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## Clint Ware Scores 2 TD's As Hens Win Lehigh Opener; Delaware Faces Bullets

Delaware's Fightin' Blue Hens, 27-0 winners over Lehigh in the season opener last week, travel to Gettysburg for another Middle Atlantic Conference test this Saturday.

Edged by Bucknell in a 22-21 cliff-hanger in their first game, the Blue Hens have not met the Hens since 1955 when Delaware drove to a 26-0 win. The series which began in 1909, stands at six wins for Delaware, five for Gettysburg. The Pennsylvania team was added to the '62 schedule after Rutgers resigned from the MAC.

Gettysburg is considered much improved over last year, when they finished with a 3-3-1 record. They amassed 203 yards in rushing against highly-regarded Bucknell last week, with shifty halfback Phil Parsons accounting for 157 yards himself.

According to Delaware End Coach Irv Wisniewski who scouted the game, "Parsons is a real good one. He's got fine moves, fine speed, and has a flashy style that's a crowd-pleaser."

Wisniewski felt that Gettysburg took advantage of Bucknell's mistakes (the shaky defense fumbled 10 times) in rolling up a 20-0 halftime lead. "Bucknell had to scramble to win," added Wisniewski. "They didn't generate anything consistent until the second half."

Delaware Head Coach Dave Nelson admitted he wasn't satisfied with his team's performance against Lehigh, rated one of the Hens' top rivals for conference honors before the season began.

"We didn't generate a consistent offense," Nelson said "and it's apparent that our offense has a way to go. We're going to go over the fundamentals again this week."

Nelson emphasized that the Hens were able to gain only 141 yards on the ground against the Engineers and 53 in the air for the total 194 yards.

"There's no question that alert defensive work helped us," concluded Nelson.

The Hens won't be at their best strength Saturday. Tough center and Captain John Scholalo sustained a knee injury at Lehigh, as did first-level defensive back Karl Lorenz and sophomore fullback Brian Barabee. All three are questionable performers against Gettysburg.

In addition, second-level center Norm Wilkinson suffered a cut hand in last Saturday's game. Nelson and Line Coach Ed Maley hope that reserve centers Mark Muller and Jim Smack will be able to fill the gap if Scholalo and Wilkinson won't be ready.

Substitute halfback Clint Ware, 156-pound senior from Salem, N.J., was the star of the Lehigh game, scoring two touchdowns and running back three pass interceptions for 106 yards.

According to backfield Coach Harold Raymond, "Clint also made a great contribution in keeping the defense going during a shaky time."

Ware's performance overshadowed those of Hen offense stars Ted Kempki at quarterback, and Mike Brown, halfback, who were held to 90 total yards between them.

Delaware's probable starting lineup will include Ron Blanco, 190, left end; Dick Evers, 245, left tackle; Don James, 214, left guard; Norm Wilkinson, 205, center; Jim Quirk, 200, right guard; Paul Chesmore, 220, right tackle; and Jack Messina, 185, right end.

The starting backfield will include Ted Kempki, 175, quarterback; Mike Brown, 195, left half; Joe Slobojan, 160, right half; and either Ron McCoy, 180, or Tom Michaels, 177, fullback.

Game time is 1:30 p.m.

# "Do you have enough handicaps to succeed?"

Hello, John Buchanan again, SPEAKING OF MONEY. This is the series where we talk about personal economics... very personal. We make no effort to make you comfortable. Quite the reverse. We're smooth like Number 6 sandpaper. Money is about the number three interest of each of us. After our family and our jobs, we're usually fascinated by money. That is, getting some and keeping it. We all have different reasons. Some of us covet money because we have one or a half-dozen pet causes in which we live to pay-off Mr. Money, and get him off the backs of people—crippled children, aged, war refugees and so forth. And combined with that we also have some worse motives, too. We want money to indulge ourselves or to, figuratively speaking, spit in somebody's eye.

But today I'm not discussing why we should seek it. But how.

Now let me say this bluntly. It will be challenged. Go ahead. But one of the chief assets we need to make big money is a good stiff handicap. Some big trouble. I mean big. In fact if you don't have some pretty good-sized troubles, you have two strikes against you, financially. Do you have enough handicaps to succeed?

Teddy Roosevelt said, "A man succeeds not despite a handicap, but because of it."

You'll remember he had one of the worst. Terrible health, and he attributed his entire success to this. But he's so absolutely correct that you can see the idea at work every day of your life... on your street, in your plant, in your office.

On my street there's a fine young fellow who has a new football outfit. His Dad bought him the helmet, the shoulder pads, the knee pads, the jersey and pants, cleated shoes and a brand-new genuine \$7 regulation football. Dandy. Only one trouble... he can't play half a hoot. The best player in my neighborhood doesn't even live on the street. Comes over from a neighboring farm. No football suit, no cleats. He has a sweat shirt, a pair of sneakers... and a whole lot of desire to show up the kids with the fancy suits. He has the wonderful advantage of a big financial handicap. It gives him strike-back power.

The fact is you can hardly make the grade without a handicap.

Glenn Cunningham became the all-time great distance runner because, of all things, he had terrible legs. Badly burned as a boy. That's what made him go to work on his legs. He showed them all.

I find that perhaps the most sensitive person in the world had several missing senses. Helen Keller. Blind, speechless and deaf.

Fred Coppie built the biggest sand and gravel business in the country because he needed five dollars to pay his poll tax one year.

Jack Dempsey became the fiercest fighter of his generation because he was hungry. And there it is in its most elemental truth. To fight you've got to be hungry.

That hunger these days is seldom for food. But a hunger to beat some handicap is needed to give you the all-consuming concentration you need to crack through the routine levels of success.

## Raymond Faces Novel, Pleasant Problem Of More Backfield Stars Than Positions

Harold R. (Tubby) Raymond, University of Delaware backfield coach, has a pleasant problem—plenty of good backs, not enough positions for them to fill.

Halfback Mike Brown, 193-pound Wilmington native, has been one of the outstanding performers, which has surprised no one. After the talented junior averaged 14 yards a carry and gained 168 yards in recent games, Raymond said "He has excelled on both offense and defense. At present, he's potentially our best."

"A grand race" is going on at right halfback, Raymond relates. Joe Slobojan, the shifty little 160-pound junior, and powerful Karl Lorenz, 195-pound senior, have been battling neck-and-neck for the first level assignment.

Junior letterman Johnny Wallace, 160, has been demonstrating his flashy, crowd-pleasing running style; Sohomore Lloyd Wells, 170-pounder from Newark; and Bill Hopkins, 175-pound soph, were cited by Raymond with "John Wallace is certainly capable of playing regularly, as we saw last year."

"Wells is a dark horse for first-level; he's done quite a job for us both ways—he's a precocious sophomore who has been learning every day. Lloyd's speed is deceptive, and he's got fine balance, a hard man to knock down. He's a fine pass receiver—and pass defender—too."

Hopkins has shown a good deal of ability; he's hard, he's one of our fastest backs, and he's got that raw, undeveloped potential that'll blossom with discipline."

Also in the picture at half are two-time letterman Clint Ware, 5-9, 156-pound handyman who will be used as a second-level spot replacement; Ken Halpern, 190-pound sophomore, and 1961's "Hodge of the Year" (top redshirt) Billy Orr, 163-pound scrapper.

A left-handed young man named Ted Kempki has the quarterbacking well under control.

"Here's a guy," muses Raymond, ground as a marker, happily found the dove just a couple of paces away.
