





## Delaware Federation Of BPW Clubs Wins First Place \$1,000 For Traffic Safety

"women's protective instinct." Mrs. Rosella T. Humes of Harrington, president of the federation, accepted the awards at a luncheon in Chicago on Oct. 19 during the National Safety Congress.

The Carol Lane Awards are made annually to nine women or women's groups for outstanding achievements in traffic safety. Award judges are women leaders in safety, club activities, and public life. Three awards are made in each of three categories: rural areas and towns of less than 25,000; cities of 25,000 and over; and for statewide programs.

The Delaware Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs won top award in the statewide category.

The Delaware organization's driver retraining program was established to give all 475 driving members of the Federation's 21 clubs the advantage of advanced training through the "Smith System of Driving."

With the help of the Delaware Safety Council, two instructors of the Smith System were located and two members of each club in the Delaware Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs of which the Newark BPW Club is a member, has received the first place award in a nationwide traffic safety program.

The National Safety Council has announced that the Delaware Federation was awarded first place in the 1961 Carol Lane Awards for Traffic Safety, the only national program honoring women for their work in this field.

The program is administered by the National Safety Council through a grant of Shell Oil Co. and is named for Shell's women's travel director.

The top award went to the Delaware group for its programs of driver retraining and its support of proposals for additional state patrolmen.

The nation's dairy farmers have a new trademark! For the first time a registered trademark that symbolizes the natural goodness of milk and milk products has been adopted, and Dr. Wilbur H. Hesseltine, University of Delaware dairy specialist, reports the new symbol was unanimously approved by dairy farmers at the recent annual meeting of the American Dairy Association.

The symbol which is now beginning to appear on American Dairy Association promotional materials will provide a standardized identification in all phases of the association's program, Hesseltine emphasized.

Since the trademark is registered, its use is controlled by the American Dairy Association and member units.

The new trademark includes a background of the sun and suggests that dairy products are basic and come from nature itself.

The stylized classic figure of a woman suggests the antiquity of the dairy industry, has consumer appeal and gives a strong impression of quality and reliability.

The drop of milk, which forms a pitcher, suggests all dairy products by emphasizes milk.

## Eight Volunteer As UD French Teachers In Gratitude For La Garde-Freinet Trip

Eight students are repaying the University of Delaware for a trip to Europe last summer by teaching French classes after spending two months at Newark's twin city in France, La-Garde-Freinet.

The students, now juniors and seniors at the university, are Wayne Brown, of Bridgeville; Barbara De-Courcelle, Wilmington; Sabra Elliott, Georgetown; Joyce Hopkins, Harrington; Judith Langkammerer, Wilmington; Jacqueline Harding, Kennett Square, Pa., and Sally McPherson and Gil Rindard, of Newark.

Dr. Kimberley S. Roberts, chairman of the department of modern languages, who accompanied the group to Europe, explains that the

purpose of the experiment is threefold: to help relieve the teaching shortage within the modern language department, to give students an opportunity to see France, and to encourage young people to go into teaching.

To repay the university which underwrote the trip, each student is teaching a course in either elementary or intermediate French, and conducting work in the language laboratory and remedial sessions—a total of eight hours' work a week.

By utilizing the services of students as classroom teachers, older staff members can devote attention to advanced instruction and research work.

Once in the classroom, the student teachers are on their own, although they have outside guidance from Dr. Yvonne N. Mahru, in charge of elementary instruction, and Filomena Giammarco, supervisor of intermediate teaching.

They receive no compensation for teaching, either monetary or in credit hours, and must take a normal undergraduate course load.

Their host in France was Alfred Max, mayor of La-Garde-Freinet, an alumnus of the University of Delaware and a frequent visitor to Newark.

Students boarded with families in the town in the mountains of southern France, about 12 miles from the Mediterranean. The town's population is 1,200.

Although there was time for pleasure, including a short visit to Paris and occasional bus trips to other areas of the country, education continued throughout the two-month stay for the Delaware students.

Dr. Roberts conducted daily classes in advanced conversation, composition and grammar, and local artist Yves Jouannaud, gave instruction in French civilization.

The experiment has its roots in an earlier University of Delaware program—the "junior year abroad" idea that was abandoned at the time of World War II.

The teaching-foreign study program is the second innovation in the French curriculum this year. The other is the establishment of a French House, a dormitory for language majors, under the direction of Miss Giammarco.

There is no charge for this program which will continue during the school year.

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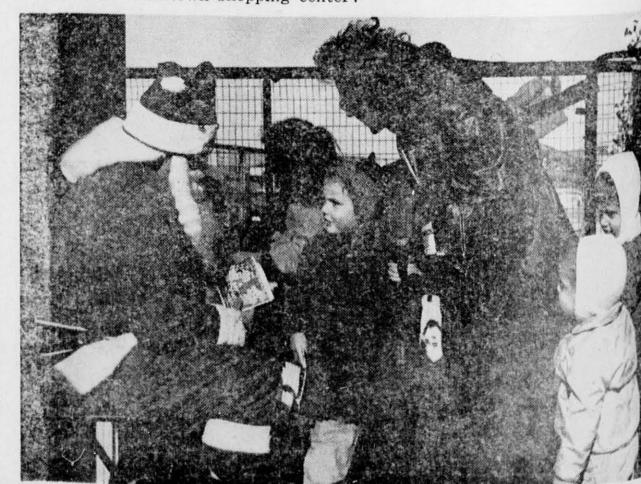

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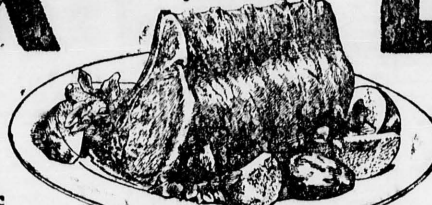

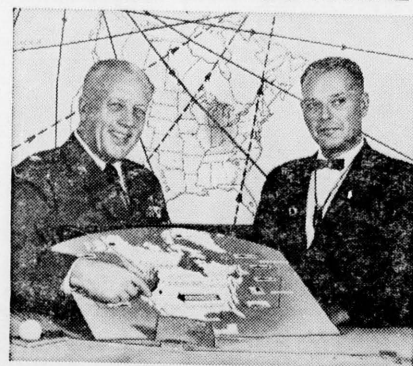

Plans to obtain federal aid for low-cost housing construction to improve sub-standard living conditions in Newark were attacked and defended in a torrid discussion at the meeting of Newark City Council last Tuesday night.

## Trio Wrecks Auto In Fear Of Chase By Newark Police

Speeding Car Crashes At Experimental Farm After Station Burglary

A speeding car was wrecked last Tuesday when three occupants believed they were being pursued by Newark police for breaking into a service station.

Patrolman William Brierley was sent to investigate a burglary at the Flying A Service Station, on South College Avenue after police had been informed by passersby that three persons were seen breaking into the building.

The officer found that a plate glass window on the south side of the building had been broken and the intruders had apparently crawled through the opening. Inside, Brierley found desk drawers and a cash register had been rifled and some change taken.

In the stock room area, a locked door had been forced and some antifreeze stolen.

The trio told police later that they saw a car jack of them as they drove off, and suspecting it was a prowl car increased their speed.

As they approached the University of Delaware Experimental Farm, the vehicle went out of control, smashed into a tree and damaged some shrubbery.

The car, damaged extensively, was found a short time later by Patrolman Brierley. The stolen antifreeze had been removed from the abandoned car by the occupants before Brierley arrived.

The officer's subsequent investigation led to the arrests of the three. He said the loot is expected to be recovered.

Meyers also said that persons whose homes were condemned and torn down by the city under its minimum housing ordinance over the three-year period prior to the time the units are ready, will receive precedence for occupancy.

Meyers said the Authority is co-operating with the city in the placement of units which are expected to be in groups of four and will not necessarily put them up only where sub-standard housing is torn down.

However, he continued, one of the objects of the public housing law is to attempt to raise the general level of family living in a community by providing better living quarters for low income families.

He said that even though the city, county, and school district are giving up some revenue, the improved dwellings in the projects should enhance the neighborhoods and the whole city.

The three agreements will be forwarded to Washington within a few days, Meyers said, and then the PHA will make its first unit for the Authority of \$200 per unit for the preliminary survey, including selection of sites and architects plans.

The Authority then must return its plans to the PHA within 60 days for approval.

**New Greaseless Frypans**

Cited By Katharine Jones

If you don't like the taste of greasy fried foods, you'll welcome the new non-stick, greaseless frypans. M. Katharine Jones, New Castle County home demonstration agent, says the new frypans have a resin coating which prevents foods from sticking as they cook.

The success of nonstick frypans may depend on how well home-makers follow the manufacturer's directions. Manufacturers recommend using only moderate top-range temperatures.

Miss Jones warns against using metal scraping utensils or scouring pads.

Warm soapy water and a cloth will clean any of the new frypans.

## Bray Cites Pesticides For High Food Standard

Pesticides play a vital role in the production of high quality foods in the United States, says Dr. Dale Bray, University of Delaware entomologist. They contribute to the most efficient agriculture in the world, and help make Americans the healthiest and best fed people on earth.

Pesticides can, and are, doing these things without endangering public health, says Bray. The important thing is to use them according to directions on the label.

There have been no cases of death or even illness traceable to pesticides used according to label instructions, he says.

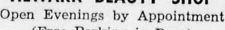

## Villanova, Uconn, Gettysburg Return To Hen Grid Card

Coach Dave Nelson Lists Nine-Game Schedule 1962 For Fightin' Blue Hens

Delaware will resume football relations with Villanova, Connecticut and Gettysburg in 1962, David M. Nelson, director of athletics and head football coach, announced this week.

Villanova and Gettysburg will be away games, but Connecticut will play at Delaware Stadium on Oct. 27.

Delaware defeated Villanova 10-6 in 1955, in the only game between the two schools. Villanova, a major-league team, swept to a 7-2 record in 1961.

Gettysburg becomes the fifth Middle Atlantic Conference opponent on the Blue Hen's nine-game schedule, replacing Rutgers, still on the 1962 docket but no longer a league member.

The Hens also will meet Lehigh, Lafayette, Temple and Bucknell in MAC competition.

The Hens thrashed Gettysburg 38-0 in 1955, the last game in the series which stands at six wins for Delaware, five for the Blue Hens. Gettysburg had a 3-5-1 record in 1961. Connecticut, member of the Yankee Conference, returns to the line-up after a three-year break and the Huskies 28-0 in their last meeting in 1958.

The Blue Hens, who compiled a 4-4 record in 1961, open at Lehigh on Sept. 22.

Lafayette opens the Hens' home stand at Delaware Stadium on Oct. 6. Home contests with Rutgers and Bucknell will close the season.

The Hens again will meet Buffalo, away, after opening relations with a 36-12 win over the Bulls in 1961.

Hofstra and Ohio University are off the schedule next year.

Delaware is expected to break its home attendance record set in 1961, and Raymond B. (Scotty) Duncan, assistant director of athletics, said season ticket applications should be filed early to insure choice seat locations. They are being accepted now at the athletic office.

## Delaware Soccer Team Led By Sam Allen Under Coach Gene Watson Hailed "Best"

The 1961 Blue Hen soccer team may have been the best in the university's history.

Under Gene Watson, second-year coach, Delaware's boosters compiled a 6-4-1 slate, established one record, and equaled two in the process.

The Hens scored 24 goals, a new season high; won six to match a 1941 mark, and tied the record margin of victory by a Delaware squad with a 6-0 whitewash of Muhlenberg.

Captain Sam Allen, senior half-back from Wilmington, was the big gun, with six goals. He rates as a league and national post-season team prospect.

The attack was well distributed with Al Roberson, of Newark; Hans Kirstad, a special student from Norway, and King Boynton, of Wilmington, each contributing four goals.

With a squad of only 15 members, the Hens had both the spirit and the stamina to play full time. Fortunately, injuries were held to a minimum.

"Winning the Washington College game got us off to a good start," Watson said.

It was the first victory over the Shoremen since 1951. Another booster was a 2-0 win over Johns Hopkins, the first time the Hens had scored on the Baltimore college since '55.

Watson said much of the Hens' success was due to a fine senior corps. He listed Allen, Bill Ziegler and Rick Jones as key seniors. Ziegler, goalie from Rohrtown, Pa., made 231 saves or 22 a game.

While the Hens' offense was adequate, it was not outstanding, which put added pressure on the defense. Delaware held opponents to 18 goals, less than two a game.

Allen and Buddy Gordon, of Hatfield, Pa., at halfbacks; Hayler Osborn, of Havertown, Pa., and Ziegler, were defensive standouts.

John Matlack, who played virtually every position, was a tremendous asset both ways, according to Watson.

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## Scholato Elected Delaware Captain For 1962 Gridders

Former Sallies' Star, 200-Lb. Tackle Named To Succeed Grossman

Center John Scholato of Wilmington, has been elected captain of the University of Delaware 1962 football team, succeeding Bill Grossman, a tackle from Palmyra, N. J.

Scholato was acting-captain for several games in 1961 when Grossman was out of the line-up with an eye injury.

He follows a long tradition which has seen linemen elected captains for the last 11 years.

The 210 pounder was rated the Blue Hens' best interior lineman during the past season. Scholato's most impressive performance was his complete mastery of Rutgers All-American Alex Kroll. He was the Hens' defensive signal-caller and linebacker throughout the '61 campaign.

Scholato, a junior, was cited by Nelson and Line Coach Mike Lude for his aggressiveness. He was a standout as a freshman and was a reserve guard his sophomore year prior to his first level center assignment.

Scholato came to the university with solid training under Salesianum Coach Dim Montero.

John Scholato is the second home-grown center to serve as Blue Hen captain in recent years. Mark Hurm of Newark, led the Hens to an 8-1 Lambert Cup season in 1959, was honored by All-East and Little All-America recognition, and played in the post-season Copper Bowl game.

Duncan Hails 1961 Chicks In Address For TD Club Delaware Freshman football coach Scotty Duncan addressed the final luncheon meeting of the season for the Newark Touchdown Club last Monday at the Newark Country Club, citing the 1961 Blue Chicks as the best he has seen at Delaware.

"This is the first season we've had two complete lines with little to choose between the two," Duncan declared.

Guard Ron Bianco, Fullback Brian Barriera, and Quarterback Dick Laxton were praised particularly by their coach for fresh performance.

Duncan termed Laxton "the best athlete at the university."

Last year Newark finished 15th. On Dec. 9, Aneda will compete with 84 other professional golfers in the Goodwill Professional Championship, a separate 18-hole tournament.

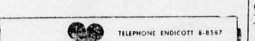

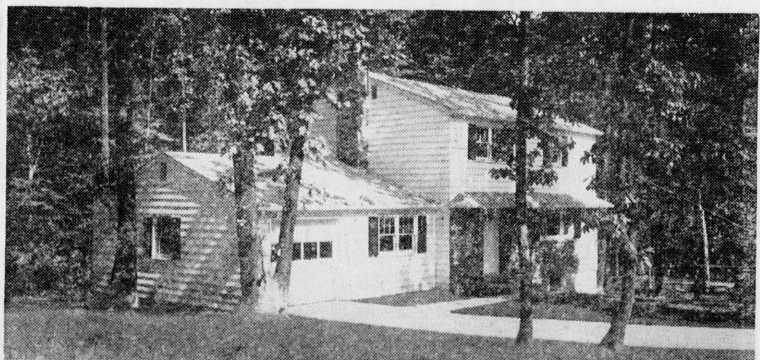

## Wheat Subsidies Cited By Zimmerman Of ASCS

Wheat growers have been urged to get all the facts in making their decision about cooperating in the 1962 wheat stabilization program. The caution applies especially to producers of soft red winter wheat, which is in a better marketing position for export or domestic consumption, than most other classes.

According to Jacob Zimmerman, chairman of the state agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, the more favorable situation regarding this class of wheat is largely the result of heavy subsidization of exports by the federal government.

In recent years, about one out of every five bushels of red winter wheat has been exported, and practically all of it has been subsidized by the government.

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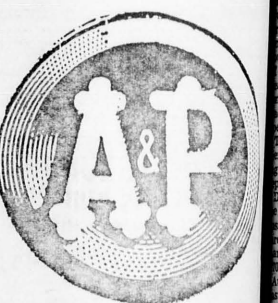
