## Varsity Letters to be Awarded NHS For High Scholarship

Newark Board of Education Authorizes Presentation Of Varsity "N" For Academic Achievement; Three New Teachers Named; Termites Reported At Medill School

The Newark Board of Education approved the awarding of varsity letters to high school students for excellence in scholarship, at its meeting last Tuesday night.

The board asked the Newark High School staff to develop and establish standards for the new awards.

In taking this action, the board stated its desire to give proper recognition to students who excel academically.

Varsity letters are to be the size of a letterhead and will be awarded to students who have earned a minimum of 90 percent in all subjects during the year.

The board also authorized the presentation of varsity letters to students who have earned a minimum of 90 percent in all subjects during the year.

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## Local Tank Plant Being Investigated By Senate Group

Former Sen. Allen Frear Reports Check With Plan For Sale Of Newark Site

The preparedness sub-committee of the Senate Armed Services Committee is investigating plans to sell the Newark tank plant.

Former Sen. J. Allen Frear, Jr., said that he expects public hearings will be ordered by sub-committee chairman, John Stennis, Democratic senator from Mississippi, after Congress reconvenes in January.

Frear said Stennis has put the sub-committee staff to work collecting information on the tank modification center which has been written off by the Defense Department.

He indicated investigators are looking into costs of producing tanks under a contract which the government-owned Newark plant lost last year to the Chrysler plant at Detroit.

Meanwhile, it appeared unlikely the Defense Department would go ahead with plans to dispose of the plant after Sen. Richard Russell, (D., Ga.) chairman of the Armed Services Committee, stepped into the dispute two weeks ago.

Russell, after talks with Frear, a member of the Securities and Exchange Commission, called on Defense Secretary Robert McNamara to hold disposal in abeyance.

Richard B. French, state coordinator of speech and hearing programs, and county coordinator of the New Castle County division of child development and guidance, will address members and guests of the Suburban Newark Century Club next Monday at 8:30 p.m. in Our Redeemer Church, Chestnut Hill Estates.

Through the efforts of Mrs. G. Russell Chambers, Mrs. Herbert H. Russell, Mrs. Robert Gebhardt, and Mrs. Floyd Swope, Jr., the club chose the speech therapy program as its community project after encouragement from the university and public school officials.

Newark is reported to be the first school district in the state to employ a speech therapist, paying him from local monies.

## Council Appoints 4 Policemen, Approves Plats For New Homes

Police Committee Recommendations For Appointments Of Four Patrolmen Approved By 4-2 Vote; Development Of Devon, Oaklands, Fairfield Crest Tracts Approved

Four new policemen were appointed to assist an undermanned force in the growing City of Newark, and Newark City Council paved the way for further growth of the community last Tuesday night with approval of revised subdivision layouts and housing development in the 78.61-acre Devon tract; some 138 lots in Oaklands; and 135 lots at Fairfield Crest, along with an approved first of two readings of an ordinance for city annexation of 95.23-acre Arbour Park home sites.

Patrolmen Delp, Kowalski, Sparks and Sweeney received probationary appointments to the police department by a 4-2 vote of council, with Councilmen Vernon Steele and George Wilson in opposition, and with Western District Councilman Carl S. Rankin absent on vacation in Europe.

Steele contended that employees should be selected by the city manager and not by the police committee; former Councilman Avery Goddin questioned appointment of the four men without recommendation of the city manager or police chief; and former Councilwoman Betty McClendon urged council not to be "hasty" in making the appointments.

Councilman William Coverdale, chairman of the police committee, replied that "we are following statutory provisions," and denied "rumors" that the police committee is taking over the reins of the city manager and police chief. He said that the men had passed all required tests, and were selected after further, oral interviews with members of the committee.

"I have at no time heard from Councilman Steele," Coverdale said, pointing out that Steele had not attended police committee meetings for selection of candidates.

Council approved the Shull Construction Company plat for the Devon home development between the Caddo and Binns tracts north of the Pennsylvania Railroad, with an estimated annual revenue of \$21,056 for the city in return for some \$24,056 expended with provision of utilities. Wilson voted against the measure.

Provisional approval was given for revised subdivision layout and development of Oaklands, with an annual revenue of \$19,300 estimated for the city in return for \$20,050 in utilities provision. City Manager Francis Neide reported that the major portion of this cost had been expended, with some \$8,000 remaining to be provided by the city. The plat was approved subject to clarification concerning drainage, and city costs.

Council approved the Fairfield Crest plan with \$21,850 in anticipated annual revenue for the city in return for some \$7,000 to be expended for utilities.

All three proposals were recommended by the Newark Planning Commission, along with the rezoning of property on Ritter Lane and Phillips Avenue from RM to RD.

Neighboring property owners presented a petition for rezoning to protect their land values, and the motion for rezoning appeared lost in a 3-3 vote until Councilman Wilson withdrew his objection. The rezoning was approved.

Proposed ordinances to rezone property on South Chapel Street from RD to Business C, and to provide council control over questionable building permits were approved on the first of two required readings, and a resolution prohibiting parking on the north side of New Street was adopted.

City Solicitor Alton Tybout reported that the law enacted at Dover for provision of six municipal voting districts in Newark "has flaws but is valid." Tybout did not prepare the bill which was submitted to Dover without council inspection. Concerning the six-district plan and its effect on present commissioners representing three districts, Tybout said that their commissions were valid at the time of appointment, and recommended retaining the present group—including the three whose terms expired last month—as hold-over appointments until the six-district plan becomes effective. Council agreed.

Tybout stated that he had filed a petition with the Public Service Commission to stop construction by the Artesian Water Company of a main in the Polly Drummond Hill area; that the commission had issued a deist order; and that construction had stopped pending further investigation.
