DELAWARE OVER- WHELMS STEVENS IN TRACK

Pitman and McKelvie High
Scorers

The University of Delaware track team defeated the Stevens Institute of Technology, in the opening meet on Frazer Field, by a score of 76-48. Delaware kept the lead in points during the entire meet although the score was fairly even for the first three-quarters of the contest. Delaware made her high score chiefly by hard fighting and not so much by superior skill.

The highest individual scorers for Delaware were Pitman and McKelvie holding 15 points each and Ralph France holding 13 points. Captain Pitman brought in three firsts, 100-yd., 220-yd., and 440-yd. dashes, while McKelvie took first places in discus throw, the javelin and shotput. France won first honors in the 120-yd. high hurdles and the 220-yd. low hurdles. The other firsts for Delaware were made by "Pat" Hoey, Baxter and Prettyman.

The biggest even of the meet was the half-mile run. McKelvie set the pace for three-quarters of the race but slackened on the last turn. Lynch who was just back of McKelvie made a sudden sprint on the home stretch and was easily winning the race when he fell about ten yards from the tape and was unable to

R. O. T. C. INSPECTION SET FOR MAY 25th

Sham Battle To Be Feature
Event

On, or about May 25, the War Department Inspection Board for Distinguished Colleges will visit the University to determine whether or not the University of Delaware R. O. T. C. Unit shall be on the list of distinguished colleges.

One whole day will be devoted to military work out-of-doors. The feature even will be a demonstration of a war-strength company, with the attached machine guns and howitzer weapons. The battalion will be used to represent the war-strength company, and an effort will be made to make the demonstration as realistic as possible. Several thousand rounds of blank ammunition will be fired and signal rockets will be employed. There will also be a battalion review and inspection, followed by close and extended order drills by the company, the platoon, the section, and the squad. Various groups will demonstrate work in Field Engineering, the use and operation of machine guns and 37 millimeter guns. Other groups will present exercises in calisthenics, and the use of bayonets and hand grenades. Besides the demonstration of the use of the use of weapons, there will be other problems, such as map sketching and reading. The inspectors may also require a demonstration of guard mounting.

During their visit, the members of the Board will visit the various classrooms, and will inspect the military office, where the military records will be inspected. The rifle range, the guns, and other property of the military department will also be inspected.

Delaware to Meet St. John's Saturday

This Saturday will present the baseball nine from the third oldest college in America. St. John's has not met with any more success at ball than has Delaware this season. The team carries three pitchers of note, Standiford, Bock and Gray, but all advance information tells us that the Cadets are weak in fielding material. In their game against Williams and Mary last Saturday St. John's got seven hits to Williams and Mary's nine. There are several good pluggers on the team notably Lenger, rf., Merrick, lf., Bounds, c., and Matthews, 2b. A comedy of errors lost the game for the Cadets by a score of 18-2. With three good pitchers, however, St. John's, with the fielders knuckled down to business, should give Delaware a tussle for Saturday's game.

There is no sign of change in the Delaware line-up, nor is it determined as yet just who will start the tossing.

DEAN SMITH ADDRESSES ENGINEERING STUDENTS

Meeting Arranged for May
Tenth

A meeting of the A. A. E. was held last Thursday evening in the Lounge of Old College. Dean Smith, of the Engineering Department, was the speaker. He gave a very interesting illustrated lecture on "Iron." All phases of the iron industry in America were treated, — how and where iron is mined, how the ore is transported to the furnaces, the various methods by which it is made into pig-iron, how the different grades of iron are produced, and how steel is made.

The annual election of officers was scheduled for this meeting, but, due to the absence of a quorum, this had to be postponed until the next meeting.

For May 10, the president has arranged to have Mr. Clement E. Chase, principal assistant engineer of the Delaware River Bridge Joint Commission, give a talk on the construction of the new bridge across the Delaware. However, unless a fairly large number of students will pledge themselves to be present, it will be necessary to cancel the lecture. President Yost does not feel that he can ask Mr. Chase to spend so much of his time for the benefit of a mere handful of students.

W. C. D. to Give Movie At Newark Opera House

The W. C. D. Rifle Club will give a benefit moving picture at the Newark Opera House on Friday, April 27th. The ladies have succeeded in getting a special film called "Pride of the Palmar," which, from all accounts, is full of gripping intrigue, romance and passion. There will be two shows, the first starting at 7.15 and the second starting at 9.00, and the admission will be seventeen cents.

The Delaware sluggers opened up in a game with Philadelphia Dental College last Wednesday, and turned in a 10 to 2 victory over the dentists. A drizzle of rain made the game rather slow and it became so dark that the game was called in the seventh inning.

P. D. C. started Jensen, their star twirler, who did fairly good work until the seventh when Delaware hit him freely. Delaware had scored in the early innings, however, so that they were always in the lead.

Brandt started to pitch for Delaware, but owing to a sore arm, he only lasted one inning. Brandt got away lucky in this inning when, although the visi-

tors got three hits, not a run was scored. Gallaher, the first man up, singled but fell for the old hidden ball trick and was tagged out a yard from the base by MacDonald. Levan fanned, but Chapman singled. Brailove beat out a hit to short, but Chapman overran second and was caught off the bag on a quick throw of MacDonald to Underwood.

Delaware made a good start, scoring one run in the first inning on Hoch's walk, a steal and an error. in the fifth. Delaware pounded the ball hard in the seventh and scored five runs on hard hits and several bunts.

Magaw pitched the last six innings for Delaware and allowed only two hits. He was wild, however, and passed seven men.

Two passes, an out and Hunt's wild throw gave the visitors their only runs in the fourth. The fielding features of the game were catches by Mannix in centerfield.

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VOLTA EXPLAINING HIS

BATTERY TO NAPOLEON

How Electrical Engineering began

IT IS not enough to experiment and to observe in scientific research. There must also be interpretation. Take the cases of Galvani and Volta.

One day in 1786 Galvani touched with his metal instruments the nerves of a frog's amputated hind legs. The legs twitched in a very life-like way. Even when the frog's legs were hung from an iron railing by copper hooks, the phenomenon persisted. Galvani knew that he was dealing with electricity but concluded that the frog's legs had in some way generated the current.

Then came Volta, a contemporary, who said in effect: "Your interpretation is wrong. Two different metals in contact with a moist nerve set up currents of electricity. I will prove it without the aid of frog's legs."

Volta piled disks of different metals one on top of another and

separated the disks with moist pieces of cloth. Thus he generated a steady current. This was the "Voltaic pile"—the first battery, the first generator of electricity.

Both Galvani and Volta were careful experimenters, but Volta's correct interpretation of effects gave us electrical engineering.

Napoleon was the outstanding figure in the days of Galvani and Volta. He too possessed an active interest in science but only as an aid to Napoleon. He little imagined on examining Volta's crude battery that its effect on later civilization would be fully as profound as that of his own dynamic personality.

The effects of the work of Galvani and Volta may be traced through a hundred years of electrical development even to the latest discoveries made in the Research Laboratories of the General Electric Company.
