### 2ND LEGISLATIVE DAY (2nd Session)

The Speaker called the House to order at 1:37 P.M., on Wednesday, February 7, 1968.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Reverend Oliver H. Spence.

The Speaker led those present in a Salute of the Flag.

## JOINT SESSION

The House and Senate met in the Senate Chamber at 2:00 P.M. The President of the Senate welcomed the House Members and invited the Speaker of the House to join him on the rostum.

Senator Cook moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate act as secretaries for the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Senator Cook moved that the President of the Senate appoint a committee of four to escort the Governor to the Chamber. Motion prevailed.

The President named Senators Schlor and Grier and Representatives Gray and Blendt to escort the Governor.

The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed committee to the Senate Chamber.

The President welcomed the Governor and introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Mr. President

Mr. President Pro Tem

Mr. Speaker

Members of the General Assembly

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I am here before you once more to discuss with you the posture of our State, where we are and where we are going—to signal our accomplishments and to share with you my hopes as to what will be our achievements during this coming year.

It is my good fortune to have served as Governor of Delaware during the years of perhaps its greatest increase in terms of economics, population, expanded industry, and individual well being. All of those areas brought with them problems and challenges. I believe your state government has met its challenges. With your help it will during the year to come.

Let us look for a moment at the dramatic growth of Delaware. In general, people seek out a place to live and work where there are opportunities they may seize and amenities they may enjoy. Our state continues to attract larger numbers of people than choose to move on.

We have grown since 1960 from a state with 446,292 people to one with 526,424, according to the special census just completed. By 1975 we will have 700,000 people and by 1980 we will have more than 800,000.

And it is not simply in population that Delaware has been growing. Economists use personal income as a major indicator of well being and economic health. During the first quarter of 1965 when this administration took office, total personal income in Delaware was \$1.6 billion. It is predicted that in the first quarter of 1968 it will reach the \$2 billion figure exceeding the per capita income for the nation as a whole by some 16 per cent.

Attuned to the hum of Delaware's economy are the labor force statistics. The working man has been the real beneficiary of the state's prosperity. Our labor force is growing at a more rapid rate than the national average, and our rate of unemployment runs consistently below the national average. We have 21,000 more people in our labor force today than we had in 1964, yet we now have less people unemployed than we had that year and I am speaking in terms of numbers of people, not percentages.

Because there were employees whose wages were not sufficient to provide adequate maintenance for themselves and their families, we enacted the state's first minimum wage law of \$1 an hour in 1965. This innovation was followed by a scaled rise in the minimum wage to \$1.25 an hour as of February 1. I view these laws as so necessary and equitable that my pride in their passage is diminished only by my regret that they were not enacted years ago.

But more has been done to help our working men and women. In the two years since we enacted the wage payment and collection law, our department of labor has collected more than \$80,000 in wages earned but unpaid, and turned every penny of it over to the workmen who earned it.

In regard to our handicapped citizens, I am pleased to report that over one thousand such citizens were placed in gainful employment during 1967, giving the state an economic lift of over \$3 million direct wages and making proud, contributing taxpayers of men and women who formerly were in need of assistance.

No one has sacrificed more than the benefit of us all than our fighting men in Vietnam.

A grateful state is concerned about our returning veterans, and we must pay our debt to them by assuring those who move back to civilian life maximum civilian opportunity. Our state employment service makes contact with each one. It is our constant aim to make certain that the disabled are afforded rehabilitation and that those seeking gainful employment get jobs. We want no war veterans to be out of a job for any reason. Also this year we enacted a bonus for the men who have served during the Vietnam crisis so that they may have a small nestegg to fall back on as they return to civilian life. Our debt to each of them can never be paid. Nor can we begin to console those who have lost loved ones in the twisting torment of Southeast Asia. They have the sympathy and lasting respect of us all.

I mention these achievements not out of satisfaction, but so that we remind ourselves prosperity is a virtue only where its fruits are shared with the people who produce it.

Now is the time to relate the past and future. We face a 30-day session in which much must be done.

First, it is appropriate that I speak to you on the subject of education. Before you for consideration in the House Chamber is House Bill 438, The Educational Advancement Act.

Three years ago Delaware had more than 80 local school districts. Today there are 48 and we are continuing to improve. It is no secret that I have considered consolidation to be one of our most serious educational problems. To pave the way for consolidation I appointed the Wolcott Committee in 1965 to report on the needs of the Delaware educational system. The major recommendation was for reorganization of our school districts so that every boy and girl, regardless of his place of residence, might be able to attend a school equipped to offer him first class, modern instruction.

Since that time the recommendations of the report have been thoroughly aired and I charged the State Board of Education to prepare legislation based upon the findings of the report, hearings held in connection with it, and the recommendations of lay and professional leaders throughout Delaware This was done and House Bill 438 is the result. It represents countless hours of work on the part of many people and has the full endorsement of the Board of Education. It also has mine, and I urge you to enact it after your membership has had ample opportunity to consider its provisions. It is far-reaching and certainly is the most significant educational legislation, aside from the original school code establishing free public schools, in the history of our State. While all of us admire and encourage local pride, it is important in this instance that every resident be a Delawarean first and a local citizen second.

On the subject of education, I want to also report briefly on the progress of educational television which has been funded in its entirety by this administration. During the 1966-67 school year nearly half of all Delaware public school teachers used instructional television programming in their teaching compared to a national average of 19 per cent in states where ETV is available. Of those making use of our closed-circuit television 50.3 per cent rated the programming excellent and 39.8 per cent rated it good.

Delaware continues to be far ahead of most other states in maintaining a multi-channel television system. Agencies of the state are now making plans to use this system in their own training programs. We will continue to make every effort to maintain and expand our leadership in this field.

Another unparalleled educational achievement is the establishment of the Delaware Technical and Community College at Georgetown. We will take another vital step forward when a northern branch of the college opens in Wilmington in September. These comprehensive technical and community colleges fill a void in the state's educational program.

The college now open has enrolled over 700 students and public acceptance is enthusiastic and exciting. The enrollment next year will almost double and within five years there will be an enrollment of more than 2,000 students.

I am pleased at this time to point out that the National Cash Register Company has begun operating in Millsboro in the former Dennis Mitchell Building. One of the reasons for this nationally outstanding industry coming to Delaware is the existence of our fine new college in Georgetown. I have confidence that it and its New Castle County Counterpart will continue to attract quality industry to our state.

Contributing to the overall education improvement of our young people are our fine vocational schools in all three counties. We should continue to fund them generously because they are one of the important reasons why our unemployment rate for 1967 was only slightly more than three per cent substantially below the national average.

Of course, we all recognize that any educational system is no better than its teachers. And to continue to attract and retain fine, dedicated teachers, we must adequately compensate them. Toward this goal it has already been provided that our teachers will receive a \$600 annual increase for the next school year which will give those in 80 per cent of our school districts a starting salary in the \$6,200 range. The state level of support for each starting teacher will then have been increased forty per cent since 1964 from a base pay of \$4,000 per year to the present 5,600.00.

In 1965 I signed into law historic legislation providing for the reorganization of the Government of New Castle County. The bill provided for a strong executive with department heads serving under him, it created a county council to establish broad policy, and it gave the county broad home rule powers in the area of general legislation and in setting tax rates. The 123rd General Assembly also enacted a land subdivision law and turned over to the county prime land at Delcastle Farms for use as a recreational area. Other recreational areas are being developed.

We have shown a continuing awareness and sympathy for the problems of New Castle County. Thus, in the past session I signed a bill affording greater bonding authority to the county in an effort to supply its citizens with the type of services they want. It may now be said that the future of New Castle County rests, as never before, in its own hands.

There is one area, however, in which our urban county cries out for help from the state, and it is that area which I especially emphasize in this message. That is the area of public transportation and it is here we must move quickly.

Some four million passengers annually are now using the available public transportation system in northern Delaware. It is a paradox that those passengers who continue to use bus service despite an increase in fares and a reduction in schedules are those most dependent upon the system for essential transportation—those least able to afford higher fares and most hurt by withered service—our poor, our incapacitated, our aged, our school-children.

As you know, I took the lead by sponsoring a bill in 1967 that was fully backed by the Department of Transportation and had the approval of the Department of Housing and Urban Development in Washington. The General Assembly did not see fit to pass that measure although it would have enabled us to resolve our difficulties.

I have informed the county executive of New Castle and the Mayor of Wilmington that I stand ready to work with them in any reasonable modification of this proposal.

In my view, here is a mandate by our citizens upon this General Assembly to provide action in this vital area before it is too late.

As you know, the Administration of Justice has been one of my special concerns.

To that end, among other accomplishments, the Justice of the Peace System was reorganized with the primary purpose of bringing uniformity of dignified courtroom facilities and trained, salaried Justices into being so that our citizens could enjoy equal treatment under the law. It was also to eliminate the fee system, a questionable practice at best,

so that a statewide standard of ethics under the jurisdiction of the Chief Justice might be established and maintained. This purpose has been largely accomplished.

As Governor, I have emphasized that the law must be respected. But to be respected the law must be clear and understandable. It should operate in an even-handed manner, providing uniform penalties for crimes or similar magnitude. It should, above all, be in tune with the times.

Our present Delaware Criminal Law falls short of these standards. It has been built into an uneven pile of fragmented provisions by the addition of bits and pieces of legislation over the past century and a half. Many of its provisions have little or no application to our modern society. Other provisions create crimes which are ill-defined. In short, the Delaware Criminal Law has been in sore need of an overhaul for years.

To accomplish this, and in line with my over-all program for streamlining and updating the Administration of Justice in Delaware, in 1965 I appointed a distinguished committee of Delaware trial lawyers for the purpose of recommending and proposing new provisions and a new structure to be embodied in a pervasive revision of what is now Title 11 of our Delaware Code. caused the committee to be bipartisan in character, and state-wide in complexion. Further, to insure the presentation of varying viewpoints, the Attorney General's Office, the Wilmington City Solicitor, and the Public Defender all were represented by membership on the committee. The chairmanship fell to Bruce M. Stargatt, an able Wilmington trial attorney.

The committee has now completed its work. Its fine report, running over 500 pages, was unanimously reached. I have caused legislation based on the report of the committee to be formulated and introduced for your consideration. In a few areas involving controversial policy decisions. I have caused the legislation as introduced to reflect the existing law-in effect suggesting that the committee's recommendations be considered on their merits. Except for these few areas, the vast body of the proposed criminal code carries verbatim the recommendations of the Governor's committee. You are now holding hearings on this legislation. It may be that as the result of these hearings you will determine that portions of the legislation based on the report of the Governor's committee will require fresh consideration and, perhaps, modification. That, of course, is your privilege and right.

But in the end, I request that you give the proposal for a new criminal code your favorable attention. The people of Delaware are entitled to a body of updated, understandable, and Uniform penal laws. In the field of protection of the consumer, this state now has in effect a truth in advertising bill which prevents the unscrupulous from using false, misleading or actually fraudulent claims in advetising and promoting their products. We have also enacted a law giving the Attorney General broad powers in prosecuting those suspected of fraudulence or deceit.

In addition, we have been sensitive to the interests of our consumers through enactment of the Delaware Wholesome Meat and Poultry Act of 1967 which provides for the removal from the channels of trade of mislabeled, misrepresented, unwholesome or otherwise loathsome meat and meat products. The establishment of a better business bureau in Wilmington has also helped immeasurably in protecting the buying public, and while it is a private organization, it has had the full cooperation and support of your state government which has contributed to its success. We now have the authority and institutions necessary to fully protect the consumer.

A program toward which we can look forward with prideful expectation this year is the new merit system which is certainly one of the most significant accomplishments of this administration.

Details are now being implemented and I want to emphasize that at this time all avenues of discussion and appeal remain open. What is important is that no longer will the vagaries of elections decide the fate of our public servants or the quality of our public service.

There are other areas which deserve more than passing note.

Massive new highway construction has been undertaken and is planned for this year, particularly in the populous areas of New Castle County. Extensive improvements have been made to some of the most heavily traveled roads. Our safety improvement program whereby safety improvements in strategic trouble areas are made immediately without waiting for major reconstruction has been implemented as has the program to replace small bridges throughout the state to render them safe for heavy vehicles such as school buses.

You know already of my interest, which I hope you share in a limited cabinet form of government. A constitutional amendment to permit the merger of The Board of Health and Mental Health is awaiting your consideration. A bill is ready to combine the activities of the Department of Corrections and Youth Services Commission into one central Department, and will be introduced shortly. I am also continuing a private study to determine the need for combining the present Game and Fish, Shell Fish, Parks

and Forestry Commissions. In this connection I want to emphasize that the time has come to provide the Shell Fish Commission with an adequate guard boat. The available guard boat is totally unsafe and I have issued an executive order prohibiting its use. This action has been taken to protect the lives of the watermen who patrol our offshore resources. It is unreasonable to jeopardize the future of them and their families because politics has tied up an appropriation Bill that would otherwise permit them to pursue their work with safety. This General Assembly must authorize repairs for the present boat, buy a new one, or else assume the responsibility of writing off a Delaware industry now in the process of making a dramatic comeback. It is certain that without adequate policing, our shellfish production cannot measure up to federal standards and thus qualifv for interstate shipment.

Also in the area of centralized government would fall the transportation bill I spoke of earlier, a bill that would have necessitated a cabinet post. So would the Housing Bill now in the Senate which I plan to talk about later.

Pennsylvania recently passed a law to pay the costs of medicaid for welfare recipients so that they would not lose their benefits. We should take similar action and perhaps also study the entire range of hospital costs, as some other states have been doing to determine if they can be held down, or if more state aid should be provided to hospitals in order to prevent their patient fees from soaring out of sight. An ad hoc committee will be named in the near future.

Another committee, authorized at my surgestion by the 123rd General Assembly, will report to me shortly. That is the insurance study committee which will present its proposed code in my office Thursday morning. I hope to pass it on promptly to you and the public.

One area where I do not recommend any change is in the excellent work being done by the Fire Prevention Commission. Not only are our volunteer companies operated and regulated with great efficiency and dedication, but we can also boast of one of the finest fire schools available for training anywhere in the nation.

It is not possible for me to go into the tremendous benefits that accrue to Delawareans as a result of this modern school, but I urge all citizens to visit it in order to familiarize themselves with the outstanding work that is being done. Members of the General Assembly who have voted the funds for its operation should similarly visit the site near Dover, in order to achieve a fuller understanding of how our firemen, selfless citizens all, are drilling and studying to prepare themselves for their hazardous job of safeguarding the general public.

We live in a time of uncertainty and unrest.

During the past few summers our nation's cities have been rocked by a series of internal human explosions that none of us would have believed possible at the opening of what would otherwise be described as a great decade of progress, progress in terms of almost any kind of achievement you might care to name, from technological development to the fundamental rights of man. One such powderkeg was fused in our own great ity of Wilmington for two hectic, frightening days last summer.

Accordingly, part of my task today is to speak to the people of Delaware about what they, the press and national spokesmen have determined to be one of the overriding is-

sues of our time at any state level.

It can roughly be categorized as "Civil Unrest."

It is not by my choice that it is so. I know of the decency of the citizens of this state. Certainly, it is apparent to me on the basis of every evidence that men and women of goodwill—regardless of religion, color or national origin—are attempting to live together in the spirit of brotherhood.

But I am governor and must take seriously every threat, especially so since all of us lived through those riots that only last summer caused \$300,000 in property damage in Wilmington.

We ignore the threats of determined men of notoriety and conviction at our own peril. Hitler should have taught us that. He prophesied years in advance what he intended to do and then he did it, although few took him seriously until it was too late.

Today men move in our midst saying they will burn and loot and destroy our cities even if, in the process, they have to wreck the very foundations of our democracy, of our sacred institutions, of our families and children.

I am not going to ignore such threats; I am not going to consider them as merely the empty mouthings of irresponsible people. I have lived through eras of hate, and I know that fools and madmen and fanatics can disrupt and even destroy the way of life that is our cherished heritage and our surest hope of the future.

We are a small and compact state. If we cannot live together in a spirit of mutual trust and respect, a condition free of those ruly deteriorating crimes of mankind—robbery and burglary and violence—then perhaps there is no hope for the progress and tranquility of mankind.

But we can. We can enjoy all of the productivity of our creative society and overcome, in our desire to achieve excellence and personal well-being, the ugly threats that are repeated in print and on the airwaves so frequently that many of us no longer listen. I listen. And because I do, I am proud to say here today that the decent people of Delaware, the respecters of law and order, the dedicated citizens of our state, will join me in a determination to protect, whatever and wherever the threat, every man's life and every man's property.

While it is necessary to insure that our laws will be obeyed, we should not forget for a moment our obligation to seek out and solve the root causes of the problems that beset us. We must work together to see to it that our great period of prosperity and plenty accrues to the benefit of all citizens, we must see to it that no one is in need, and that everyone has a maximum opportunity to achieve the full measure of his potential. If a citizen needs additional training, it should be available. Decent housing for all should be one of our foremost goals.

Before you in the Senate is a bill which would enable us to proceed with both public and private construction of low cost housing that will help all of our citizens, not now so blessed, to find a decent, adequate place in which to live and raise their children.

I urge you to approve the measure, which has the stamp of approval from the necessary federal agencies in Washington which would assist in funding it without delay.

I want also at this juncture to restate my position on fair housing which has failed of enactment. Since I first became a candidate for governor, I have made it clear that if the General Assembly passes fair housing legislation, I will sign it into law.

In the related area of upgrading job skills, we must continue to develop new and improved training programs. In 1967 our Apprenticeship and Training Council—hand-inhand with private industry and the Federal Government—registered 1,100 young apprentices, the highest number in our history. They will train these young men to become skilled craftsmen, under these formally approved training programs, which are placing more and owner emphasis on training of disadvantaged and under-employed minority groups.

But despite advancement the old, old problems of our disadvantaged and hard-core unemployed could not be solved by traditional approaches. We have learned that the causes of such inadequacy are complicated and that there are no easy solutions.

Specialized governmental agencies, insulated from each other, each functioning within its own jurisdiction in a tidy and exclusive compartment, could not solve the complex overlapping problems and miseries of the man who is hopelessly unemployable in today's world.

Here in Delaware we have torn down the compartments, and through the Governor's Coordinating Committee, our state agencies are pooling their skills, services and resources with each other, and with federal agencies, and even with private groups to try to solve the problems of the hard-core unemployed.

We are experimenting, we are innovating, we are trying—and we are moving ahead.

Three of our agencies—Public Welfare, Public Instruction, and Employment Security—worked together with the federal government to train approximately 1,300 people, who had no marketable skills, to fill existing job openings. More than 70 per cent were placed in jobs for which they were trained, and others were placed in related fields of employment.

Three of our agencies—corrections, public instruction and employment security—came up with an idea to rehabilitate and train adult prisoners to meet an acute shortage of "combination welders" and give them a second chance. We were the first state to ask and get federal manpower development training act funds for this purpose. Now, other states are interested and no wonder! Those prisoners who were certified after completing the course started out in private industry at \$2.72 per hour. One man's first week earnings, with overtime, totaled \$193.

You are aware that the state is investing \$100,000 in a privately run program for motivating and training the poor to become employable, a program concentrating on motivation. This program—O.I.C.—has succeeded elsewhere and we have high hopes for it here in Delaware. Its founder, the Reverend Leon Sullivan, has praised our action in being first to support this program at the state level. We can look forward to the implementation and benefits of this program.

I personally sign and send a letter to every school "Dropout" urging him to contact the state employment service so that he can be placed in a job, or can obtain counseling and testing, or can obtain additional training if needed, or obtain supportive services if needed, such as medical or psychiatric care. The effort has been productive, and all agencies of the state are enthusiastically cooperating to help train and find jobs for those who want to share in our national abundance.

While the low cost housing and employment programs already suggested are of top priority and were among the recommendations made last fall by the committee to investigate the causes of civil urest, there will be other legislative suggestions stemming from this report during the year.

The committee on civil unrest found that unemployment and underemployment contribute to feelings of discrimination among those who really want to work and those who are working but are relegated to low paying menial type jobs with no opportunity for training and advancement. It recommended that I appoint a full time "equal employment opportunity" officer to develop, implement and oversee a program for all state agencies to assure there is no discrimination in employment, training and promotion in state agencies. I have a bill ready to authorize such an officer under the personnel commission and it will be introduced shortly.

And I want to re-emphasize one area. The committee was convinced that the fact that thousands of Delaware families are compelled to live in houses which are unhealthy, unsafe, and demoralizing to dignity was indeed a major factor and continues to be in fomenting civil unrest. The committee was of the firm belief that failure now to act on this problem of slum and sub-standard housing and the lack of adequate housing for lower and medium income families would be a threat to the basic economic fabric of our state and endanger the safety and security of every citizen, no matter where he may live in Delaware.

The committee believed that It should be the stated policy and commitment of the Government of the State of Delaware to take direct action and also to give its full assistance, morally and financially, in cooperation with local and federal governments and the private sector in providing decent housing. The housing bill before you in the Senate does just that, and once again I urge you to move expeditiously to its passage.

That is, as I see it, the State of the State, where we are, where we are going, where we have done well, and where we need to do better.

I have said nothing about two vital matters—the new budget and the capital budget along with the planning activity that accompanies it. On February 13, I shall present the budget for your consideration. At this time I can tell you only that it will be within the state's means and will not, as I have said before, require any increase in taxes. The capital budget will also be presented upon completion.

This is where a proud nation got its beginning. We are the first state. Much more important we are one state, with one people, with one goal—to sustain a fair and equitable society committed to justice for all.

This administration has been commissoned by our people to carry forth new ideas toward a more dynamic and greater Delaware.

With God's help and that of the people, we will continue toward that end.

The previously named committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber.

Senator Cook moved that the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House compare their respective Journals.

The Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House compared their Journals and found them to agree and so notified the President.

Senator Cook moved that the two Houses separate to reconvene in their respective chambers. Motion prevailed.

The House reconvened at 3:40 P.M.

This bill, it was explained, (HB 456) merely clarifies certain district boundaries in New Castle County by street nomenclature and does not change boundaries.

Mr. Hale moved that the Chief Clerk of the House and the Secretary of the Senate act as Secretaries for the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

The Chair appointed the following committee to escort the Governor to the House: Reps. Cicione, Blendt, Senators Bookhammer and Moore. The Sergeant-at-Arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed Committee to the House Chamber.

The Speaker invited the Governor to the Rostrum and

introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Mr. Speaker Mr. President

Members of the General Assembly

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Thank you for your consideration in permitting me to postpone delivery of this message from Tuesday last until today.

The budget I am presenting for your consideration is a vital, living document that will carry our state into new areas of progress and achievement. It implements many of the great programs enacted by the General Assembly during the earlier years of this administration.

In going through the preparatory work on the budget and arriving at the recommendations, I was truly proud of the many new services, protections and governmental reforms that it will provide for the people of Delaware.

It is also a source of satisfaction to me that this progressive, forward-looking budget can be proposed in Delaware and financed out of revenue expected and on hand. In state after state this year, I have read budget messages by my fellow governors in which they had to go before their legislatures and seek tax increases to finance additional expenditures legitimately demanded and expected by a public which must be served. This is a budget that provides those increases without any need for additional revenue, and the next governor will have a surplus with which to begin his term.

We will begin operation of a Technical and Community College in New Castle and also initiate a second year program for the one now operating in Georgetown. The long desired merit system will be put into effect giving our public employees a degree of security never before known. Better pensions, better wages, and larger staffs are recommended for virtually every agency. Teachers will receive a \$600 to \$800 pay increase, and a firm staffing program will go into effect. Health care for our citzens will be dramatically extended. Consumer protection will be surer and better than it has ever been before. Air pollution monitoring stations will be established to provide the Water and Air Resources Commission the information it needs to protect our state. Our promotional arm, the Development Department, will be able to attract more industry, thus keeping alive our economic expansion.

I shall go into more detail later. Let it suffice to say that never before in its history has the State Government been in a position to provide so much that is desirable and needed to its citizens in all walks of life.

I am able at this time to report that in December a tax dispute dating back to 1965 was settled to the benefit of the state providing us with additional estate taxes in the amount of \$2.8 million for the next fiscal year. This is revenue I did not know about the last time I spoke to you on the subject of Finances.

Based upon six months actual experience during the current fiscal year, I have estimated our revenue through June 30, 1968, at \$153.6 million. If no additional supplementary appropriations are made, it is estimated that disbursements for this same fiscal year will be \$157.7 million. The net effect will be a reduction in our general fund cash balance to about \$23 million.

I have estimated general fund receipts of \$159.7 million for fiscal 1969. Added to the beginning cash balance of \$23 million, a total of \$182.7 million will be available for appropriation.

My total recommended budget for fiscal 1969, including the Budget Appropriation Act, Routine Grants-in-Aid, Estimated Automatic Appropriations and Estimated Reversions, calls for expenditures of \$178,432,039, leaving an estimated general fund cash balance of about \$4.2 million on June 30, 1969.

Since there is seldom any difference of opinon over the routine grants-in-aid and since nothing can be done about the automatic appropriations—primarily revenue refunds—I will direct my attention to the Recommended Budget Appropriation Act of General Fund Monies for 1969 and point cut the significant changes from the current appropriation act and its various supplements.

The Budget Act for Fiscal 1968, as initially amended, appropriated \$149,514,691. Since that time, the General Assembly has enacted, and I have approved, \$2,768,615 in supplemental appropriations that can be classified as new or improved programs that must be carried into fiscal 1969. Other supplements, automatic appropriations, and grants-in-and bring the total allocation up to about \$161.3 million from which we can anticipate \$3.6 million in reversions.

My recommended Fiscal 1969 Budget Act of \$173,013,-279 is \$20,729,973 Higher than the comparable total of \$152,-283,306 appropriated for fiscal 1968. This represents a cut of approximately \$10 million from the total agency requests. No request has been lightly trimmed, but I think it apparent to you that the \$20.7 million increase recommended is higher than has been customary in recent years.

However, it should come as no surprise. During the past year, I have frequently appeared before you to explain our financial condition and the effect that certain projects under consideration would have upon the Fiscal 1969 Budget.

For the purpose of analysis, I will break this increase generally into three major categories, although these will overlap in some instances:

I. Increases over which we have no direct control.

II. Increases due to legislative action already taken by this assembly; and

III. Increases that are necessary to maintain present services at the current level because of population growth and to provide highly desirable improvements and new projects.

I. Increases over which we have no direct control.

- (a) Debt Service Appropriations must be increased by \$4,312,660, primarily due to the maturity of a \$2.5 million bond which was not amortized. This figure would be \$1 million higher if we were not using the earnings of the Capital Investment Fund to help meet the demand.
- (b) Pension and Social Security Appropriations must be increased by \$1,054,400.

This means that a total of \$5,376,060 of the recommended increase is beyond our direct control.

II. Increases mandated by prior Legislative Action.

(a) School District Appropriations must be increased by \$6,698,299. This breaks down as follows:

- (1) \$4,623,799 for regular salary increment raises and for the salary schedule increases mandated by Senate Bill No. 230.
- (2) \$1,650,000 to cover increases in the numbers of school children.
- (3) \$250,000 for the additional school staffing mandated by Senate Bill No. 228.
- (4) \$82,500 for the Driver Education Summer Pro-
- gram mandated by House Bill No. 405. (5) \$92,000 for additional clerical staffing. This item was not mandated but is necessary if a uniform clerical staffing formula is to be applied for all districts.
- (b) Recommended appropriations for Public Education at the state level in the Departments of Public and Vocational Instruction and Educational Television have been increased by \$325,227. This includes approximately \$125,000 for salary increases mandated by Senate Bill No. 230 and House Bill No. 369.

In summary, of the total \$7,023,526 recommended increase for Public Education, approximately \$6,731,000 was previously committed by the General Assembly. When this sum is added to the \$5,367,060 for debt service and pensions, you will see that \$12.1 million of the recommended increase was already mandated before the budget review began.

# III. Recommended Increases other than Public Education

(a) Recommended appropriations for Higher Education are increased by \$2,636,750 Of this sum, \$1,428,500 is earmarked for the University of Delaware, and \$133,000 for Delaware State College. Virtually, all of the balance is allocated to the Delaware Technical and Community College for the purpose of instituting the second year courses at the Southern Branch and for opening a Northern Branch in New Castle County.

Thus, it can be seen that Delaware will spend \$9.65 million more for total education than is being spent during the current fiscal year. This is a phenomenal but sensible increase since the education of our young is our foundation for the future.

It would seem appropriate to comment at this point of departure from the educational function that only \$6 million of the total recommended increase remains for the important services to be carried out by all the rest of our State Government, but that \$6 million will be meaningful to our citizens for years to come. The recommended increases are as follows:

(b) Appropriations for the nine Legislative and Elections agencies have been increased by \$334.667. The major portion of this additional cost is routine for the conduct of the 1968 elections.

(c) Appropriations for the twelve Executive and Financial Agencies have been increased by \$409,955. The following programs account for over 80% of this sum.

(1) Establishment of the new Personnel Commission on a full-time operating basis.

(2) More adequate data processing equipment and some additional staff in the budget office to automate the processing of personnel records as required by the Personnel Commission, and certain routine phases of the budget preparation now performed at the agency level.

(3) Additional Staff in the Treasurer's Office to as-

sure prompt reconciliation of accounts.

(4) Additional Staff to enable the Planning Office to meet the increased demands validly made by our state agencies, the various municipalities, and especially by the General Assembly.

(5) The stepping up of promotional programs by the State Development Department to attract desirable types of new business and industry to our

state.

- (b) Recommended appropriations for the fifteen Judicial and legal agencies have been increased by \$164,717. Over one-half of this sum is allocated to the Family Courts in order that they can more adequately cope with the increased case loads in a vital area of human relations.
- (e) Recommended appropriations for the twenty-nine professional, occupational and regulatory agencies have been increased by \$108.032. Of this sum, \$50,000 is required by the State Insurance Commissioner, primarily for insurance premiums, and \$26.000 has been allocated to our Fire Prevention Agency to expand the fine programs that they have recently established.
- (f) Recommended appropriations for the two defense agencies have been increased by \$17,565 and recommended appropriations for the four labor agencies by \$31,500. Of this latter sum, \$20,000 is a new appropriation to the office of economic opportunity for the purpose of matching and continuing federal aid for programs that are an integral part of our fight against unemployment and underemployment.
- (g) Recommended appropriations for the seven cultural, historic and recreational agencies have been increased by \$165,960. The State Park Commission would receive \$144,920 of this sum for the purpose of continuing a staged and orderly expansion of operations in the park and recreational sites acquired during the past several years. The physical development of these sites is already underway as provided by you in various capital improvement acts.
- (h) Recommended appropriations for the three agencies involved with state properties have been increased by \$118,993. This sum is nearly equally divided between the necessary utilities maintenance of new state properties in the Capital, and a modest expansion of our central procurement program. It is worthy of note that agency response to the opportunity of participating in this latter service has exceeded the capacity of the small initial staff provided this year, and the modest outlay provided here should be returned to the state several times over in savings; in fact, this present budget is smaller than it would have been without this service.
- (i) Recommended appropriations for the nine Health and Welfare Agencies have been increased by \$2,199,-947, a sum which is more than one-third of the total increase for all agencies other than education, debt service and pensions. The principal parts of this in-

crease are \$550,900 for the Department of Public Welfare—largely for benefit grants—and \$1,138,852 for

the Department of Mental Health.

This 13% increase for increased operation in the Department of Mental Health is directed toward strengthening that part of the staff having direct contact with the patients in these institutions, especially the aides, attendants, nurses and therapists. Altogether, it will provide for an additional 176 employees, of which approximately 92 fall in these categories It will also provide for a stepped up program to combat alcoholism in our state and a start on the staff for the children's hospital now being constructed.

Let me also point out that the \$112,050, or 33%, increase for the Water and Air Resources Commission will be chiefly used to locate the first adequate air pollution monitoring stations in Delaware, although the task of maintaining clean water will continue to

be vigorously pursued.

(J) Recommended appropriations for the four rehabilitation agencies have been increased by \$391,595. Over \$200,000 of this sum is for the Department of Corrections with a priority on increasing the staff of the probation and parole program from the present 20 to 35 as requested.

(k) Recommended appropriations for the eight agriculture, forestry and conservation agencies have been increased by \$169,721. Of this increase, \$98,740 is for the Department of Agriculture and its sub-divisions for the purpose of implementing the new meat inspection code and further protecting our citizens by streng-

thening the weights and measures division.

(1) Recommended Appropriations for the eight divisions of the Highway Department have been increased by \$1,100,895. The major portion of this amount is for salary adjustments provided under the new merit system pay plan which is discussed below. Also significant, however, is inclusion of \$183,000 for our State Police Division, primarily for raises for all personnel, in accordance with their own request; funds to complete the centralization of all data processing equipment and the implementation of what may be the first local-state-national criminal information exchange network. It should also be pointed out that part of this increase is a result of more carefully restricting those department expenses that can be covered by bond monies, a change initiated last year.

(m) Finally, the emergency fund recommendation has been increased by \$452,000. This fund contains a contingency of \$500,000 for the implementation of the

new merit system pay plan. Without this sum, the emergency fund would actually have been reduced.

This final area deserves more attention. Of the \$6 million increase recommended for all agencies other than Educations, debt service and pensions, approximately \$1,625,000 has been recommended for employee salary adjustments in the classified service. Over 27% of this \$6 million is for the purpose of implementing a uniform classification and pay plan. Most of this sum is in the agencies' budgets and was a part of the increases I outlined to you above. 'Time has not permitted the final determination of classification and costs within each agency before the deadline for submitting this budget to you. It is, therefore, imperative that the budget commission have a contingency fund available for the final implementation of this plan, and the authority to move excess salary funds from one agency to another if required for this purpose. This is an exact parallel to the procedure that has operated so successfully in the appropriation of salaries for school employees, first under the budget commission, and, for the past four years, under the budget director.

The provisions of this budget act, when combined with the state merit system law already on the books, will carry Delaware into a bright new day in the field of personnel administration. It will put us on a level with the best being done in other states and will establish, for the first time, fiscal responsibility in this area which accounts for more state expenditure than any other. Incidentally, I would like to repeat that these provisions are not new in Delaware Law. The state allotment of school employee positions and salaries has been handled this way for many years now. During this current year, you have approved employee position control in a number of agencies on an experimental basis. I am satisfied that this experiment has been a success to date.

My address today has necessarily concentrated upon facts and figures, so that you will have a clear understanding of where we are financially and where we are going. But I want to say just a word about the hard-working board and commission members who serve on so many of our state agencies with either no or little remuneration. For most of them, public service is a sacrifice, and I think it appropriate that we call attention to their contribution and realize in our own minds that without their generosity, our budgetary expenses would inevitably be higher.

I want also to point out that this budget is a balanced one, making use as it does of a surplus accumulated through years of prudent spending and fiscal responsibility.

Fiscal responsibility has been the trademark of this administration because it is the budget itself which reflects the capacity and development of the state, and not only in gov-

ernmental activity. The budget of the State Government relates to growth in nearly every segment of a vibrant economy and is, therefore, of immense importance to every businessman, industrialist, wage earner, investor and pensioner.

During my administration, our budgets have been marked by steady growth, allowing the agencies of the state to keep pace with the overall progress of the private sector and also permitting us to expand into scores of new programs that were but a dream a few short years ago.

In short, we have a budget that will enable the state to move ahead responsibly without resorting to any question-

able money practice whatever.

Last year, in detailing the financial responsibility we practice, I set forth six major guidelines, so that there could be no misunderstanding. Firm in my belief that the same philosophy must prevail, I would like to repeat them now.

1. We must continue to progress. This budget will enable every agency to operate with efficiency. We have given high priority to the prevention of air and water pollution, the expansion of higher education, the improvement of certain phases of our mental health programs, the development of certain recreational areas, the implementation of the merit system, and increased emphasis on highway safety.

2. We must continue to improve the structure of State Government. The present priorities in this area are the implementation of the merit system, the expansion of our voluntary bulk purchasing program into a modified central purchasing office, and the functional reorganization of state

agencies.

3. In each priority area, we must continue to advance in positive but planned and controlled steps. We do not foresee any "crash" programs, since none is necessary. The agencies can take advantage of an effective program and utilize moderate budgetary increases each year for several years. Crash programs in these areas can only lead to waste and inefficiency.

4. The Governor, as chief executive is the chief fiscal officer in the state. It will be expected during the next year, as during the past three, that all executive agencies will direct their requests for change in the recommended executive budget or for supplementary appropriations to the Governor and to the Budget Director for consideration prior to plac-

ing such requests before the General Assembly.

5. Except for bone fide emergencies beyond the control of the agency, it is expected that all executive agencies will live within their budget appropriation. This is especially true in the area of employees' salary increases. It has been, and will continue to be, the policy of this administration to oppose supplementary appropriations for the purpose of increasing salaries midway through a fiscal year.

6. We must continue to adopt fiscal programs that assure the state of an adequate annual cash balance in the General Fund. We must not revert to fiscal policies which permit a General Fund deficit. Our budget proposals should carefully weigh our needs and resources with this guideline in mind in this regard. It is my determination, for the duration of this administration, to meet our increased automatic requirements and advance all priority programs without any tax increases No tax increases will be recommended or anticipated by me through the remainder of this gubernatorial term.

If we pursue these guidelines in the area of fiscal responsibility, we will continue to advance and maintain our position of leadership as one of the most dynamic and attractive entities in this union of sovereign states.

The previously named committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber.

### JOINT SESSION

The House and Senate met in the Senate Chamber at 2:00 P.M.

Senator Cook moved that the House and Senate convene in Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Senator Cook moved that the President of the Senate preside over the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

Senator Cook moved that the Secretary of Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House act as Secretaries for the Joint Session. Motion prevailed.

The Chair appointed the following committee to escort the Governor to the Senate Chamber: Senators Grier, Schlor and Representatives Blendt and Cashman.

The Seregant-at-arms admitted the Governor and the duly appointed committee to the Senate Chamber.

The President invited the Governor to the Rostrum and introduced him to the Joint Session.

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Mr. President

Mr. Speaker

Mr. President Pro Tem

Member of the 124th General Assembly

Ladies and Gentlemen:

In my letter to the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker I asked for the privilege of addressing you briefly today. I shall be brief because my message is simple and to the point.

We have arrived at a time in the progress of our state when we must move emphatically ahead in two major areas, and legislation to achieve that end is ready at hand.

I am hopeful that within a week you will be able to give favorable consideration to Administration Bills to establish Departments of Transportation and Housing.

If we are to avoid crisis situations in northern Delaware we must stand ready to provide people with adequate opportunity to live in decent homes and with public transportation to allow them to enjoy normal movement for purposes of employment, commerce and the availing themselves of necessary services.

For sometime now I have been saying publicly and privately to all groups that I welcome any suggestions, am prepared to study any recommendation, am willing to listen patiently to any idea and will do my part in translating into action any positive proposal that will lead to a lessening of tensions and to concrete improvement for the part of the people of Delaware most in need of help.

In transportation and housing I have taken the lead and the Bills to be placed before you today are the result. I hope you will review them carefully and then give them your approval because they are vital necessities if we are to move ahead during 1968. Before this session is over you will be asked to enact other Bills also of top priority for our people but I can assure you that none will be as important, or as meaningful, as the two which will be introduced in this chamber today.

Also today for your consideration will be introduced an Elections Bill which has been carefully drawn by able lawyers and which will achieve the purpose called for by me in my State Message of 1967.

Legislation to create a Department of Rehabilitation by merging the Youth Services Commission and the Department of Corrections is ready, but the members of those agencies asked me to hold it once more until they can meet with me regarding some minor changes that they would like to see made effective. In consideration of the great and generous work that they have done for the State of Delaware, I am honoring their request, and, accordingly, the Bill will not be introduced until you return.

Finally, today you are in Session because of the emergency request of the Department of Public Welfare. I understand that a Supplemental Bill is ready and will be introduced in the House by Representative Evans.

Late in 1967 officials of the Welfare Department came to see me in Dover and said they would need an additional \$500,000 in funds if they were to meet the standards they had set for relief and assistance to the elderly, children and those otherwise in need. I immediately endorsed their request and a Bill to provide the money was approved by the General Assembly.

Then, late in February the same officials visited me again and asked for another \$240,000 in Welfare Funds. In light of the investigation of welfare being made by a specially authorized committee of the Senate and also, I understand, by a committee of the House, I did not feel that I should subscribe to the request until it had been fully deliberated and concluded by you since you have the appropriating power of the State.

You should consider the matter before cuts are automatically put into effect on April 1.

In other words the people on welfare have a right to know whether they must live with reduced payments or whether you will maintain the previous standard and accordingly you should reach a decision this week.

The previously named committee escorted the Governor from the Chamber.

Joint Session adjourned at 2:22 P.M.

#### 5TH LEGISLATIVE DAY — 2nd Session

Governor Terry's veto message of HB 108 with HA 1.

March 6, 1968

To the House of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On February 26, 1968, I received House Bill No. 108 as amended by House Amendment 1, entitled:

"An Act to Amend Chapter 76, Title 29, Delaware Code, Establishing a General Regulation that the Results of Research Projects, Surveys and Similar Endeavors Involving Use of State Funds or Personnel Be Made Public."

I respectifully return House Bill No. 108 with House Amendment 1 to the House of Representatives without my approval.

This bill would make specialized reports available to interested members of the general public in order that all citizens can be aware of the results, recommendations and insight provided by said report. The wider distribution of such expert analysis to the general public, so that they can build their governmental suggestions on a sounder basis of fact, would aid progress in the State of Delaware if the bill more exactly delineated the nature of the reports which were to be made public. Unfortunately, the bill as now drafted would not give agency heads sufficient leeway with regard to some confidential reports and could result in limiting their freedom of action in sensitive areas. Indeed, as the bill is now drafted, certain comments made to me with regard to the advisability of signing into law legislation passed by the General Assembly would probably not be excepted from its coverage and it would be required that these written comments be made public. This would be undesirable, and I am sure that there are other examples of the possible harm that could result were agency heads required to operate in a fish bowl of public comment and reaction to specialized reports.

Governor Terry's veto message on HB 474.

March 4, 1968

To The House of Representatives of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On February 23, 1968, I received House Bill No. 474 entitled:

"An Act Making A Supplementary Appropriation to the Respective Departments of Elections of New Castle, Kent and Sussex Counties and to the Election Commissioner for Implementation of the 1968 Reapportionment Act, and Providing for Equal Division of New Employees of the Respective Departments of Elections Between the Two Major Political Parties."

I respectfully return House Bill No. 474 to the House without my approval.

This bill, would appropriate funds which are essential if the Departments of Elections are to conform their records and procedures to the districts newly created by the 1968 Reapportionment Act. However, this bill would so restrict their hiring practices that I feel required to veto it.

It provides that all employees hired in the future and indeed, even retroactive to January 10, 1968, would have to be "equally divided in political affiliation between the two major political parties." This criteria would eliminate the employment of any Independent or Decline, which is thoroughly inconsistent with our registration demands, and also would create a standard which has no relationship to competency or qualification.

The Speaker called the House to order at 1:43 P.M., on Tuesday, May 7, 1968.

There was a prayer by the Chaplain Rabbi Edward Kandel.

Mr. Cicione was granted privilege of the floor and spoke about his attendance at the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped in Washington, D. C. on May 2nd.

## Mr. Speaker:

I was privileged to attend the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped in Washington, D. C. May 2nd and 3rd. I found this meeting to be most educational and rewarding.

After hearing the Vice President of the United States. other speakers, visiting various workers and reading material offered us, I am most concerned of the state's roll in hiring the handicapped and the welfare of these people who are physically more unfortunate than the non-handicapped. In my opinion, little has been done in the field of employment for the handicapped on the state level. Each year the Governor sets aside one week as "Hire the physically handicapped." This is done to encourage private industry to hire the disabled. I believe it is time the state take the initiative. I believe the state agencies should review their job classifications and take a second look for any possible opportunity to employ a handicapped person. I believe it is time to give these people a place in our society. I believe we should take a second look at the states training programs. I believe the disabled should not be the "disqualified," I consider them the "trainable". I believe state agencies should review their hiring practices and applications as not to disqualify any person for reasons of some disability. Mr. Speaker, if I may, as an example recommend the handicapped be placed at our automatic toll booths on our highways and bridges. Surely, this would give them an opportunity to prove themselves worthwhile.

Other recommendations that I have, would be legislation permitting the state to reimburse private industry for the cost of training the handicapped. This would encourage private industries to employ more handicapped persons, whose accident rates by the way have been proven to be much lower than the non-handicapped and at the same time giving the disabled an incentive of being productive and creative. I am in hopes that more private industries in Delaware will

operate with a more selective idea, that gives everyone, no matter what their handicap, an equal chance of getting a job.

I would also like to touch upon the problem of architectural barriers in our state buildings. Who are we to deny any of those with limited mobility, access to the buildings they must enter to vote, work, learn, play or as a better example even this Legislative Hall. I am hoping consideraton was given to the handicapped in the new addition to Legislative Hall in accordance with legislation passed in 1966. Which permits accessibility to the handicapped to any building built with state funds.

I will introduce a supplementary appropriation bill today for \$2,500 to the Governor's Committee to hire the handicapped as to enable this committee to attend national and state meetings, communicate, cooperate with private industries, releasing annual reports and suggestions for hiring the handicapped.

In conclusion Mr. Speaker, may I say, I hope my remarks have been constructive. All I'm asking is a "little more be done for those who can and are willing to help themselves." With a little help and training, just imagine how much the disabled could add to the wealth of our state.

A messenger from the Senate delivered SB 295 having passed the Senate over the Governor's veto, SB 252, SS 1 for SB 317, and requested the concurrence of the House; and HB 166 with SA 1 and HB 248 having passed the Senate.

The Governor delivered the following message:

Mr. President

Mr. President Pro Tem

Mr. Speaker

Members of the General Assembly

Ladies and Gentlemen:

I appear before you today to present my adopted six year capital improvement program and annual capital budget. The six year program is for fiscal years 1969 through 1974. The annual capital budget is for fiscal year 1969. On three previous occasions I have appeared to present similar messages. In my first message the state agencies and school districts asked for approximately \$49,000,000 in the capital budget year. In this years' capital budget they requested over \$98,000,000. As can be readily seen from these figures, there is a constantly increasing demand on the state to provide additional physical facilities. I feel that I have provided for these needs, although each of my capital budgets and capital programs have been substantially under the amount requested by the agencies and school districts. A review of the authorized, but unissued bond schedule and the construction accounts will show that my capital budgets have provided amply for our needs in this area. Basically there are three questions to be answered in capital programming:

- (1) Is the project a good one?
- (2) When is it needed?
- (3) Can we afford it at the time it is needed? The question that provided the greatest problem is the second one "When is it needed?" We all want better highways, better schools, better parks, better help in welfare facilities; and we want them now. At the same time we want to maintain a good balance between our bonded debt and our revenue and we must retain a reasonable tax structure. We must face the fact that all of our "present" wants cannot be provided without giving up our desire for a good fiscal position or without an exorbitant increase in our taxes. This is what the capital program is all about. In the capital program, I present to you a schedule of our needs within the framework of our ability to pay.

Now to discuss my capital budget and capital program. This year 70 state agencies and school districts submitted 647 capital program requests for the six year capital program. In the capital budget year they requested \$98,539,000. In the capital program they requested \$440,436,000. These figures represent an increase in requests of 109 million dollars over last year's total program request, and an increase of 210 million dollars over my last adopted capital program. I would like to point out at this time that even with a substantial tax increase within the capital program period, a pro-

gram of this immensity could not be financed without creating a drastic distortion in our bonded debt to revenue ratio. Our bonded debt limitation for fiscal year 1969 is computed to be \$456,000,000. This amount will allow authorization of funding up to \$90,000,000 in fiscal year 1969: However, authorization of this amount in the capital budget year would severely limit the authorization of funds in the other five years of the program.

The revenue forecast that has been used for this capital program assumes that there will be some tax rate increase during the last five year period of the program. I am not asking for an increase in taxes this year. Based on this forecast and keeping in mind our bonded debt limitation, I have reviewed each of the submitted project requests and have adopted a six year capital improvement program in the amount of \$272,468,000, which includes a capital budget in the amount of \$56,899,800. Of this capital amount \$1,330,-000 has been funded previously. An additional amount of \$1,920,000 will not be requested for funding at this time. Legislation will be introduced for your deliberation to fund the annual capital improvement program act of 1969 in the amount of \$53,149,800. A second act will be submitted to provide funding of a program to assist communities and counties to acquire and develop local park facilities. Funds for this program will be requested in the amount of \$500,000. Also, a separate act will be submitted to provide \$500,000 toward the Mill Creek flood control project. This is a \$1.8-2 million project of great importance to residents of that area. \$1 million will be provided in federal funds with the balance of the cost being split between New Castle County and the state in an excellent example of federal, state, local cooperation in the meeting of community needs.

My adopted capital budget for fiscal year 1969 and my adopted six year capital improvement program for fiscal years 1969 to 1974 has been prepared and is presented to you at this time. Review of this report will show that in the capital budget:

- (a) Higher education requested \$10,510,000 I recommend \$4,660,000.
- (b) The State Board of Education requested for local schools \$30,348,000 I recommend \$17,175,800.
- (c) The State Highway Department requested \$31,-188,000 I recommend \$22,700,000.
- (d) Other states agencies requested \$26,553,000 I recommend \$12,364,000.

In addition to providing for programs established in previous years, I am recommending in my capital budget that three new programs be initiated. These are:

(a) A State Service Centers Program.

- (b) A Local Park Land Acquisition and Development Assistance Program.
- (c) A Suburban Development Street Reconstruction Program.

The State Service Centers Program will provide facilities for centralized state operated programs located throughout the state. These facilities will be designed to accommodate many types of outpatient clinics, day care centers and other health and welfare programs. I am including in by capital budget a request for the development of the First State Service Center in Newark, Delaware.

The Local Park Land Acquisition and Development Assistance Program will provide communities and counties much needed funds on a matching 50 - 50 basis to acquire and develop local parks and recreation areas. I have recommended that \$500,000 be provided in my capital budget for this program. Future appropriations through the capital improvement program will depend on the degree of use of the proposed current appropriation.

The Suburban Development Street Reconstruction Program is a new program which I have requested the State Highway Department to initiate. This program will reconstruct older subdivision streets throughout the state which were not constructed to current highway standards. I have recommended that \$1,000,000 be provided for this program in the capital budget.

Earlier, I mentioned that there was an amount of \$1,920,000 in my capital budget that I was not requesting to be funded at this time. This amount was provided in my capital budget for a new high school to service either the Bridgeville-Green-wood-Seaford area if the State Board of Education consolidation program is implemented. This facility is recognized by the Local School District Board and the State Board of Education as being badly needed. The recent failure of local referendum precludes my consideration of funding this project at this time. In the consideration of my capital budget for local school needs, I have deferred funding of projects requested by the State Board of Education which were promulgated on the boards' consolidation program. The projects requested were for the following areas:

- (1) Southeastern Sussex
- (2) Georgetown-Milton
- (3) Laurel-Delmar
- (4) Midletown-Odessa

This is not to say that I do not endorse the principles of the consolidation program wholeheartedly, but rather to say that I cannot conscientiously provide funding of these projects at this early date when there has been no action either with local referenda or through Legislative passage of the Educational Advancement Act to establish the actual configuration of these consolidated school districts. I would urge at this time that the General Assembly, the State Board of Education and the citizens of this great state work together with me to provide the necessary consolidation that we must have to continue the increase of quality in education that is the just right of our children of today and tomorrow. I want you to know that I will follow this program very closely this session.

In addition to the mentioning of new programs and to my position on school construction funding, there are other policy considerations in the capital improvement program that I wish to present at this time:

- (1) I have again incorporated the "minor capital improvement program for schools" in my capital budget.
- (2) All capital projects included in the capital budget that require funding except the Local Parks Land Acquisition and Assistance Program are incorporated into one omnibus bill.
- (3) I am submitting legislation to remove bonding authorization in the amount of \$5,164,382 for projects that are no longer contemplated for initiation.
- (4) I am urging that House Bill Number 153 that was introduced in the first session of the 124th General Assembly be passed this session. This act is the second leg of the constitutional amendment that would prohibit the state's bonded debt from exceeding 3.4 times the state's previous year's normal general fund revenue.

I will present an act that will establish definite dates annually for the receipt of Capital Improvement Program requests by the State Planning Office and for the presentation of my adopted Capital Improvement Program to the General Assembly.

I wish to emphasize at this time that the Capital Improvement Program I am presenting here today considers the need of all state agencies both large and small. It must be understood that the relative importance of a project to an agency and to the state cannot be judged by the monetary amount alone. We must not overlook the needs of our smaller agencies as has been the case in the failure of passage of legislation in the last two capital budgets.

In conclusion, if through your deliberation you conclude that amendments should be made to the proposed legislation presented here today, I ask that I have an opportunity to review these amendments before they are introduced to the General Assembly. The same committee escorted Governor Charles L. Terry, Jr. from the Chamber.

The Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House compared their Journals and found them to be in agreement.

The Joint Session adjourned at 2:45 P.M.

Dear Members of the House and Committee Members:

In my opinion, the present form of this Fish and Game Merger Bill is the final step in the finest piece of work ever done by a committee in the history of the Delaware Legislature. This bipartisan group, the Joint Fish, Oyster and Game Committee, has taken their responsibilities seriously, despite the fact that many of the committee were new legislators. and despite the fact that before this a majority of the Committee's principal contact with the Shell Fish Industry occurred in restaurants. These legislators working together heard the testimony of approximately 30 citizens including watermen. commissioners and biology experts and through their dedi-cation to their task there was a realization that a need to reform the law existed. This Committee gathered the facts at a dozen investigative sessions held last summer and produced a report which was richer in content than many reports for which we in Delaware have paid tens of thousands of dollars to consulting firms. (Many of these reports ended up in the trash rather than in action.)

Subsequent to publishing the report itself which made certain legislative recommendations, there was no slackening of effort. The Committee and its staff, F. L. Peter Stone, attorney, and Ruth Potter, secretary, proceeded to draft a bill to carry out each recommendation of the report. After consulting with Fish and Game improvements were made in the original draft and the result is the progressive Shellfish-Fish and Game Merger Bill before this body today.

As a result of these hard-working legislators' efforts, we now have many well informed people in the State Legislature who can proceed to implement the necessary legislation that has been long needed in an area which has been so politically charged that no one before ever dared try to straighten it out.

There are many more areas in Delaware where similar work can, could, and should be done, and I hope this effort serves as a model and guide for effective legislative committee work in the future.

Dear Representative Murphy:

I would like to endorse House Bill No. 523 establishing public kindergartens in the State of Delaware and also to inform you that this bill has the full endorsement of the State Board of Education.

In 1952, my first year in Delaware, I had the privilege of speaking in the General Assembly in support of public kindergartens because I was then, and still am, convinced that this is the most vital program need in the State of Delaware. I have never been able to understand why a state as progressive as Delaware should be so far behind the other states (now 35) who provide public kindergartens at state and local expense.

Every report or study on matters affecting the learning process indicate that the pre-school years are the most formative years of one's life and we must begin early to develop good habits and attitudes if we are to even begin to make inroads into the problems of the disadvantaged. The sad fact is that the children who need kindergarten most are the least able to afford them. As a matter of fact, we should at this stage be beyond public kindergartens and thinking about nursery school education for all children.

I commend you for sponsoring this legislation and the strong stand you have taken in support of this educational need. Certainly we must be as concerned about preventive measures as we are about corrective measures. The time for action is certainly now and I know you have the full support of the teaching profession.

I am sure that all the students at Delaware State were fully aware of the College rules and regulations when they enrolled. If they find that they do not wish to abide by, or, cannot abide by these rules, then they have a choice - either conform to the rules or leave the campus. They have no other "right" and should be given none.

Mr. Speaker Hering read a statement of explanation re: **HB** 558 and **HB** 559.

I am introducing today a bill that requires at least a brief measure of explanation.

Basically, it is designed to provide continuing funds for the state to deal with major disasters, under which I include both natural disasters such as storms and civil disorders.

Some of you may know that such a fund was established in Delaware following the severe storm of March 1962. My intent now is to insure the continuance of such a fund and to provide it with money.

For when disaster occurs, it does not choose the most convenient time, and it is often imperative that we move quickly. With such a fund, administered by the Governor and the Secretary of State, Delaware would be able to move quickly, not having to await approval of Federal funds or convening of the General Assembly.

There are actually two bills in this package. The first measure includes civil disorder, riot and insurrection as "major disasters" within the scope of present law and provides an appropriation of \$500,000 to establish the fund. This fund, under the bill, would always include that amount.

The second measure is a bond bill authorizing the State to borrow up to \$1 million as needed to supplement this fund. Again, the idea is to provide the State with a method of instant response in the event of disaster. This might include paying the National Guard or State Police.

I see no reason why these measures should be controversial and hope they will be enacted as soon as practical.

Statement by Mr. Speaker Hering:

Over past years we have all heard a lot about a cabinet form of government or about reorganizing or consolidating state agencies. We are all aware that there are in Delaware well over a hundred agencies, boards and commissions, and many of us would probably agree that our state could run more efficiency with fewer of them.

Governor Terry found the matter important enough to ask his Goals Commission to consider the subject, and that group produced a report in April of 1967 that recommended various consolidations. Unfortunately, the Governor limited the scope of the commission's work, but ragardless of that there were a number of interesting ideas presented. The report which incidentally cost the taxpayers \$28,000, even included in its appendix various specific bills.

In March of 1967 Governor Terry appeared before the Senate and advocated two major consolidations — joining Mental Health with the Department of Health and the Board of Corrections with the Youth Services Commission. These ideas, by the way, were not directly taken from the report.

The net result of all of this talk, work, and expense to

date has been a big fat zero.

Today I am introducing a series of 10 bills that are taken directly from the Goals Commission Report. I have merely copied them from the appendix, in some instances advancing the effective dates because of the time that has elapsed I am placing these measures before you without taking any position on them at this time but rather because I feel strongly that it is time we began to consider this subject. The Governor has talked and promised, but we have yet to see any action, and we cannot wait forever.

Most of these bills are minor. At least one is of considerable importance. But major or minor, I see no reason why they should remain in the back of a \$28,000 report gathering dust.

The most important of these 10 measures is unquestionably one to create an office of General Administrative Services and to assign to it the functions currently being undertaken by a long list of agencies and boards. Included would be such areas as the State Custodian, Professional and Occupational Licensing, and General Purchasing.

The remaining measures briefly are these:

— To transfer functions of the Delaware State Poultry Commission to the Department or School of Agriculture of the University of Delaware.

- To abolish the Delaware State Apple Commission and

repeal the Apple Tax.

- To abolish the Delaware Day Commission and transfer its functions to the Delaware State Development Department.
   To assign General Jurisdiction and Supervision of the Bingo Control Commission to the State Tax Commissioner.
- To assign Jurisdiction and Supervision over the Board of Boiler Rules to the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations.
- To change the title of the State Archivist in the Public Archives Commission to the Director of Archives and Museums.
- To assign Jurdistiction and Supervision of the Lewes Memorial Commission to the Director of Archives and Museum.

- To abolish the Portrait Commission and transfer its functions to the Director of Archives and Museums.
- To assign Jurisdiction and Supervision of the Delaware Archaeological Board to the Director of Archives and Museums.

I hope that we can now begin to consider these measures and perhaps enact at least some of them this year. There is no reason to wait further.

- HB 577 An Act to amend Delaware Code, Title 14, by providing authorization for establishing and financing year-round school programs in public schools. Introduced by Reps. Heckert, Gooding, Sebrell and Evans. Referred to the Committee on Education.

Introduced by Senator Isaacs. Referred to the Committee on Revised Statutes.
- SB 231 with SA 1, 2 and 3 An Act to amend Chapter 7, Title 17, Delaware Code, by prohibiting every Railroad Company in this State from electing, planting, and/or maintaining certain hedges, shrubs, trees, solid fences and other large solid objects from its property or right of way and providing procedures where railroad company fail to comply. Introduced by Senator Isaacs. Referred to the Committee on Revised Statutes.
- SCR 33 Relative to the death of Howard S, Abbott, a former State Tax Commissioner. Introduced by Senator Steen. On motion of Mr. Hale SCR 33 was adopted by voice vote.

Veto Message from the Governor on HB 566.

May 31, 1968

To the House of the 124th General Assembly of the State of Delaware:

On May 22, 1968, I received House Bill No. 566 as amended by House Amendment 1 and 2, entitled:

"An Act to amend Title 6, Delaware Code, Entitled "Commerce and Trade" providing for a Rate of Interest not in excess of 8 per cent per annum."

I respectfully return House Bill No. 566 as amended by House Amendment 1 and 2 to the House of Representatives without my approval.

I do this because certain financial institutions questioned the construction that might be placed on Section 3 of this Bill which reads as follows:

Section 3. "Sections 1 and 2 of this Act shall become effective immediately upon passage of this bill and shall terminate as of October 1, 1969, whereupon the provisions of §2301, Title 6, Delaware Code, in effect prior to passage of this Act shall become reinstated."

Some out-of-state institutions felt that the language therein could be interpreted as allowing an interest rate between 6 and 8% on mortgages executed after passage of this Act only up to date of October 1, 1969, and these mortgages would then have to reflect an interest rate of no more than 6% for the balance of the mortgage's term. This clearly was not the intent of the Legislature nor the construction which I place on it. However, if some lending institutions would refuse to accept Delaware mortgages because of their fear that the language of Section 3 could be so interpreted the bill would not serve its purpose of relieving the present tight money situation. Rather than leave this question in doubt and possibly defeating the purpose of the Bill, I called attorneys from all large lending institutions in Delaware to my office for a conference at which clear and unambiguous language revising Section 3 was agreed upon.

A bill incorporating this new Section 3, namely House Bill No. 588 was then introduced and passed by the General Assembly. House Bill No. 588 has since been signed into law.

## State of Delaware STATE PERSONNEL COMMISSION Statement of Policy

WHEREAS it is the best interest of the State government that all Boards, Commissions, Agency heads, State employees and employee representatives affected by the State Merit System be advised at the earlist possible date concerning the personnel matter the State Personnel Commission believes best and properly administered in a uniform manner at the State level as distinguished from those matters the Commission believes may be determined at the individual agency level, and

WHEREAS it is the desire of the State Personnel Commission to exercise its statutory duties and responsibilities so as to develop and administer a comprehensive Merit System that is compatible with the statutory right of State employees to organize and bargain collectively, now, therefore:

BE IT RESOLVED by the State Personnel Commission that the policies and guidelines set forth below are hereby promulgated as the policies and guidelines of the State Personnel Commission and shall be distributed to the State agencies and State employees affected thereby:

- 1. Rules and regulations in the following areas shall be uniform and shall be determined at the State level. Prior to the initial promulgation of such rules and regulations, and prior to any changes therein, the State Personnel Commission will meet with any State Officers, employees or employee representatives affected thereby who request such a meeting and will discuss in good faith any such rules and regulations:
  - a. Position Classification Plan.
  - b. Uniform Pay Plan.
  - c. Competitive examinations, appointment of highest ranking candidates, eligibility lists and rejection for unfitness.
  - d. Number of days of leave of absence with pay (vacation, sick and special leave).
  - e. Promotions, only to the extent of determining that the person being promoted meets the position classification requirements (by evaluation or, if appropriate, by non-competitive examination) and, in the event there is no qualified employee in the agency in which the vacancy exists, by holding competitive interagency examinations.
  - f. Inter-agency transfers.
- II. Rules and regulations in the following areas shall have general application unless otherwise determined at the agency level within the specific statutory limitations noted. This means that such areas are clearly within the scope of collective bargaining between organized groups of employees and their respective agency heads. It also means that in the absence of a collective bargaining agreement any agency head is free to make his determinations in such areas:
  - a. Promotions, except that the Director shall determine, by evaluation or non-competitive examination: that the person being promoted meets the position classification requirements, and shall hold competitive inter-agency examinations in the event no employee in the agency meets such requirements.
  - b. Probation regulations, except the period of probation shall not exceed 12 months, the probationary employee shall be entitled to appropriate performance reports warning of any poor performance, and the appointing authority shall notify the Personnel Director in writing concerning the services of the probationary employee within 10 days prior to the expiration of the employee's probationary period.
  - c. Emergency employment not to exceed 30 days with or without examination, with the consent of the Personnel Director.

- d. Provisional employment without competitive examamination when no appropriate eligible list is available except that no such provisional employment shall continue longer than six months. The six month limitation need not be applicable until July 1, 1969.
- All intra-agency transfers where no change in classification is involved.
- f. Reinstatement of persons who resign in good standing or who are laid off without fault or delinquency on their part, subject to the approval of the Personnel Director on each reinstatement.
- g. Performance Records.
- h. Intra-agency layoffs, transfers or reduction in rank because of lack of funds or work, or abolition of a position, or material change in duties or organization, and for the reemployment of employees so laid off.
- Disciplinary measures including fines of not more than 10 days' pay or suspension from service without pay for not more than 30 days.
- j. Discharge or reduction in rank or grade after the probationary period except that such employee shall have the right of appeal set forth in the statute.
- Employee grievances and complaints; optional use of outside mediation or arbitration services.
- Work schedules, call-in provisions, attendance regulations and rest periods.
- m. Leaves of absence without pay.
- n. Development and operation of programs to improve work effectiveness and morale of employees in State service, including training, safety, health, welfare, counseling, recreation and employee relations.
- III. There are certain usual areas of employer-employee relations and employee working conditions not specifically mandated to the State Personnel Commission. In some cases these areas are specifically treated in the Delaware Code. The State Personnel Commission cannot or will not make rules and regulations in these areas and, within statutory limits, matters in such areas may be determined at the agency level. The list set forth below is intended to be illustrative and not necessarily inclusive; it is only set forth for the purpose of making this a more comprehensive statement of policy:
  - a. Legal holidays.
  - b. Pay days, payroll procedures and payroll deductions.
  - Workmen's Compensation and Unemployment Insurance.
  - d. Employees' Pension System.
  - e. Medical, surgical and life insurance benefits.
  - f. Union shop agreements.

Where specific practices are mandated in the State Code to bodies other than the State Personnel Commission these will be incorporated in Commission rules, regulations or operating manuals with appropriate statutory reference.

Adopted: February 6, 1968

Mr. Benson also read a statement on behalf of the sponsors in answer to questions which were raised in discussing the bill.

June 17, 1968

Questions have been raised about the effect of several sections of **HB** 624.

I have spoken to the other sponsors of the Bill, Representatives Benson and Cashman, and they have authorized me to make this statement in answer to these questions.

A question was asked about the position of the Personnel Commission and of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees with respect to the Bill. The Bill was requested by AFSCME.

A letter dated June 13, 1968 from the Chairman of the Personnel Commission cited the intention of the AFSCME and the Commission's views of the Bill. I quote from the Chairman's letter, which was written in response to Representative Benson's request for the Commission's views:

"Representatives of Council 81 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees have conferred with the chairman and director of the Commission indicating their belief in the desirability of putting into statutory form the substance of the Commission's Statement of Policy on the relationship between the merit system law and the law providing to public employees in Delaware the right to organize and to bargain collectively.

"The representatives of Council 81 indicated that in their opinion this subject was sufficiently sensitive and important in nature that it should be covered by legislation. They also indicated that passage of such legislation would represent a long-term statement of the relative jurisdictions of the two statutes.

"On this basis, we have reviewed HB 624; we believe it incorporates the substance of the present Statement of Policy of the Commission and does not impair the integrity of a sound and progressive merit system. Accordingly, the Commission has no objection to its passage."

The letter from the Chairman has the unanimous approval of the Personnel Commission.

I am asking that a copy of the Commission's Policy Statement be filed with the transcript of my remarks.

In answer to another question, Section 7 of HB 624, which provides the relative jurisdictions of the merit system and of the collective bargaining law, is not intended to affect

the Commission's authority under general provisions of the merit system law such as the definition of "terms" or the description of the "classified service".

A question was also asked about the import of the words "to negotiate in good faith", which appear in Section 7 (e) of HB 624.

Previously, HB 493 would have required the Commission to "confer and negotiate to decision". The words were changed to those as in HB 624, on the express understanding that the term "to negotiate in good faith" means to discuss or confer in good faith, with no obligation of any kind, express or implied that any agreement must flow from such discussions.

In answer to another question, Section 5 of HB 624, which would amend Section 5916 of the Merit System law by limiting the pay plan to salary and pay schedules, would, of course, permit the Commission to promulgate appropriate implementing rules relating to the lists containing salary and pay classifications.
