

Newark Gridders Face Brown Tomorrow Night At Home

Yellowjackets Seeking Second Victory Of Season.
They Ended 1951 Season On Line; Coach Dave Nelson
Townsend Wins Starting Quarterback Position

Tomorrow night at 8:15 p.m. the Newark High School Yellowjackets will be seeking their second win of the young season when they meet Brown Vocational of Wilmington on the home field.

At the same time the charges of Coach Fred Spasato will be looking for their seventh straight win over a two-season period. The Yellowjackets finished the 1951 season with five straight victories and added the sixth last Friday night with a season-opening 32 to 0 conquest of Elkton High School.

Coach Spasato admitted this week that he was well pleased with the opening effort of the club against Elkton, especially the defensive play.

The Yellowjacket mentor was high in his praise of Jack Cleaver and Jerry Truskey, members of the defensive backfield, and Alvon Sparks and Joe Thorpe, defensive linemen.

Offensively the locals were handicapped in the early part of the game by a series of fumbles and were not able to score of their own initiative during the first half. Both of the first half scores, one in the first and one in the second quarter, came on intercepted passes. Ivo Thorpe, linebacker, had the honor of scoring the first Newark touchdown of the year when he snagged an Elkton pass early in the first period and ran 40 yards for the score.

Jerry Truskey, defensive back, tallied the second touchdown in the second period when he lugged an intercepted pass across.

Bobby Townsend, diminutive quarterback, finally got the Newark offensive clicking with the beginning of the second half and had a hand in two scoring efforts. A 20 yard pass to Dave Hurn gave the Yellowjackets their third score of the night and a little later Townsend himself bulled across from three yards out to notch the fourth. Dave Hurn tallied his second and Newark's final touchdown in the final quarter when he took a running pass from the arm of Danny Palmer into the end zone.

Coach Spasato announced this week that Bobby Townsend has won the starting quarterback post from Jake Shew, who started the Elkton game, and Arthur Boulden will start at center against Brown in place of Bill Wetzel.

Despite the fact that Brown Vocational will start the season with only four lettermen from last year's team which the Newark club trounced 21 to 7, Coach Spasato is wary of the charges of Joe Bradshaw and is preparing for a tough battle.

All this week he has had several men practicing hard on extra point kicking, a department which was less than brilliant last week when only two out of five were successful. Elkton 0 0 0 0 0 0

Delaware Set For Gettysburg In Saturday Night's Opener

Bullets Will Put Five-Game Win Streak With Which They Ended 1951 Season On Line Coach Dave Nelson Has Blue Hens In Excellent Shape For First Game

Sporting a five game winning streak carried over from the 1951 season and led by a new coach, John Yovicson, assistant coach last season, Gettysburg College will provide the opposition on Saturday night for the University of Delaware football team's opening game. The Wilmington Park contest will begin at 8:15 p.m.

With four weeks of strenuous practice behind them the

Blue Hens have been pronounced ready for the opener by Head Coach Dave Nelson, and with the exception of Jimmy Carbonetti and Jimmy Cooper, will be at full strength for the opening whistle. According to Coach Nelson and his assistants the main concern for the coming season will be the lack of depth in the line. If the Blue Hens are able to avoid injury to such stalwart linemen as Capt. Paul Mueller, Frank Hielg, Johnny Maccariello, Frank Serpico, Ben Mountain, and Bob Trivits, the chances for a successful season will be excellent.

On the other hand if several of these players should be hurt for any appreciable time during the year, then the Delaware coaches will have a difficult time finding comparable replacements.

This lack of capable replacements is no problem in the backfield, however, for according to reports issued during the past four weeks of practice, the team boasts a wealth of excellent backfield material with eight or nine candidates fighting for positions in the offensive backfield.

At the present time, reports indicate that Don Miller, sophomore passing star, is about the only sure starter. Likely starters at the other three positions appear to be Joe Scarica, diminutive seatback, at the tight halfback spot; Kenny Reith or Bob Haggerty, last year's freshman sensation, at left halfback; and either Rocco Carzo or Carbonetti.

While Coach Nelson has not announced the complete starting line, several positions have been definitely assigned. Fairly certain of starting posts are Capt. Paul Mueller and Frank Serpico, ends; Frank Heilig, tackle; Johnny Maccariello,

guard, and Frank Gyetvan, center. Howard Graham and Johnny Williams are fighting for the remaining guard slot while the battle for the remaining tackle position is between Bill Doppstadt, Charlie Searfoss and Steve Butcher.

Speculators Move To Potato Field

Speculators in swarms have moved into the potato market, with results that are as yet unpredictable for potato farmers.

With potato prices decontrolled by Congress, what used to be a relatively quiet futures market has become one of the liveliest on the commodity exchanges.

The Office of Price Stabilization, although it no longer controls potato prices, is watching them carefully because of the effect they may have on substitute foods which it does control.

High potato prices and a switch by housewives to cheaper substitutes would not only affect the farmer according to OPS, but would also erect price pressures on the substitutes.

So far Maine potatoes have been the principal object of attention from new speculators all over the country. All past trading records have been smashed.

Trading volume on the Mercantile Exchange last January was 1487 carlots; in June it was 1918. By July it had jumped to 3263.

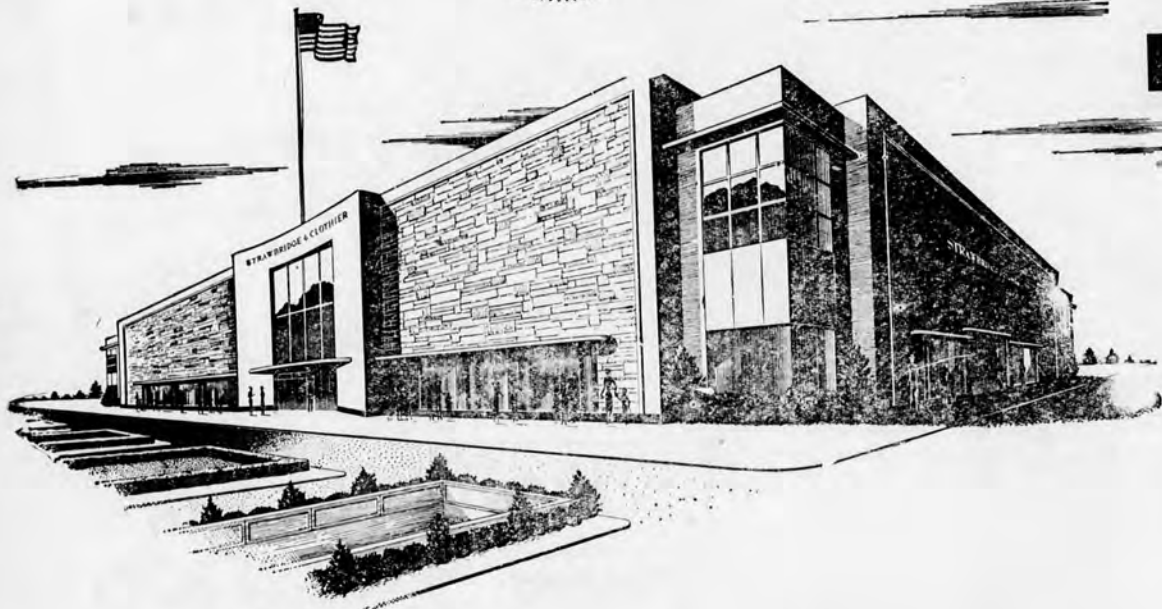

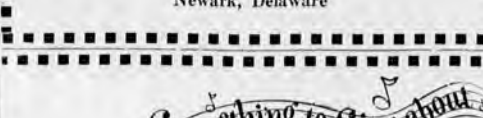

Beef Cups With Potatoes Au Gratin



Homemakers seeking new ways to serve favorite foods will welcome this entree.

If one were to take a poll of America's favorite dishes Hamburger and Potatoes Au Gratin would certainly be near the top of the list. Here the two dishes are combined to make an unusual dinner entree.

To make the main course as pretty as a picture and just as good to eat, serve broiled pineapple slices and tender, bright green asparagus spears with the Beef Cups.

Pass a basket of crisp, margarine rye toast. The slices of rye bread, spread with good, fresh margarine, can be placed on the broiler rack along with the pineapple slices. Both will be done at the same time.

BEEF CUPS WITH POTATOES AU GRATIN

Beef Cups
1/2 pound ground beef
1/4 cup bread crumbs
1 teaspoon grated onion
1/4 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt
Dash pepper

Creamed Potatoes
1/2 medium-sized potatoes, peeled and diced
1/4 cup milk
2 tablespoons fortified margarine
Salt and pepper
1/4 cup grated cheese

To make Beef Cups: Combine beef, bread crumbs, onion, milk, salt and pepper. Mix well. Line ungreased 8-inch muffin pans with the meat mixture to a thickness of 1/4-inch.

To make Creamed Potatoes: Place diced potatoes in a saucepan with

milk. Cover and cook slowly for about 20 minutes. Remove cover and cook over low heat until thick. Add seasonings and fill meat cups. Sprinkle grated cheese over each cup. Bake in a 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Yield: 5 to 6 Beef Cups.

A Hymn Is Born

Nearer My God To Thee
A Dying Actress Reads The Bible

In 1827 a tall beautiful woman with regular features, walked off the London stage, broken in health. When she was five years old her mother had died of tuberculosis. Her only sister had contracted the disease and now Sarah Flower Adams had played her last role as "Lady Macbeth."

Partially regaining her health, Mrs. Adams turned to writing verse, dramatic poems and hymns, drawing "inspiration" from the latter from the time in 1849 when she was 35 years old, the actress was reading the book of Genesis when she came across the story of Jacob at Bethel. This was the theme for what has been called the greatest hymn ever written by a woman. It was among thirteen from her pen to appear in print the following year.

While nursing her sister, Ellen, Mrs. Adams broke completely. She lingered two years after her sister died in 1846.

On September 19, 1901, every city in America paused in silent prayer for five minutes . . . and to sing the assassinated William McKinley's favorite hymn. He had whispered its title as a dying prayer.

"Nearer, My God To Thee" has rarely been sung since the sinking of the luxury liner Titanic, in April, 1912, without associating it with that marine disaster. As the few life boats pulled away with their cargo of 600, all hope was lost for those left on deck. The ship's band went down playing a composition by Lowell Mason, the dean of hymn-tune writers, as 1,500 helpless souls sang the words of a dying actress who had read the Bible and, like Jacob at Bethel, had a vision of being drawn . . .

Nearer my God, to Thee,
Nearer to Thee;
E'en though it be a cross
That raiseth me;
Still all my song shall
Nearer, my God, to Thee.

Though like the wanderer,
The sun gone down,
Darkness be over me,
My rest a stone;
Yet in my dreams I'd be
Nearer, my God, to Thee.

Or, if on joyful wing
Cleaving the sky,
Sun, moon, and stars forgot,
Upward I fly,
Still all my song shall be,
Nearer, my God, to Thee.

There let the way appear,
Steps unto heaven;
All that Thy handest me,
In mercy givest;
Angels to beckon me,
Nearer, my God, to Thee.

Train, with my waking thoughts
Bright with Thy praise,
Out of my stony griefs
Bethel I'll raise;
So by my woes to be
Nearer, my God, to Thee,

And in my olden days,
When I am all alone,
Still all my song shall be,
Nearer, my God, to Thee.
