VFW POST LAUNCHES DRIVE FOR MEMBERS

Campaign Seeks Vets Who Will Make Most Active Members

A drive for new members is now being carried out by the local Veterans of Foreign Wars, Post No. 475. Commander Drexel Harrington announced this week. Plans for the expansion of the post are also underway, he said.

The membership drive is being conducted along informal lines. Harrington pointed out, with no intensive plan of member solicitation being adopted. Eligibility requirements and the advantages of membership in the post are being explained to likely prospects. The program is designed to attract genuinely interested veterans, who will make active and enthusiastic members.

A number of activities aimed towards community betterment carried out recently by the post, were also announced. A donation of \$35 has been made to the Newark Recreation Association to assist with the playground fund, and another \$20 gift has been contributed to the school building fund of St. John's R. C. Church. Donations of food and clothing to the town's needy families have also been made. In addition, the post has contributed \$5 toward the activation of Post 1920 in Wilmington.

At present, VFW officials are considering establishment of a scholarship fund.

In connection with funds raised to expand the post, Commander Harrington this week extended public thanks for the support shown by the VFW Thanksgiving dance here, which proved an outstanding success. More social affairs of this nature are being planned, it was said.

Another new VFW policy here will be the presentation of weekly reports on the activities of the post.

Jean Lee To Head State Project Work

Expansion of the 4-H Club program in Delaware is noted, with the appointment of Miss Jean Lee, as State 4-H Club specialist in charge of girls' projects work, announces George L. Schuster, director of the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service.

Because the 4-H Club agents in Delaware are men, the need has been felt for a specialist to work with the girls' program, explains Director Schuster. Miss Lee will be in charge of leader training meetings for girls' work, preparation for dairy foods demonstrations and style reviews, will be largely responsible for planning 4-H events such as the annual short course at the university, and fair exhibits, and will maintain contacts with the National 4-H Committee in Chicago.

Miss Lee, a native of Le Mars, Iowa, attended Western Union College, La Mars, Iowa; Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio; and was graduated from Iowa State College in 1943, with a B. S. in home economics. For two years, she served as a head teacher in the Kaiser Nursery School, Portland, Oregon, and this past year, was head teacher in the Springfield Day Nursery, Springfield.

PERMANENT COMMISSION FOR BARKER

Local Resident Named 1st Lieut. In Regular Army

Capt. Leonard C. Barker, 16 Amstel Avenue, was among four residents of the state nominated for permanent commissions in the Regular Army by President Truman this week, according to a Washington announcement.

Barker, now stationed at Fort Winfield Scott, the Presidio, San Francisco, where he is an instructor in the department of gunnery and tactics of the Coast Artillery School there, was nominated as a first lieutenant.

Entering the service in April 1941, after receiving his commission in the Reserve Corps at the University of Delaware where he graduated, Barker was stationed at several coast artillery posts in this country, attending the Coast Artillery School at Fort Monroe, Va., and the Staff and Command School at Fort Lavenworth, Kansas.

In April 1945, he went overseas, serving in England, France and Germany and returning to the United States in June 1946.

Lt. Barker is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Barker of 515 North Franklin Street, Wilmington. His wife, the former Elizabeth Tiffany of Newark, plans to join him in San Francisco in March. Lieutenant Barker was well-known as an athlete at the university, serving as captain of the swimming team.

UNIVERSITY PROGRAM TO OFFER AIDS TO TEACHERS

3 Types Of Scholarship- Fellowships Are Offered

Three types of scholarship-fellowship aids will be available to prospective and in-service, teachers of the state during 1947, it was announced by Dr. W. Earl Armstrong, Dean of the School of Education at the University of Delaware this week.

These aids represent a portion of the program made possible by a \$50,000 grant to the university by the Delaware School Auxiliary. Fifteen scholarships of \$400 each will be granted to qualified high school graduates or university students who expect to teach in Delaware.

Forty fellowships of \$100 each for summer session work at the university will be granted to Delaware teachers, whose further training would be a step towards an improved school program as well as towards individual growth.

A maximum of four graduate fellowships for 1947-48, each carrying a stipend of \$800, will be offered to teachers in the state of Delaware.

A committee of faculty members of the School of Education at the University of Delaware will pass on candidates in all three categories.

A special committee of educators representing the public schools in Delaware and also the university has established criteria for the candidates for the student-teacher program.

Application blanks and further information may be obtained by writing to the School of Education at the University.

Competitive examinations for the fifteen scholarships will be held on February 8, from 10 a. m. to 3:30 p. m., in Wilmington High School, Dover High School and Georgetown High School. Interested students whose marks are in the upper half of the class, should report for the examinations at the center nearest their home.

DR. GRIZZEL TO TALK AT DOVER MEET

Facts On State School Survey To Be Outlined

Important facts about Delaware's school system are expected to be disclosed at a meeting in the Dover High School field house on Thursday, February 6, when Dr. E. D. Grizzell and Dr. Walter O. Cocking, the former chairman and the latter a member of the impartial committee of nationally known educators which recently completed a state sponsored critical survey of Delaware's public school system, will speak for the first time at a public gathering in Delaware and answer questions from the floor.

The meeting is being sponsored by the Council for Delaware Education, Inc.

The last general assembly authorized an intensive survey of Delaware's educational system, and set up the Delaware School Survey Commission to administer the investigation. At the request of this commission, the American Council of Education undertook to make the survey, selecting a committee of experts to do the job. Dr. Grizzell and Dr. Cocking were among these experts. Dr. Grizzell being named chairman of the group. Some of the committee's recommendations, sharply criticizing certain aspects of Delaware's school system, were made public last week.

The public will have its first opportunity, on Feb. 6, to question two of the educators who made this recent study of our public schools. The two speakers are also expected to comment on the legislative program proposed by the Council of Delaware Education, Inc., including its recommendation for increases in teachers' salaries. This legislative program was announced by the Council at a meeting in Wilmington on Jan. 21.

Dr. Grizzell is a professor in the School of Education at the University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Cocking is chairman of the board of editors of the American School Publishing Corp.

TALK ON OIL RESEARCH AT ROTARY CLUB

Martin Outlines Reclamation Of Exhausted Wells

An interesting discussion of newly developed methods for reclaiming exhausted oil wells was given by Don Martin, research expert for Hercules Company, at the weekly dinner session at the Newark Rotary Club, on Monday night, with Vice-President William S. Hamilton presiding.

Opening his talk with a historical sketch of the discovery and use of oil in this country, Mr. Martin said oil deposits were first uncovered in Pennsylvania around 1800 by a Jesuit priest from Canada. No notice was paid the black wealth until 1858, from which date the Bedford fields were intensively developed and worked until by 1900 the wells were practically exhausted.

A fortunate accident, he said, led to the discovery of a method for revitalizing many of these wells. A faulty casing in one of the shafts permitted water to leak, thereby washing surrounding sands to such an extent that later oil was forced into adjacent wells. The water, it appears, had exerted pressure on the residue of oil in the sands of the apparently exhausted well and forced it into neighboring wells. Experts now use this method deliberately with the same result.

SPECIAL BILL IN ASSEMBLY TO EASE NHS BUDGET ILLS

Proposed New State Measure Asks Boost In School Funds

Concern felt by local school authorities over the \$55,000 reduction by the state in the Newark School's budget request for the 1947-48 biennium was eased somewhat this week following an announcement that state officials intend to introduce a special bill in the State Legislature calling for additional funds to cover vital items which were cut sharply in school budgets throughout the state.

While the bill will benefit public schools in the state generally, local officials were told yesterday that the proposed measure, which seems virtually certain of passage, carries a special Newark appropriation of \$12,500 for repairs to the school building. Thus, one of the most critical items on the Newark budget, which was cut sharply in the original estimate, will be sufficiently provided for.

Second most pressing budget problem facing Newark authorities is the need for additional funds for teacher salaries. No provisions for such funds are included in the new bill, it is believed.

Plans for a meeting of the New Castle Teachers Association, composed of faculty members from schools throughout rural New Castle County, which will be held at the local school on February 21, were also announced this week. The session will be in charge of Harry A. Meuser, principal of the Marshallton School.

Speakers will be Dean W. Earl Armstrong, of the University of Delaware; Dr. T. D. Smith, director of membership for the National Educational Association; Dr. George R. Miele, state superintendent of public instruction; the Hon. Fred P. Hare, public relations head for the Pennsylvania State Education Association; and Dr. F. P. Hare, who will exhibit a color film on the "Magic of Ireland."

FEDERAL JOBS OPEN

Information At Postoffice

The Civil Service Commission recently announced examinations for probational appointment to the positions of Clinic Psychologist, Training Specialist, and Junior Administrative Clinical Psychologist positions are located in the Veterans Administration in Washington, D. C., and throughout the United States. The salaries range from \$4,149 to \$7,102 a year. There are no age limits, and competitors will not be required to take a written test.

Salaries for Training Specialists range from \$3,297 to \$5,905 a year. The positions are located in Washington, D. C., only. The age limits, 18 to 62, are waived for persons entitled to veteran preference. No written test is required. Ratings will be based on the applicant's experience, the amount and kind varying for each successive grade of the position. For the lower grades, appropriate education may be substituted for part of the required experience.

The positions to be filled from the Junior Administrative Technician examination are located in Washington, D. C., and other states.

Applications for the Clinic Psychologist examination will be accepted until further notice. The closing date for the receipt of applications for Training Specialist positions is February 4, 1947, and that for Junior Administrative Technicians is February 11. SEEK HIGHER MILK OUTPUT

Dairies To Study Efficiency Means

The most important issue before Delaware dairymen at this time is efficiency of milk production, cautions Delmar J. Young, extension dairyman, Delaware Extension Service.

The outstanding factors to bring about more efficient production, says Young, are better management, better feeding practices and better breeding programs.

Young specifically calls dairymen's attention to the fact that better feeding practices are frequently neglected at this season of the year. He says that recently he has observed that in a number of herds in the state all cows are receiving the same amount of grain. Grain, he adds, should be fed according to each cow's production and condition. To maintain a cow's body and to produce milk, high producing cows require more nutrients than lower producing cows.

To aid in better management and breeding practices as well as better feeding practices, Young recommends that more dairymen become members of local Dairy Herd Improvement Associations and dairy breeding units. Through such organizations dairymen place their milk production on a business-like basis that weed-out costly and inefficient practices.

Boasts Three Top Producers

Three registered Guernsey cows, owned by Pete Zeitler, Glasgow, have set state records, according to an announcement this week by the American Guernsey Cattle Club.

Duet's Blossom of Waverly has turned in the highest record in the state

for a junior three-year-old, producing 18,342 pounds of milk and 503 pounds of butterfat in 305 days. The other two champions in the Zeitler herd are Beneva's Bessie, which completed an outstanding Advanced Register record of 16,335.1 pounds of milk and 710 pounds of butterfat for a year, while Melinda's Little Rose turned in a creditable Advanced Register record of 10,050.8 pounds of milk and 465.6 pounds of butterfat in ten months.

Elizabeth Zeitler, of Glasgow, also has won honors with her registered Guernsey cow, Sister Sue of Green Acres, which produced 12,027 pounds of milk and 608 pounds of butterfat for the highest record in the state by a senior four-year-old milked twice daily for 305 days while on test and carrying a calf.

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HOMEMAKERS SIGN RECORD MEMBERSHIP

Over 1700
Enrolled In
Farm Clubs

A total of 1766 homemakers are enrolled in the 54 home demonstration clubs in Delaware, according to a report made this week by Miss M. Gertrude Holloway, State home demonstration leader. This represents an increase of 148 over 1945 enrollment and makes the 1946 enrollment the largest on record.

1941 reports showed the next highest enrollment with 1740 members—3 clubs with 69 members, are colored.

Reports made by members to agents show that changes in homemaking practices have been made in 2716 homes in the State, 879 of which were reached for the first time in 1946.

Two new clubs were organized during this past year; one at Wilmington Manor in New Castle County by Miss Nancy Kelly, home demonstration agent, and one in the Shawnee area near Milford by Mrs. Alma Smith, Sussex agent. A club was reorganized in the Hickman area in Kent County by Mrs. Violet Goodwill, Kent County home demonstration agent.

The home demonstration program is conducted largely through organized clubs ranging in membership from about 12 to 75. The clubs meet regularly each month, when programs relating to home economics are presented by the home demonstration agents or by leaders from the groups, who are trained to present the programs. During 1946, nineteen training meetings were held for these leaders with 511 leaders attending. Miss Louise Whitcomb, home management specialist for the Delaware Agricultural Extension Service, Miss Adeline M. Hoffman, extension clothing specialist and Miss M. Gertrude Holloway, State leader and nutrition specialist conducted these training schools assisted by the agents.

Predicts Continued Newsprint Shortage

George Olmsted, Jr., of New York City, chairman of the Book Paper Manufacturers Association, predicted recently a continued shortage of newsprint.

"There will be a very bad shortage of newsprint in this country because newsprint manufacturers in Canada and Scandinavia will find that other grades for export to the United States will be more profitable," he told the Committee on Reciprocity Information.

"This shortage of newsprint," he said, "will have a vital effect on the free press of this nation as well as on the price of newsprint."

The committee is gathering information on tariffs for use in trade negotiations with 18 nations. Olmsted urged that the present duty on newsprint be retained.

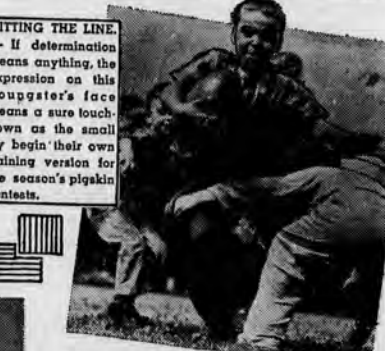

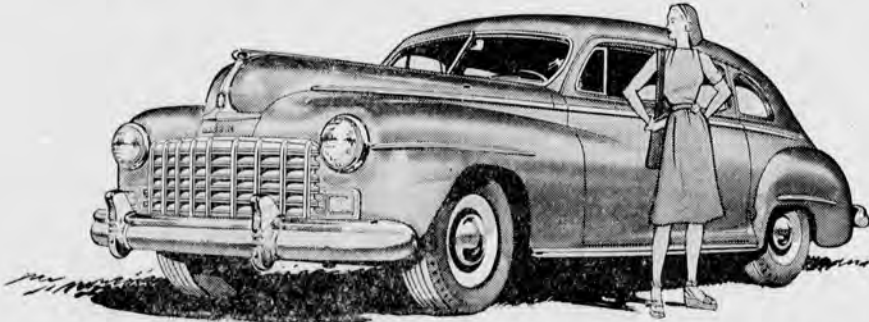

JAYCEES' BANQUET

Marks Founding Of Nat'l Group

The Newark Jaycees celebrated the 20th Anniversary of the founding of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce last Thursday with a banquet at the Charm House.

The speaker of the evening was W. Earl Armstrong, Dean of the School of Education of the University of Delaware. Dean Armstrong, who has traveled widely in Mexico, presented a vivid impression of life in that country. Stating that prosperity within a country is, in the main, dependent on a strong middle class, industrialization, and an effective educational system, the speaker drew parallels between Mexico's struggle to become an economically stable country and the more complex but equally violent economic upheavals taking place in our own country.

An interesting question and answer period followed the main talk.

LEVIN AND CARNERA IN MAT SHOW

Levin's Showing Against Sexton Earns Him Bout

Dave Levin, the Jamaica Butcher Boy, as a result of the game battle which he gave Champion Frank Sexton in their title bout last Thursday night at the State Armory, has been named to oppose Primo Carnera, the Ambling Alp, in the feature one-fall to a finish bout this week at the Armory.

Levin and Sexton battled to a draw when state curfew law forced stoppage of the contest. But Levin was so impressive against Sexton that he was the logical choice to meet the gigantic Italian.

Carnera, a former world's heavyweight boxing champion, has made two appearances here during the current season, defeating Benny Rosen of Chicago in the first, and pinning Texas Babe Sharkey in the second.

Matchmaker Jimmy Houghton has built up a strong supporting card composed of four half-hour one-fall bouts that feature some of the best grapplers in this section of the country.

The semi-windup pits Texas Babe Sharkey, former mat tilist, against the extremely unpopular mat villain, Abe Stein of New York, in a bout that might well steal the show.

Experts Relent: Say Mom Can Cuddle Baby

Take it from Dr. Milton J. E. Senn—it's perfectly all right to cuddle and coo at baby, and even to feed him on his schedule rather than yours.

Dr. Senn, associate professor of pediatrics in psychiatry at the Cornell medical school, told a meeting of Maryland Nurses' organizations recently that indulging junior's whims at times may even prevent dire consequences.

The newborn infant, he said, can suffer psychological injuries with physical manifestations if his "individual rhythm" is disturbed by a rigid regime.

Dr. Senn declared: "There is an emotional need for occasional cuddling and rocking to allay the sense of fear, insecurity, and even—later—of guilt."

Farm Living Standards May Rise Above Urban

A leading industrial forecaster declares that "a life of luxury" is the near offing for the United States farmer that will bring his standards of labor beyond city standards.

The widespread adoption of industrial machines and methods on United States farms is transforming the average farmer into "a business executive in boots—a professional man in overalls," says Charles W. Moore, director of research for SKF Industries, Inc., in a report on farm mechanization.

The farmer of the immediate future will have the benefit of a score of new developments aimed at eliminating traditional rural drudgery, Moore declares.

The farmer's wife will share in these benefits, too. With machines doing most of her work and modern transportation and communications keeping her in touch with the social world of her choice, she is now well along toward the leisure regarded as normal by the average urban housewife, Moore says.

DEL. SCHOOL HEADS MEET

Joseph McVey, president of the local school board, and Wilmer E. Shue, superintendent of schools, attended a meeting of the State School Directors Association, Monday, in Smyrna, which passed, without a dissenting vote, a resolution backing the program of the Council for Delaware Education, Inc. The Council's much publicized plan calls chiefly for increased teachers' salaries and other measures aimed at improving Delaware's educational system.

Other local men attending were Dr. Earl W. Armstrong, dean of the school of education, U. of D., and R. W. Heim, university faculty member and state director of vocational education.

The speakers were Henry Troy, president of the CDEI; W. B. Simpson, head of the Delaware State Education Association and Dr. Emmitt D. Grizzell, chairman of the recent state-sponsored school survey in Delaware. The latter outlined school needs in Delaware as disclosed by the survey.

Dr. Grizzell also disclosed some of the facts brought to light by his commission, listed the function of school directors and boards as follows: Determine policy; select a chief school administrator; appraise the execution of the educational program with a view to improvement; and finally, prompt community growth through the school and its program.
