Local Post Office Employees Honored For '68 Suggestions

Newark Post Office Tops In Class For Nation As Ideas Offered By Employees Provide \$17,000 Annual Savings; Wm. H. Fraser, Ottavio Cataldi Receive Special Awards

Additional honors came to employees of the Newark Post Office recently for their 1968 participation in the Post Office Department's suggestion program.

The Postmaster General's Special Citation, a walnut-based plaque, was presented to Newark Post Office employees by David S. Bitterman, suggestions and awards administrator of regional headquarters in Philadelphia.

The Newark Post Office earned this award by having the greatest total dollar benefits from adopted employee suggestions, of any post office in the United States, in competition limited to offices with no more than 125 employees.

Letter of Commendation
Assistant Postmaster General Richard J. Murphy in a letter to the Newark Post Office, stated "I sincerely appreciate this outstanding display of interest in service improvement through use of the employees suggestion program."

The suggestion program affords any and all postal employees a formal means of bringing to the attention of top management their ideas on how to improve any facet of postal operations or equipment being used.

During 1968, employees of the Newark Post Office submitted 47 suggestions and had 21 of these adopted.

Tops For Size
The more than \$17,000 in attendant savings was the greatest savings in any one post office of this size.

William H. Fraser of the Newark Post Office received a special citation from the postmaster general for his suggestions that are saving the Newark office more than \$12,000 annually.

Fraser also received the Newark "Suggestioner of the Year" plaque.

Supervisor Of The Year
Ottavio G. Cataldi was named "Supervisor of the Year" at Newark. This honor is bestowed upon the supervisor, who in the opinion of management, made the best use of the suggestions program by motivating his subordinates to present ways to improve existing operational patterns.

The Newark Post Office also received achievement certificates from J. J. Doherty, regional director, for having exceeded the 25 per cent participation quota, and having better than 20 per cent adoption of suggestions.

John R. Ferron To Head Rochester Chem Engineering

U. of D. Prof. To Succeed
Shelby Miller Next Fall
At University Of Rochester

John R. Ferron, professor of chemical engineering at the University of Delaware, has been named professor and chairman of the department of chemical engineering at the University of Rochester, effective next September.

Ferron will succeed Prof. Shelby A. Miller, chairman of the department from 1955 to 1967, who will become associate director of Argonne National Laboratory.

Ferron joined the Delaware faculty in 1958, after serving on the faculties of Macalester College, St. Paul, Minn.; the University of Minnesota; and the University of Wisconsin.

He also has been associated with Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing in St. Paul, and DuPont's electrochemical department in Niagara Falls.

A native of Minnesota, he holds bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Minnesota and a PhD from Wisconsin. He held a National Science Foundation faculty fellowship at the University of Naples, Italy, in 1966-67.

Ferron is the author of 40 papers and reports published in professional journals and presented at scientific meetings.

Married, he has four children.

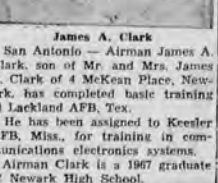

Leopards During Cold Night On Equator Observed By Perry L. Munday In Africa

Portions of animal carcasses were tied to three bare trees within 15 ft. of the veranda, and after dark floodlights were trained on these tree trunks and the waterhole.

"We were cautioned not to make a sound, as the animals were wary," Mrs. Munday said.

"Apparently, they did not mind the lights, accepting them for extra zooms, perhaps. The lights also served to shield onlookers from the animals."

"I was observing one leopard tearing at the meat when someone must have made a noise. The leopard looked directly into the lens of the field glasses I was using — and stared a long time. It was an eerie feeling. He finally went back to his feeding."

"Buffaloes and rhinoceroses came to the waterhole, and our guide animals had been in the movie — a huge man with red hair, ruddy complexion — a big game hunter who had been with the British Army in fighting the Mau Mau."

"He certainly knew his animals, and just to sit in the lodge and listen to Steve Pownall talk about the physical discomfort of spending a cold night animal-watching on the equator," Frances Munday continued.

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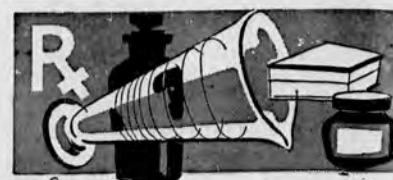

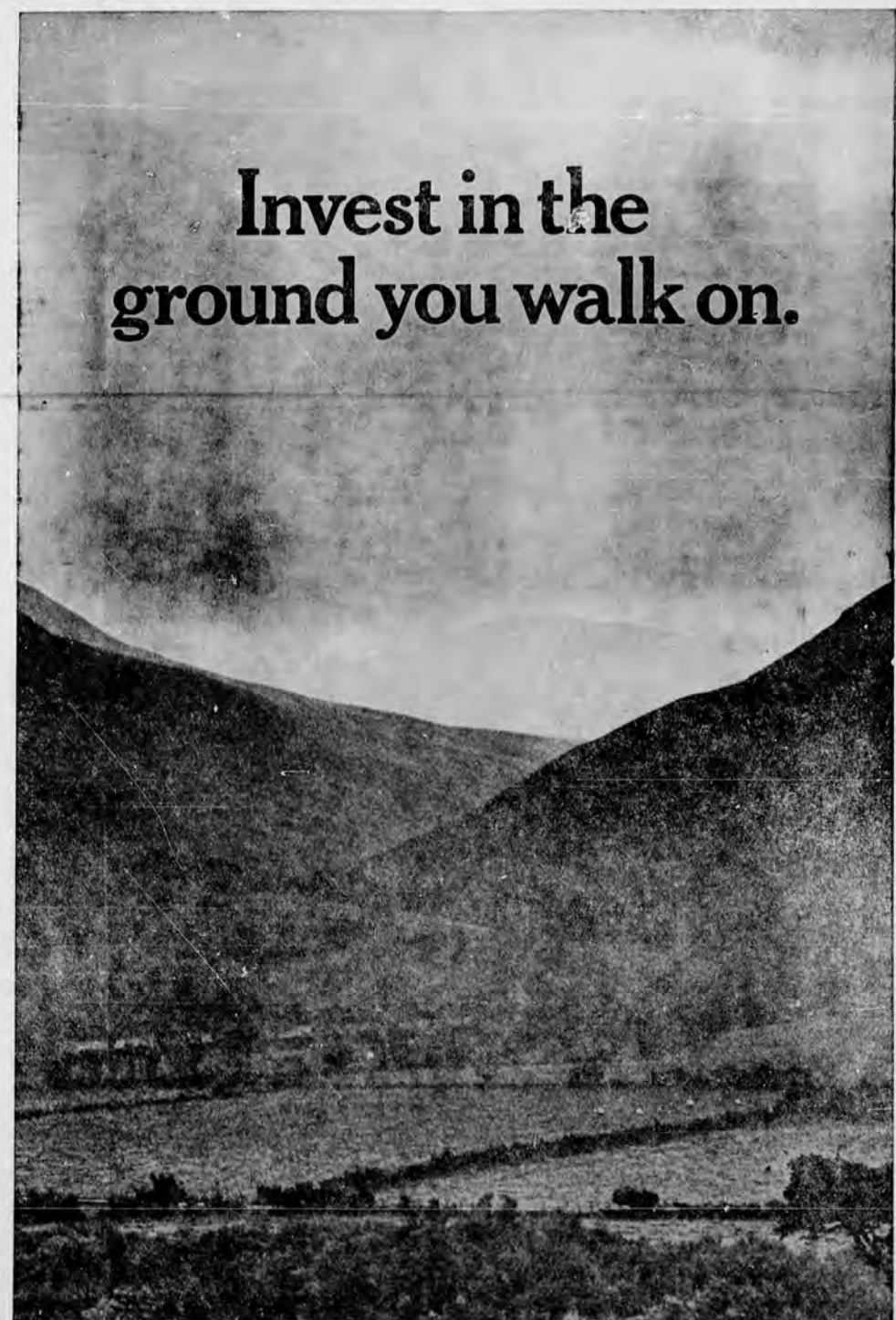
It's Time For...
EYE CARE

WEAK EYES
"Are my eyes weak?" "Why is it that my eyes become progressively worse each time I visit my eye doctor?" These are frequently asked questions of an eye doctor. Some patients are very concerned about this "weakness" of their eyes and how they require stronger and stronger lenses.
Just because one needs a stronger lens in order to make the eye focus better does not mean there is a weakness present. It depends upon the cause. A camera that is out of focus is not a weak camera; all it requires is a change in focus. The eye functions the same way. To regain the proper focus the distance between the image and the back of the eye, where the image is registered, is altered. Since you obviously cannot adjust the eye itself a spectacle lens or a contact lens aids the eye in correcting the focus.
The eye is considered weak only where some disease is present. If this is not true, and the changes are created by normal physiological changes, then I would consider the eye healthy — and not weak. It was Delaware's 10th highway fatality this year as compared to four the corresponding period last year.

Mrs. Munday said in many of the national parks in Kenya and Uganda, visitors may drive past herds of elephants, zebra and antelope "and perhaps even come upon a family of lions, as we did at one spot."

"The lions had just finished eating a zebra and were relaxing by a stream, rolling on their backs like huge cats, or just snoozing."

"There is much open country or veldt as they call it in South Africa, and 'bush' where these wild animals roam protected now from hunters' guns."

"All these countries are taking precautions to preserve what wildlife is left after irresponsible killing by the natives for food, and by big game hunters for fun," Mrs. Munday added.

At Capetown, the government has built communities of modern homes for native Africans, rented at about \$3 per month, Frances Munday observed.

These people are provided with education including college, and free medicine. And the economy appears sound.

"The South Africans and the Rhodesians are handling a very difficult job very well," Mrs. Munday said concerning development of the natives.

"At Murchison Falls, which is the beginning of the Nile, we stayed at a lodge where the elephants wandered freely day and night, and the hyenas and other animals roamed at night."

"There were signs that the animals were wild and guests were not to approach them. The animals needed the signs, for they walked right up to the cabin doors."

"I wasn't about to get too close, though Perry inadvertently met an elephant face-to-face when he stepped outside," Mrs. Munday said of her husband who suffered no mishap with this unexpected confrontation.

"Even though we did not go into West Africa, which is probably jungle and typical of Tarzan pictures, we did get a cross-section of scenery, people and animals by going from Capetown northward through East Africa."

"One job not accomplished, is straightening out my African memories while I still remember some of the smaller details," Mrs. Munday concludes.

"It's funny how quickly one's recollection fades in the course of 'bread and butter' concerns. But the trip was really one of the greatest."

THE RETINA OF THE EYE

The back of the eye has the nerve endings of the optic nerve and this portion is called the retina. It is the inner coat of the eye. The retina changes light stimulation through the optic nerve for interpretation so that we can see.

The image on the retina may be blurred or it may be clear. The clearer it is, the sharper your vision. If the eye is out of focus, you may be hyperopic, which means far-sighted, and the image falls behind the retina. If this image falls in front of the retina you are near-sighted. When you have astigmatism one focus may fall in front of and the other in back of the eye. It is important this image be clear and this is the purpose of the crystalline lens which controls the focus of the eye. If this crystalline lens cannot maintain focus, auxiliary lenses are needed in the form of spectacles or contact lenses.

There are many other factors that must be considered beside the sharpness of the retinal image. If the prescribed lens is not comfortable, or the eyes cannot work together, you may have more problems. The two eyes together may have a different measurement than one eye alone. The two eyes must be considered as a team and measured that way.

The National Eye Research Foundation advises us to have regular eye examinations in order to protect our most prized possession.

Maintaining Lined Soil Inexpensive Farm Chore

Raising the lime status of poorly lined soil is costly, but maintaining a well lined soil is one of the least expensive jobs on the farm, according to Dr. William H. Mitchell, extension agronomist at the University of Delaware.

There is no such thing as instant soil fertility, he explains. If soil is not well lined, it is almost impossible to make it so in a single year.

Lime may be applied quickly, but may require three or more years to mix with the soil and make desirable chemical changes.
