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MORELOS-MEXICO  
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Dear Doug:

This is just a short note to thank you for your letter of Nov. 25.

We spent the week end as usual at Cuernavaca and the Millers and Glenn Abby were with us. This week the Ellis & Stevens will be with us. The treatment for Colitis has certainly helped me, and so does the treatment for the Waller knee, but that at the best will be a slow operation. There seems to be a Jason, or a job, for me & a few days I have an attack of "touretta" the first since I am in Mexico, and the doctor has advised me to stay at home for a few days.

There isn't much new here. A friend of ours from Lewis, Delaware, Kots Meull, has been with us for over a month, and is leaving for home tomorrow. Floyd Reason has had what the doctors think may have been a slight coronary, and has been in the hospital for several weeks but is home now. Anne has been in the slots to be with Mary Ann,

while she was having her first baby, and it has been quite a problem to keep Anne from knowing that Floyd has been sick. He is getting on well but will have to slow up his pace for he goes to work in business as well as going out at night. Brewster Stoddard has been told by his doctor to stop home at night for at least 3 or 4 weeks - he is very busy, and you know how he likes to go out at night. Anna Dominic seems to be catching up prematurely with a lot of us here. I wish there is <sup>nothing</sup> serious wrong with Brewster, but he goes too hard. Don't mention Floyd Rawson's illness to any one.

I'm sorry that we could have been with you on your father's last day. I hope your mother is better. I will be writing again soon, - with little one is obliged to do - one does very little.

I don't think Peron has at his command anything like the amount of money you mention. He is a very unquiet man, and while I feel he can't return in any capacity to the Argentine for years, he can make a lot of trouble, and his followers can make work in Argentina. The situation there has not improved, and will not until some strong man can get control, and that I see more difficult now.

The candidate for the Presidency here is as good as one can expect, but I see things slowing up here unless the government stops this looking to Europe for help which can come in only much limited amounts.

Shannon, who took Gen. Bradburn's place in the Embassy, died about ten days ago in his sleep, and he apparently had had no heart trouble to his knowledge. He was only 47. It was quite a shock
