Even I feel sure cannot believe to Argentina but there can even be worse than that! The Code is gone, as Bramson says. The government has gone too far. What they have done will have wide implications, and what the B. A. Government tells us, is really infantile.

I am interested in the news from Buenos Aires. I still doubt if the matter will come to trial. I hope not. It can't do any good in any way and can do a lot of harm.

We have Kate Mearl from Lewis
Delaware staying with us and Marion &

saying too much. The colic's pains
are gone, but the doctor assures me
he can take care of this Malice
fever (contagious fever). It is most
~~un~~ uncomfortable and worrying,
and I don't feel like doing any-
thing. In my heart I feel the doctor
is on the right track.

I hope your mother is better, and please
give her our love.

Do tell your father how much Marion
and I will be thinking of ~~them~~ her
on the 23rd.

Marion gives in love to you
& Jane and I hope to write you
news from here soon. They love
their presidential Candidate now
and most every one seems very happy.
