





What are homeowners' options for managing yard waste?

- The City of Newark picks up yard waste for free for city residents through its Bulk Collection Program. Miscellaneous yard waste must be prepared in bundles less than four feet long and less than 40 lbs. in weight, or placed in approved 32-gallon containers. A maximum of six bundles or six containers or any combination of six total will be accepted at no cost on a scheduled, first-call-first-served bulk collection basis. Call the City at 366-7040 for more information.
- Handle it yourself by composting, using a mulching mower, or by taking it to one of the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC) free community yard waste drop-off sites:
 - Look into starting a compost pile in your yard. Delaware Solid Waste Authority (DSWA) and the University of Delaware Extension Offices are both selling composting

bins for \$10.00. The bin can be expanded to three feet in diameter.

- Take yard waste to the convenient, free drop-off facility on Polly Drummond Hill Road.
- You can also arrange to have someone else manage your yard waste by either hiring a landscaper or making arrangements to have your waste hauler remove your yard waste.
- Sign-up for DSWA's *Pay-As-You-Throw* yard waste collection program. Residents purchase stickers for a \$1 a bag and place yard waste at the curb for pick-up by DSWA. Stickers must be bought in \$10 increments. Call 1-800-404-7080 or visit http://dswa.com/programs_ yard.asp for more information.

As you may have heard, at midnight on February 17, 2009, all full-power television stations in the United States will stop broadcasting in analog and switch to 100% digital broadcasting. Digital broadcasting provides a clearer picture and more programming options, and will free up airwaves for use by emergency responders.

Congress has created the TV Converter Box Coupon Program for households wishing to keep using their analog TV sets after February 17, 2009. The Program allows U.S. households to obtain up to two coupons, each worth \$40, which can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes.

A TV connected to cable, satellite or other pay TV service does not require a TV converter box from this program. Converter boxes are expected to cost between \$50 and \$70.

Consumers have a variety of options:

- 1. keep your existing analog TV and purchase a TV converter box. A converter box plugs into your TV and will keep it working after Feb. 17, 2009; or
- 2. connect to cable, satellite or other pay service, or
- 3. purchase a television with a digital tuner.



Planning a Fall Community Cleanup?

Each fiscal year I receive a landfill user fee credit of \$1,000 for use in my district. The purpose is to encourage neighborhoods to conduct community cleanups by making it cheaper to dispose of the collected trash.


Here's how it works: pick a date (usually a Saturday) for your municipal, non-profit, or other local community association to organize a cleanup in your neighborhood. Then contact my office, and I'll provide you with a form for your truck driver to take to the land fill that day along with the trash you've picked up. (Sorry, I can't provide the truck!) The landfill operator will allow your driver to dispose of the trash without charge, and take the tipping fee (currently \$61.50/ton) off my credit account.

NEW LONDON AVENUE SCHOOL

The first documented public school for African-American youth in the Newark community was established in 1867 by the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Abandoned Lands. This was one of several schools established in Delaware during the post-Civil War "reconstruction" period through this federal government program, which was designed to assist African-Americans in former slave states. In 1922 a new school housing grades 1-8 was built here on land purchased from John Nields. There were four classrooms on the first floor and a lunchroom in the basement. Funding for construction was provided by P.S. duPont and the Delaware School Auxiliary Association. The building functioned as a school until integration took place in 1958. The school and surrounding property, also known as "School Hill", was an important meeting place for neighborhood residents for social and recreational gatherings as well. In 1961, the City of Newark purchased the building and grounds. Significant renovations took place and the New London Community Center opened in 1970. In 1977, the building was renamed in honor of George M. Wilson, a leader in improving housing conditions for members of Newark's African-American community and former member of Newark's City Council.

The Delaware Assistive Technology Initiative (DATI) is a wonderful organization that makes assistive technology available through its demonstration/ loan program. Included are hearing aids, text telephones, computer screen readers, magnifying glasses, Braille embossers, clothing with Velcro fasteners, wheelchairs, walkers, and special toys for children. Delaware residents can borrow equipment for temporary disabilities, "test drive" assistive technology devices, or watch demonstrations of various assistive technology options. The borrower must be a resident of Delaware; the standard loan period is two weeks; and a maximum of four devices may be borrowed at one time.

As a result of legislation I sponsored, citizens can fight back with an Identity Theft Passport which can be presented to law enforcement agencies, creditors, and consumer reporting agencies as official notice that substantiates that you have been a victim. 
Vial of Life Kits Available

The New Castle County Vial of Life program is offered to residents who suffer from disease and take medications on a daily basis. The program provides a form on which you can list your medical history, medications taken on a daily basis, and any other medications you take or significant allergies you have. Other information can include your family doctor, cardiologist or other specialist, and hospital of choice. You then place the form in a small medication-sized container labeled "Vial of Life" and store it in your refrigerator. A magnetic card is provided to attach to the outside of the refrigerator to indicate that the vial is inside. Although the vial does not require refrigeration, this location was chosen as it is a nearly universal appliance within the home. Emergency medical personnel responding to an emergency at your home are trained to look for the magnet on the refrigerator

and take the Vial of Life along with you if you must go to the hospital.

The Vial of Life program helps eliminate common errors that occur when a person is rushed to the hospital. Among them: inadvertently omitting a medication a patient was taking at home during a hospital stay; failing to ensure that home medications temporarily stopped during a hospital stay are restarted when the patient is discharged; duplicating medication orders because of confusion between brand and generic versions of a drug; and prescribing incorrect dosages.

Report to the People

Dear Neighbor,

I am very honored to serve as State Representative from Newark's 23rd District. I have met and talked with many of you during the past six years, and I always welcome your comments, suggestions, concerns, and problems. The 145th General Assembly has been one of the most challenging two-year legislative sessions in our history. We faced a record \$800 million revenue shortfall last fiscal year. FY10, which resulted in several difficult votes for all of us. This year we managed to balance the budget without raising taxes. Responsible cuts produced a Fiscal Year 2011 Budget over \$57 million less than the state budget passed in FY09. Over the past two years we have cut 1,026 positions from state government out of 16,000 – without any layoffs – even though the demand for state services like education and healthcare have grown. We also eliminated over \$300 million in expenditures and made government more efficient while maintaining critical state services. However, we will continue to face challenging budget issues in the foreseeable future and must continue to look for cost-saving measures while preserving our core mission of serving our citizens.

On a more positive note, we expanded the Freedom of Information Act and opened access to the budget process before the close of session. We enhanced protections for Delaware's vulnerable children and infirm adults. We established a curbside recycling program and passed a series of energy conservation and efficiency bills. New initiatives to offer more flexibility and incentives for small businesses were instituted. And we passed legislation protecting the rights of all Delawareans regardless of sexual orientation. Identity Theft

The 23rd District is home to many retired State employees, especially retired teachers. I am concerned about the security breach involving State benefits' consultant, Aon, and the publication of your personal information on the internet. My husband, Kit, and I were recently victims of identity theft (not related to Aon), so I know how frustrating it can be. (I coincidentally benefitted from a piece of my own legislation by getting an identity theft passport from the AG's office.)

On September 1, I asked the Office of Management and Budget to require Aon to offer lifetime credit monitoring to victims at no cost, instead of the current proposal of one year's monitoring. When I receive any more information, I will pass it along.


REAL ID Driver's Licenses

In 2005, the U.S. Congress passed the REAL ID Act to create a driver's license and identification card that would improve the integrity and security of state-issued licenses and cards to help fight terrorism and reduce fraud. This new license/ID card can be used to board commercial aircraft and enter federal buildings such as the Allen Frear Federal Building in Dover.

Beginning in 2010, those of you visiting the DMV who want to get this secure license/ID card must bring source

strict cell phone usage while driving when it passed House Bill 229, which I co-sponsored. The comprehensive statewide restriction requires drivers to use a hands-free device – such as a headset or speakerphone – to talk while driving, and also prohibits text messaging, sending or reading e-mails or browsing websites while the vehicle is in motion. The cell-phone bill, which takes effect January 2, 2011, permits

a driver to punch in a number or activate the hands-free device, but the driver must put the phone down while talking. A first violation of this primary offense will carry a

documents such as a birth certificate, passport or immigration documents to establish your identity, social security information and proof of residency.

Keep in mind that this is an optional process. You still can get a standard license or identification card the same as you have done for years. Beginning December, 2014, you will not be able to use that standard card as identification for federal purposes, such as boarding a commercial flight or entering a federal building. The way the

> federal law is written, you will need the secure license/ID card **or** another secure document (such as a passport) to fly commercially or walk into a federal building.

The bill allows exemptions for police, firefighters and other emergency personnel. It also allows drivers to report an accident, fire, reckless driver or another emergency.

Federal law allows you to receive one free credit report every twelve months. Please log on to www. annualcreditreport.com or call toll free 1-877-322-8228. It is a good idea to check your credit report every year to protect yourself from identity theft. Do not be fooled by organizations with similar-sounding names who advertise heavily on radio and TV. Annualcreditreport.com is the only government-approved entity to offer you one free credit report per year, no strings attached.

You may also include your family doctor, cardiologist or other specialist, and your preferred hospital. The form is placed in a small medication sized container labeled "Vial of Life" and is stored in the refrigerator. A magnetic card is provided to attach to the outside of the refrigerator to indicate that the vial is inside. County EMS personnel are trained to look on your refrigerator door if they are called to your home for an emergency. 
Race to the Top
