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
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












Football

It was an exciting year for the Blue Hens' Football Team. Under the direction of Coach Tubby Raymond, the Hens qualified for the NCAA 1-AA Championship Tournament. The Hens opened the season to Atlantic 10 competitor New Hampshire and a victory. The only loss the Hens received in regular season was against rival Villanova. In a fierce and competitive game, the Hens were unable to hold on and lost to the Wildcats by ten points. After the Villanova game the Hens never looked back and the word defeat was no longer in the players' vocabulary. Sophomore Quarterback Brian Ginn led his team to 11 straight victories ending the season with a record of 12-2 overall, 7-1 in the Atlantic 10, and NCAA Semifinalists.

In the first round of the tournament the Blue Hens went up against Hofstra and easily defeated them 24-14. The second round brought Georgia Southern to Delaware, however, they didn't stay long. The Hens sent Georgia Southern home with 7-16 loss. This victory sent the Hens to the semi-finals where they faced McNeese State. In a game that came down to the final seconds, the Hens said goodbye to the dreams of a NCAA I-AA Championship. Even though the Hens didn't make the Championship game, they are champions to the University of Delaware fans.







For the men's cross country team, the 1997 season was filled with invitationals along the east coast. Up and down the east coast the Blue Hen's showed their determination and strength. Their season began at the Fordham Invitational where the team placed fourth with help from Jeremy Muratore, who was the top finisher for Delaware. The following week Delaware hosted it's own Invitational with competitors Navy and Delaware State participating. Being on their own home turf, the men looked towards the race with success. The men didn't disappoint by placing second, beating Delaware State with a score of 20-41. However, the men fell to hard competitor Navy 50-15. The men ended September with a fourth place finish at the Maryland Invitational.

isher for Delaware. DeGennaro placed 155th for the Blue Hens and gave the Blue Hens a 31st place finish. The men pushed the Paul Short Invitational behind them and came back to place third at the Delaware Invitational and eighth at the IC4A Championships. Dave Geesman had an extremely good run at the Delaware Invitational by winning the meet. The following week at the IC4A Championships Zach Chupa turned in a second place finish.

November brought the America East Championships for the men. With teammates Geesman and Chupa placing fourth and eighth at the meet, the Blue Hens came home with a third place finish. The last event for the men this season was at the NCAA District Il Championships where the men finished in eleventh place. The Women's Cross Country Team began their season at the Navy Invitational. Going up against competitors Navy, American, and George Washington, the women placed second. The women were able to outscore American and George Washington with help from Caron Marra. Marra was Delaware's top finisher in the meet placing eleventh. The next week the women participated in the Delaware Invitational. Again the women went up against tough competitor Navy along with Delaware State. Giving it their all, the women fell to Navy but beat out Delaware State. This meet gave the women their record for the season at 3-2.

In October a second Delaware In-

vitational took place. The women placed fourth at the meet. Marra placed sixth in the meet and fellow teammate and Kasia Brodka placed eighth. The last meet in October for the women was the ECAC Championships in New York. Brodka was Delaware's top finisher placing 22nd and was named All-ECAC.

November brought the end of the season for the women. The America East Championships and the NCAA District II Championships were the last meets the women participated in. The Blue Hens, who featured a team with no seniors, started out hot, winning six of their first seven games of the season with the only loss to national power North Carolina in the championship of the Temple Tournament.

The Blue Hens went on the road to defeat William & Mary, Richmond, Lehigh, Temple, and AMERICA EAST foes New Hampshire, and Maine.

The Blue Hens came home to face West Chester who defeated Delaware 3-1.

In the game before, Delaware was outmatched by No. 3 ranked University of Maryland who took an 8-1 victory. The losing streak went to three games with a loss to No. 7 Princeton, 5-3.

But the winning ways returned with a 4-0 home win over Ursinus.

And with a new turf field, the \$3.3 million Fred Rullo Stadium, being built on campus this summer, UD field hockey will be looking to make some noise nationally as well.





With their second place finish in the America East Conference last year, the women's soccer team was looking forward to an exciting and prosperous 1997 season. They began their season against UMBC which provided a victory for the women. Looking ahead to the competition, the women remained strong. September brought the women a series of wins and losses as they faced such teams as Temple and nationally ranked Penn State. The women participated at the Nike/ Tribe Invitational where they placed second defeating Old Dominion (3-1), but losing to ninth ranked William and Mary (1-5).

October brought the women to face their first competitors of the America East Conference. The Blue Hens easily defeated Maine and New Hampshire, but took a hard lose to conference companions and nationally ranked Hartford. The Blue Hens had a rocky start this season with the Jefferson Cup Tournament, losing three of four matches, even with Kristen Merrill receiving All-Tournament honors. When September came, so did the wins. At the Yale Tournament, the Hens won three of four matches placing second behind host team Yale. Paige Harrison earned All-Tournament honors at the match. The rest of September had a disappointing finish winning only two of five matches.

At the Delaware Invitational, the Hens made a fine showing winning the tournament without losing a single game. The hard work during the invitational paid off with Paige Harrison and Jennifer Wanner receiving All-Tournament honors and fellow teammate Joanna Dusza named Tournament MVP. The remainder of October looked promising for the Blue Hens in the America East with six

wins and only two losses to America East competitors.

By the time November came, the women were in full swing. They suffered only one America East loss in the beginning of the month. However, the Hens bounced back into action with six straight America East wins. The Blue Hens finished the season 11-3 and placed third in the match season. This year's Blue Hen Volleyball team was very talented led by Coach Barbara Viera. The ladies earned numerous honors throughout the season. Harrison received All-America East Second Team honors as well as America East Setter of the Week. Dusza received All-America East First Team honors and America East Player of the Week three times. 





he Blue Hens posted a 17-1 dual match record (6-0 AMERICA EAST) and extended their three-year winning streak to 42 straight matches before falling to Temple 5-4 in the final regular season match of the season.

The 42 straight victories, which dated back to the 1995 season, tied the University of Delaware all sports record for consecutive wins set by the women's swimming team in the early 1980's.

Individually, the Blue Hens posted a composite singles record of 103-19 and a doubles fries record of 51-7. The team won eight matches by a 9-0 score and one other by an 8-0 margin.

The singles charge was led by senior Rebecca Fearins who finished with a singles record of 19-4 and had a streak of 14 straight singles victories at one point.

The Hens were rarely challenged, winning five of their first eight matches by shutouts entering the Hofstra Tournament in early October where the Hens proceeded to down AMERICA EAST foes Hofstra, Vermont, Hartford, and New Hampshire to take the tour-

A victory over Georgetown Oct. 19 tied the UD all-sports record for consecutive wins with 42.

But the Hens fell just short of the record against a strong Temple team, falling at home to the Owis by a 5-4 score. It was the loss for the women since they fell to Bucknell September 23, 1995.

The Blue Hens came into the AMERICA EAST Tournament at Vermont looking to go over the top after three straight second place finishes to Boston University.

The title slipped away again but several strong showing were made. Fearins won the #1 singles championship, becoming the first non-Boston University player to win a conference title at the No. I spot.

It was a season of records for the Blue Hens. Wasniewski and Dencker set the UD record for doubles win a season (20), Fearins set the all-time UD record for doubles wins (56) and moved into second place on the singles wins list (68) behind her current coach, Laura Travis.



























he 1997-98 season was another successful one for the University of Delaware golf team.

Head coach Jim Kent's 13-man squad, which featured just three upperclassmen, started the fall season with a bang, winning the AMERICA EAST Championship at Newark's Deerfield CC by edging out Towson University 622-623.





Men's Outdoor Track & Field

he University of Delaware men's outdoor track and field team posted a competitive third place finish at the AMER-ICA EAST Outdoor Track and Field Championships this spring.

The Blue Hens did not win any individual titles at the meet, held May 9 at Northeastern's Solomon track, but posted several strong finishes.

The Blue Hens were strongest in the distance events and in the weight throws where several Delaware athletes enjoyed outstanding performances.

Robb Munro finished second in 3,000 meter steeplechase (9.24.13) and Dave Geesaman ran the 5,000 meters to a second place finish.

Mike Chadwick threw the hammer 164-4 to also finish second while Tom Marando and Matt Katsirmas came in second and third respectively in the shot put with Katsirmas also placing second in the discus.

Freshman Jamin Elliott placed

second in the triple jump.

Following the AMERICA EAST championships, the Blue Hens headed to the IC4A Championships at George Mason University. 
