes has been the change from an industrial economy to a service economy. There has been a decline in the part of the economy based on automobiles, steel, electric appliances like TVs, and other manufacturing industries. The growth areas have been in education, health care, computers and information, banking and other service areas. The new parts of the economy need people who have college educations. This means that fewer jobs have been created for people with little education. As a result, the income and employment of poor people deteriorated. The lack of stable jobs and good incomes led to higher divorce rates, breakdown of family and neighborhoods, and more women having children without being married.

As the economy has changed, the distribution of income and wealth in the U.S. has become more unequal.

Income refers to the amount of money households get during a year. In 1966, the top five percent of households got 155% of the country's income and the bottom twenty percent got 5.6% of the country's income. By the mid 1990s, the distribution of income had become even more unequal. The top five percent got 19.1% of the country's

income while the bottom twenty percent got 4.2%. This inequality has been even greater in the concentration in the ownership of wealth. For example, by 1990 less than 1% of families in the US owned almost 30% of the country's wealth. The top 10% of families owned more than two-thirds of the country's wealth.

Over the past thirty-six years, violence has grown dramatically. For example, reported rapes have increased from 95 per 100,000 to 39.2 per 100,000. Aggravated assault has increased 85.1 to 430 per 100,000. In part, more people reporting some types of crime, such as rape, can explain increased rates of violent crime. Also, the increased number of young people as a percentage of the whole population during most of this period led to more violent crime. As criminologists have shown, violent crime varies with the age structure of a society. This kind of change in demographics can also lead to changes in illegitimate births.

Yet differences in income and wealth affect the distribution of crime and punishment. For example, it is far more likely that people who are poor and who are either Black or Hispanic will go to prison. The War Against Crime followed by the War Against Drugs led to laws that increasingly made drug use illegal and made punishments very severe.

the quality of schools vary with Even the apparent decline in SAT scores is related to economic inequality. Higher school funding. and higher percentages of high school students have been taking the SAT since getting into college is important for good employment. Because of differences in social class, schools in the U.S. do not have equal funding. To a large extent, the quality of schools vary with school funding. Generally, lower income students have not had the opportunity to go to the best schools. As a result, they tend not do as well on the SAT as do middle class and upper middle class students.

I've suggested that economic growth does not necessarily lead to social problems getting better. Some social problems may have gotten worse because of greater income and wealth inequality I do not mean that all problems are based on inequality. The values people have and the way they care for one another is extremely important. We must, however, consider inequality as an important issue even when the economy is growing.

In the event of a family crisis such as divorce, children are often not provided with the necessary comfort by their parents when it occurs. Divorce rates have quadrupled in recent years, and kids are often being lashed around during the struggles that are common in divorce situations regardless of their feelings on the matter. Since many of these kids feel there is no one to talk to during those times, they begin to sink deeper and deeper into depression. 

From College Board statistics, average math SAT scores have hit a 32-year high. Verbal scores on the other hand, are still 40 points lower than 30 years ago. The dip in scores began in the 1970's, but math scores began to rise after educators focused on math in schools. However, verbal achievement has not improved, but rather, has remained stagnant over the last decade after the initial plunge in the 1970's. Researchers attribute the drop in scores to an increase in under prepared test-takers. The problem in verbal scores is most likely due to decreased enrollment in Grammar and English classes leading to underprepared students.

The Center for Disease Control and prevention found that the percentage of youth who report that they had thought seriously about committing suicide in the last year has declined from 27 percent in 1990 to 19 percent in 2001. However, the number of youth who reported having attempted suicide has remained steady at 8 to 9 percent. A much smaller proportion, 2 to 3 percent, reported requiring medical attention as a result of the suicide attempt.

Females are more likely to consider and/or commit suicide than males, and overall, Hispanics are more likely to consider and/or attempt suicide than other racial group.

According to a study done by Child Trends Databank Organization and the University of Michigan, the use of marijuana among 9th-12th graders has doubled over the last decade. In the Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System almost 50 percent of students in the study reported having tried marijuana. Males reported having used marijuana more than females and overall more African-Americans reported having used the drug.

In Delaware, approximately 25 percent of 11th graders reported using marijuana once a month or more often. Most young teens (ages 12-14) believe marijuana to be a harmless drug, while older teens (ages 15-19) believe the effects are minimal and continue their use of the drug.

The increase in marijuana use among teens may be due to:

- the increasing availability of the drug. According to the National Center on Addiction and Substance Abuse, almost 80 percent of teens indicated that drugs are used, sold, and kept on school grounds.
- the continuous promotion or exposure of druguse from pop culture and other various media images; and
- the lack of parental discussion about drugs. The Center also reported that students are more likely to learn about drugs from peers or via the media before ever having a conversation about drugs and drug use with a parent.

Similar trends are also found in the use of other illicit drugs.* The Monitoring the Future Study by the University of Michigan showed that in 1990 less than 8 percent of 12th graders indicated having used illicit drugs, and that in 2001, almost 11 percent of 12th graders indicated having used illicit drugs. However, contrary to marijuana use, White teens are more likely to use illicit drugs (11 percent) than African-Americans (3 percent).


My generation is growing up in an economic boom; we are the wealthy generation. With this position comes certain obligations, such as attempting to do something about social regression. With all the money
