OUNCE OF PREVENTION

Prevention of disease is far better than trying to cure it after it occurs, says Dr. J. R. Downes, Director of the New Castle County Health Unit of the State Board of Health, in telling about the physical examinations carried on in the schools, an important part of which is the giving of toxoid for diphtheria and the vaccinating against smallpox. Both of these services are a definite part of the physical examination program and are entirely free but the New Castle County Health Unit does require that parents sign "consent slips" which the teacher sends home to the parent by the child and which the parent must return to the teacher after it is signed, in order to obtain the benefit of the free inoculation and vaccination.

Delaware has made an amazingly efficient drive against diphtheria, according to Dr. Downes, who cites the fact that there were no deaths from it in the state last year and that only 16 children contracted the disease, whereas, in 1925 there were 204 cases with 30 resulting deaths and in 1930 there were 127 cases with 20

However, if Delaware is to maintain this low number of cases, it is necessary to keep up the immunity of the population by seeing that as many children as possible have had the diphtheria toxoid. Dr. Downes stresses the fact that it is even more important to number of cases occur between the ages of one to six years. He states that both immunization for diphtheria and vaccination for smallpox are splendid forms of "life insurance" for every child. The New Castle County Unit's health officer advocates that babies be immunized and vaccinated as soon as possible after they reach their ninth month.

Though there has been no record of smallpox in Delaware for some years, the United States Public Health Service reports for the country as a whole show 110,672 cases in 1920. Vigorous programs for vaccination against this scourge were carried on and in have the younger children at home immunized because a great

NEWS IP THE WORLD OF RELIGION BY W.W.REID

According to rural sociologists of Iowa State College, Aross, Iowa, there are twelve types of community better-ment that churches should render the towns and open country they serve in America: (1) participation of church America: (1) participation of church members in community coincil to integrate activities of school, church and other agoncies; (2) use of church building for community activities; (3) members and leaders of 4H Club work in conditionary; (4) leaders and participants in home project work; (5) leaders are agricultural projects; (6) assistance to out-of-school youth groups; (7) leaders and activities in other fields; (8) projects and leaders contributed to civic education projects; (9) activities and leaders furnished for health and social welfare programs; (10) leaders of farm organizations; (11) economic cooperation of church members who are leaders of cooperatives; (12) programs to which pastor has contributed as member, speaker, or counselor.

"The church is not the state; and the state is not the church," said the bishops of the Norwegian Church (Lutheran) recently to the (German) Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs in Norway, "In external matters, the political power may attempt to exercise compulsion upon the church; but the church is a spiritual and sovereign body, built up on on the church; but the church is a spir-itual and sovereign body, built up on the Word of God and the fellowship of faith. The American Bible Society recently The American Bible Society recently shipped 4,000 English New Testaments to "Stalag VIII B, Germany" (a camp for British war prisoners). This almost unprecedented request is based on one of the very few communications that have been permitted to go out from such camps in Germany. For war refugees and prisoners in Europe, 3,200 Bibles and 58,000 Bible portions in seven languages have been shipped by the Bible Society; for Germans held pris-Bible Society; for Germans held pris-oner in Canada by Britian, 2,000 gospels

"No matter who wins the war, there is no hope for future order and stability unless we have some common Christian principles," says Dr. Roswell P. Barnes, of the Greater New York Federation of Churches. "If America can solve its problems on a Christian basis, this will be a demonstration that will hearten and guide the rest of the world. What is America going to have to suffer before she realizes what the world is to be? unless we have some common Christian

"In the first century, the church paid the price of the catacombs, the arena, prisons; today in Europe the church is in prisons and concentration camps. This does not mean its defeat, but its testing. The church in America must choose between pride and prestige in the community, losing its life to save all?"

The American Friends Service Committee (Quakers), which has relief workers in almost every war-torn country in the world, has joined the United China Relief and will enlarge its activities in Free China. The Committee now has a home in Shanghai for refugee Chinese children, and is aiding some 18,000 Jewish refugees from Europe who are stranded in China en route to other lands.
