Fullback Ron McCoy Leads Hen Rushing As Delaware Defeats Temple Owls 20-8

Delaware's defense drew praise from Coach Dave Nelson after the Hen's 20-8 victory over the Temple Owls last Saturday at Philadelphia.

Playing under the lights for the first time in 10 years, Delaware consistently thwarted the eager Owl offense, twice holding at the goal line for dramatic stands.

"We played well defensively—and so did Temple," Nelson said. "They couldn't score when they were given opportunities—we could."

"When we had to make the play, we made it," the Admiral added.

Among Hens making the plays on the bitterly cold evening were senior Fullback Ron McCoy from Smyrna, who sustained Delaware drives and finished with 45 yards in eight carries, the game's best individual rushing performance; Quarterback Ted Kempki, Wilmington senior, whose only completed pass (the tried two) was a 56-yard touchdown toss to classmate Tom Michaels, fullback; and a number of Hen linemen.

Singled out for praise up front were Junior Tackle Paul Cheshire, 220-pound Baltimore native, who outplayed a highly-touted tackle opponent for the fourth straight week, in this case the Owl's Bill Lites; Guard Don James, junior from Delmar, who stalled an Owl drive with an 11-yard pass interception runback; Guard Jim Quirk, a frequent unswelcome guest in the Temple backfield all evening; and Guard Don Burawski, sophomore from Wilmington, who made the pass interception of the night, a fourth-quarter theft which led directly to Delaware's final touchdown and ended a determined Temple scoring threat.

The 215-pound Burawski had intercepted two passes against Connecticut the previous Saturday and was named to the All-ECAC College Team of the Week.

Another significant individual performance was turned in by senior Fred (The Bull) Rullo, of Chester, Pa. Rullo's versatility gave the Hens excellent protection from his corner back post, and also produced a 36-yard punting average.

Rullo was pressed into service as the punter after regular kicker Arnie Rozental suffered a charley horse earlier in the week.

Delaware fought back from the 2-0 first quarter deficit incurred when Halfback Mike Brown was tackled in his own end zone for a safety. The Kempki-to-Michaels "bomb" made it 6-2, and although a pass-conversion attempt failed, Delaware scored again before the half ended as senior Halfback Clint Ware, amazing 155-pounder from Salem, N. J., swept in to score his sixth TD of '62 from the four.

The touchdown had been set up by a wild center pass which saw Owl punter Dave Townsend forced to eat the ball at the Temple seven.

November is a good time to plant roses, advises Dave Tattall, assistant agent in ornamental horticulture.

Soil is a fairly sunny, well-drained spot for your rose plants. Thoroughly work the soil up and mix in plenty of peat or compost, and also some ground limestone at the rate of about five pounds per 100 sq. ft.

As soon as you obtain your plants, get them out. Prepare the holes large enough to easily accommodate all the roots. The plants should be set at a depth where the bud union (the joint between top and roots) is just under the surface of the soil.

Spread the roots naturally in the hole; firm soil about them; and water thoroughly to eliminate air pockets. Then fill the remaining portion of the hole.

To protect your newly planted roses from winter injury, mound up additional soil about the plants to a height of from 8 to 10 inches.

And at this time of year, Tattall adds, limit pruning of your rose plants to the removal of dead, diseased, or broken wood.

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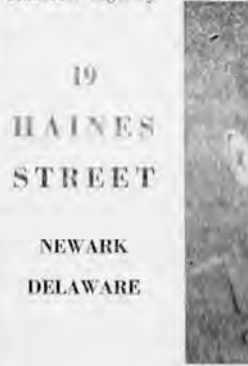
