Dr. Iyengar came to this country in 1954 as a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Southern California. He taught there for one year before joining the Du Pont Company where he works at the Chestnut Run plant.

Mrs. Iyengar came to this country with her husband and did post-graduate work here. Both are Hindus.

They have two children, a 10-year-old daughter and a son, six. Mrs. Iyengar's father was assistant director at the Food Research Institute in India.

## Fire Chief Scores Road Job Conflict In Iron Hill Area

Aetna's George W. Smith Cites Coordination Lack In Turnpike, Bridge Work

Newark Fire Chief George W. Smith cited lack of coordination for bringing Delaware Turnpike work to an Iron Hill area already isolated by rebuilding of two Christina River bridges.

Chief of the Aetna Hose, Hook & Ladder Company, Smith said: "If the highway commission knew the work on the road was coming, so early, it seems to me they could have granted us our request to keep one of those Christina River bridges open."

He was referring to the June closing of bridges on Welsh Tract and West Chestnut Hill roads. These bridges are being rebuilt by Eastern States Construction Company for \$116,000.

Before the bridges were closed, a delegation from Newark, led by fire company members, appeared before the highway commission and asked that only one bridge be taken out at a time.

They said that to remove both simultaneously would force Aetna's fire trucks to detour about four miles to get to any fire just across the river.

William J. Miller, Jr., director of operations for the highway department, admitted at the time that there "is some risk involved," but doubted "there is much more than having one bridge out for about eight months."

Miller contended that to force the contractor to work on only one bridge at a time would have added nearly three months to the scheduled completion date, which is 130 working days, or some time this winter.

On Monday last week, one of the main roads behind Iron Hill used by residents to get to Newark or Elkton, was blocked by James Julian, Inc., construction teams working on the turnpike. They have opened the road again by laying a temporary road around the right of way.

Smith, apprised of the detour, said he was glad to hear the road was no longer blocked, but wondered if the temporary road would support some of his company's heavy equipment, especially during wet weather.

"With the work on the turnpike down here, some of our main access roads will be blocked, from time to time," Smith declared. "As a consequence, we have worked out an agreement with the Singler Fire Co. of Elkton and the New Castle County fire call board, that Singlerley will be notified immediately if there is a fire across the river and will respond."

## Architects' Drawing of New Aetna Fire Station

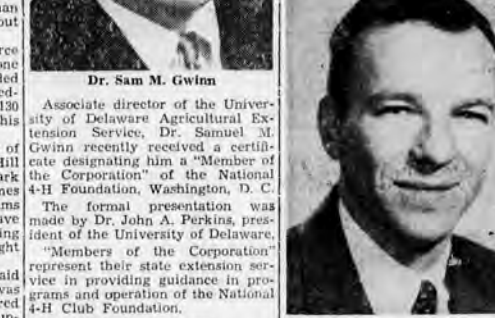

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## LWV Backs NHA Low-Rent Housing Plans For Newark

League Support Depends On Complete Integration Mrs. Ronkin Announces

The Newark League of Women Voters is supporting the Newark Housing Authority effort to bring low-rent public housing to the city, and Mrs. R. R. Ronkin, chairman of the league's continuing responsibilities committee, summarized efforts of the league over the past seven years to improve local housing conditions.

"At the time we studied housing, we assumed that public housing would be integrated. If we learn that the public housing here is otherwise our support motion would have to be withdrawn and taken back to the members to see what they think about it," Mrs. Ronkin said.

John W. Meyers, chairman of the Housing Authority, declared that this was the first public support the group has received.

In contrast with the last two meetings of the authority, when as many as 100 citizens opposing choice of a site for the 42 units of low-rent housing on East Main Street, tried to make their views known, last week's meeting was attended by 10 people, including Mayor Carl S. Rankin and Councilmen Henry R. Folsom Jr. and Charles J. Schneider.

With their counsel, John Van Brunt, Jr., in the hospital for a check-up, the Housing Authority once more found itself marking time. A few minor technical moves were approved, such as setting the fiscal year to coincide with that of the federal government, getting unpublished information from the Census Bureau on elderly persons, and paying certain bills.

Avery Goddin, NHA vice-chairman, said the authority would make no move involving possible legal consequences until Van Brunt returned. He said money has been set aside for whatever action the authority has to take to obtain a second site for low rent housing that must be built simultaneously with housing for the elderly.

## 2nd Fire Station To Be Built By Aetnamen On Ogletown Rd.

Contract For 10,000-Sq. Ft. Building Awarded For Low Bid Of \$184,245 By Nowland Bros. With Construction To Start Next Month, Completion Stated In 240 Days

Construction of a second fire station for Newark's Aetna Hose Hook and Ladder Company is expected to begin next month on a 2 1/2-acre site east of the A&P Store on the north side of Ogletown Road. The contract for construction of the new building has been awarded to Nowland Brothers of Wilmington for the firm's low base bid of \$184,245 among 11 contractors submitting bids for the job. Completion is expected within 240 days.

Plans for the one-story, brick, steel, and concrete building were prepared by Whiteside, Moeckel & Carbonell, architects, and the new Aetna fire station will include 10,000 sq. ft. of floor space.

The building will consist of two large, auditorium-like rooms, 56x92-ft., and 34x70-ft., with a lower ceiling center section joining the two.

The largest section to the west is intended to be rented for community functions and can be used for public meetings, basketball games, and dances as a source of revenue for the fire company in defraying cost of the building.

The center section will include a lobby, Aetna office, a firemen's recreation room, public rest rooms, and the heating plant.

A combined 35-ft. chimney and firemen's training tower is to rise above the roof of this center section.

The east wing is to be used for storage of fire-fighting equipment, and space is to be provided for housing four fire engines and a battery charging device.

The need for an additional fire station was anticipated six years ago, and officials of the Aetna Hose, Hook and Ladder Company conferred with the regional planning committee in deciding upon a site best suited to serve industrial and residential growth in the Newark area. The Ogletown Road tract was purchased last January from the B&O Railroad for \$16,000, with a frontage of some 200-ft. on Ogletown Road, and a depth extending north to the railroad tracks.

Mason will also assume other program responsibilities which will include Indian Guides and day camp.

Starting in 1920, and continuing each year since, the design of the Christmas Seal has carried only the double-barred cross. Together, the Seal and the double-barred cross have been the banner around which

the people have united in the voluntary battle against tuberculosis.

## Yellowjackets Saunders, Sinclair, Smith Face Annual Blue & Gold All-Star Game

Two Blue Hen Conference record-holders — All-State End Arnie Saunders, conference champion with pass receptions, and Quarterback Mike Sinclair, who fired a record-breaking 11 touchdown passes last fall — along with End Jim Smith, defensive star and anchor man on the other side of the line from Saunders — will represent Coach Bob Hoffman's Yellowjackets as members of the Gold team in the seventh annual Delaware All-Star High School Football Game this Saturday at Delaware Stadium.

The Golds will be out to make it two wins in a row over the Blues at 2 p.m. on Saturday.

All 1962 June graduates from schools below Wilmington's southern border, the Golds won (20-14) for the first time in the series last summer and are hoping to improve their 4-1 record.

The "We Play That They May Learn" spectacle again benefits the Delaware Foundation for Retarded Children, an organization which has netted more than \$150,000 from the contest in the last six years.

Over 7,000 fans from all over Delaware are expected to make the

game another sellout, but tickets will be on sale at Delaware Stadium, starting late Saturday morning.

The Golds are coached by John M. Clayton, High's Graham Dill, while the Blues are guided by Wilmington High's Earl Smith.

J. M. Clayton's Joe Dallabrida and De La Warr's John Meccarillo will assist Dill, with P. S. du Pont's Buddy Clark and Wilmington's Ed Mallin helping Smith.

Both 30-player teams will go into the game in tip-top physical condition after nearly two weeks of intensive training on the University of Delaware campus.

Saunders, 5-11, and 165 pounds, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James M. Saunders, 8 Corbit Street, Newark. One of seven children, Arnie Saunders led Newark (4-5) in scoring with 65 points. He scored nine touchdowns and 11 extra points to finish high up in the state race. In addition to making All-State, Saunders was named to the All-Conference team.

Saunders, who also was a letterman in basketball and baseball, was vice-president of his sophomore class and won the Mayer Brothers Trophy as Newark's top senior gridder last fall. He plans to enter Delaware in the fall and major in physical education.

Smith, 6-2, and 176 pounds, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Smith, 17 Mackey Lane, Brookside. He played starting end on the opposite side of the line from Saunders and was a defensive standout.

Jim Smith, received the Newark Touchdown Club trophy last year as the player contributing most to team morale.

Sinclair, 5-9, and 155 pounds, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Sinclair, 15 Sunset Road, Newark. Mike had the distinction of throwing four TD passes in one game for Newark.

Sinclair, who plans to enter Swarthmore in September as a pre-medical student, was a finalist in the McCabe Scholarship at Swarthmore and received a letter of commendation in the National Merit Test. He won an Americanism essay contest sponsored by the American Legion.

The Gold attack appears to be built around triple-threat Dover High quarterback Jim Somerville, who won the Delaware scoring championship last fall with 127 points. Somerville can run, pass and kick with equal finesse.

Somerville is one of five Wilmington Sportswriters and Broadcasters Association All-Stars on the Gold squad. The Blues have four.

One of Somerville's favorite passing targets during Dover's undefeated season last fall was All-State end Bobby Sylvester, who wears a Gold uniform Saturday.

Rehoboth Beach High's powerful Ken Simpson supplies good punch to the Gold backfield. This All-State back was second to Somerville in scoring with 86 points.

Newark All-State End Arnie Saunders will be one of the fastest players on the field, and Nolan Ray is the other All-Stater on the Gold team. In all, a record 19 schools are represented on the Gold squad.

While the Golds will be out to extend their streak, the Blues are determined to get back in the win column. They haven't won since 1959; the 1960 game ended in a tie.

Three of Smith's All-Staters played for his undefeated Wilmington High (9-0) Blue Hen Conference championship team. They are Halfback Cliff Armstrong, Guard Bill Neiger and Tackle Jim Wilson.

Powerful Salesman Halfback Corky Marge is the fourth All-Stater. The Blues have a sturdy line, with seven linemen over the 200-pound mark. In addition, Marge was considered one of the best running backs in the state last year. If they spring him loose, he will be hard to stop.

The wind was up, too, with a bright, sparkling day, but despite the evidence and supper provided by Messrs. Fluharty and Roe in fishing close to shore and close at hand, we beat our way down the bay to the mouth of the Choptank and out to a surf-covered reef which is all that remains of Sharp's Island, in response to a newspaper report of big blues in the area.

Much later, without contacting a blue or any other fish, we stopped at Rose Haven across the bay to gas up, and just off Rose Haven on the western shore, joined a flotilla in pursuit of small rock and blues breaking water beneath swarms of terns and gulls.

The rock was just over the keeper size, and the blues were half-pound snappers, and after catching a dozen of these small specimens, we returned the bay to Poplar Island where again we found birds shrieking and swooping over schools of fish.

Trolling and casting with small spoons and bucktails, we picked up another mixed dozen of rock and blues, and then anchored off Poplar Island just in time to see a fisherman land a pair of two-foot long rock from a stand on the beach — the same site suggested by our Tighman's Island friends of the night before.

The tide or something was wrong, because we didn't but one fish, a silvery sand perch, and the successful rockfishermen departed shortly after we began.

In some bottom fishing at this location the next morning, we caught one small rock with a bloodworm and spinner combination and then drifted from Poplar Island into Eastern Bay before a brisk breeze, fishing with live eels, bloodworms, crab, and grass shrimp over beautiful water without getting a strike.

Starting the engine, we trolled toward the Kent Narrows on our way home until birds were seen circling over surface-slashing fish in a cove just north of Wade's Point.

"We'd better think about getting through the Narrows before it gets dark," Capt'n Gibby observed after some fast action by all hands with this cove-full of small rock and blues, and again we headed home. But at the mouth of the Miles River, birds, rock, and blues were again in evidence, making life miserable and brief for scattering schools of alewives, and we couldn't pass them by, darkness and Narrows, notwithstanding.

And last Friday, Carroll Mumford with Jim MacKenzie, Earl Dawson, Mr. Lum, and Norman Slack aboard Capt. Charles Bradley Kerr's "Billy K" out of Rock Hall, caught 12 nice rock weighing from 2 to 5½ pounds, trolling bucktails near the bay bridge.

John H. Evans, outdoorsman and Newark school teacher, spent a stirring Saturday night a week ago in fishing with peeler crab and light tackle from the bridge over the Choptank, at Cambridge. John caught 17 nice rock, 36 big white perch, and one spot in this hotspot.

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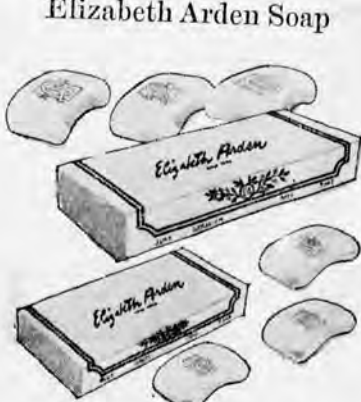
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
