Johnny Long and his band, with Barbara Hammond, vocalist, will be featured at the Inter-fraternity Ball on Friday, November 19 from 9 p. m. to 1 a. m. in Carpenter Field House.

A new feature of this annual event will be the naming of an Inter-fraternity Queen. Each fraternity will put up one girl and Dean Hocutt and the other chaperones will select a queen from the group.

E-52 Players Announce Production Of Play 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'

"A Midsummer Night's Dream," one of Shakespeare's most humorous and witty comedies, has been announced by the E-52 University Theatre as its next production to be presented in Mitchell Hall on the nights of Dec. 9, 10, and 11.

Dr. C. Robert Kase, chairman of the Department of Dramatic Arts and Speech, began directing his cast of 20 early last week with line rehearsals in the lobby of Mitchell Hall. Full rehearsals will begin in Mitchell Hall next week after the University Drama Group's "Harvey" closes.

In the cast are several veterans of the E-52 stage, including a third-time guest performer from the faculty, Dr. Cyrus L. Day of the English Department. In this production he will be seen as Egeus, a father jealous of his own authority, determined that he will be obeyed, even if he has to use the whip.

In his two previous E-52 appearances, Dr. Day first did the prologue to "Twelfth Night" which was presented late in the 1930's. He was last seen on the stage four years ago when he did the part students on campus still remember—Father in "Life with Father."

UD To Be Center For Teacher's Exams

The University of Delaware has been designated as a testing center for the 1955 nationwide administration of the National Teacher Examinations. The one day testing session will be held February 12, 1955.

College seniors preparing to teach and teachers applying for positions in school systems which encourage or require applicants to submit their scores on the National Teachers Examinations are eligible to take the tests. The examinations are prepared and administered annually by the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey.

Applications for the examinations and a bulletin of information describing registration procedures and containing samples (test questions) may be obtained from Dr. W. A. Pemberton, assistant Dean of Students in his office at 112 Hulihan, or directly from the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassau Street, Princeton, New Jersey.

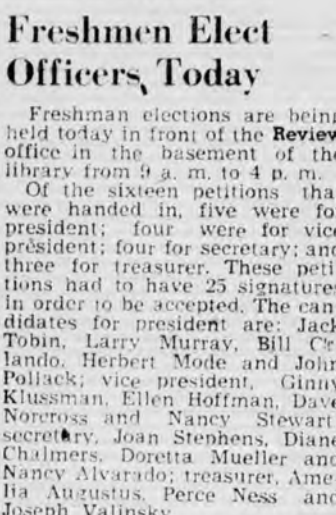

Purnell Hall Object Of Early American Architectural Study

Purnell Hall, constructed in the 1850's, is one of the buildings on the campus with the most interesting and least known history. Although somewhat reconstructed, it still remains an object of study for students interested in early American architecture.

The ivy-covered west wall is noted for its beauty and perfection of proportion. A winding staircase, a fireplace in each room, and old fashioned window glass are remnants of the period when it was the residence of the Chamberlain family.

Sold to Mr. and Mrs. John Evans in 1870, it remained in their hands for another twenty years. After the death of the Evans family it became the property of Kappa Alpha Fraternity until 1906 when it was purchased by the university as a student union. Not more than a year later it became a library for the school until 1916.

It was during this period that the floor dividing the first floor from the second floor was removed in one of the rooms to be made into a reading room, providing extra space for air circulation. The small porch and columns were also added at this time.

After 1916 the building was used consecutively as a YMCA, the headquarters for the Local Board for New Castle County and as offices for the army examining physicians. Later, the English and history departments of the university moved in and even later the Alumni Office and Placement Bureau, which it now houses.

The history of Purnell Hall has been one of constant change from hand to hand over the years. Several families and organizations have carried on their activities within its walls and, if history repeats itself, will probably continue to do so for some time to come.

New York Graphic Society Presents Modern Art Show Of 'Limited Edition' Prints

Mr. Lubin of the New York Graphic Society presented his company's show of modern art composed of two hundred fifty signed "limited edition" prints last week. This show contained wax impression reproductions. The show featured the first good Chinese reproductions on silk which have never been available before.

Mr. Lubin, who has shown this exhibit to many New England Colleges, such as Amherst, Smith, Williams and University of Massachusetts, suggested that our art gallery ought to have more and better lighting. "Student interest and appreciation was excellent," Mr. Lubin stated, "and I would like to bring the show to Delaware again."

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Contemporary Music Festival Honors Pulitzer Prize Winner

The Music Department of the University of Delaware will hold its 10th Annual Contemporary Music Festival on November 17th and 18th on campus. Guest composer and visiting scholar for the occasion will be Douglas Moore, head of the Department of Music at Columbia University.

Mr. Moore, a graduate of Yale University, is an accomplished composer, author and teacher. He has studied composition with Ernest Bloch in this country and with Nadia Boulanger in Paris. Before his appointment to the faculty of Columbia University in 1936, he had been Curator of Music at the Cleveland Museum of Art.

Three of his friends, all American poets, who have influenced his writing are: Archibald MacLeish, Vachel Lindsay and Stephen Vincent Benet. In 1951 he received the Pulitzer Prize for his opera, "Grants in the Earth." Besides this, his compositions include other operas, songs, choral music and instrumental music.

College. From there the students will march down S. College Avenue and pick up the girls at Warner Hall. Then they will proceed to the stadium where the bonfire will be held.

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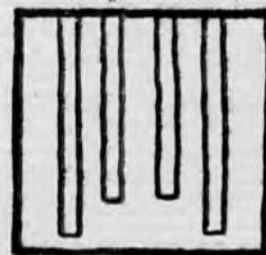

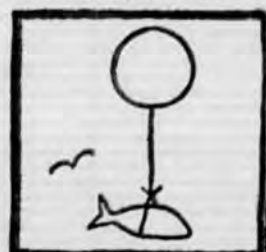

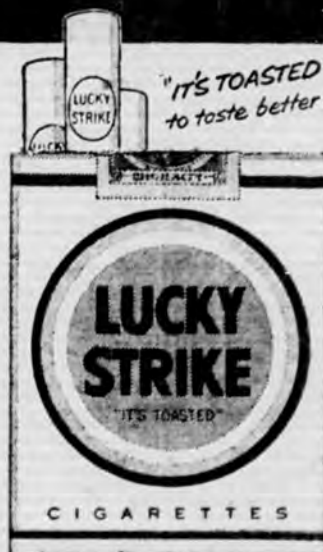

As A Man Thinketh

The university of the middle ages was the gathering place of great men; the place where they assembled to share their learning and ideas. Today, though the main purpose of a university is to prepare young people for earning a living, it is still a place of ideas. The University of Delaware, due to its policy concerning religious instruction, limits the free exchange of religious ideas.

For this reason, while the student is acquiring the facts necessary for his future vocation, his religious beliefs fail to keep abreast with his intellectual development. When one comes to college and is confronted with new theories and ideas which offer conflict to his religious beliefs, he finds his childhood beliefs are wholly inadequate when he tries to resolve them with his newly acquired academic learning.

His failure to resolve such conflicts does not prove that those beliefs are untrue, but rather that his religious development has lagged far behind his academic work.

It seems unfortunate that the student should cast off religion when confronted with new knowledge just because he has not had the opportunity to develop and widen his beliefs in conjunction with his academic pursuits.

The program of Religious Emphasis Week is an attempt to compensate for this deficiency in our university. This week's activities will enable the student to discuss vital religious concerns with outstanding rabbis, priests, ministers, and educators who are competent to work with students and their individual problems. These leaders will be on our campus from Sunday through Thursday of next week.

They will be available for classroom visitations, as well as seminars and smokers. Participation in the dormitory and fraternity smokers will be a valuable opportunity for all. We urge everyone, faculty and students alike, to take advantage of this program.

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Concert Notes

The first concert of the current Artist Series was held on Thursday evening, November 4, in Mitchell Hall. The featured artists were the Philadelphia Woodwind Quintet. They played to an unusually large and appreciative audience.

The men who make up this group are: Sol Schoenbach, bassoon; William Kincaid, flute; John de Lancie, oboe; Anthony Gignot, clarinet; and Mason Jones, french horn. All occupy the first chairs in their respective instrument sections of the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra and teach in the Curtis School of Music. They have had many extensive tours throughout this country and abroad. Constant searching of the music for their instruments and constant practice have made them accomplished musicians with an extensive repertoire.

The program presented last Thursday night contained selections from both the classic and the modern periods of music. As their first number they chose "Divertimento in B-flat Major," by Joseph Haydn. This is in four movements. Especially noteworthy in their reading of the work was the smooth and exact attacks and releases. It made for very fine interpretation. Haydn was the first of the great composers to write for these instruments, since the clarinet was invented during this period, and the other instruments were improved to allow greater facility in playing.

The "Quintet in E-flat, Opus 88, No. 2," by Anton Reicha, started out with long chords and was marked by running passages for the various instruments. Especially effective was the work of the bassoon.

The "Suite No. 1, Opus 11," by Nicolai Berezowsky, was very humorous and very dissonant in tonality. Each instrument had a job to do, and each did it without particular regard to the others. Even the piccolo came in for a share in the fun.

A Trio, "Divertissement," for oboe, clarinet and bassoon by the modern French composer, Jean Francais, was played in the United States for the first time in this concert. This was written in the modern idiom, lively and bright, but not profound in thought.

"Trio Pieces Breve," by Jacques Ibert, another modern Frenchman, was the last number on the formal program. In each of the three pieces a different instrument was featured: the oboe in one, the clarinet in another and a duet between the flute and clarinet in a third. They were pleasingly melodic and ended in a lively manner.

As encores the Quintet played "Walking Tune," by Percy Grainger, and "Scherzo," by Eugene Bozza.

Taken For Granted

In the early evening of November 2, the Democrats in the state of Delaware were celebrating their resounding victory. Many Delawareans who were watching the returns on Philadelphia TV stations were amazed to see a clean sweep for the Democrats in all the higher offices up for election, when in most states enough votes had not been tallied to even establish a trend.

Immediately, everyone became an expert analyzer in order to determine the multitude of reasons for answering that impossible question: WHY?

1. Were the Republicans handicapped by traditional off-year voting trends? Did the voting machines have any effect on the outcome of the elections? Both these factors can be practically ignored.

2. Did the fact that there were no increases in income (real or otherwise) for the hourly and salaried workers since the last election have an effect? In all probability it did, for the party in power always seems to be blamed for any cyclical movement of the business cycle.

Was unemployment a factor? Although unemployment was relatively low in Delaware as compared to some other states, this factor has the characteristic of "snowballing." Not only is the vote of the unemployed at stake, but possibly that of his wife, children, and even friends and neighbors. This, then, was also a factor.

3. Is the voting tendency of Delaware as a whole becoming more Democratic or Republican? Statistics may show the former, but for a single election, rather than consideration of the long-run, it is probably insignificant. What is of much greater importance is an analysis of the already established voting trends of the newcomers to the state's populace. This could very well be Democratic in nature; but who can be sure.

If both parts of number three are true, the Republicans have real work ahead.

4. How about local issues and the reported split in the Republican "hierarchy"? Ask and all you'll get is: "Quien sabe?"

5. Segregation. Ah, here is the answer. About two weeks before the election we asked a friend, who believed there would be a Republican victory, about this issue. He said that any effect in the two lower counties would be off-set by the New Castle vote. What did he find on election day as he went from door to door seeking Republican votes in a Wilmington ward?

"Have you voted?" he asked one gentleman who responded to his knocking.

"Are you a Republican?" his neighbor inquired.

"Yes."

To quote the next reply is impossible, but it suffices to say that the breakdown in segregated education and Republicanism were synonymous to him and that he was highly displeased.

This was a typical example our friend said, and it wasn't long before he realized that the segregation issue was going to have a real effect.

From the time the gun sounded, the Delaware thineclads held the front positions. Led by Dan Marini, Richie O'Connor and Paul Ciacio, the host of blue shirts of the U of D stayed ahead of the pack through the first mile.

Running with his phenomenally relaxed stride, Marini set the pace for 3 miles until overtaken by Joe Rouse of Baltimore Olympic Club.

Clyde Louth made his move up through the crowded field late in the race. Within a mile of the finish, Louth quickly moved from thirteenth to fourth place.

Richie O'Connor ran his usual steady race finishing sixth. Dick Lawrence sprinted across the finish to claim the No. 9 spot for Delaware.

With Frank Davidson out with a leg ailment, Wally Cook gave his finest effort of the year by finishing eighteenth in the large field. Wally has been improving throughout the season and should be of great value to the Hens at the Middle Atlantic today.

Turn-Out Small For Basketball Squad As Thirteen Men Report For Practice

Thirteen men, one of the smallest turn-outs in recent years, have reported for varsity basketball practice, which began in earnest last week. The squad is composed of two seniors, seven juniors, and four sophomores.

So far no individual stars of the calibre of a "Skip Crawford" or a "Frank White" have appeared, and therefore, Coach "Whiz" Wisniewski is pointing towards developing sound, versatile, all-around team which can readily adapt itself to any offense or defense.

Along with the strong emphasis on offensive and defensive fundamentals, the coach is going to put particular stress on defense. He believes that too often basketball coaches concentrate on high-scoring and neglect good defense. A team which can hold down its opponents' score does not have to score as many points to win as a team engaged in a free-scoring game.

The club has been hurt by the loss of 6 ft. 7 in. Jim Kinch through ineligibility. Height will be supplied by two 6 foot 5 inch juniors, Dallas Green and John Waddington, and by senior Pete Kelleher and Sophomores George McKelvey and Sid Kugler, who are all 6 foot 4 inches.

Coach Wisniewski said that in all probability senior co-captains Pete Kelleher and Don Miller will be the nucleus of the team. All other positions are considered wide open. The remaining juniors are Bob Messick, 6 foot 0 inches; Ed Swiatkowski, 6 foot 3 inches; Neal Keough, 5 ft. 8 inches; and Russ Trimmer, 6 foot 0 inches, a transfer student from York, Pennsylvania. Jim Smith, 5 foot 11 inches, and Clyde Louth, 5 foot 8 inches, are the other sophomores.

The varsity season will begin on December 4.

Lafayette Reaches Peak Against Hens

Easton, Pa., Nov. 6 (Special)—The Lafayette College football team is beginning to find itself and should reach its peak in the remaining two games of the season with Delaware at Newark tomorrow and Lehigh in the traditional game here next week.

The playing of the Maroon grid-ders in the last two games against Bucknell and Gettysburg has heartened Lafayette followers and indicated better things to come.

Lafayette Coach Steve Hokuf is especially pleased with the development of two reserve quarterbacks, Don Raymond, a junior from Vandergrift, Pa., and Jack Bitting, a sophomore from South Orange, N. J.

The two, filling in for injured George Bartlett of West Orange, N. J., did a commendable job in the last two games, both in running the team and carrying the ball.

Hokuf is pleased with the general improvement of the Lafayette team as a whole, both on the line and in the backfield. Norm Dion, of Oxford, Mass., junior back, is pressing for leadership in ground gaining from scrimmage.

Delaware's Fighting Blue Hens, victims of one point losses for two successive weeks, return home this Saturday to meet Lafayette. Eking out a 12-7 victory over the Easton, Pa. team last year, Coach Dave Nelson's eleven will try for their second win in Middle Six competition this year. Lafayette, ending the '53 season with a 5-6 record, has totaled three wins against four defeats this year. Gettysburg was victimized by the Lafayette Leopards, 20-6, two weeks ago. Muhlenburg, Delaware's other nemesis, overcame the Leopards, 27-0.

Last weekend Delaware lost its second game by a 14-13 score. Gettysburg's hard charging forward wall caused the Delaware team to fumble in the crucial points of the game. Delaware fumbled 10 times and failed to score twice, while inside the opponents' 15 yard line. In the final minute of first quarter, Gettysburg scored on a pass from quarterback Gagliardi to fullback Bob Epelman. Reserve quarterback Jim Soltesz converted and Gettysburg led 7-0.

Delaware came back in the second quarter as halfback Andy Wagner ran 26 yards for a Delaware touchdown. This play climaxed a 74 yard march by the Blue Hens. Jimmy Flynn converted and the score read 7-7 at halftime.

The Blue Hens went out in front in the final minute of the third quarter as Jimmy Flynn ran 25 yards through the Gettysburg line for a Delaware score. Flynn's all important extra point attempt was no good and Delaware led by a 13-7 margin.

Later in the third quarter Gettysburg took the lead as quarterback Jim Soltesz threw a 12 yard pass to halfback Dave Lichtenfeld for the tying score. Soltesz again converted as a 14-13 score.

In the season opener this fall, only team last season to defeat the Leopards topped Albright, 26-0. Successive contests found the Leopards dropping close games to Carnegie Tech 23-21; Bucknell, 7-0; and Rutgers, 7-0.

Tomorrow's game will be the tie breaker in the series between Delaware and Lafayette with each team having four wins over the other.

In 1914, the first game of the series, Lafayette blanked the Blue Hens 41-0, for Delaware's only loss of the season. Very consistent, the Eastonites scored 31-0 and 44-0 triumphs in 1915 and 1921.

Delaware's rise in football prowess caught Lafayette at a disadvantage evidently, for the Hens have won four times in the last five years losing to Lafayette only in 1950, 7-9.

Soccer Team Seeks Third Win Tomorrow Against John Hopkins

Tomorrow morning at 11 a.m. the Blue Hen booters will play host to Johns Hopkins University on Frazer Field. Delaware will be going after their third victory for the year. They also will be trying to avenge the Blue Jays' 4-1 victory of last year.

Hopkins will bring with them a fine team, but Coach "Whiz" Burham feels confident that the Blue Hens will be up for this one.

Delaware ran into tough luck last week as they lost to Lehigh 5-4 and Drexel 3-0.

The Lehigh game, which was played on election day in a sea of mud at Bethlehem, was Delaware's game until the last quarter. This is when Lehigh got hot and scored three muddy goals. Co-captain John McLaughlin was high scorer for the Hens with three goals.

Last Saturday the frosh placed third in the Del-Mar-Va Championships at Baltimore; being beaten only by the Delaware Varsity and the Baltimore Olympic Club. Four freshmen earned medals for their performances. Paul Ciacio won a 7th place medal, John Skillern an 11th, Ken Callaway a 12th and Perce Ness a 15th. Medals were awarded to the first twenty to finish.

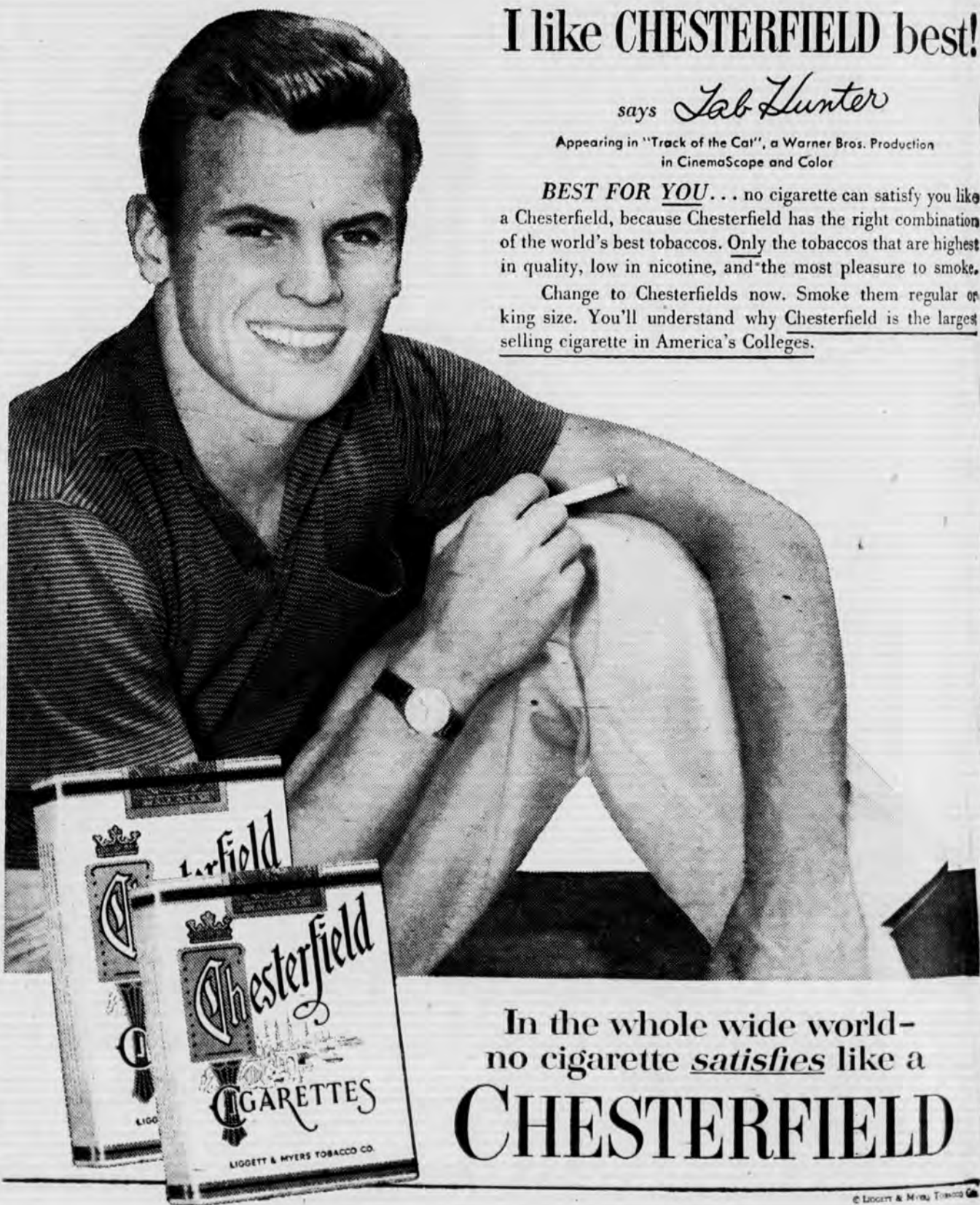
