Bailouts, failures, collapse. The market is down 700 points one day and up 300 points the next. It's an economic crisis, but will it impact both Wall Street and Main Street?

It's been a difficult few weeks for everyone as we've watched our entire economic foundation shaken to its core. There have been unprecedented failures and lots of finger pointing.

It's nuts.
So we all know that Wall Street is on shaky ground, but what about Main Street?

Well, there's Valania no question that
 foreclosures are up and 401(k)s are down. Tensions are high as people worry about what's happening on Wall Street.

But take a walk down our Main Street any afternoon or evening and you'll see that it doesn't appear that we're headed for boarded up vacant buildings any time soon.

For a long time, I've maintained that Newark is a special place. I'm not saying it's immune to national economic problems. I am saying, however, that it's better suited to withstand these types of problems than most other towns.

We've seen Chrysler announce that it will shut down of its plant in Newark next year. We've seen Avon say that it's shutting down its facility as well. We've seen the market battered and tattered in ways that haven't happened since the Great Depression.
There are dozens examples of towns throughout the country - especially in the Midwest - not being able to withstand such blows.

Yet, Newark keeps chugging along. There are new buildings and improvements happening up and down Main Street and, thankfully, Elkton Road as well.

Opinions mixed on new store's impact

The Home Depot on Elkton Road is now open for business, but not everyone is welcoming the national chain to Newark.
Manager Douglas Goto said the site has done well since opening Sept. 25.

When you talk to people, one of the first things out of their mouth is the convenience of the store, so obviously our location is important to our customer base," he said.
The Newark Home Depot joins the chain's stores on Churchmans Road in Christiana and at Peoples Plaza in Glasgow, but Goto said the new location is designed to cater to the large customer base residing in Newark.
"I don't know if you've ever driven from here to the Christiana [area], but it's a bit of an inconvenient drive for the folks," he said. "Newark has a large population base of more than 30,000 people, and I think it's good to be here."
Goto said the 145,000 -square-foot Newark location is larger than the Christiana and Glasgow stores, which allows it to offer more items, a bigger
selection of appliances and an expanded design center. It also houses a tool rental center, something the other nearby stores do not have.
The Home Depot project has been controversial since it was proposed more than two years ago. In January 2006, citing traffic concerns and fears the new store could change the character of the community, the city's planning commission unanimously recommended that City Council reject Home Depot's request to rezone the 13 -acre property to allow for the home improvement store.

At a contentious meeting in February 2007, council deadlocked on a revised version of the plan when Mayor Vance A. Funk III cast the tie-breaking vote in favor of the rezoning.
"It brings additional revenue to the city in terms of electric, water and sewer sales and it brings to the city the creation of over 100 new jobs," Funk said this week.

With the impending closing of the Chrysler plant, jobs are needed in Newark, he said.

The Newark Home Depot currently employs 135 people, 70 percent of whom were hired new from the area, Goto said.

Yet, Rocco Curro, owner of the Scott True Value hardware store on Elkton Road, said he has already seen his business
take a hit from the opening of the Home Depot.

Last year, Curro was out spoken against the Home Depot and launched a petition drive that he said collected almost 4,000 signatures.

Curro, who opened his store 16 years ago and employs 14 people, said he could be forced to close his business due to a drop in sales.

You're always optimistic that you can rebound, but I don't know if this town has given me enough reason to be optimistic," he said.

Goto, on the other hand said many of his customers tell him that they used to shop at other Home Depot locations, so by opening the new store, the company is helping to keep their money in the city.

Browsing the Newark Home Depot on a recent afternoon, Carolyn Brunner said she likes the store because it has low prices, greater variety and is close to her Nottingham Green home.
"I hate to see the little stores with their customer service go out of business," she said.

Despite her opposition to the store, Brunner said the selections and price might have won her over.

I'm probably going to come here," she said, "But I'd prefer not to have it here.'

The restaurant's unique slant has made the company something of a media darling since it's founding in 2003. The company has been the subject of a series in the Miami Herald and has been featured on CNN and the Food Network.
"We've had the ability to be very picky about where to open our first franchise," Glassman said. "We love Newark because it's a college town that also has a local population that still uses its main street, so we hope to see a lot of students, but also a lot of families and older couples."

In addition to selling cereal, the company is also trying marketing the ways it's environmentally friendly.

The cereal bowls, for instance, are made from reconstituted sugar cane and post consumer recycled paper that reportedly degrades within 45
days. Most of the refrigerators are higher-end, energy efficient models, and the company will soon switch all of its paper products to quick degrading sugar paper, Glassman said.

Franchise owners Linda Busacca said the company's focus on going green is one of things that got her and her husband, Anthony, interested.
"We liked the idea of a company that's focused on that kind of thing," she said. "We also grew up on cereal and raised our two kids on cereal, so there was a certain fun factor in there too."

Brittany Klein, a 21-year old University of Delaware student, who stopped in for the restaurant's test opening on Wednesday said she and her roommate had been checking out the Cereal Bowl's menu online for weeks.
"It's something new on Main Street and it just looked interesting," she said. "We couldn't wait for it to open."

## Take it from someone who knows, Joe Biden Sr. would be proud

In the afterglow of U.S. Sen. Joseph Biden's nomination for vice president, someone - the senator, Beau Biden or another speaker said how proud Joe Biden Sr. would be if he were here to see this accomplishment.
That was my exact thought.


How I came to Sisk know this for a fact - and I do know this for a fact - is a tale of fathers, sons, family business and Newark, Del.
I met Joe Biden Sr. for the first time in the late 1960s, when I was hired to be, essentially, an automotive placement specialist

## (I parked cars) and a petroleum installation engineer (I pumped gas) at Porter Chevrolet.

Busy car dealers always needed bodies for such duty. Porter's was then (and may well still be) very much a family business, and not just in the sense that it was founded by William H. Porter Sr. and at that time employed his sons Bill and Rick.
The child of any employee had a leg up for employment. My father was the business manager for the company for several years; I needed money, so there I was.
Mr. Biden (always Mr. Biden to me-this was in a time before teenage lot boys called senior management by first names) was the sales manager. He was tall and distinguished looking - the word that comes to mind
is, well, senatorial
Over the period of several summers and school years that I worked at Porter's, I took direction from Mr. Biden and many others. I am told that Sen. Biden didn't work at Porter's as a young man, but his younger brothers did work with me.
Comparing the Bidens to the Kennedys (which wàs promoted by media, not the Bidens) struck me as odd - these were good people, but were also the guys I had taken out the trash with at Porter's.
Two things truly distinguish Mr. Biden in my memory. First, he was a democrat with a small ' d '. Not everyone who was a boss (and if you were a lot boy, everyone was the boss) treated the hired help well. Some See BIDEN, 7 -

clearly had an A list and B list - I, for instance, was treated reasonably well by one tyrannical manager, but co-workers who weren't Bill Sisk's son were not.

I know now that this is generally the way of the world, but it wasn't Mr. Biden's way.

Second, he was kind. This went far beyond the necessity imposed by the facts that my father and Mr. Biden were both in mánagement and had a social relationship. He took some trouble to learn that the longhaired lot boy who played in rock bands at night also had ambitions for law school. He asked questions, encouraged me, and
shared his own sons' experiences (Sen. Biden and one of his brothers are both law school graduates).

Some years after I left Porter's, I saw Mr. Biden in the old New Castle County courthouse. I had just passed the bar. By this time his oldest son was a senator and he was with a group of very important looking people. There was no percentage to him in stopping to talk to a recent law graduate for five minutes, and leaving the VIPs to cool their heels. But he did, and with near total recall of things we had discussed nearly a decade before.

He congratulated me. He was proud of all his children too, but didn't look at life as a zero sum game - whatever success I had,
or might have, was almost as much a joy to him as his sons success.

I am sure the Sisks and the Bidens aren't the only families who worked at Porter's over multiple generations.

I was, I think, a particularly valuable lot boy (I worked there off and on for five years) since I had a great deal of interest in making money, but no particuar interest in cars. I could be trusted, for instance, not to blow the engine out of the Corvette that needed to be delivered to Rehoboth (though I might play the radio loud).
The point, though, is that Porter's, since 1925 , like many small businesses, has provided opportunity to many, many people (there was one particu-
larly able mechanic named Hal Godwin there; I must look him up one day).

The Bidens are especially distinguished alumni but many, many people put food on the table, roofs over their families' heads, and tuition in the pockets of places of higher education through working in that family business.

A lot has happened since those days. Since Delaware is a small place, I, like everyone, have had some contact over the years with the senator and his family.

Beau Biden, of course, is now our attorney general - and whoever holds that job is far more important in my world than the vice president of the United States (the AG, in fact, is

## Paradise in a Warehouse

TThe black ties were left at home in favor of denim and flip-flops at the Food Bank of Delaware's third annu al Blue Jean Ball last week.
In the spirit of this year's theme of Caribbean Calypso, the entrance was marked with a beach chair and a palm tree.
Once inside, however, tickets were sold in front of large food crates piled high.
It was a message that Food Bank President Patricia Beebe said she wants to remain at the heart of the event, which was held at the charity's food warehouse in Newark.
"It takes a lot to make a million meals a year," she said, in reference to the 90,000 Delawareans the Food Bank feeds each year with meals prepared at the facility.
A small section of the warehouse's 33,000 -square-foot, opened into fresh white table cloths, blue and green lights and an open dance floor where the band Jellyroll brought the 220 guests to their feet.
On the menu was an islandstyle meal featuring dishes such as Dread Lox (Jamaican-cured salmon with rum), Callaloo Voodoo (crab and greens stew), Jug Jug (beef with pigeon peas) and Papaya Pie prepared by executive chef Noah Mathay, chef instructor Nick Durbin and students from the Culinary School, a 12 -week program that provides job training to unemployed and underemployed individuals.
Food Bank Community Relations Manager Kim Kostes said this year's event is expect-

Newark residents are encouraged to place used, unbroken CFLs in a plas tic sandwich bag and bring them to the City of Newark Municipal Center at 220 Elkton Road between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The bulbs will be packaged and transported to a licensed recycling center where the mercury will be reclaimed and the glass and metal will be recycled.

The Master Composter Training Program will be held on Saturdays this fall - Nov. 8, 15 and 22 - at the New Castle County Cooperative Extension Office, 461 Wyoming Road, in Newark.

Instructors for this training include extension employ ees, other county and state professionals and Master Composters.

This three-session training features lectures, workshops, hands-on experience and a tour of the county's composting highlights.

As a part of this Master Composter training class, you also will be invited back to participate in a hands-on, com-munity-composting event this spring.

During the first training session on Nov. 8, you will learn about the composting process and the methods of composting.

In the second session, the training instructors will focus on making and maintaining a compost pile and the many uses of compost. Also during the second session, representatives from the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control and the Delaware Solid Waste Authority will present brief talks highlighting Delaware's recycling and composting efforts. Emphasis will be placed on the yard waste ban in northern New Castle County and the yard waste drop-off sites in Brandywine Hundred, on Polly Drummond Hill Road, and the DART Mid-County drop-off site. Additionally, Hetty Francke, New Castle County Master Gardener and Master Composter, will introduce the training class to the various compost demonstration sites throughout the state, and finish by providing a brief overview of vermicomposting or composting with worms.

Finally, on the third
Saturday of training, the program will feature a bus tour of

the Cherry Island Landfill, the Bellevue State Park Compost Demonstration Site, the Polly Drummond Hill Yard Waste Drop-Off Site and, upon returning to the extension building, the new compost demonstration site at the extension office.

For complete Master Composter certification and recognition, a trainee must attend all three November training sessions and participate in a hands-on spring composting event (date to be announced).

You also must finish two
brief take-home quizzes during the training period and implement one composting project in New Castle County by the end of fall 2009.

If all requirements are successfully achieved, then you will receive full Master Composter certification and

Katie Much, 20, was the fastest female contestant, completing the course in six minutes and 7.2 seconds. The fastest male over the age of $\mathbf{4 0}$ was Micheal Reph who finished in five minutes and 36.9 seconds, while Pam Slivka, who finished in eight minutes and 0.7 seconds, was the fastest female over the age of 40 . The fastest restaurant team was Caffe Gelato.

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## Newark-Glasgow prep for district grid showdown

With less than five miles separating the two campuses, the annual Newark-Glasgow football game is one of the top rivalries in the state.

The two schools both coming off Flight A losses last week will square off on Friday night at Glasgow High School in a match-up which, with Middletown and Wm. Penn sitting atop the conference at 3-0, could have playoff implications down the road.

Glasgow (2-3 overall, 12 Flight A) is coming off a tough loss against Middletown last Friday. After blowing a 14-point first-quarter lead, they came up just short in their comeback attempt, falling to the Cavaliers, 35-28.

Senior quarterback Chris Cruz completed 20 of 34 passes for 423 yards and two touchdowns, with seven of those passes including both touchdown tosses - going to senior wide receiver Malachi Freeman.

While Glasgow has had no trouble scoring on offense, their defense faces a tough challenge stopping Yellowjacket senior running back Brandon Norwood
"We know Newark likes to run the ball and Brandon is a great running back," Dragon Coach Shannon Riley said. "He runs hard and has great vision. The key to stopping him is gang tackling because he is strong and very fast."

For Newark (2-3, 1-1), their $28-0$ loss to Wm. Penn was a setback after decisive wins over Delcastle and St. Mark's the previous two weeks.
"Just when you think your
team is heading in the right direction, we have a little bit of a setback," Yellowjacket coach Butch Simpson said.

A key to the game for Newark will be the health of Norwood, who touched the ball only four times in the second half last weekend due to back spasms. Following rushing totals of 149 and 337 the previous two weeks, Norwood was limited to just 79 yards on 22 carries against the Colonials.
"I'll be ready by Friday night," Norwood said. "I can't wait to get back at it."

Freshman quarterback Taylor Reynolds now has two games under his belt and as he gets more and more comfortable in his new role, expect the Yellowjacket offense to open up a little bit more, as they did in the second half against Penn.
"Taylor Reynolds is a freshman," Simpson said, "and although he shows a lot of poise at times and has a very bright future in front of him, this is all very new to him."

Although Penn shut down senior wide receiver Shaun Thomas (zero catches), getting him the ball will be critical if Newark expects to move the ball against Glasgow, especially if Norwood is not 100percent.

With 246 wins on his resume, getting a team ready to play after being soundly beaten is not new to Simpson.
"We need to get back at it during practice, keep the spirits up, and get ready to go play a very solid Glasgow team on Friday night," he said.
"This is an intense rivalry," Riley said. "We are not only cross-town rivals but district rivals as well. The game has big playoff implications. It should be a great game."

## Hens get ready to face Maine

On a Monday when the University of Delaware football team tumbled to No. 20 on the Football Championship Subdivision coaches' poll, no one - certainly not coach K.C. Keeler - was pondering the Blue Hens' postseason chances.

Chattanooga, Tenn., site of December's FCS championship game, never seemed so far away for the Blue Hens and their coach who were agonizing over Saturday's 17-7 loss at Massachusetts, the latest setback in what is now a 2-3 season. The furthest Keeler was looking ahead was to the Blue Hens next practice in which he hopes to find answers to his team's offensive malaise.

The way we are playing offensively, I don't think there is a lot to worry about besides Maine and driving back and forth to work from home," Keeler said. "There isn't a whole lot else in my life. I've got to get this offense ready to go.
"If we get the offense to a respectable level, we've proven we play good enough defense that we can win some ball games."

Keeler said his teams have never had trouble scoring, but this season has been an exception. The Blue Hens have scored 121 points in five games, the least by a Delaware team at a similar point since the 1990 Hens gathered only 90 . Entering the 2008 seasons,

Delaware had been held to a ing records. But Keeler is taktouchdown or less only three times, but in five games this season the Hens have been held to a touchdown twice.

The result is reflected in the fact that for only the ninth time in the 25 years of the regularseason 11-game schedule has Delaware moved into the second half with a losing record. Only twice on those occasions have the Hens bounced back to finish above .500 . One can only imagine how UD would stand if their defense wasn't ranked No. 1 in scoring defense.

Once again, the offensive lethargy evoked questions about Schoenhoft's status. And once again, Keeler gave the Ohio State transfer a vote of confidence, explaining a quarterback's best friend is a strong running game which Delaware backs haven't provided, but on this Monday the coach's endorsement had a qualified tone.
"We don't make it public, but we are evaluating every week, and we'll continue to evaluate this week," he said, adding that it is only fair to backup quarterback Lou Ritacco. "[Schoenhot] has to get better. He knows he has to get better.
"If we give [Schoenhoft] that running game I think he will get better. If he doesn't play better, then absolutely, there will be an option."

One might expect Delaware to have the opportunity to establish a running game in the next three weeks when it faces Maine, William \& Mary, and Hofstra, each with los-
ing records. But Keeler is tak-
ing nothing granted against the 2-3 Black Bears whose three losses were to Big Ten member Iowa and CAA frontrunners Richmond and James Madison. Maine was competitive against the latter two, playing Richmond relatively early in a 44-17 loss and played James Madison even into the fourth quarter before the Dukes claimed a $24-10$ victory.
"They are a good football team ...I think they are our equal," Keeler said. "They are like we are. They can beat anyorte in this league. They are very sound, very physical. They raise them very tough up there."

For Maine coach Jack Cosgrove, the Black Bears had a bye week that allowed them to recover from a difficult back-to-back run against Richmond and JMU. One of his major concerns coming into the game is tailback Jhamal Fluellen, who is doubtful because of a neck injury.

Maine and Delaware have not played since 2005 so none of the Maine players has ever played in Delaware Stadium, but Cosgrove's history in the venue goes back to the 1970s as a player. He reeled off a series of major victories and losses for both sides, but perhaps the most memorable was Delaware's $35-28$ victory in 1989 when Maine was 8-0 and commanding national attention.

There's always been some great action between Maine and Delaware, at least the games I've been around," he said.

## Last year, Phillip Dutton was the winner of the Concours Complet Internationale three-star Championship at Fair Hill

Phillip Dutton of West Grove, PA, rode The Foreman, owned by Ann Jones, to a thrilling victory in the U.S. Equestrian Federation (USEF) CCI*** Eventing Championship at the 2007 Dansko Fair Hill International Festival in the Country.

The win marked Dutton's fourth CCI victory at Fair Hill, with previous wins coming in 1996, 2000 and 2004. It was an especially meaningful win for Dutton, as it was his first time winning the USEF Three Star Championship, the award given to the highest placing American rider. Dutton, a three-time Australian Olympic veteran, competed for the first time as an American citizen at Fair Hill, having changed his

citizenship from his native Australia before the event.
"It was a hard decision to change my citizenship but the U.S. is where I live and I thought it was time to make the change," he said. "It's great to win as an American and I could really feel the crowd behind me.

Following his win, Dutton spoke about his mount, The Foreman, and the history the two have shared.
"It was particularly gratifying to win on The Foreman as this is his first three-day event since he got hurt a year and a half ago and this is a great way for him to return."
Dutton led throughout the competition. He took the lead on his 11-yearold, bay thoroughbred with a score of 42.4 penalties in dressage. He then turned in a clean cross country ride and added just four penalties in show jumping for a three-phase score of 46.4. Placing second was Boyd Martin of Australia who scored 50.5 on Ying Yang Yo, also an 11-year-old, bay thoroughbred. Martin had been living in the U.S. and training with Dutton last year.
"He has turned pretty good horses into excellent horses," said Martin of Dutton. "The results of working with him were evident this week-end."

Dutton and Martin also took the next two places with Dutton finishing third with a score of 50.9 penalties on Woodburn and Martin taking fourth with a score of 52.4 on Neville Bardos.

## What does CCC*** mean?

English and French are the official languages of the Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI), the international governing body of the sport, and the concise and descriptive French term for this competition is Concours Complet $\mathrm{d}^{\prime}$ Equitation or "complete equestrian competition."

The use of acronyms is universal today, and throughout the world an international Three-Day Event is known as a CCI (concours complet internationale). To indicate the level of difficulty, the FEI uses asterisks or "stars" on a scale of one to four stars.

The four-star CCI is the highest level of competition in the sport, reserved for the World Championships and Olympic Games held every four years, the annual Badminton and Burghley Three-Day Events in England, the Rolex Kentucky Three-Day Event, and Adelaide in Australia.

## Olympians head entries expected to compete in CCI** at Dansko Fair Hill International

Previous Champions and Olympic veterans head the list of world-class riders entered to compete in the U.S. Equestrian Federation (USEF) CCI*** Championship at the 20th annual Dansko Fair Hill International Festival in the Country.

Previous Fair Hill Champions such as Karen O'Connor, and Charles Plumb are expected to be on hand to battle for top honors in the eventing Championship, which was won last year by Phillip Dutton of West Grove, PA.

Dutton, a two-time Olympic team Gold Medalist from Australia, is a familiar face in the winner's circle at Fair Hill. He won the CCI*** Championship in 1996, 2000, 2004 and again in 2007. Dutton competed three times as a member of the Australian Olympic team, earning two gold Medals. He represented the United States at the 2008 Hong Kong Olympic Games after obtaining his US citizenship.

Heading the list of entries along with Dutton are four-time Olympic veteran and two-time Fair Hill Champion Karen O'Connor of The Plains, VA and 1990 Fair Hill Champion Charles Plumb.

O'Connor is a popular competitor at Fair Hill, winning the Championship in 1989 and 2003.

Charles Plumb has a history of wins at Fair Hill. He won the U.S. Championship in 1990, while his father won in 1966 and 1972 and his grandfather won in 1963, although their wins were at other locations.

The Dansko Fair Hill CCI*** is one of the most prestigious three-day events in the United States. In fact, it is one of only two eventing competitions of such high caliber in the country. U.S. riders competing in the CCI*** at Fair Hill also vie for the USEF Three-Star Fall Championship, in which the highestfinishing American rider earns the U.S. Equestrian Team (USET) Foundation Challenge Trophy.

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# The sport of Eventing offers crowd-pleasing, breathtaking excitement 

Eventing (also known as three-day eventing or combined training) traces its beginnings to "The Militaire" in Europe, a competition introduced at the 1912 Olympic Games in Stockholm as the ultimate test for the cavalry horse. Only active-duty Army officers mounted on military chargers were then allowed to compete for the United States.

Today, the sport attracts competitors from varied backgrounds, drawn to the variety of challenges eventing provides to horse and rider.

The Three-Day Event is a test of horse and rider's skill and all-around ability - the ultimate test of teamwork between horse and rider. This equestrian triathlon was patterned after the demands of training and testing military chargers: precision, elegance and obedience; stamina, versatility and courage; jumping ability and endurance; and finally, the horses' fitness to remain in service.

By present standards, that first Olympic competition in Stockholm was severe. Of the 27 competitors starting, only 15 finished. Among the seven countries that competed, the United States placed third, winning the Bronze Medal. By 1924, 17 national teams competed in Paris, with the U.S. as the only overseas entrant. It was at these Olympic Games that the present pattern for the Three-Day Event was established.

The dressage phase takes place on the first day (or first two days if warranted by the number of entries) to show balance, obedience, flexibility,

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and harmony between horse and rider. Next is the cross-country phase, the most demanding phase, testing boldness and speed. Finally, horses must demonstrate conditioning, resilience and agility in the jumping phase.
The 1948 Olympic Games in London marked the end of the U.S. Army's participation in Olympic equestrian events and the transition to a civilian competition. Olympic competition was opened to women riders in 1964.
Taking advantage of this new opportunity, Fair Hill International coPresident Lana duPont Wright became the first U.S. woman to compete in eventing at an Olympic Games, taking home the team Silver Medal in 1964.
American eventers have enjoyed a great deal of success at the international level highlighted by team Gold Medals at the 1976 and 1984 Olympic Games and David O'Connor's individual Gold at the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney.
What it takes to ride in a three-day event
There are four levels of competition in eventing. Levels are designated by stars-one-star through four-star, with four-star having the highest degree of

difficulty. Horses and riders must earn the right to compete at these levels. At each successive level, a horse has to jump higher, run farther and faster, as well as trust its rider more.

The degree of difficulty for gymnastic exercises-both on the flat in the dressage phase and over fences dur-

ing the cross-country test-increases progressively.

## The first phase: dressage

The dressage test in eventing reflects the cavalry officer's need for an obedient, attractive mount on the parade ground. The objective is to demonstrate harmonious development of the horse's physique and balance.

Each horse-and-rider combination is required to perform a prescribed set of movements within a confined area. Three independent judges award marks for each movement, ranging from 0 to 10 . There are also collective marks for the horse's pace, impulsion and submission to its rider's direction, as well as for the rider's position and use of aids.

The test must be executed from memory. Errors or incorrect sequences of movements are penalized by the subtraction of points.

Throughout the dressage test, the judges are looking for calmness and relaxation, combined with impulsion and rhythm, all from a horse that should be at the peak of fitness, full of energy for the strenuous demands of the competition still to come.

A dressage performance should be fluid, balanced and accurate, providing an overall picture of grace and harmony. This capability cannot be obtained overnight. Many years of training go into producing a wellschooled horse that can perform a good dressage test.

Additionally, without the obedience and suppleness dressage requires, the crosse-country and jumping phases would be considerably more difficult.

## The second phase: cross-country

The cross-country phase is a test of speed and endurance and is the most exciting and challenging part of a three-day event. It is made up of as many as 35 obstacles set in varied terrain, which must be jumped boldly and with speed.

Some obstacles may include four or five separate jumping efforts.

Each portion of the cross-country phase tests the rider's knowledge of pace and use of the horse across country. Competitors must complete the phase within a prescribed "optimum time." Time penalties are incurred if the course is taken too slowly and the competitor exceeds the optimum time.
Penalties may also be incurred for jumping faults, such as refusals and run-outs, in addition to time penalties. Under adverse conditions of weather or terrain, phase length and time allowed may be altered for safety reasons.

The third phase: jumping
The final component of a three-
day event is the jumping phase. In order to compete, horses must pass a series of veterinary inspections after the cross-country phase, similar to the inspection they must pass before being allowed to even enter the competition.

Jumping tests the horse's ability to retain the suppleness, energy and obedience necessary for them to complete a jumping course consisting of various colored, moveable obstacles without incurring penalties due to knock-
downs, refusals, falls or exceeding the time allowed, after their great efforts of the previous day.

And the winner is .
The overall winners of a three-day event are determined by converting dressage scores to penalties and adding the penalties incurred in crosscountry and jumping. The competitor with the lowest number of penalties wins.

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# Several favorites will be back to compete in Eventing 

## Phillip Dutton

Hometown: West Grove, PA
Born: Sept. 13, 1963
2008 was an Olympic year for Phillip Dutton and his mount Connaught. The pair represented the United States as members of the Three-Day Event Team at the 2008 Olympic Games in Hong Kong. It was Dutton's first Olympic Games representing the United States. Dutton rode as a member of the Australian team in the last three Olympic Games and won two Gold Medals, but recently obtained his American citizenship.
Also in 2008, Dutton had his first win at the Rolex Kentucky Three Day Event aboard Connaught. Dutton had finished second at Rolex five times previously.

In 2007 Dutton rode The Foreman to a thrilling victory in the U.S. Equestrian Federation (USEF) CCI** Eventing Championship at the Dansko Fair Hill International Festival in the Country. The win marked Dutton's fourth CCI ${ }^{* * *}$ win at Fair Hill, with previous wins in 1996, 2000 and 2004. It was, however, the first year that Dutton - who became a citizen of the United States prior to the Festival - won the USEF Three Star Championship, an award given to the highest placing American rider at Fair Hill.

Also in 2007 won Individual Silver and Team Gold medals at the Pan American Games in Rio de Janerio, Brazil with Tru Luck, as well as a second place finish at the Rolex Three Day Event with Connaught.
In 2006 Dutton and his mount Tru Luck finished Fair Hill's Eventing Championship in third place. Tying up the 2006 season, Phillip was named United States Eventing Association (USEA) Rider of the Year, and Tru Luck was named USEA Horse of the Year.

In 2004 Phillip and Nova Top finished 2nd at the Lexington, $\mathrm{KYCCI}{ }^{* * * *}$ as well as finishing 13th at the Atlanta Olympics. Dutton won the individual Gold Medal at the 2003 Asia-Pacific Eventing

Championship and the 2003 Foxhall Cup CCI*** both on Nova Top.

In 2002, Phillip Dutton finished fifth at the World Equestrian Games held in Jerez, Spain after he won the Advanced Horse Trials division at Morven Park, VA and placed 20th in the CCI**** at Rolex Kentucky and was second in the CCI*** at the Fair Hill International in Fair Hill, MD. It was the second straight year that Dutton was Reserve Champion, behind David O'Connor, at Fair Hill.

In 2000, Phillip Dutton helped the Australian team shine in the sport of eventing as they earned the team Gold Medal at the Sydney Olympic Games. Dutton also placed 2nd and 4th at the 2000 Foxhall Cup CCI***.

In 1997, Dutton finished 5th at Bramham $\mathrm{CCI}^{\star * *}$ and 35th at the Badminton CCI****. He competed around the world again in 1998, where he placed 18th at the World Equestrian Games in Rome and 2nd at the Rolex Kentucky Three-Day Event CCI****, and 9th in the three-star competition in Lexington, KY.

Dutton made his initial mark on the international eventing scene in 1996 when he earned a team Gold Medal at the Olympic Games in Atlanta, GA. That same year, he captured 1st place at the. Fair Hill International and at the Kentucky Invitational.

The USA Leading Rider of the Year Title has been given to Dutton a total of seven times; in 1998, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, and 2005.

## Kimberly Severson

Home: Scottsville, VA
Born: August 22, 1973
Kim Severson had a history-making relationship with her partner Winsome Adante, owned by Linda E. A. Wachtmeister and Plain Dealing Farm, Inc., who was retired from competition earlier this year. In 2007, the pair won the CIC** World Cup Qualifier and went on to place 3 rd at the $\mathrm{CCI}^{* * * *}$ at Badminton
in England.
In 2006 Kim and "Dan," as he is called for short, competed in the World Championships in Aachen, Germany. The pair placed 3rd in dressage, and were 17th overall.

The duo has won the Rolex Kentucky CCI**** championship three times-2002, 2004 and 2005

Following their win at Rolex in 2004, the pair rode for the U.S. at the Olympic Games in Athens, Greece and won individual Silver and team Bronze Medals.

Dan was honored at the 2008 Rolex Kentucky Three-Day Event with an official retirement ceremony. Kim, as well as hundreds of Dan's fans were present to honor and celebrate the horse's legendary career. At the 2008 Rolex Kentucky Three-Day Event, Kim competed aboard Tipperary Liadhnan and finished in fifth place. She is expected to compete at Fair Hill this year in the CCI*** aboard Tipperary Liadhnan as well as in the CCI ${ }^{\star *}$ with Queen Wannabee.

Severson earned her first medal in a World Championship in September of 2002 when she helped the U.S. earn the team Gold Medal at the World Equestrian Games in Jerez, Spain. Severson rode Winsome Adante, in the World Championship, which was her biggest career win to date.

Earlier in 2002, Severson had a major career win when she and Winsome Adante took top honors at the Rolex Kentucky Three Day Event CCI**** in Lexington, KY. In 1999, she was also in the winner's circle in Lexington having won the USET Three-Star Spring Championship. Severson and Over The Limit topped a field of 82 horses. This win was key in her being selected to represent the United States in the 1999 Pan American Games in Winnipeg, Canada. Unfortunately, Severson had to withdraw from the Pan Am team when Over The Limit encountered health problems.

In 1999, Severson took Over The Limit to the Blenheim CCI ${ }^{\star *}$ in the United Kingdom on a USET Grant and finished second. Two years later, in September, 2001, she won the Blenheim $\mathrm{CCI}^{* * *}$ on Winsome Adante. Earlier that year, she rode Winsome Adante to the Reserve Championship in the USET Three-Star Spring Championship at Foxhall.

October, 1999 she won the two-star event at Radnor on Silent Partner. In 1998 and 1999, Severson had consistent success in Horse Trials with Over The Limit, placing third at Morven Park in 1999 and Millbrook in 1998. She and Over The Limit placed fourth (behind Olympic medalists Blyth Tait, David and Karen O'Connor) in the 2000 Rolex Kentucky Three Day Event presented by Bayer CCI****

## Karen 0'Connor:

Home: The Plains, Virginia
Born: February 17, 1958
Karen $\mathrm{O}^{\prime}$ Connor competed in her fourth Olympic Games this past summer in Hong Kong aboard Mandiba.

In May 2008 the loss of Karen O'Connor's event pony, Theodore O'Connor, shook the equine community. "Teddy" as he was called for short was a 14.2 h chestnut Sport Pony with the heart of a giant! His darger-than-life persona made him a crowd
favorite and he will surely be missed.
Karen O'Connor and Theodore O'Connor placed 3rd at the Rolex CCI**** in 2007 as well as having won Individual and Team Gold medals at the 2007 Pan American Games. In 2006 the pair made their début performance at the Fair Hill International much to the delight of spectators.

2006 went on to include Karen placing 12th with her mount Upstage at the Rolex $\mathrm{CCI}^{\star * * * ; ~ 7 t h ~ a t ~ t h e ~ R e d ~ H i l l s ~}$ CIC***, as well as representing the U.S. at the World Equestrian Games in Aachen, Germany.

In 2004 Karen competed both, Upstage and A Phar Cry, at the American Eventing Championships. Karen finished 2nd with Upstage in the Advanced division, and won the Intermediate division with A Phar Cry.

Karen O'Connor had a huge end to 2003 after she won the Eventing Fall Championship and Fair Hill CCI** Championship at Fair Hill, MD on Grand Slam followed by an individual Silver Medal in the Pan American Championship at Fair Hill, MD.

O'Connor and her 2000 Olympic mount Prince Panache won the 2001 Foxhall Cup CCI*** in Atlanta, GA. In 2000, she won the team Bronze Medal at the Sydney Olympic Games. Earlier that year, she came in third in
the Rolex Kentucky Three Day Event, CCI**** on Prince Panache.

She won the Rolex Kentucky Three Day Event, CCI**** to start out the 1999 season. She ended 1999 by placing second to her husband David in the USET Three Star Fall Championship at the Fair Hill International on Regal Scot. O'Connor won the team Silver Medal at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta with husband and teammate, David. O'Connor first made a World Championship team when she qualified for the 1982 World Championship. However, she was forced to withdraw when her horse became sick. She did win a World Championship medal, a team Bronze, at the 1998 World Equestrian Games in Rome, Italy.

In 1984, riding The Optimist, O'Connor became the first American to win the Boekelo (Holland) CCI. Taking over fellow U.S. Equestrian Team (USET) veteran Jim Wofford's mount, Castlewellan, she won the 1985 Chesterland (Pennsylvania) CCI in their first three day event together. O'Connor was a member of the 1988 USET Olympic squad, riding The Optimist. The following year, she retired The Optimist and campaigned Nos Ecus, clinching both the Radnor and Fair Hill events, and taking the first of three consecutive U.S. Combined Training Association (USCTA) "Lady

Rider of the Year" titles. She also rode in the 1986 World Championship in Gawler, Australia.

On the basis of her performance in 1991 with Mr. Maxwell, the USET provided a grant for O'Connor to compete in Europe. While there, she finished third at Burghley and Mr. Maxwell was named USCTA and the Chronicle of the Horse's "Horse of the Year." Karen finished first and third in the 1993 Punchestown CCI*** Three Day Event, as well as third in a CCI** at Loughanmore, Ireland. She was ranked third in the World that year, and was the number 1 ranked lady rider.

Based on her international performances, the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) named O'Connor its 1993 "Female Equestrian Athlete of the Year." Karen has been named Lady Rider of the Year seven times-1989, 1990, 1991, 1995, 1996, 1997 and 1998.

## Amy Tryon

Home: Duvall, WA
Born: February 24, 1970
Amy Tryon has been eventing since age seven, although she competed in her first three-star event in 1999.

She purchased Poggio II in October,
1997 and the young horse advanced
quickly. He won his first event at the training, preliminary and intermediate levels so Amy tried him at the advanced level in October, 1998 where he won the two-star at Radnor. His solid performance in the threestar at Punchestown (Ireland) in May, 1999 earned Amy a trip to the Pan American Games where she finished 4th individually, just two penalties away from the Bronze Medal.

Tryon had anoutstanding two weeks in April, 2002. She rode Woodstock to the Reserve Championship in the USET Three Star Spring Chamionship at the MBNA Foxhall Cup CCI*** and then rode Poggio II to third place in the USET Four Star Championship at the Rolex Kentucky Three-Day Event presented y Bayer CCI****. She ended her amazing 2002 season by helping the United States win the team Gold Medal at the Eventing World Championships at the World Equestrian Games in Jerrez de la Frontera, Spain!

In 2004 Amy competed as part of the bronze medal winning Olympic ThreeDay Event Team in Athens, where she also finished sixth individually.

Amy rode Poggio II to an individual bronze medal at the World Equestrian Games in 2006. The pair returned to the Olympic Stage in Hong Kong as members of the United States ThreeDay Event Team this past summer.

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## Dansko Fair Hill International adds CCI two-star to 2008 schedule

Fans of the popular Dansko Fair Hill International Festival in the Country have something new and exciting to look forward to when the event returns October 16-19. This year's Festival features the addition of a CCI TwoStar (CCI**) to Fair Hill's competition schedule.

In addition to the traditional CCI Three-Star (CCI**) which has drawn many of the world's best eventing horses and riders to Fair Hill for many years, the new CCI** makes way for a new group of horses and riders to compete at Fair Hill.

There is a serious need for a CCI** in this part of the country in the fall because, without it, competitors must travel to Ocala, FL in order to compete and qualify for future events," said Trish Gilbert, Co-President of the Dansko Fair Hill International Festival in the Country.
"The addition of the Two-Star event will enhance the level of excitement and add to the top-notch quality of
competition we have at Fair Hill." Creation of the CCI** course required a lot of planning and hard work. Derek DiGrazia, long-time cross country course designer for the Fair Hill CCI***, stepped in and also designed this year's CCI** course.

The course, which consists of all new jumps, is sure to please riders and spectators alike.
Exciting cross country action can be seen at any of the jumps, but Gilbert points out that the water jumps, which share the same area of the two and three-star events, as well as the start box are particularly exciting.

The funding for the new cross country course has been provided in part by riders and owners taking part in "The Cross Country Fund."
"We sent letters out to owners and riders and had such an overwhelmingly positive response," said Gilbert. "The money earned from The Cross Country Fund is dedicated to the construction of the cross country course."

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## Plumb family has winning ways

## The Plumb family, formerly of Chesapeake City, can boast three generations of USET Fall Three-Day Event Champions

In 1990 Charles Plumb became the third generation of Plumb family three-day event riders to be crowned as Champion of the United States Equestrian Team (USET) Fall ThreeDay Event Championship.

Plumb, who was 24 years-old at the time, captured the prestigious win at Fair Hill aboard Landino. Plumb's victory was proof that history does repeat itself - his father eight-time Olympian J. Michael Plumb, won the same honor in 1966 aboard Chakola and also in 1972 on Johnny O, while his grandfather, the late Charles D. Plumb, won on The Lark on 1963.

Plumb's performance aboard Landino in 1990 was one for the Fair Hill record books. The dynamic pair led the field of 19 competitors from the beginning dressage phase through the daring cross country course and onto the final show jumping phase. He and Landino earned an impressive 50.2 on their dressage test, putting them at the top of the leader board going into the cross country phase.

The cross country course that year at Fair Hill was large and straight forward, requiring bravery and skill from each horse and rider combina-
tion. Charles and Landino negotiated the course without error and incurred only 4.8 time faults. In the show jumping phase, the pair knocked down just one rail but maintained their lead and captured the win.

Perhaps history will repeat itself yet again. Plumb is expected to compete this year in the CCI*** USEF Fall Three-Day Event Championship, the premier event at Fair Hill aboard Westerly.

Spectators can expect Plumb to attack the course at Fair Hill with the same determination, bravery and skill he, his father and grandfather are famous for. In 2008 Michael Plumb was the first equestrian inducted in to the U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame.
"My dad thought he could ride anything. He had incredible confidence. That's what. I feel about myself," said Michael Plumb of his late father, Charles during an interview in 1991. In a short, but to-the-point compliment, Michael also complimented his son by saying, "he's tough."
