Ebenezer Methodist Church
The big event is homecoming this Sunday, when the 130th anniversary of the church will be celebrated. Two special services will be held—one at 11 a.m., the other, at 2 p.m. The Rev. Samuel Snyder of Westminster, Md., will bring the morning message and the Rev. Scott Guthrie, pastor of Parkside Methodist Church, Chester, Pa., the afternoon sermon.

Horney became minister, the church property was valued at \$42,500 and the membership was 177. To date, the valuation has increased to \$34,000 and the membership has jumped to 274.

Ebenezer is a growing church in a rapidly growing community and it has a rich past and very bright future. Lunch will be served at 12:30 p.m.

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Delaware Dramatic Conference Events Scheduled Oct. 29

Shakespeare To Be Theme Of Annual Program Held At University of Delaware

Several outstanding program features have been arranged by C. Robert Kase, chairman of the Department of Dramatic Arts and Speech, for the 15th Delaware Dramatic Conference on Oct. 29, at the University of Delaware.

In keeping with the conference theme, "Shakespeare on our Stages," Dr. Kase has secured a new motion picture, "Shakespeare's Theatre: The Globe Theatre," which recently has been filmed at UCLA. It is an authentic account of the Globe Playhouse and how Shakespeare's plays were produced there. Its showing at the conference will be the first in the Delaware area.

Three local people, each of whom is prominent in theatrical affairs, have been secured to conduct a program feature, "Producing, Staging, and Costuming Shakespeare." William P. Frank, Mrs. Burt Hurlong, and Mrs. Phyllis Preston will take part in this important phase of activity.

Three Delaware high schools will contribute reading performances of scenes from Shakespeare.

Students from Smyrna High School will present Act I, Scene I, of "Macbeth" under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Williams.

PASSING THE BUCK

HISTORICAL REVIEWS OF THE NEWARK AREA

By ETHEL M. HILL

Delaware College was built in 1833 and finished in 1834 and it has been said that the college was built out west of town. The town in those days was centered near the Chapel Street-Main Street intersection.

It is believed that the hill on which the college was built is the site of an old burying ground, but this has not been clearly established.

The college was not originally built as it appears now. A floor has been removed over the oratory on which were rooms for students, and as each room had its own stove, a chimney was needed for every two rooms. These chimneys have been removed and about 20 ft. built to each end beyond the oratory. Much of the old walls was torn out and rebuilt in 1917.

The original building was done by Winslow Lewis. Whether he was of the Lewis family of Newark is not known. The local cemeteries have been examined but no stone marking his burial has been found.

Ground Work
In 1833, trenches for the foundation were being dug, the boys playing around—jumping over and into the mud and building material and making general nuisance of themselves as boys have been doing for ages.

The builder called one of the leaders of the boys, gave him a trowel of mortar and a brick and said, "get down into that foundation trench and lay this first brick and you may be proud to say in many years, that you laid the first brick in the foundation of the college."

This boy was a student in 1833 at Newark Academy. His name was Manlove Hayes. He was later a trustee of Delaware College, when I went to Newark public school, and his grandson, Manlove Hayes Wilson of Dover, was then a student at Delaware College.

The oratory was still the same in 1897 when my class commencement exercises were held there—13 graduates in the largest class from the Newark public school under principal A. Lee Ellis—later the horse and buggy physician of Baltimore.

College Doll
In remodeling the old College Building—tearing out the chimney and the floor where the students rooms had been—the workmen found a little doll in the wall. It is known that girls attended Delaware College from 1872 to 1885, but do most college girls take their dolls with them to college?

When the doll was found in the wall in 1917, so great was the impression on the students that they asked to have the doll sealed in a jar and put back into the wall. So someplace in the wall of old College Hall is this quaint toy.

Delaware college is a land grant college. The Women's College was opened to girl students in 1914 with Miss Winnifred J. Robinson as dean.

In 1921, by an act of the general assembly, the name of the college

Blue Cross Weighs Proposed Changes In Hospital Plan

Extended Time Coverage, Added Maternity Benefit Considered By Officials

Changes in the Blue Cross contract to increase benefits in line with recommendations from members are under study by Group Hospital Service, Inc., and decisions will be announced within the next week, it was reported yesterday by Harold V. Mayhew, managing director.

Recommendations received from Blue Cross group representatives have indicated two principal areas where increases in benefits are particularly desired. These are:

1. Coverage of longer duration to help meet the expenses of prolonged hospitalization of members.

2. A boost in the amount of maternity benefits.

At present, Blue Cross pays the full semi-private room rate for its members for up to 30 days in any one illness. After that, the hospitalization organization pays at the rate of \$5 a day for 90 days if the member's illness is longer than 30 days.

Representatives of groups, in a series of meetings with Blue Cross officials, have suggested that the length of coverage at the full semi-private room rate be extended, and that the rate paid per day for any stay beyond that period be boosted from \$5 a day for 90 days to \$8 or \$10 a day for a longer period.

On maternity benefits, group representatives have suggested that the present \$50 fee payment, in the Surgical-Medical plan be increased. Blue Cross can increase benefits in any way the members desire, but increased benefits means increased rates. Mr. Mayhew pointed out. The object of the present study is to determine what various improvements in benefits would cost, and which would best fit present needs of the 224,000 Delaware Blue Cross members.
