





#### SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 2

# IN REFERENCE RULES OF THE DELAWARE STATE SENATE

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the 142nd General Assembly that the following Rules of the Senate be and they hereby are adopted as Rules for the governing of the present session, until further action of the Senate:

#### **RULE 1. ORDER OF BUSINESS**

- 1. Calling of the Senate to Order.
- 2. Prayer.
- 3. Salute to Flag.
- 4. Roll Call.
- 5. Reading of Journal.
- 6. Presentation of petitions, memorials or communications.
  - 7. Reports from Standing and Special Committees.
- 8. Reporting by the Secretary of prior filed bills, resolutions and citations.
- 9. Introductions of all other bills and resolutions by members.
- 10. Agenda for the day.
- 11. Miscellaneous business.

#### **RULE 2. CONVENING OF SENATE**

Unless otherwise ordered by a majority of its members, the Senate will convene Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday at 2:00 p.m. All proceedings of the Senate shall be public.

#### RULE 3. ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS

- (a) Every member shall be in their place at the time to which the Senate stands recessed.
- (b) No Senator shall absent themselves from the service of the Senate without notifying the President Pro Tem.

## RULE 4. ROLL CALL; READING OF JOURNAL

Each legislative day and before the Senate proceeds to the consideration of any business, the Secretary shall call the names of the members in alphabetical order, and shall then read the Journal of the preceding legislative day, which shall be approved or corrected by order of the Senate.

#### RULE 5. CONTENTS OF JOURNAL

The proceedings of the Senate shall be briefly and accurately stated on the Journal; messages to the Governor in full; the titles of all bills and resolutions; every motion with the name of the member making the same, except motions for adjournment; the names of the members voting on all roll calls.

# RULE 6. PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS, MEMORIAL

## OR COMMUNICATIONS TO THE SENATE

- (a) After the Journal is read, the Presiding Officer shall lay before the Senate communications or messages from the Governor, reports and communications from Departments or State Boards, and other communications addressed to the Senate, and such bills, joint resolutions and other messages from the House of Representatives as may be upon the presiding officer's table, undisposed of.
- (b) When petitions, memorials and other papers addressed to the Senate are presented by the President, or a member, the contents thereof shall be briefly stated.
- (c) Messages from the Governor or from the House of Representatives may be received at any stage of proceedings with the concurrence of the Presiding Officer, except while the Journal is being read, while a question of order or a motion to adjourn is pending, or while a bill is on the floor.
- (d) When a message is brought to the Senate by the Governor or the Governor's messenger, or by a member of the House of Representatives, or any officer thereof, the members of the Senate shall rise upon their feet, if so directed by the Presiding Officer.

#### RULE 7. <u>DELIVERY OF MESSAGES FROM THE</u> <u>SENATE</u>; <u>DUTIES OF SECRETARY</u>

Messages shall be delivered to the House of Representatives by the Secretary, or by a Senator or other officer of the Senate directed by the Presiding Officer. The Secretary shall certify previous to delivery the determination of the Senate upon all bills, joint resolutions, and other resolutions which may be communicated to the House, or in which its concurrence may be requested; and the Secretary shall also certify and deliver to the Governor all resolutions and other communications which may be directed to the Secretary by the Senate.

#### RULE 8. PREPARATIONOF BILLS AND RESOLUTIONS

- (a) No bill or resolution shall be received by the Senate unless it be prefaced by a brief statement of the purpose of the bill or resolution, which shall be known as the title, and shall also contain the text of the bill or resolution in full. The original of all bills and resolutions shall be printed or stenciled on permanent rag content bond paper, be properly backed, contain no erasures or interlineations and shall be produced in such a manner as shall be approved by the State Archivist and Director of Legislative Council. At the end of each bill, Joint Resolution or amendments there shall be placed the name of the author and/or Department who was responsible for writing same and a brief synopsis of the intent of the bill. In the lower left hand corner of page one there shall be the initials of the unit preparing the bill or resolution, the initials of the author and the typist, and, if prepared by automatic equipment, the identification number. Each bill or resolution shall have an appropriate enacting or resolving clause. The first name listed after the word "sponsor" on the first page of a bill or resolution shall be the "prime" sponsor. Once a bill or resolution has been pre-filed or introduced, the addition or deletion of a sponsor shall not cause the bill to be reprinted. The change in sponsorship shall be noted in the calendar, on the jacket of the original bill and on the first page of the original bill.
- (b) Every bill or resolution introduced in the Senate which establishes and/or creates a committee, commission, task force or similar body, either for a specified period of time or on a permanent statutory basis shall require that the following functional details be incorporated in the bill and/or resolution, if necessary; provided, however, the requirements of subparagraph (4) in drafting legislation affecting the Delaware Code need not be made a part of the Code.
  - (1) The date on which the report is due;
  - (2) to whom the report is to be presented;
  - (3) the appointing authority or authorities;
- (4) the designation of a temporary chairperson to enable the committee to commence its duties.
- (c) Every bill and resolution to which the concurrence of both Houses of the General Assembly may be necessary, shall be introduced with one original and one backed copy. The original shall at all times remain in the custody of the Chairman of the Committee to which it was referred, or of the Secretary of the Senate; and one backed copy shall be delivered to the Legislative Council. In addition, every Senator shall be provided with an unbacked copy of the text of the bill or resolution.
- (d) The master used to produce the bill or resolution together with a minimum 160 true copies of the bill or resolution, shall be made available to the Legislative Council immediately after the introduction of a bill.
- (e) All bills for the amendment of any statutes contained in the Delaware Code of 1974 shall be made with reference to the statutes or parts of statutes contained in said Code, and shall conform to the arrangement of said Code.

# RULE 9. PROCEDURE APPLICABLE TO BILLS AND JOINT

## RESOLUTIONS

- (a) Unless the bill or joint resolution has been placed upon a President Pro Tem's pre-filed list, every bill and joint resolution when introduced shall be read one time by title only, after which it shall be assigned to the proper committee.
- (b) No bill or joint resolution shall be considered on the same day it is reported out of committee, or in the absence of the prime sponsor who introduced it, unless by his or her written consent. After any bill has reached its order of preference on the agenda, it may be deferred twice to the end of the agenda. After it has been deferred twice it must be considered when its order of preference is next reached or removed to the ready list by the Secretary of the Senate. In the event of

such removal, no bill shall again be placed on the agenda for the same or the next legislative day.

- (c) When considered, each bill or resolution shall be given its final reading by title only unless any member requests a reading in full.
- (d) An agenda of bills to be considered on the succeeding legislative day shall be kept by the Secretary of the Senate; and announced at the end of each calendar day; and published each day and a copy thereof distributed to each member, and any bill placed upon the agenda by any member of the Senate, without otherwise limiting the right of any member to put a bill upon its passage, stand in the same order of preference for consideration by the Senate unless otherwise ordered by it.
- (e) Every bill or resolution shall be introduced by a member or group of members or by order of the Senate or by report of a committee. Introduction may be by either of two methods:
- A. Filing of Bills and Resolutions with the Secretary of the Senate.
- (1) A bill or resolution may be introduced by being filed with the Secretary of the Senate at any time while the General Assembly is meeting.
- (2) A bill or resolution that is presented to the Secretary of the Senate while the Senate stands in recess, in adjournment, or is not otherwise meeting, may be given a number, entered upon a docket kept for that purpose.
- (3) As soon as may be practicable following the filing of a bill or resolution with the Secretary, unless the bill or resolution was placed upon a President Pro Tem's pre-filed list, the Reading Clerk shall read the bill or resolution number and title of all bills filed with the Secretary and entered upon the docket prior to the convening of the Senate which have not been previously read.
- (4) Such reading of the bill or resolution by the Reading Clerk shall constitute the first reading of such bill or resolution.
- (5) Upon such first reading, or upon placement upon the President Pro Tem's pre-filed list, copies of the bill, amendments or resolutions shall be distributed as provided in Rule 8.
- B. Other Methods of Introduction.
- (1) A bill or resolution may also be introduced from the floor while the Senate is in session.
- C. President Pro Tem's pre-filed list.
- (1) A bill or resolution filed with the Secretary may, in the discretion of the President Pro Tem, be placed upon the "President Pro Tem's pre-filed list" and the bill or resolution shall at such time be assigned to a Committee by the President Pro Tem. Copies of the President Pro Tem's pre-filed list shall be distributed to members prior to its reading by the Reading Clerk. The President Pro Tem's pre-filed list shall be read as soon as practicable by the Reading Clerk.
- (f) No bill that has been tabled, shall be lifted from the table for further consideration until such bill is first placed upon the agenda, unless such bill is lifted for further consideration on the same legislative day the bill was tabled.
- (g) No Senate Bill returning from the House shall be acted on by the Senate unless the bill is first placed on the agenda.

#### RULE 10. MOTIONS

- (a) All motions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the Presiding Officer or by any Senator, and shall be read before the same shall be debated.
- (b) Any motion or resolution may be withdrawn or modified by the mover at any time before a decision, amendment or ordering of the yeas and nays.
- (c) A motion shall be in order at any time to amend or substitute a title to any bill or resolution only in order to correct typographical errors.
  - (d) When a question is pending, no motions shall be received but: To adjourn;

To adjourn to a certain day.

To take a recess;

To proceed to the consideration of executive business;

To lay on the table;

To postpone indefinitely;

To postpone to a certain day;

To commit:

To amend.

Which several motions shall have precedence as they stand arranged; and the motion to adjourn, to take recess, to proceed to the consideration of executive business, to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate.

#### **RULE 11. VOTING**

Every bill, amendment, joint resolution, concurrent resolution, or simple resolution shall be decided by a roll call vote and shall require a majority vote of all members elected to the Senate for adoption. The names of the Senators shall be called alphabetically and each Senator shall without debate answer "Yes" or "No" or "Not Voting"; and no Senator shall be permitted to vote after the roll call shall have been announced by the Secretary, but may change their vote prior to said announcement. No Senator shall be granted privilege of the floor from the time the Secretary has announced the roll call to the time the roll call is declared by the presiding officer of the Senate. Tabling of roll calls is prohibited.

#### **RULE 12. RECONSIDERATION**

Any motion for reconsideration must be made by a member of the prevailing side within three (3) legislative days of the original action. When a motion for reconsideration is granted, there can be no further consideration until the sponsor or floor manager rescinds the roll call and takes appropriate action.

# RULE 13. PROCEDURE WHEN BILL OR OTHER MATTER SOUGHT TO BE RECONSIDERED HAS BEEN SENT TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OR TO THE GOVERNOR

When a bill, resolution, report, amendment, order, or message, upon which a vote has been taken, shall have gone out of the possession of the Senate and been communicated to the House of Representatives, or to the Governor, the motion to reconsider shall be accompanied by a motion to request the House or Governor to return the same; which last motion shall be acted upon immediately, and without debate, and if determined in the negative shall be a final disposition of the motion to reconsider.

#### **RULE 14. OUESTION OF ORDER**

A question of order may be raised at any stage of the proceedings, and, unless submitted to the Senate, shall be decided by the Presiding Officer without debate, subject to an appeal to the Senate. When an appeal is taken, any subsequent question of order which may arise before the decision of such appeal shall be decided by the Presiding Officer without debate; and any appeal may be laid on the table without prejudice to the pending proposition, and thereupon shall be held as affirming the decision of the Presiding Officer. The Presiding Officer may submit any question of order for the decision of the Senate.

#### **RULE 15. SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS**

Any subject may, without objection by any member elected to the Senate, be made a special order; and when the time so fixed for its consideration arrives, the Presiding Officer shall lay it before the Senate.

## **RULE 16. PETITION OUT OF COMMITTEE**

Upon written request signed by the majority of the members elected to the Senate and directed to the Presiding Officer, any bill, joint resolution or other business, which shall have been referred to a committee, shall be reported to the Senate.

#### **RULE 17. CONDUCT**

- (a) When a Senator desires to speak, the Senator shall rise and address the Presiding Officer, and shall not proceed until recognized, and the Presiding Officer shall recognize the Senator who shall first address him or her.
- (b) No Senator shall interrupt another in debate without his or her consent, and to obtain such consent the Senator shall first address the Presiding Officer; and no Senator shall speak more than three times upon any one question in debate on the same day without leave of the Senate which shall be determined without debate.
- (c) No Senator in debate shall, directly, or indirectly by any form of words, impute to any Senator or to other Senators any conduct or motive unworthy or unbecoming a Senator.
- (d) If any Senator, in speaking or otherwise, transgresses the rules of the Senate, the Presiding Officer shall, or any Senator may, call the Senator to order; and when a Senator shall be called to order, the Senator shall sit down and not

proceed without leave of the Senate, which, if granted, shall be upon motion that the Senator be allowed to proceed in order, which motion shall be determined without debate.

- (e) If any person who is not a member of the Senate shall be granted the privilege of the floor for the purpose of addressing the Senate, such person and the Senate members shall then accord each other the same courtesies and respect that is required among members of the Senate.
- (f) Any person in the chamber and/or balcony who is not a member of the Senate and who refuses to salute the American flag at the time such ceremony occurs shall leave the chamber and/or balcony.

#### RULE 18. APPOINTMENT OF COMMITTEES

The President Pro Tempore shall appoint all committees; however, the President Pro Tempore, on at the Pro Tem's own initiative or upon order of the Senate, may appoint special or select committees.

#### RULE 20. <u>DELIBERATIVE PROCESS AND PROCEDURES OF</u> STANDING COMMITTEES

Each bill, resolution or other legislative matter assigned to a standing committee shall pass through deliberative process before being brought to the floor of either House, unless it is sooner petitioned out of committee. Such deliberative process shall include pre-announced meetings whereby the committee receives testimony from the general public, including those affected by the proposed legislation; considers an analysis of the proposed legislation; and by notice to the sponsor, makes time available for each formal sponsor to explain the legislation and answer possible committee questions.

- (b) Regular standing committee meetings may be held every Wednesday, while the Senate is in session, between the hours of noon and 3 P.M. The scheduling of the regular meetings shall be coordinated with the Secretary of the Senate. The Chairman of a standing committee may call other meetings as deemed necessary.
- (c) At least five calendar days before a meeting each standing committee shall release a Committee Agenda which shall include, among other things, all matters to be considered by the committee at its next meeting and any other announcements from the committee including the times, places and dates of future meetings. Nominations may be exempted from the 5 calendar day notice requirement.

(d) Minutes shall be taken at each formal standing committee meeting, and the results of any committee votes shall be recorded. Committee members who dissent from any committee decision shall be permitted, in the minutes, to state such dissent and the reasons therefor.

A quorum does not have to be present to constitute a committee meeting. Committee members unable to attend pre-announced meetings may subsequently affix their signatures to legislation considered at such meetings.

Nothing in this rule shall preclude the option of a committee chairman to cancel regular or special meeting or call additional meetings when necessary.

All committee meetings shall be scheduled in a space large enough to accommodate everyone reasonably anticipated to attend. If there are more attempting to attend a committee meeting than there is room for, the Chair shall move the meeting to a different space which is large enough to accommodate those wishing to attend.

#### **RULE 21. CONTESTS**

Any contest for a seat in this body shall be referred to the Leadership. RULE 22. UNDER THE LEADERSHIP, SUPERVISION OF

#### ATTACHES

The officers, attaches and employees of the Senate shall be under the supervision of the Leadership in the performance of the duties of their respective offices.

#### RULE 23. PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR

(a) No person who is not a member of the Senate shall be granted the privilege of the floor, or be seated, stand or allowed to proceed in that area in front of the rear line of the last row of members' seats from the rostrum, to the left of the right line of the farthest right row of members' seats, as facing the rostrum and to the right of the left line of the farthest left row of members' seats as facing the rostrum, while the Senate is in session except:

The Governor of the State

The Secretary of the State

Ex-Governors of the State

**Ex-Lieutenant Governors of the State** 

**Ex-Members of the General Assembly** 

Members of the Congress of the United States

Ex-Members of the Congress of the United States

Members of the House of Representatives of the State

Attorneys, Officers and Employees of the Senate

Attorneys, Officers and Employees of the House

of Representatives of the State

The staff of Legislative Council

(b) Notwithstanding anything contained in subsection (a) of this Rule, any other person or persons may be granted the privilege of the floor, or of being seated or to stand in front of the rear line of the last row of member seats aforesaid, by and with the consent of this body.

#### RULE 24. CHANGE OR SUSPENSION OF RULES

Any rules of the Senate may be changed or suspended by approval of a majority of all members elected to the Senate.

#### **RULE 25. RULES OF ORDER**

All questions of parliamentary procedure not covered or provided for by the Rules of the Senate or the Constitution of the State of Delaware shall be decided in accordance with Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure.

#### RULE 26. NEWS MEDIA

Members of the press, with permission of the President Pro Tempore, may use personal recording devices in the Senate Chamber during live session of that body.

#### RULE 27. TRAVEL BY MEMBERS OF THE SENATE

Any member of the State Senate who takes an out-of-state trip on official business at taxpayer expense shall upon the Senator's return and at the request of the Senate, give an oral report to the Senate on the extent of the Senator's travel, the nature of the official business and a summary of the convention, conference, seminar, or other proceedings.

#### RULE 28. CONSENT CALENDAR

- (a) Any member of the Senate may propose any Senate Resolution, Senate Concurrent Resolution or House Concurrent Resolution, which ever the case may be, for inclusion on a Consent Calendar for the purpose of a final reading; provided that no amendment to the resolution is proposed.
- (b) Any proposal by a member of the Senate for inclusion of a Senate Resolution, Senate Concurrent Resolution, or House Concurrent Resolution on a Consent Calendar shall be made to the Secretary of the Senate.
- (c) Upon receipt of a proposal for inclusion the Secretary of the Senate shall prepare the Consent Calendar noting each inclusion thereon and present the Consent Calendar to the membership at an appropriate time during each legislative day.
- (d) All resolutions included on the Consent Calendar shall be read and voted on collectively as a single group.
- (e) Any resolution may be removed from the Consent Calendar for individual action if objection is made to its inclusion by any member. RULE 29. CITATIONS

Every member of the Senate shall be granted the privilege to issue citations, in the categories or classifications available, at anytime during his or her tenure; provided, however, the procedures herein prescribed are adhered to. Citations, unlike resolutions which are highly detailed, invoking the entire Delaware State Senate as a body shall be sequentially numbered by the Secretary of the Senate and made a part of the permanent record of the Senate. Each citation before becoming an official document of the Senate shall be signed by the sponsor and/or sponsors, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Secretary of the Senate. When the Senate is in session pursuant to Article II, Section 4 of the 1897 Constitution, as amended, the President Pro Tempore or their designee shall cause to be read into the permanent record of the Senate, for informational and archival purposes, on one of the three (3) legislative days mentioned in Rule 2, such citations as have been filed with the Secretary of the Senate, by topical notation along with the name of the Chief sponsor thereof. Such citations shall not require an official vote; however, at the time such citations are officially read into the record, any member of the Senate may comment, elaborate or simply expand on the content of the citation. Citations requested and issued by members of the Senate when the Senate stands in recess or adjournment (July 1 - December 31st) shall be administratively managed by the Secretary of the Senate and in the duties of compiling the permanent record of the Senate proceedings (the Senate Journal) shall cause such citations to be made a part of the official proceedings of the Senate.

# RULE 30. PROHIBITING SMOKING IN SENATE CHAMBER, CAUCUS ROOMS AND GALLERY

No member of the Senate, staff person, member of the press or visitor shall smoke a cigarette, cigar, pipe or other smoking object or equipment in the Senate chamber, caucus rooms and gallery while the Senate is in session.





#### 1<sup>ST</sup> LEGISLATIVE DAY 142<sup>ND</sup> GENERAL ASSEMBLY FIRST SESSION JANUARY 14, 2003

Pursuant to Section 4, Article 2 of the Constitution of the State of Delaware, the Senate met at Legislative Hall in Dover, Delaware at 02:15 PM on January 14, 2001 with Lt. Governor Carney presiding.

A prayer was offered by Senator Venables followed by the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Lt. Governor Carney recognized Senator Adams.

Senator Adams move that Bernard J. Brady be appointed Temporary Secretary of the Senate and Patricia Moore be appointed Temporary Reading Clerk. No objections.

Senator Adams moved that Lt. Governor Carney appoint two members to examine Certificates of Election.

The Governor was welcomed by the Lt. Governor and invited to the rostrum.

The Governor addressed the assembly as follows:

To the Lieutenant Governor, the President Pro Tem, Senator Adams, Speaker Spence, members of the 142<sup>nd</sup> General Assembly, members of the Delaware judiciary, the members of my Cabinet, the Presidents of the Colleges and Universities, to the other state wide elected officials, to distinguished guests, to my son and my fellow Delawareans.

As I stand before you today, I can report to you that the State of the State of Delaware is

strong. We are a leader in educating our children and protecting health. We are in the forefront in cracking down on polluters and in preparing for bioterrorism.

We are recognized for our plans to curtail sprawl and to make our state more livable. And while we confront a national economic recession with challenges that still lie ahead, we have shown that's Delaware's financial remains strong.

As my 49 colleagues give their State of the State addresses to your colleagues, you and I are nearly the only ones who can say we have not raised taxes, we have not slashed services, we have not laid off our state workers or raided our emergency reserve funds in the last two years. In fact, while other states have opted for one-time and short-term fixes, we have taken the responsible and the prudent course of seeking long-term solutions of our fiscal situation.

The reason for Delaware's success – over the last two years, over the last twenty years – has been our willingness, our ability and our will to focus on the future of our state, even when it means making unenviable decisions in the present.

As in the past, we have worked together – legislative and executive, Democrats and Republicans, senators and representatives, and done what's best for Delaware. It's what we mean when we say "the Delaware way."

There are times when we must rise above the political turmoil of today and focus on tomorrow. This is one of those times, and the opportunity we have is for the future Delawareans to look back and see that we focused on their good, perhaps ahead of our own.

So let me start talking about those opportunities.

#### Industrial responsibility

In the last two years, we have strengthened Delaware's environment. Laws are better today and we protect and inform the public. In 2001, the Environmental Right-To-Know Act met the expectation of citizens that we inform them more quickly of the environmental incidents in their community.

Last year, the Jeffrey Davis Aboveground Storage Tank Act gave the state, authority to regulate chemical and other tanks that have the potential to cause harm to our workers, our residents and our environment.

We put those facilities that repeatedly foul our air and water on notice that they are branded "chronic offenders" and subject to harsh penalties.

We must continue our efforts to focus on those industries and facilities that endanger Delaware and, for the first time, hold individuals in charge of those facilities accountable.

I proposed legislation, with Sen. McBride and Representative Smith and Representative Valihura, to focus on those who manage industrial facilities and their responsibilities to the community and the state.

This industrial accountability legislation will create a felony punishment for industrial officials who are knowingly violate environmental standards and cause serious injury when they do.

It will expand criminal penalties for falsely reporting adherence and environmental rules that require the top Delaware operating official of a facility to attest to compliance with safety rules. It will subject chronic violators to independent safety audits and require industrial facilities to give us notice of environmental problems they have in other states.

Finally, this industrial accountability proposal will clarify the state's ability to close down dangerous industrial facilities. It's a bold initiative, but it is a necessary next

step in our ongoing effort to protect our natural resources.

Today, I am also announcing a task force to review the events that led to the closure of the Metachem, a facility near Delaware City.

The abrupt shutdown of that plant and the bankruptcy of that company have saddled the people of Delaware with up to 40 million tons of chemicals to clean up and up to \$75 million in costs.

The goal of the task force will be to determine what environmental, operational, business and financial factors played a role in the closure and identify any steps we as a state could take to prevent this situation from occurring again. The task force will work to identify any other industrial site in our state that may be at risk of becoming the next Metachem.

I will name a man who is well respected for both, his love of our state and his ability, honed as one of our state's most respected jurists, to seek the truth. I am pleased to have with us today the task force chair, former Supreme Court justice, Chancellor and Superior Court judge, William Quillen.

In the coming months, I will announce additional initiatives designed to encourage and require industrial facilities about the environmental protection in Delaware. I look forward to sharing and working with you in the weeks ahead.

Livable Delaware/water supply/energy

The Minner-Carney administration's Livable Delaware plan for curbing sprawl and managing growth has changed the way the state and local governments approach development.

Because state taxpayers pay for the roads, the schools and the other services demanded by development, we have asked our counties and towns to plan where they build and build only where they plan.

About two-thirds of the state's municipalities and all three counties are in the process of reconsidering or adopting a growth plan. The results, over time, will be more responsible and thoughtful growth.

Often, when plans for development are proceeding through the local process, our state government finds elements of those plans problematic, from the local roads to the things that happen with environmental impacts. Often these issues arrive very late in the process, inconveniencing local officials, concerned citizens and the developers.

This year, I will propose legislation, legislative change to the Land Use Planning Act to create a pre-application step to protect those projects and to do it to projects of a certain size. This proposal would bring together the developer, local governments, state agencies before the project is submitted for approval. It would eliminate many of the last-minute objections and changes that take place now and, with the consultation of state agencies earlier, may result in projects that are more suitable for the affected community.

The issues of development in northern New Castle County cannot be addressed without Talking about the issue of water supply.

During the 2002 drought, Delaware was the last state in the region to impose mandatory restrictions and the first state to lift those restrictions.

That is not because we were inattentive, its but because of the interconnections among water providers that allow the sharing of supplies, the suppliers' ability to manage the flow and yes, DNREC's oversight. I commend the public-private partnership that went into the management of this year's drought, the most serious water shortage in our state in a century.

But the growth of the state's population means significant action is necessary to ensure that water is available to every Delaware citizen and business, even during a drought. I propose today that we embark on an effort to make certain that northern Delaware achieves water self-sufficiency by the year 2010.

We have already begun the progress toward that goal.

The Public Service Commission is reviewing last year's drought to identify future solutions. And the state, municipal water suppliers and private water companies are working together to identify the steps that will provide adequate water for everyone.

Whether we are at the end of a period of strange and turbulent weather or whether it will continue, I cannot predict. In Delaware, of course, weather is the responsibility of our Lieutenant Governor.

But in the past year, we've seen a mild winter, a dry spring, a summer drought, a fall too wet for some and a restoration of needed water supplies for others. We are now experiencing a normal winter but one that strains household budgets for heat and for transportation.

That's why next year, I hope to have before you the first-ever comprehensive energy plan: one that will make us more self-sufficient in a world that sees uncertainty, one that will nurture new Delaware companies that are part of the fast-growing and moving technology, changes yes many, and one that will provide incentives to homeowners and businesses to take part in the energy transition to renewable products.

As we strive to keep the challenges of the present from becoming the crises of the future, energy in our state is one we must address. And we must work together to address it.

#### Homeland security

At this time last year, I told you that much of my legislative agenda for 2002 would focus on protecting our state from the threat of terrorism. Working together, you and I have accomplished most of that agenda.

We passed several pieces of legislation, the most important being the Delaware Emergency Health Powers Act.

Now our food processors, pharmacists, veterinarians and medical community are all part of a massive early-alert network that will allow us to detect bioterrorism in the critical early hours. Now we have a set of rules and procedures that will help us react swiftly and effectively if a bioterrorist act does occur.

We have some of the most sweeping medical privacy rules in the country, so Delawareans can be assured that their medical privacy will not be compromised in the event of a bioterrorism or chemical attack.

Taken together, we have the most comprehensive and effective anti-bioterrorism system in the country, and I thank the General Assembly for its help in dealing with this complicated but important issue.

My work on homeland security will continue this year. I will work with my homeland security adviser Phil Cabaud to secure from the federal government the necessary resources to improve our public health alert and first responder systems.

I cannot talk about homeland security without recognizing the 245 men and women of Delaware's National Guard currently deployed on active duty, many as our country's war on terrorism. Another 137 are expected to go by the end of the month. We also, have reservists who are activated and serving. I know you join me in offering

sincere appreciation for their courageous service, as well as our prayers and best wishes for their safe return.

Health and safety/cancer

One of our government's most sacred duties is to protect the health and safety of its citizens. And we are doing that in Delaware.

In the area of public safety, we have supported our emergency responders by fixing the troubled 800-megahertz system it's the backbone of the communication for firefighters, for police officers, for EMS workers.

Lt. Gov. Carney has distributed 20,000 free cable gun locks, hoping they will keep those guns from becoming a part of the tragic accident we hear about and shudder.

Last year, you joined me in strengthening the penalties for individuals who repeatedly drink and drive. But there is more to be done. I ask, once again, that the General Assembly consider the legal blood alcohol level while driving to .08 and to ban open containers of alcohol from passenger compartments of cars and trucks.

We know these measures will save life, prevent injury, prevent the loss of about \$1.6 million of federal highway funding.

I have spoken to you and the people of Delaware often about my desire and commitment to reduce the high rate of cancer and mortality of the State of Delaware.

Last year, the Delaware Advisory Council on Cancer Incidence and Mortality produced what I consider a landmark report on cancer in our state. It contains specific recommendations that doctors, cancer survivors and family members of cancer victims tell us will lower Delaware's cancer rates, a personal priority of mine.

My budget proposal will include a plan to spend \$5 million of the tobacco settlement money to fund the first-year recommendations of the cancer council. These funds will be used to begin early screening for colorectal cancer, to pay for cancer treatment for those without insurance and to begin to investigate environmental causes of cancer and to reduce tobacco use in Delaware.

I'd like to recognize and have all of us thank the Delawarean who led the council and provided a road map for our efforts to fight cancer. His commitment to his son, who was diagnosed with leukemia but is now in remission, has turned into a commitment to every Delawareans with cancer. Please welcome Mr. Bill Bowser.

I brought along with me today and I want to read to you a letter about the Clean Indoor Air Act, because that was one of their recommendations, let me read a part of this letter to you. A letter from a 10-year old, Kimberly Eagle: "I appreciate it, because she is very honest in what she says, let me tell you what she said, I appreciate it very much because when I was 6 years old I was diagnosed with cancer. And I am very happy that you put the smoking ban up because when I went into a restaurant I had to walk past a bar to go to my table and it hurt my lungs very much." Kimberly is with us today, welcome to the Delaware State Senate.

Ladies and Gentlemen, the message from Kimberly and from I: Be proud of what you did for the people of Delaware and for the generations yet to come.

Yes, there are detractors, there's also the quiet majority grateful for clean air and the opportunity to now dine or socialize where they choose.

For the same reason that we should not borrow from future generations to solve this year's budget problem, we should not sacrifice the health of those who work or who will be born here to the crisis of last year's bold steps. Delaware is one of the first states to

care so deeply for its citizens instead of being one of the last and that's to our credit, and I want to keep it that way.

#### Character education

In our schools, we are seeing the results of the standards and accountability program that our state committed to almost a decade ago. In the last two years, we have seen improvement in reading and math scores in all the key grades in our accountability system.

This, to me, shows the wisdom of setting high standards, of deciding together how to help our children meet those standards, and in remaining committed to the means that will lead us to our desired end – a truly world-class school system and we will remain true to this commitment.

As we develop our children's ability and intellect, we should also seek to develop in them virtues that are good for them and for society.

To do this, I have directed the Secretary of Education to research and identify character education programs that could be added to the school districts at little or no cost to them. This curriculum addition would be completely voluntary, but I believe those schools who adopt it will be producing better students and better citizens.

#### Campaign finance reform

For the elected officials here, each of us arrived through the democratic process, a system of representation that began in our state over 200 years ago. And I believe we have the responsibility to maintain or improve that process.

In keeping with that responsibility, I believe it's time that we address the issue of campaign finance reform in particular the newest kind of attack paid for by "independent expenditures."

I am talking about the vicious campaign attacks on—Democrats and Republicans—by organizations with mysterious sounding names that no ones ever heard of until campaign season.

These independent expenditures allow such groups to evade our campaign contribution laws and limits, buy the outcome of elections, and worst yet, the negative ads they pay for sours our citizens on the system.

We can't stop these ads—the First Amendment protects them. But I believe we can do two important things. First, we can strengthen our laws to make sure these ads are really independent, and not simply efforts by a political candidate to circumvent our campaign finance laws.

Second, we can make a better effort to require the people who pay for these ads to reveal who they really are, rather than letting them hide behind fictitious names and bogus groups.

So, in the coming months, I will submit for your consideration campaign finance reform to address these problems and I ask you to consider it carefully. Did you know Delaware has struggled over the last few years as the economy has softened, but there have been a few bright spots.

Two weeks ago Palmetto Management and Engineering announced it would bring 350 high-wage jobs to Wilmington. Last week, Bank One agreed to locate two state of the art data centers in Delaware one in Bear the other in Wilmington – and create another 100 jobs. That means a total of 2,600 jobs have been created in Delaware since January 01.

Also last week, I was proud to announce that M&T Bank will keep the Allfirst facility in

Millsboro open, a facility many thought sure to close when Allfirst's announced their merger with M&T. In fact, M&T may expand in Millsboro in the future, bringing even more employment opportunities to our state.

These announcements show that Delaware continues to be a desirable place to do business.

Last year, the Strategic Economic Council, led by DuPont senior vice president Stacey Mobley, recommended a number of steps for making Delaware's economy even stronger. Among the recommendations was one that Delaware create special procedures in its already well-respected Chancery Court to hear disputes in the area of technology-related commerce.

According to the Council, "in the coming decades, we cannot maintain expertise in law—whether in intellectual property, privacy, patent and trademark, or the UCC—without expertise in the increasingly complex technologies developments involved."

To maintain Delaware's preeminence in the area of business law and preserve the sizeable economic impact that business law has on our state, I will submit legislation creating new "technology court" procedures for your consideration.

I will also reconvene the Council throughout the year to continue to identify opportunities and policies that will keep Delaware first in job retention and creation.

#### Budget preview

Finally, you have agreed to allow me to return next week and detail my proposal for the Fiscal Year 2004 budget. So I will not dwell much on it today.

What I will say is this: The task be for you and I, it will be daunting. In enacting a balanced budget it will be daunting. When I began work on the budget proposal, the gap between projected revenues and expenditures for FY04 stood at about \$300 million – more than 10 percent of our budget.

The gap existed because the current projected revenues will be less than state government's level of spending this year. Add to that a largely unavoidable increase in the budget from the mandated costs we see them every year: increases in Medicaid, increases in health care and prescription costs, increases in costs of schools because we have more a growing student population, and increases in costs of our growing prisons system.

Further complicating the budget picture is the fact that revenues for FY05 are currently also forecasted to be lower than this year's budget and economists are not forecasting a quick recovery – in fact many are forecasting a "double-dip" recession instead.

In short, there is a structural problem in our state budget: the fact that revenue forecasts for the next two years are well below the current level of spending.

The only responsible ways to align revenues and expenditures are to cut the budget in ways that are sustainable or raise sustainable revenue. Temporary or one-time revenue sources will not solve the fundamental and structural budget problem our state.

As you know, my philosophy during these past two years has been to avoid quick fixes that sacrifice long-term fiscal health.

Since I took office, we have saved almost \$200 million with budget cuts. In fact, these budget cuts began on my second day in office. The 2004 budget I will propose next week will include even more budgets.

One such cut has already been announced – the closing of the Gov. Bacon Health Center in Delaware City. The state has been operating three nursing homes when it really only needs two, creating a opportunity to save \$2.5 million without diminishing services to the

patients or to the employees who work there. The level of care these patients receive will not change, as they and the employees who have served them so well in the past will be moved to one of our two other health care facilities.

When I release my budget proposal and as we discuss it between now and June 30, I urge those of you who have been here before and those of you who weren't to look back at the way our state has faced the challenges in the past.

I know how difficult the next few months will be. Many of us in this chamber today were here in the 70s and in the early 90s, the last two times our state faced a fiscal crisis especially a crisis of this size.

We know that the only way to solve the problem is together – legislative and executive, Democrats and Republicans, senators and representatives – the Delaware way.

#### Conclusion

As I said when I began, this is a time of challenge but a time of opportunity. This is a time to focus on the future. This is a time to face the realities of our situation and to work together to find responsible solutions.

Newsman Edward R. Murrow once said, "Difficulty is the excuse history never accepts." We face difficult decisions over the next several months. Let us work together to prove ourselves and our mettle to history.

The Governor addressed the assembly as follows:

#### State of Delaware Office of the Governor Budget Address of Governor Ruth Ann Minner January 30, 2003

Good afternoon everyone. What a pleasure to be here. I always enjoy coming back to the House and the Senate, so I thank you for the invitation to be with you today. Lieutenant Governor Carney, President Pro Tem Adams, Acting Speaker Oberle, to the members of the 142<sup>nd</sup> General Assembly, other elected officials, and the college Presidents, the University President, members of the Delaware judiciary, members of my Cabinet, distinguished guests, my son and my fellow Delawareans...

We gather today in uncertain times, gripped in a national economic recession and with the threat of war looming. The outlook for our country's economy and thus for our state's finances is unclear. But we are charged, you and I, with the stewardship of our state, and so I am here to present my long-term plan to steer Delaware through the uncertainty, toward a fiscal stability and economic prosperity.

A national economy has slumped and Delaware is weathering the storm much better then most states. As I said last week, Delaware is one of the only states that has survived the last two years without raising taxes, drastically slashing services, laying off employees or raiding the emergency reserve funds. We have not had to do what over states have had to do because we chosen the sensible path and I thank you for that.

The effects of the national economic slowdown took hold on my second day in office, and I was told that I had a \$35 million shortfall, I immediately ordered a series of cuts to bring our budget into balance. When revenue projections continued to drop and costs continued to rise, we continued to cut and to save – four more rounds of budget cuts, a total of almost \$200 million.

In the most recent round of cuts, our plan to fill a \$95 million hole included a freeze on state hiring, a three percent across-the-board cut to all agencies, reengineering and retooling existing programs, and a review of the state purchases.

These aggressive steps early in the fiscal year along with one-time funds from the state's largest ever property settlement have closed the gap for Fiscal Year 03, assuming that is, revenues don't go down again. Now, the challenge is to construct a balanced budget for Fiscal Year 2004.

And it is no small challenge. The gap between projected revenues and expenditures on

the Fiscal Year 2004 budget I am proposing to you today was \$300 million when I started to work on it. Let me explain first the factors that have contributed to a structural problem in our state budget.

The revenues projected by DEFAC for the next two years – 2004 and 2005 – are considerably lower than what we are spending today, in Fiscal 2003. In fact, according to DEFAC's estimates, it will be Fiscal 2006 before our revenues again match our current year spending.

On top of the drop in revenue, there are the constantly increasing taxes Medicaid, health care, state pensions, state prisons, debt service, schools and then continue.

It is time to solve the structural problem that exists in our budget and put Delaware on a firm financial footing. Without significant change, this problem will exist for years to come.

We won't meet the challenge with one-time measures and financial gimmicks. In the last few years, other states have relied on one-time expenses, one-time ways of balance their budgets, like appropriating the 98 percent or raiding their emergency funds.

Other states were betting the economy would bounce right back, and as we all know, it didn't. As a result, we read in the paper what those states are now being forced to do: release prison inmates; close schools one day a week; eliminate state police officers; layoff large numbers of state employees; close parks; close museums; close Division of Motor Vehicles lanes; or use one time tobacco money for ongoing non-health care costs.

None of us can predict the future, each and every one of us is responsible to prepare for it. If we were to raid our rainy day fund or appropriate all of our revenue, what would we do if, we did have a further turn down or as most forecasters say, we would have a real second economy dip?

What if we have a hurricane strike, or terrorist attack, or some other unanticipated emergency? Who among us wants to resort to what the other states did because they failed their citizens in making the tough choices?

No, our goal should be to fix the structural problem that exists in the state's budget and fix it for the long-term. That means putting our revenues and expenditures back into alignment.

We will do what every Delaware family would do if faced with the same problem. Suppose the family had an income paycheck \$1,700 with their bills, their payments, their expenses were \$2,000.

They could raid their savings account trying the difference for one month. But what if they have an emergency, like fixing their family car or some home repair, or someone got sick or needed a root canal? And what about the next month and month after that?

No, responsible Delawareans would say cut back on spending, or find a way to make more money. Or both.

And my proposal will be to do both. While I believe that we have cut costs and made Government more efficient, I also believe that there are certain obligations government has and certain services the state provides that should not be eliminated. We cannot solve a \$300 million problem through tax cuts without affecting children, the elderly, the poor, public safety and our state's competitiveness.

Therefore I propose today a Fiscal Year 2004 budget of \$2.432 billion, an increase of only 1.69 percent over Fiscal 03 while meeting mandated increases. This proposal includes a balanced approach. Of the \$300 million gap between revenues and

expenditures for Fiscal 04, I propose that more than half be made up by cutting costs and a little less than half from raising revenue.

Delaware has a strong tradition of working together to solve the state's problems. And I am deeply grateful for the positive working relationship between my administration and the 62 members of the General Assembly.

We've worked together to solve Delaware's problems and I stand before you today, renewing my commitment to solve the challenge that will have implications for many years to come.

I propose to make up about \$155 million of the \$300 million gap by eliminating and reducing sustainable cuts made in Fiscal 03 budget and carry them over into 2004, for a savings of \$15 million. While some of these cuts have been painful, they must be done. All agencies and branches of government have been affected—including department of education, health and social services, the judiciary, higher education, the legislature and the executive department.

But solving our problem, we need to make even more cuts to our base budget. Including my budget proposal is difficult but fiscally responsible to help close the problem. And I propose to close the Governor Bacon Health Center.

The fact is that the state is currently running three long-term health care facilities. Residents will fit into two, we still have room for expansion. We can operate two hospitals much more efficiently than three, and save almost \$2.5 million while maintaining the same quality service for the clients at those two facilities.

Because so much of state government spending is tied to personnel at the state level, I believe more must be done to reduce the size of state government. It is important not just to freeze jobs or freeze the growth of state government, but to take a hard look at what we are doing and eliminate positions where we can.

As a result, I am recommending that we reduce the number of state positions between now and June 30<sup>th</sup> by more than 3 percent. That means 400 positions and more than \$6 million in savings.

I am not proposing layoffs. Layoffs are not effective because a laid-off employee and their family would only need more support from the state whether through unemployment benefits, some cases Medicaid, food stamps, welfare or other services. We also lose that productive member of our workforce and the resulting taxes that they would pay.

My proposal is to reduce the size of state government by analyzing each position that currently vacant ones, and finding the ones that we can live without and eliminating them permanently. This reduces the size of state government and saves taxpayer funds without laying off existing workers or eliminating essential services.

Finally in reducing the base budget, I am forced to ask school districts to take about a I percent cut in the amount of funding that they receive from the state. I will again urge them to find ways to cut without affecting our children and their classrooms, but focusing instead on administrative costs and discretionary funds that are in every district and every schools

Despite the fact that funding to schools makes up one third of our operating budget, we have not to this point had to cut in this area. But at this point, it is necessary and I thank all the schools districts, the administrators of the schools for helping us with this.

Reengineer Existing Programs

Just as important as reducing costs is ensuring that essential programs run efficiently and as efficiently as possible. Reengineering government and improving the way we do business is one of the most important things in this administration.

Many of these ideas come from our state employees and I must thank them again for their diligence and dedication to serving Delaware. Change is difficult, but government must change in order to meet the challenge that we face.

To make sure Delaware is prepared for any threat conflict, natural or man-made, I have re-tooled existing resources and today propose the creation of the Department of Safety and Homeland Security.

This new department would consolidate the Delaware State Police, the Delaware Emergency Management Agency, Capitol Police, Office of Highway Safety, the EMS Office and emergency communications staff and allow them to concentrate on preventing and responding to any possible threat.

With all of the key emergency and security personnel in the state under the direction of Secretary Ford, homeland security operations will be seamless. Statewide strategies and planning will continue to be developed by Secretary Ford in conjunction with Homeland Security Officer Phil Cabaud and the Adjutant General Frank Vavala, bringing together the all the best expertise in our state for these critical programs and preparations.

To allow the Department of Safety and Homeland Security to focus on its core mission, I propose integrating the Division of Motor Vehicles into the Department of Transportation.

This reorganization will align the various departments in state government responsible for collecting the revenue for the transportation trust fund in one agency and will ensure that all clean air initiatives, particularly for vehicle emissions, operate smoothly in the years ahead.

Protecting over \$100 million in federal funds that comes into Delaware is an ongoing struggle under the clean air requirements and this change will assist in those efforts. This move will also produce a cost savings to the General Fund of \$9.7 million.

I am proposing today that the state replace the decrepit Sussex County Motor Vehicle lanes and that building. This long overdue project is the only new capital project that I'll propose in this budget.

Other changes included in the budget proposal and additional ideas for streamlining government, including and moving the Insurance Coverage Office to State Budget, Natural Resources and Environmental Control, to the Boiler Safety unit, to the Natural Resources and Environmental Control and there are some others.

With each of these changes, we gain efficiencies in both operations and in costs while maintaining the same quality services to the people we serve.

#### **Driving Down Mandated Costs**

As we look to the cost of doing business in Fiscal Year 2004, items such as health care, Pension, debt service loom large. Nationally, we have seen double digit increases in the area of health care with no end in sight. Other states have chosen the path of across-the-board elimination of benefits. My approach is different – one that preserves essential health care services for the most needy Delawareans at the lowest possible cost.

Over the past two years, the state has worked to harness its health care purchasing power with tremendous success. We have bid all our health care plans together, negotiated lower pharmacies rates, eliminated unnecessary reserves and joined a multi-state coalition to purchase our prescription drugs at cheaper rates.

For Fiscal 04, my proposal recommends we continue to drive down health care costs through consolidation, purchasing savvy and tough negotiations. I propose that we do everything we can to squeeze profits before we begin to eliminate people from our health care system.

New Initiatives

In addition to the construction of a new DMV facility in Sussex County and new funding for fighting cancer which I discussed last week, I would like to highlight just a few other initiatives in the budget proposal.

We have worked very hard and very successfully over the last decade to preserve farmland. This ensures not only that we maintain some of the look and feel of Delaware, but that we maintain our agriculture industry, which has been the cornerstone of our local economy, for so long.

But farmland isn't any good if we don't have farmers to work it. And the last few years haven't been kind to farmers, with many of them on the brink of going out of business.

As recommended in last year's Strategic Economic Council Report, I have proposed an initiative, costing \$600,000, to help Delaware farmers pay the cost of crop insurance. Preserving farmers and farmland.

Even in the toughest of times, I want to maintain our commitment to protecting children, especially those who are trapped in the dark and lonely shadows of abuse. That's why I am proposing a \$390,000 increase in the rates for foster care, an increase that will allow 100 families to care for the most distressed and difficult foster children in our state.

By reallocating cost in Health and Social Services, we will be able to place 54 more disabled citizens into community settings including 24 from our Stockley Center.

I have included these new initiatives because, while they are relatively small sums of money, they make a huge difference in the lives of some of our Delawareans.

#### Raising revenue

The areas of expense reduction I've mentioned – eliminating programs and positions, reengineering government, driving down mandated costs. Make up just more than half of my to our \$300 million structural problem.

I do not believe we can make further substantial cuts now without affecting the core services of state government: public safety, education, health and welfare services. We can't go there. I also believe it would be irresponsible to use one-time quick fixes to balance the Fiscal 2004 budget.

I believe at this time that the responsible response to the remainder of the challenge is a increase in our state's revenue base.

During the flush times, we responded by returning excess funds to Delawareans in the form of aggressive tax cuts. The personal income tax, for example, has been cut nine times since 1980, an appropriate response by state government we returned the unneeded revenues to the taxpayers.

What we sometimes forget though that we also seen increase in revenues periodically as well, usually when we faced a weak national economy. Tax increases were enacted in 1977, 1984, 1991 and they are needed again now.

What I propose to the General Assembly is a revenue package that will increase revenue by \$145 million in Fiscal 2004, slightly less than the \$300 million structural problem of the package I am proposing is a balanced one.

I have studied our options and I'm submitting moderate increases in the areas that

will cause the least pain to our citizens and our businesses.

No one especially this Governor, wants to stand before you and call for tax increases. But leadership sometimes demand that we take on the tough issue now to prevent more severe problems in the future.

Let me describe the major elements of the revenue package.

#### Corporate taxes and fees

I propose today an increase of \$89 million in the taxes and fees paid by corporations and other entities for the privilege of making Delaware their corporate home.

Historically, Delaware has enacted increases in corporation revenues about once a decade, reflecting inflation and the increasing cost of doing business. In 1984, Governor du Pont signed legislation with a 31 percent increase. In 1991, Governor Castle approved an increase of 43 percent. The increase I seek today is about 17 percent.

550,000 corporations and other entities make Delaware their legal home, and for good reason. We provide a sound legal structure, a superb court dedicated primarily to their needs, and excellent service through the Division of Corporation and a quick responses from the members of the General Assembly and the Executive Branch.

We've consulted with some key leaders of the business community and are comfortable that these proposed increases are equitable and will not deter firms from continuing to make Delaware their corporate home. In the weeks ahead, we'll consult with the Corporation Law Council and the Delaware State Bar Association, which carefully reviews any proposed changes to our incorporation laws.

As I said, firms make Delaware their corporate home because of the many advantages that Delaware offers them. At a time when we're asking them to pay more to incorporate here, it's especially important that we review the services we offer and make sure we're doing everything we can to retain their business. I pledge to do that.

#### Cigarette tax

The next revenue I propose is an increase in the cigarette tax.

Since 1991, Delaware's tax has been 24 cents a pack. This tax rate is far below our neighboring states, all of which collect \$1 some of them more. I am proposing an increase of 26 cents, which will make our new tax rate 50 cents per pack. This increase will bring \$23.5 million in Fiscal 2004, but will still leave our tax rate much, much lower than our neighboring states.

Besides bringing in more revenue, an increase of this size should also bring about some reduction in smoking, especially among our young people. I sincerely hope that it will.

#### Decoupling

The third major component of my package is to partially cut our ties to the federal tax system, also known as "decoupling." This proposal will return \$14 million of revenue in Fiscal 2004, and could prevent the loss of even more in the future.

Because of the way we piggyback our state tax system on the federal tax system, a tax cut by the federal government often results in a drop in our state revenues. The two major tax bills already passed during the Bush administration will result in an estimated \$36 million reduction in our revenues for 2004. The dividend tax exemption proposed earlier this month by the President could cost us millions on top of that.

The federal government can run a deficit, our state constitution wisely dictates that we can't. Like most governors, I had hoped that the President would include some relief for the states in his stimulus package, but he didn't.

We cannot afford to remain so tightly linked with a federal tax system that causes our state such huge losses of revenue, all without a vote of the General Assembly.

Decoupling from the federal elimination of the estate tax will bring \$14 million in additional revenue in fiscal 2004. The estate tax is paid by a very small number of Delawareans, about 300 a year. Only estates of \$1 million or more pay any estate tax at all, and that amount will grow to \$2 million in 2006. I propose setting Delaware's estate tax at the level before the 2001 federal change, making Delaware one of the states that would not be tied to the federal estate tax.

If the President's dividend exemption is passed, I plan to submit legislation to decouple Delaware from that change as well, preventing another unbearable revenue loss. Video lottery

The final major piece of my revenue package is additional revenue from the video lottery industry.

I am proposing that we increase the state's take by \$16 million, or about 8 percent. Even with the effects of the Clean Indoor Air Act, the casinos remain a large and vibrant industry that can contribute more to the general fund during these difficult times for our state.

I believe that there are opportunities to increase revenue by strengthening the video lottery business, better preparing the industry to face the inevitable competition from Maryland and Pennsylvania.

I propose that we expand the hours when the tracks may operate and allow them additional video lottery machines to handle times of peak business. I propose the state take a larger share of the increased revenues that will result.

I also plan to submit legislation in March to permit a number of new marketing tools that will help the tracks become more competitive. I do not favor adding more casinos in our state, but I do feel that it's appropriate to take steps that will strengthen our existing industry.

So the main elements of my revenue plan are: an increase in taxes and fees from the corporations; an increase in the cigarette tax; a partial decoupling from the federal tax system; and increased revenue from the video lottery industry. All together, this plan will bring Delaware an additional \$145 million above the current revenue estimate for Fiscal 2004. It is balanced, it is responsible, and it prepares us for the future.

#### Conclusion

As has happened the past two years, there is the possibility the revenue forecast for the next fiscal year might improve between now and June 30. If it does improve, we must first look at what kind of revenue it is.

If we see one-time revenues increase, we must not use those short-term improvements to avoid consideration of these long-term revenue solutions. Instead we should look to use any one-time revenue increases for one-time capital projects, such as the Sussex County DMV facility or a biotechnology center in Dover.

The proposal I have presented today for eliminating the \$300 million structural problem in the Fiscal Year 2004 budget is a balanced one, with a little more than half of the problem solved through cuts and a little less than half solved with new revenue.

The revenue package is balanced, with no one group of taxpayers shouldering the brunt of the increase.

The proposal I have presented today seeks to make government more efficient and effective while preserving the essential services of state government.

The proposal I have presented is responsible, because it does not use one-time quick

fixes to balance the budget today in a way that could cause a serious, serious crisis tomorrow.

The proposal I present to you today is in keeping with our state's tradition over the last 25 years of making responsible decisions that are focused on the future, even if they may be unpopular with some in the present.

As I said last week, many of us here have experienced these times of challenge before. We know we must set aside partisanship and work together. We must continue the tone of cooperation and mutual respect that has led this state from fiscal crisis to financial stability over the past quarter-century. We must continue to solve this challenge in the Delaware way.

In addressing our structural budget problem, we have a choice between the sustainable and the temporary, between the responsible and the shortsighted. I look forward to working with you to choose the right course for the people of Delaware.
