Board Of Education Appoints Safety, Personnel Executives

State Supervisor Of Driver Education Namer To Head
Newark District Transportation Safety; Ronald Finch
Of Christiana High Appointed Asst's Personnel Chief

The Newark Board of Education appointed a supervisor of school transportation and safety, and an assistant director of personnel at its meeting last Tuesday night.

Robert A. Massafieri, state supervisor of safety and driver education, will become supervisor of school transportation and safety for the Newark special school district next May 1, and Ronald M. Finch, assistant principal at Christiana High School, will become assistant director of personnel for the Newark district on July 1.

Massafieri, who holds a master's degree in safety education from New York University, has held the state job since 1963. The board set his annual salary at \$15,100.

Finch is an assistant principal at Christiana High School, completing work for his doctorate. His salary figure has not been set since he has not assumed his post until the next fiscal year.

Also last Tuesday night, the board received a detailed presentation of operations of the CDMN Data Processing Center in the administration building on East Main Street.

The data center, which began four years ago, is a cooperative venture used by the Conrad, Dickinson, Marshall and Newark school districts.

Certain business operations, report cards and various student lists have been computerized in the Newark school system.

Data Processing Support
William B. Keene, a member of the Newark school board and principal of Brandwine Springs Junior High School, said after the presentation that "most of our teachers are enthusiastically supporting data processing."

In other action, the board announced plans to continue the usual summer school program.

Gilmore B. Ott, principal of Christiana High School, headed a committee to investigate the possibility of a 12-month school program.

The board was notified that Kelly Credit Service, Inc., has mailed out notices for more than \$4,000 in delinquent caption taxes and will have a report of collections at the March meeting.

Catharine Bonney Named For Shell Fellowship Grant

Mrs. Catharine B. Bonney, science supervisor for the Newark school district, has been invited to accept a Shell Merit Fellowship for study this summer at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y.

Planetary director, and director for the Outdoor Laboratory, Mrs. Bonney is one of 35 high school science and mathematics teachers selected by Cornell for the program, according to Shell Companies Foundation, Inc.

The Cornell program, July 1 to Aug. 9, is designed to acquaint Mrs. Bonney and her fellows with modern learning theory and instructional materials.

Mrs. Bonney and the others will "brainstorm" important classroom needs that might be met by improved teaching techniques.

Under the guidance of Cornell professors, fellowship holders will develop ways of using new materials for routine instruction and for enriching regular courses.

Tuition, living expenses, a travel allowance, books and supplies required by Mrs. Bonney are paid by the Shell Companies Foundation.

Each teacher will receive a \$500 stipend to compensate for money earned in summer employment.

Six-Story Building For Office Rental Slated At Newark

Charles F. Beatty Heads
Newark Center Square Co.
For Construction Project

A six-story office building is planned for Newark at a cost of \$3-million, and construction of the Newark Center Square Building is expected to start early this summer, according to Charles F. Beatty, president of The Beatty Corp., which will build the structure. Beatty also is president of Newark Center Square Co., owners.

David Farnon is developer of the new venture and the architect is Donald T. Naleginski.

According to Beatty, the estimated cost includes the site on Main Street opposite the Newark Shopping Center, and construction. The building will have a surrounding hardtop parking lot.

Approximately 6,000 sq. ft. on each of the six floors for a total of about 36,000 sq. ft. will be offered. The space will be expanded in modern "outside office style" to suit needs of tenants.

Harris-Hamby Co., with Newark real estate offices at 72 East Main Street, has been assigned as management agents for the building.

Contemporary design will be followed in the building's exterior. A ground floor front inset will provide a covered arcade across the entire width of the building.

Cost covering panels will be used in exterior walls, and evenly spaced openings in the wall panels are arranged at each floor level with rectangular glass panels. The outside wall will be white.

The building will be fully air-conditioned and there will be elevator service.

Special sound conditioning is included in construction features.

**Extra Racing Days
At Fair Hill Meet
Sought With Bill**

Fair Hill, Md. — Two more racing days may be added to the Fair Hill steeplechase meeting which normally runs for two Saturdays in September.

Two Cecil County delegates have introduced a bill in the Maryland House of Delegates calling for an increase of from two to four days at Fair Hill.

The bill also calls for an increase of 2 per cent to 14 per cent in motel take, with the 2 per cent earmarked for purses and operating expenses.

Mrs. Nancy Burkheimer, one of the bill's sponsors, said the Maryland Racing Commission could assign two extra dates for the track, whose profits are turned over to Union Hospital at Ellicott.

Assumed dates for this year are Sept. 7 and Sept. 14.

Council Schedules Referendum For \$2,111,000 Bond Program

Property Owners To Vote Next April 23, At Aetna Hall
On Capital Improvement Program With 14.7-Cents Tax
Increase In July, 1969; Three New Ordinances Offered

A referendum next April 23, to determine property owner approval of a \$2,111,000 bond issue for a capital improvement program involving a 14.7-cents per \$100 tax increase effective July 1, 1969, was approved in a 6-1 vote at the regular meeting of Newark City Council last Monday night. Balloting by freeholders only, at the Aetna Fire Hall on Ogletown Road from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., will be in four parts with votes for or against \$200,000 for electric water, sewer, and street improvements; \$657,500 for parks and recreation facilities; \$700,000 for municipal office buildings; and \$100,000 for city costs with Edgewater construction.

Mayor Norma B. Handloff opposed the 6-1 vote for the April 23, date with "I preferred to see the referendum held before the April election."

Councilman Olan H. Thomas opposed the 6-1 vote of approval for the \$2,111,000 allocation for parks and recreation because of the "high cost of development of these sites," but approved the resolution calling for the vote on the total \$2,111,000.

For Annexation
Coverdale said that these industrial users were "petitioning for annexation" and are "aware of our rules. Keep the money to serve new customers," he concluded of the \$2,000 budget allocation.

Councilman David H. Doshier pointed out that a "utilities tax would be cheaper for them" than purchasing electricity from the city, and provide an equal amount of city revenue.

But the \$2,000 was not deducted from the total \$600,000 figure for electric, water, sewer, and street improvements.

With approval of the resolution to conduct the referendum on April 23, for the \$2,111,000 bond issue, Mayor Handloff declared a five-minute recess at 9:47, and turned the meeting over to Deputy Mayor Mayer. She had stated at the opening of the meeting that she was "violating the mayor's orders" by being present that night.

Three proposed ordinances were approved at the first of two required readings with 4-1 votes in the absence of Mayor Handloff and Councilman Thomas over Coverdale's dissent.

Written by some long forgotten sage — 200 years after Columbus discovered the New World, and 276 years before this edition of the Newark Post — excerpts from a statement found in Old St. Paul's Church in Baltimore, dated 1692, offer a fine philosophy of life well worth reading for a philosophical uplift in these hectic days of 1968.

E. Hofer & Sons, Publishers, of Portland in far away Oregon, provided the thoughts from Old St. Paul's, as reprinted in the Washington Water Power Co. "Illuminator."

And Robert McDowell, an editor's father-in-law and former choir boy at Old St. Paul's in Baltimore, must have read the following in his church. He lived the philosophy to the letter.

"Go placidly amid the noise and haste, and remember what peace may be in silence. As far as possible without surrender be on good terms with all persons. Speak your truth quietly and clearly; and listen to others, even the dull and ignorant; they too have their story.

"Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs; for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals; and everywhere life is full of heroism.

"Be yourself. Especially, do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment it is perennial as the grass.

"With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be careful. Strive to be happy."

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Corn Or Soybeans Choice Perplexes Delmarva Grower

Mitchell Cites Potential Corn Profits In Address At Annual Soybean Meeting

The choice between growing corn and soybeans is a difficult one to make, says Dr. William H. Mitchell, extension agronomist at the University of Delaware. Although more consultation will provide a basis for decision in many cases, a more satisfactory answer will take into consideration the long range supply and demand for the area, yield potential, risk and soils.

Speaking at the second annual Delmarva soybean meeting in Rehoboth, Md., on Feb. 23, Mitchell pointed out that Delmarva agriculture is concerned primarily with corn, soybeans and broilers. A limited supply of grain and a heavy demand by the broiler industry has given area growers a premium market for corn and beans.

Additional acres and high yields, however, are rapidly closing the gap between supply and demand.

This is especially true of corn where the greatest amount of progress has been made in increasing yields. The acreage in 1967 compared to the 1966 grain shortage is indicative of this trend. Mitchell predicted that corn yields will increase 10 to 15 bushels per acre by 1975. "Will the local grain market respond with a corresponding growth?"

Soybean supply has not yet caught up with the local demand, Mitchell suggested that it might be advantageous if the soybean acreage were increased with a corresponding decrease in corn acreage to help balance the supply and demand of both crops.

Given present or projected yields and current prices, you might assume there is more money in soybeans, Mitchell points out, however, that corn responds better than soybeans to cultural treatments.

Studies at the university's George Washington station during the past three years also indicate corn responds relatively better than soybeans to intensive management. Therefore, the potential profit from corn is well above that for beans within the limits of present knowledge.

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Thomas Pickett Directs

Geological Study Of Clay

The Delaware Geological Survey

The Delaware Geological Survey, under the U.S. Bureau of Mines, is conducting a joint survey to locate economic clay resources in Delaware.

According to Dr. Thomas E. Pickett, who is directing the survey, and testing for the Delaware Geological Survey, preliminary test results of clays from Delaware appear favorable.

Dr. John J. Groot, state geologist, said that the clay study data, all of which will be published, is available on open file at the Delaware Geological Survey office, Robinson Hall, University of Delaware, Newark.

Modern harvesting equipment and the high cost of labor makes it almost impossible for a farmer to harvest his crop that has fallen to the ground. If stalks are lodged, but not broken, some of the grain can be harvested by moving the picker slowly through the field, says Mitchell.

However, and may cause an even more serious lodging problem in other fields where the corn is allowed to become too mature.

Mitchell points out that comparison of 80 corn hybrids in university tests during 1967 indicated that areas with 15,000 plants per acre had 60 per cent more stalk breakage than adjacent areas where 15,000 plants were grown.

The additional yield of five bushels at the higher population was not nearly enough to compensate for stalk breakage losses.

Mitchell advises that potassium fertilizer helps build strong stalks and will definitely minimize breakage problems. This, however, is only one of the factors involved and will not prevent corn from falling down.

Growers can plan now for standing corn next fall by selecting a hybrid with good standability ratings in performance tests, providing enough potassium in fertilization, and using no more than 15,000 plants per acre, Mitchell concludes.

A Great "Weight Lifter"

Perhaps old dogs can't be taught new tricks, but old horses, particularly Thoroughbreds, can. A striking example of the versatility of horses is Fortune Pete Ryan's Champion hurdle horse Quick Pitch, the winner of six straight races last season and the all-time great "weight lifter" of baronism.

In the Double Dragon Handicap at Annapolis, his last start of 1967, he set a record in an unprecedented 172 pounds over 14 furlongs and stressed the finish 12 lengths to the good.

Quick Pitch is a strictly 7-year-old chestnut gelding and, unlike the majority of horses converted to jumping, he was considerably "bigger" than an empty stall while running on

the flat. He won 16 races and almost \$180,000, including five stakes events on dirt and turf, before his owner's brother, Barry Ryan, taught him to "make like Pegasus."

The blessed New York racing fans ordinarily don't get very enthusiastic about jumpers, but as his jersey James Mahoney noted, "You'd have thought it was Kelo running" when he came through the stretch in the Double Dragon to a standing ovation from the crowd.

Having proved himself without competition among American jumpers, he may go to England this spring, or he may take on the Steeplechasing division here.

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Rawstrom's Hens Face Title Tests With MAC Meet

Delaware's swimming team will send a full contingent to the Middle Atlantic Conference university division championship meet at West Chester State College this weekend.

Coach Harry Rawstrom's Blue Hens, 7-5 in dual meet competition, don't figure to be a contender for team honors this year, but Rawstrom has hopes for individual laurels.

"We have three record-breakers on the team and we expect them to do well," the veteran Hen coach says.

Bob Locke has been swimming very well in the freestyle events. Barry Gurkie set a record in the backstroke, and Rich Wilson is a competent swimmer in the breaststroke.

LaSalle, Bucknell, Temple and American appear to be top choices for the team crown, but Rawstrom doesn't rule out the possibility of an upset.

"The MAC championships have probably the strongest field ever this year," the Hen master notes, "and this will be very tough competition for us."
