Two-part project approved by Planning Commission

The Planning and Development Commission unanimously approved a major subdivision, parking waiver, and special use permit for two construction projects that will be located at 144-150 East Main Street and 21-27 Choate Street, and will be called, respectively, Kate's Place and Choate Street Townhouses.

The original plan was proposed by Independent Investors, LLC, owner of Klondike Kate's restaurant, in December 2011.

Lisa Goodman, of Young Conaway Stargatt & Taylor, LLP, representing Independent Investors, made the pro-

posal before the Commission at their February 7 meeting.

Both parts of the subdivision occupy 1.079 acres, but part of the site, .493 acres, is leased to the city as part of Municipal Parking Lot #4. This portion will be donated back to Newark as part of a long-term lease with Independent Investors and will allow the Parking Authority to reconfigure the lot to slightly increase the number of parking spaces.

The plan for Kate's Place calls for the demolition of the existing building, which will be replaced by a four-story building that will contain 2,760 square feet of retail space on the first floor and 22 two-bedroom apartments on the upper floors.

An artist's rendering of Kate's Place, as viewed from Main Street.


Christina Board calls for impact analysis on proposed Newark Charter School Expansion

The Christina Board of Education passed a resolution at its regular monthly meeting on February 14, stating the Board's concern that the impact of a proposed expansion of Newark Charter School "must be fully vetted to include an analysis of impact from the Christina School District to be submitted to the Charter School Accountability Committee before the public hearing on 3/7/2012."

The resolution also outlined that the Board was duly elected to govern the public schools of Christina, committed to the equity of access for all children in Christina, and "legally and morally bound to protect the interests of each of its schools, teachers, parents, staff, and taxpayers." It also stated that the Board recognized that choice is a critical component of success for many students, and recognized

that the state of Delaware supports charter schools with both "public dollars and empowering legislation."

Following the meeting, Christina Superintendent Dr. Marcia Lyles stated, "The District will immediately begin the process of developing an analysis of the impact of the proposed expansion on schools in the Christina School District so that data is available."

Bear woman arrested for convenience store robbery

The Newark Police Department has arrested Stephanie Augustine, 38, of Bear, for the strong arm robbery of the Sunoco Gas station located at 1106 South College Avenue.

On Sunday, February 19 at approximately 4:45 p.m., Augustine entered into the Sunoco Gas Station, picked up a small item for purchase and then approached the register. When the 16 year-old male clerk opened the register, Augustine jumped the counter. The clerk closed the register and retreated from Augustine, however, she grabbed the clerk and forced him back to the register advising that she had a gun. The clerk opened the register and Augustine removed an undisclosed amount of currency and fled the store.

Although he did not know her name, the clerk recognized Augustine as a prior customer and former resident of a local hotel. Later that evening

while Detectives were attempting to confirm her identity and locate her whereabouts, Augustine turned herself in to the Delaware State Police. She was arrested on the charges of Robbery 1st Degree and Assault 3rd Degree, and was released on \$25,250 unsecured bail. The 16 year-old clerk sustained several scratches during the incident but refused medical treatment.

Child Predator Task Force arrests Newark man on child pornography charges

An investigation by the Delaware Child Predator Task Force has resulted in the arrest

of a Newark man on charges of dealing child pornography, Attorney General Beau Biden announced. Gordon M. Riggs, 60, was arrested following the execution of a search warrant at his residence by Task Force personnel.

"The Delaware Child Predator Task Force continues to keep kids safe by going after child predators with the best training and technology," said Attorney General Biden.

An online undercover investigation into dealing child pornography led detectives to Riggs' residence at 29 Honeysuckle Drive in Newark, for which they obtained a search warrant. After executing that warrant on February 14, detectives seized four computers and other assorted digital media, which were taken to Delaware State Police Troop #2 for forensic examination. Riggs was also taken to Troop #2 for further investigation.

A forensic preview of one of the computers revealed over 25 images of child pornography, including an image of an

approximately 10 year-old girl with her genital area exposed. In an interview with detectives, Riggs admitted that he used the internet to look for child pornography. He also stated that he was unemployed and living off of a military pension, having retired from the Delaware Air National Guard in December 2011 after over 40 years of service.

Based on the interview with Riggs and the forensic previews of the computer, Riggs was arrested and charged with 25 counts of dealing child pornography. He was arraigned by videophone at J.P. Court #2 and ordered held on \$500,000 secured bail. Riggs was detained at Howard R. Young Correctional Institute in Wilmington.

Two Newark men arrested for selling drugs from convenience store

The Delaware State Police have arrested two people after the culmination of a two-month investigation into illegal drug sales from a north Dover store.

On Tuesday February 14, the Kent County Drug Unit executed a search warrant as a result of an investigation into the illegal sale of synthetic cannabinoids sold from the U.S. Gas and Lucky 7 Deli Mart, located in the 3100 block of North DuPont Highway in Dover.

During the execution of the search warrant, detectives located 24 single packets of "Cloud 9" which is a synthetic cannabinoid and over \$2,800 in suspected drug proceeds.




Alkaben Patel, 51, and Mu Kesh Patel, 61, both of Newark, were both arrested and charged with Drug Dealing (two counts) and Conspiracy 2nd. They were then arraigned at JP Court 2 and respectively released on \$22,000 and \$12,000 unsecured bail.

Man from Bear arrested after strong arm robbery


Delaware State Police detectives have arrested a Bear, DE man following a strong arm

robbery that occurred in the parking lot of an area pharmacy on Tuesday morning.

The incident happened at approximately 10:28 a.m. on February 14 after a 48 year-old Hartly, DE man had just exited the Stanton Pharmacy located in the 2000 block of W. Newport Pike, Stanton after having a prescription for medication filled. The victim was then approached by a male suspect, later identified as William H. Hinckle, who attempted to take the victim's medication. The victim, however, refused to let go, and began struggling with Hinckle. Both Hinckle and the victim fell to the ground at which point, Hinckle was able to wrestle the medication from the victim and attempt to flee through the parking lot. He was then chased by three witnesses who tackled him to the ground and held him until the arrival of an officer from the Newport Police Department who then took him into custody. The victim suffered minor injuries and was treated at the scene by responding EMS personnel.

Traffic stop leads to arrest of suspect linked to nursing home robberies
New Castle County Police

have arrested Shakeana Sims, a 25 year-old female who resides in the unit block of Egret Court in the community of Sparrow Run Townhouses in Newark, after it was discovered during a car stop that she was in possession of property that belonged to two residents of a nursing home where she is employed as an nurse's aide. On Monday, February 20, at 12:45 a.m., an officer was on routine patrol in

the area of Skyline Drive and Mermaid Boulevard when he observed a Ford Focus with a fictitious registration and initiated a vehicle stop. When the officer approached the car, he made contact with the driver, who was later identified as Shakeana Sims.
A computer inquiry revealed that Sims had several outstanding capias issued by the New Castle County Court


of Common Pleas. After Sims was transported back to county headquarters, Officer Carter found her to be possession of a stolen watch, bank card and blank check. Police learned that the property belonged to two elderly residents whom Sims cares for at the Kendal Crosslands Nursing Home located in Kennett Square, Pennsylvania.
Shakeana Sims was charged with several traffic offenses and receiving stolen property. She was arraigned and given a \$1,000 unsecured bail for the charge and committed to the Delores J. Baylor Women's Correctional Institute after failing to post \$1,500 secured bail as a result of the capias.

Pornography; and Possession of a Firearm in Furtherance of a Crime of Violence.
The indictment and related court documents allege that Reynolds met the 15-year-old minor on Facebook in late 2011. On January 17 of this year, the minor decided to run away from home and begin working as a prostitute for Reynolds.
Reynolds drove the teen and a 20-year old prostitute who was working for him from southern New Jersey to a Newark, Delaware hotel. Reynolds photographed the minor and the other female in lingerie and posted their images in advertisements for prostitution on a website.
On January 26, Federal Bureau of Investigation agents traced a phone number used in the prostitution advertisements to a Newark hotel, where agents found the minor with Reynolds and the 20-year-old female. Between January 17 and 26, 2012, both females had engaged in numerous acts of prostitution in various hotels in New Castle County. Reynolds received the money paid by the prostitution customers to engage in sexual acts with the minor and the 20-year-old prostitute.
During a search of computer and camera equipment seized from the hotel room on January 26, 2012, FBI agents found video recordings of Reynolds engaged in various sex acts with the minor and with the 20-year-old female. FBI agents also seized approximately \$2,000 in

small denominations and a loaded 9-millimeter handgun from the vehicle Reynolds used to transport the females to meet customers throughout New Castle County.
If convicted, Reynolds faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 years, to life, in prison on the sex trafficking and transportation charges. He faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 15 to 30 years in prison on the production of child pornography charge, and a maximum term of 10 years in prison on the possession of child pornography charge. He also faces a mandatory sentence of five years in prison on the firearm possession charge, with this 5-year sentence running consecutively to any sentence imposed on the other charges. Reynolds also faces a mandatory minimum sentence of 5 years to life, of supervised release following any prison term. He also will be required to register as a sex offender in any jurisdiction in which he lives, works or attends school.
This case is being investigated by the FBI and is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney Edward J. McAndrew.

Out of the Attic

This week's Out of the Attic item is an undated picture of an east bound Baltimore and Ohio Railroad passenger train stopped at the West Main Street crossing to board passengers at the B & O station on Elkton Road seen at the far left edge of the picture. The scene is thought to be from the earlier part of the 20th century. Note the horse and buggy by the station, the absence of automobile tracks in the roadway and the presence of electric power poles. The B & O tracks were laid through Newark in 1888, the third railroad to come to town. The first was the Philadelphia, Wilmington, and Baltimore Railroad that laid its tracks a mile south of Main Street, today's Amtrak northeast corridor line. The second was the Pomeroy Railroad that was built and operated under several names that brought track from Pomeroy, PA to Newark in 1868 then on to Delaware City. It ceased operation in the 1930s. The Pomeroy roadbed is now being redeveloped as a walking trail north from Newark to the state line through the White Clay Creek Valley. Newark was rather unique as a small town to be served simultaneously by three railroads. This was a significant factor in its transition from an agricultural to an industrial town in the 1880 to 1930 period.
Visit the Newark History Museum located at the historic 1877 passenger train station on



South College Avenue beside the bridge on the town side of the tracks.
The museum is now observing winter hours through March with visits by appointment only. Individuals, groups, clubs, or organizations are welcome to call 368-9845 for arrangements. Grand jury indicts N.J. man on sex trafficking charges involving 15 year-old

A federal grand jury in Wilmington has returned an indictment charging Usef Reynolds, 20, of Mays Landing, N.J. with sex trafficking and child pornography offenses relating to a 15-year-old female whom he met on Facebook and allegedly brought to Newark, Del. for prostitution purposes.
The five-count indictment charges Reynolds with one count each of: Sex Trafficking of a Minor; Transportation of a Minor with Intent to Engage in Criminal Sexual Activity; Production and Possession of Child

Delaware HEAL releases first annual report

The Delaware Coalition for Healthy Eating and Active Living (DE HEAL), in partnership with the Delaware's Division of Public Health (DPH), announces the online release of the first DE HEAL Annual Report, "Physical Activity, Nutrition, and Obesity Prevention Plan 2010-2014." This report, avail-

able at www.deheal.org, is a look at the efforts and progress of Delaware HEAL and its partners to reduce the prevalence of obesity and related chronic health conditions.

DPH studies show that in 2010, more than 416,000 Delaware adults — 64 percent of the adult population — were

overweight or obese, a clear and startling indication that this issue and the related chronic diseases it spawns are a major health challenge for Delawareans, creating significant burdens to the economy, families and business.

"It is very sobering to know that well over half of our adult population in Delaware is over-

weight or obese. Obesity is a serious health limitation in itself, a condition that can and often does lead to other serious chronic diseases, such as heart disease and diabetes. We must address this problem, and in a united and strategic way," said Dr. Karyl Rattay, DPH Director.

"As the burden of obesity and obesity-related chronic diseases continues to negatively impact the health of Delawareans, collaborative engagement is the key to reaching all Delawareans in the dynamic and diverse communities in our state," said DE HEAL Coalition Chair Brian Rahmer. "The commitment, resourcefulness, and expertise of DE HEAL members, along with the organizations and communities they represent, exemplifies the power of one common voice committed to providing people the tools to improve their health."

The HEAL Coalition has increased awareness statewide as well as developed and launched the website, www.deheal.org to further awareness and partnerships. Other progress includes:

Hosted a forum in New Castle County on access to healthy foods in urban settings

Prompted the Municipal Wellness Leadership Program. To date, the City of Harrington,

the City of New Castle, Delaware Greenways, Inc., and New Castle County have conducted environmental scans and developed Community Action Plans for chronic disease prevention in their communities.

Developed, tested, and launched two global assessment toolkits that identify healthy community resources:

The annual report continues to engage joint efforts of state and local government agencies, nonprofit organizations, business leaders, health care providers and insurers, and education organizations to support policy, systems, and environmental change strategies associated with individuals who are overweight, obese or who have related chronic diseases.


On March 22, in Dover, DE HEAL will host the fourth

annual summit, "Impacting Obesity Through Policy and Environmental Changes," to create context for conversation to raise awareness about the health impact of community design decisions. A statewide call for presentations was issued to garner local input on research, strategies and accomplishments on improving Delaware obesity and related chronic disease rates. Complimentary copies of the DE HEAL annual report will be available at this summit, but advance review of the online report is recommended for optimal presentation. Newark swimmers set to make "big splash" at State Championships

The saying goes that good leaders are born, not made.

Tyler Coffing was born in 1993 and Ian Moyer in 1994.

Fast forward to 2012.

This Saturday the Newark High senior co-captains will lead the Yellowjackets boys swim team down the road to Carpenter Sports Building for the final day of the DIAA Swimming and Diving State Championships. (Note — the event is sold out.)

It's only fitting, since they led the team all season.

"My two senior captains have taken over the leadership role on the team to the point where my job as a coach has become extremely easy," Newark coach Brian Polaski said. "They're leadership has been huge for the team."

Some born leaders don't like to lead. That's not the case with either of these young men, who someday hope to coach themselves.

"I connect with all the guys in a different way," Coffing explained. "We have a brotherhood. It's been an honor to lead these guys this year and an amazing experience swimming five or six days a week with them."

Coffing said he hopes to finish in the top eight in both his individual events (listed below), while Moyer's goal is to "podium" (place in the top three) his.

But like any good leaders, both quickly deflected any individual attention to back to the team.

"The team looks really ready for states," Moyer said with excitement. "Seventy-five percent of our swimmers made states. It's the highest level most of these guys have ever swam, so it's really exciting."

When the four-year lettermen climb out of the pool for the last time, their high school athletic careers won't be over. Coffing will move on to the lacrosse field and Moyer the baseball diamond. In the fall, both are attending Delaware, where they plan to swim on the club team. But before they officially become Blue Hens, they'll continue to hone their leadership skills at Nottingham Swim Club, where they serve as assistant coaches under Polaski.

"We've been learning the ropes from coach and maybe, if it works out, hopefully one day I can take over for him at Nottingham," Coffing, who plans to work in the sports industry, said with a laugh. "I think Coach Polaski is the best coach in the state. He'd certainly be my pick for coach of the year."

Moyer, who credits Polaski for "making me the swimmer I am today," admitted he'd also like to coach one day.

"I'd like to maybe be a head coach down the road," Moyer, who plans to study physical therapy, explained. "Teaching the kids how to swim and watching them have fun sort of lets me relive my childhood."

Coffing quickly chimed in that it's not just the swimming part of his childhood that Moyer likes to relive on the pool deck.

"It's fun watching Ian squirt the younger kids with water guns and horsing around with them and just having a good time," Coffing said with a laugh. "He gets along great with younger kids. He's a great role model for them."

Moyer pointed out that Coffing's ability to lead by example makes him a strong captain.


"Tyler brings an unbelievable passion to the sport," Moyer said. "He's extremely hyped up for all his races and that energy transfers to a lot of people."



Bank of America to expand over next three years

Bank of America announced it will add more than 500 jobs over the next three years to its Delaware workforce, Gov. Jack Markell announced last Thursday morning.

"Bank of America's commitment to add hundreds of jobs here is a strong endorsement of both the quality of our workforce and our State's commitment to the middle-class careers this industry supports," Markell said. "This industry has been one of the foundations of our state's economy for many years. We have people with the experience and energy to help these companies succeed. Looking forward, Bank of America sees a future that includes more Delawareans working to make them successful."

Bank officials and Markell are discussing the news with local Bank of America employees at meetings in Wilmington Thursday morning. Bank of America operates employment sites near Newark and at the former MBNA headquarters in Wilmington.

"Gov. Markell has always encouraged us to grow in Delaware. Along with the General Assembly, the congressional delegation and Mayor Baker, they have all created an exceptional environment for us to do business," said Co-Chief Operating Officer David Darnell. "While we continue to create a stronger, more efficient organization throughout our footprint, we are pleased to be able to do more in a community that is home to

thousands of our people."

Bank of America has been trimming staff in Delaware in the past decade after acquiring MBNA, which at one time had a workforce of 10,000 in the state. However, Bank of America refrained from massive restructurings and layoffs in Delaware.


The company refuses to release unemployment numbers, but the head count in Delaware is believed to be in the 6,000 to 7,000 employee range.

The news from Bank of America comes after the Federal Reserve Board approved the merger of Wilmington-based ING Direct and credit card giant Capital One. Capital One has pledged to add 500 jobs. - Doug Rainey contributed to this story.

He also taught in the Upward Bound Program at the University of Delaware and in the Jobs for Delaware Graduates program.

Keeping your Heart Healthy Means Eating Smart

February is American Heart month. There have been reminders online, in the supermarket and in our doctor's offices to take better care. Research shows us that if you eat right, you can reduce your risk of heart disease, diabetes, osteoporosis and certain cancers. But many people have a hard time putting the goal of healthy eating into practice. This upcoming course is for you.

Eat Smart for a Healthy Heart is a three-part program that includes education, cooking demonstrations and samplings of healthy foods. The program also includes basic information about heart disease, including risk factors, and other measures, such as exercise, that can impact cardiovascular health. We're taking registrations now for this series that will be held on March 20, 27 and April 3 from 6:30 – 8:30 p.m. at the New Castle County Extension office.

We feature recipes with little or no saturated fat, trans fat and cholesterol; little salt; low-fat sources of protein; and plenty of fruits, vegetables and whole grains. And teach that there are no 'bad foods,' that there are many creative ways to modify beloved old recipes into new, healthy favorites. We'll show you how to adapt your favorite recipes too. You'll learn ways to reduce the salt and fat without sacrificing the taste.

Each session focuses on a different part of the meal: desserts, main meals and sides. So you'll get to try some different recipes and learn strategies for

each of these important aspects of the meal.

Strategies for simple and quick food preparation as well as making healthy food choices when eating on the run are important to heart healthy eating. Cook once and eat multiple times is an important technique for manageable meal planning. As an example, cook a large meal at the beginning of the week. It is easy to double a recipe so that you have extra to use later in the week for quick lunches or dinners when you don't have time to cook. You can also freeze half for another day. Add a green salad or other side dish and you have a delicious easy meal.

Melissa Cox has travelled far since performing Jewel covers at open mic nights throughout the state.

Since her time as a high school student at Alexis I. duPont High School and later as an English major at the University of Delaware, Cox, a classically trained vocalist, has earned national and regional songwriting awards and opened for artists like the Spin Doctors, Sister Hazel, Smash Mouth, and Three Dog Night. As a solo artist and lead singer of the national touring Celtic Fusion band Mythica, she has also headlined scores of performances across the country. She returned to roots last Friday, however, for her first Delaware show in years, entertaining a packed room at Central Perk on Main Street with selections from her new album *Harmonious Maladies*.

Her second solo release, *Harmonious Maladies*, showcases the mezzo-soprano's powerful voice as well as her heartfelt versatility. An accomplished guitarist and mandolin player as well as vocalist, Cox deftly mixes genres and time signatures on the 11-track release, feeling just as much at home on the concept album's catchy, rock-infused love songs as she does on the more folk-centered numbers.

"I released my first solo album around ten years ago, and I wasn't really proud of the music at the time," Cox explained. "Harmonious

Maladies is my most experimental, honest, and emotionally open album to date. The concept of the album is juxtapositions and diametric ideas, and it's a departure from the Irish influence I do with Mythica—it's much more progressive." Although Cox explained that she was a writer before she was a musician, the Delaware native showed an early instinct for harmony and melody.

"My dad played guitar, and he encouraged me to experiment with it when I had nothing to do as a teenager," she said. "One afternoon, he gave me a sheet of chords and his guitar. I picked it up quickly, and within a month I had written my first song."

Now as an accomplished singer/songwriter, who cites Tori Amos, Porcupine Tree, Bjork, Massive Attack and Simon and Garfunkel as influences, Cox continues to focus on developing and challenging her sound. 



A feature of the site will be its step-back look, due to it having three floors in the front and four in the rear, which will raise it up for the construction of a 21-space covered public parking area at the rear of the building that will be controlled by the City of Newark as part of Lot #4.

The situation is unique to Newark, but was initiated, as Goodman stated, "to not have private parking in a public lot."

The Choate Street Townhouses will be a 7,000 square foot building consisting of five, four-bedroom townhouses apartments, along with garages for parking. The site will replace the old Casablanca Restaurant that is presently used for storage.

Members of the Commission applauded the Choate Street part of the project, in that it will hopefully usher in other projects that will improve housing in the neighborhood.

Safety was the biggest concern put forth by the Commission, especially for the Choate site, which will have alleyways that go into and out of the parking lot. Representatives with the project stated that sufficient lighting will be installed as a security precaution. Lot #4 is equipped with video surveillance cameras and an attendant who monitors the area, which can also help, should an event occur.

Liability over the covered parking area was another concern that was raised. Goodman assured the Commission that since the area will be under control of the Parking Authority, the city will be responsible for any damages, but that those parking in the area will have additional safety measures, such as fire suppression sprinklers, that are part of the building's design.

The final proposal will be put forth before the Newark City Council for a vote at a future meeting. Meeting agendas can be viewed by visiting www.cityofnewarkde.us.
