BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 118th GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE (THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVE CONCURRING THEREIN) as follows:

- 1. That the Department of Defense of the United States Government and/or the Bureau of Public Roads of the Department of Commerce of the United States Government be and they are hereby requested to seek means to provide to the State of Delaware special sums of money that will materially aid the State of Delaware in improving highway facilities in the area of the Dover Air Force Base in the very near future.

I sincerely hope that you will find it possible to give these bills your enthusiastic support.

In closing, I would like to advise you that, as a Wilmington school teacher, I heartily oppose HB 162 because of its selfish provision instituted by school administrators, which gives administrators twice the salary increase school teachers would receive. SB 96 is much more fair and realistic. According to its provisions, all professional personnel in the schools receive the same treatment, regardless of the title they may hold.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the text of this resolution be spread upon the Journals of both Houses of the 118th General Assembly and that copies hereof be sent to the members of the Congressional delegation from the State of Delaware.

Laurel, Del., April 5, 1955

To His Excellency, the Governor of the State of Delaware, and To All Members of the One Hundred Eighteenth General

Assembly:

I have served for ten years as a member of the Commission for the Feeble-minded, and am presently the Commission Chairman. My term expires in May, and as I retire from this

post, many disappointing aspects of the Institution's operation compel me to go on record as to some ways in which I

think it might be improved:

1. The Commission is too large. It should have about five members, of whom not more than two would be professional men, and not more than three members would be from the same political party. The terms should be so staggered as to allow a minimum of dislocation upon change of administration. Commissioners should be dropped, however, for failure to attend meetings.

- 2. The farm eats up large sums of money which should be used for the children. The report shows that for farm labor alone last year the agency spent \$35,000.00! And, in addition, twenty-seven of the children were worked to some extent on the farm; and they, of course, received no pay. It is a financial flop and is the cause of constant criticism and suspicion of dishonesty. Moreover, hardly any administrators of an Institution of this kind also happen to be farmers. The farm cannot be sold because is surrounds and separates the buildings of the Institution. I think it should be loaned to the University of Delaware Extension Service as an experimental farm or leased to some good farmer. A very small farming operation for instructional purposes might be valuable, but not the thing we have.
- 3. The garage which is maintained for repair of farm implements could very easily be converted into a shop for vocational training. Many of the children would benefit from such training, and so few things of that kind are presently offered.
- 4. Employees should not be freely allowed to live at the Institution with their families, but should only be allowed to do so where it is necessary for the supervision and training of the children.
- 5. Even if the waste connected with the farm and the support of employees' families were eliminated, the School would still need much more money than it has ever had.
