STATEMENT BY SENATOR LEON E. DONVAN

April 18, 1961

For over a year the members of the State Highway Department have been exposed to public ridicule and scorn because of certain allegations involving the financial operation of their Department. They have been investigated by the Attorney General and blasted by the minority party in the Assembly. And the prime accusation against this Department as a whole has been one of omission; of not being fully informed of some staff activities.

Now we have an example of a public agency that has clearly violated the laws of our State. But this agency, the Board of Education in Wilmington, has not been investigated by the Attorney General and has not been subjected to public criticism by the press. Is it because these Board members were appointed by a Republican judge rather than a Democratic Assembly?

The public is entitled to know the facts in this case, and the facts are amazingly clear. When the Budget Appropriation Bill for the current fiscal year was prepared Wilmington was entitled to 608 units (in other words there were enough pupils to justify 608 teachers). This figure was supported by data filed with the State Department of Public Instruction at that time. A provision was included in the Budget Act to allow an upward revision if there were an increase in the number of pupil units by September 30, 1960. The reports show that the Wilmington units had actually dropped to 604 on that date.

On February 13, 1961, the Wilmington Board of Education notified the State Department of Public Instruction that it needed and was entitled to an additional appropriation, including \$38,540 for teachers.

Chief Accountant E. H. Davis of the Budget Commission notified the Wilmington Board and the Attorney General on March 22 that the Wilmington Board had been paying the salaries of 625 teachers out of State funds in violation of Section 1705, Title 14, Delaware Code, which states in part:

"... No State funds shall be appropriated to any school district to provide salaries for teachers in excess of one teacher for each unit of pupils in such school district."

On April 7, 1961, Dr. Ward I. Miller, Superintendent of Wilmington Schools, confirmed in writing the accuracy of the Chief Accountant's charge.

The actual loss to the State of Delaware, had not the Chief Accountant discovered this violation, would have been approximately \$65,000, not just the \$43,753 involved in the amendment to House Bill No. 145. Since the exposure of this violation we have received many excuses from Dr. Miller, including the statement in the press that "the money was added to the bill without our knowledge." This latter statement is in clear contradiction to the request dated February 13 requesting these funds and filed with the State Department of Public Instruction.

Nor are the hands of the State Board of Education clean. Just this session we have been presented with salary requests for the Budget Act submitted by the State Department of Public Instruction that are in violation of the State Salary Laws. We have been presented with supplementary appropriation bills to pay for salaries that were made in violation of Section 6519, Title 29, Delaware Code.

Delaware parents are entitled to know when the Attorney General is going to start his investigation of the Wilmington Board of Education and the State Board of Education. These Board members are just as responsible for the activities of their staff as the State Highway Department is for its staff. These Boards spend over \$8 million annually. We have provided clearly documented evidence of illegal spending. We also have good reason to believe that Wilmington has requested an appropriation for next year in excess of the unit allocation for clerical employees, and that both boards have requested funds for certain administrative salaries in excess of the State law. What more does Mr. Bove need before he decides to start an investigation? Or does our Attorney General only investigate Democratic appointed boards?

Mr. Hoey asked to be marked present.

WHEREAS, efforts have been initiated in the Senate by one of the Republican Members of the Senate to throw doubt on the legal right of two Democratic Members of this Body, employed from time to time by the State Highway Department when the General Assembly is not in Session, to vote on a measure or measures which would authorize the State of Delaware to issue Bonds to defray the cost of building Highways and other purposes as are within the Power of the State Highway Department; and

WHEREAS, it is the sense and finding of Members of the Senate that the Senate and other members of the General Assembly have as the Legislative Branch of this Government the sole power under the Delaware Constitution to determine the right of its members to vote on measures introduced in and presented for consideration of the members of the General Assembly; and

WHEREAS, the present Attorney General, a part of the Executive Branch of the Government, has arrogated to himself the power to attempt to dictate to the General Assembly as to the rights and powers of the General Assembly members to vote on pending legislation; and

WHEREAS, the Senate desires to ascertain for itself the legal sufficiency of a Bill of the General Assembly which would authorize the State of Delaware to issue Bonds to defray the cost of building Highways and for other purposes as are within the power of the State Highway Department if such a bill or bills are passed with the concurrence of said

two Democratic Senators; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Secretary of the Senate be and he is hereby directed to communicate with Lester H. Washburn, Esquire Bond Counsel of the State, and present to him the facts relating to the problem here presented, and request from him his legal opinion as to the legal sufficiency of a Bill of the General Assembly which might be passed and would authorize the State of Delaware to issue bonds to defray the cost of building Highways and for other purposes as are within the power of the State Highway Department, if it appears that the votes of the two Senators affected by the attack on them are necessary for passage.

The following message was received from the Governor

and read to the Senate:

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

Dover, April 17, 1961

The Honorable John Reilly, President Pro Tem, Senate The Honorable Sherman Tribbitt Speaker, House of Representatives Gentlemen:

In the process of preparing legislation it is very easy for the attorneys and others drafting the bills to make technical errors. It is to the credit of the members of the General Assembly that most of these shortcomings are corrected before the measures are passed and delivered to the Governor. This makes my task, and that of the Legislative Reference Bureau much easier.

As a result of a brief study of the legislation currently before the Assembly, it appears to me that there is a questionable pattern in many of the bills to which I should like to call your attention for consideration and advice. The legislation to which I refer, all involves the finances of our State,

and falls into two major classifications.

First, there are the supplementary appropriation Acts, which are designed to expand services during the next fiscal year. These are clearly titled as appropriations and specify the sums to be allocated. The difficulty here is not in the construction of the bills, but in their relationship to Section 6337, Title 29, Delaware Code, which states in part:

"... But neither House shall consider further or special appropriations, except in case of emergency, which fact shall be clearly stated in the appropri-

ation bill therefore, until the Budget Appropriation Bill shall have been finally acted upon by both Houses."

It would seem that desirable supplementary appropriation legislation can be unnecessarily jeopardized by premature consideration of the Assembly since this limitation is so clearly set forth in the statutes.

Secondly, and more difficult to relate to precise statutory restriction, are the bills which will require additional funds for increased services and salaries during the coming fiscal year, but which are not titled as supplementary appropriations and which do not indicate the source or the amount of the funds required. I should like to advance two objections to such measures. First, since they do not show their "price tag", members of the Assembly and the Governor may be easily misled concerning the real expenditure involved. Second, despite the fact that they are not so labeled, these are still supplementary appropriation bills in effect. It is my opinion that legislation of this nature is equally subject to the application of the above mentioned Section 6337, and, once the Budget Appropriation Bill is passed, to Section 6339 of the same title.

In order that you may be apprised of the gravity of this situation, there is enclosed a list of the measures that seem to be in this classification. You will notice that while in some cases the sums are negligible or no estimate was readily available, others involve substantial sums, even as high as \$2,475,000.00.

I would be happy to meet with you, or our Assembly members as a group, to discuss this situation.

Dear Mr. Twilley:

You have transmitted to me a copy of Senate Resolution No. 42 which requests my opinion

"as to the legal sufficiency of a Bill of the General Assembly which might be passed and would authorize the State of Delaware to issue Bonds to defray the cost of building Highways and for other purposes as are within the power of the State Highway Department"

if two Senators who are "employed from time to time by the State Highway Department when the General Assembly is not in Session" vote for the Bill and their votes are necessary for the passage of the Bill.

If the Bill is passed and (1) the Journals of the Senate show that the final vote thereon was taken by "Yeas" and "Nays" as required by Section 10 of Article 2 of the Delaware Constitution and (2) the Journals show that not less than three-fourths of all the members of the Senate voted for the Bill as required by Section 3 of Article 8 of the Delaware Constitution and (3) the Bill as passed is authenticated in the manner provided by the Delaware Code and is filed with the Secretary of State, I am of the opinion that the validity of the Bill cannot be successfully questioned. In reaching this conclusion I am relying upon the decision of the Delaware Courts reported in Rash v. Allen, Del. 444; 76 Atl. 360.

The fact that the Journals show that the right of the two Senators to vote on the measure was questioned on the ground that they had a "personal or private interest" in the Bill which, under the provisons of Section 20 Article 2 of the Delaware Constitution, disqualified them from voting on the Bill would, I think, raise no question with respect to the sufficiency and validity of the Bill, provided, the Senate permitted the two Senators to vote on the measure. While Section 20 of Article 2 does not so provide, it is my opinion that the decision whether a Senator is disqualified from voting by reason of his having a "personal or private interest" in the measure voted on, is a question which is to be finally determined by the Senate itself.

On May 15, 1961, I received Senate Bill No. 135 entitled: AN ACT TO AMEND "AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE EXPENSES OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1961," BEING CHAPTER 299, VOLUME 52, LAWS OF DELAWARE, IN RESPECT TO APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE DEBT SERVICE OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE, BY MAKING TRANSFERS IN CERTAIN ITEMS THEREIN, AND BY MAKING A TRANSFER FROM DEBT SERVICE TO SALARIES AND WAGES OF THE STATE TREASURER.

I have this day signed House Bill No. 135, but in so doing I have disapproved and deleted the following portions of this Bill:

- 1. The following words beginning in line 3: "the sum of \$403,192.50 from DEBT SERVICE, Interest-State Bonds to: DEBT SERVICE, Redemptions-State Bonds, Bonds Issued and"
- 2. The following words beginning in line 7: "and the sum of \$217,807.50 from DEBT SERVICE, redemption-State Bonds, Authorized, Unissued to DEBT SERVICE, Redemptions-State Bonds, Bonds Issued"

The authority for this action is found in Section 18, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Delaware.

The reason for my disapproval of these portions is that the situation suggesting the need for this appropriation has been corrected without legislative action. To make this appropriation at this time would make it necessary to have further legislation before the end of the fiscal year to appropriate funds back into the accounts decreased.

Senate Bill No. 135 is available in this office to the Senate of the 121st General Assembly at any time you should require it.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE

June 5, 1961

The Honorable Eugene Lammot, President of the State Senate Legislative Hall, Dover, Delaware Dear President Lammot:

Senate Bill No. 132 was passed by both the Senate and the House and was received in this office on the 17th day of May 1961. In accordance with Article 3, Section 18 of the Constitution of the State of Delaware, if a bill shall not be returned by the Governor to the Legislature within 10 days after its presentment, it shall become law without the Governor's signature; unless the General Assembly shall be adjourned, thus preventing its return, in which case it shall not become law without the approval of the Governor.

The 10 days deadline for action by the Governor on Senate Bill No. 132 expired on May 29, a day the General Assembly was in adjournment. Since the General Assembly was in adjournment on May 29 and I did not sign the bill, it did not become law. My objections to Senate Bill No. 132 are not based on the merits of the bill, but only to an obvious error in the language of the bill. The words "the Director" appear in Section 1174 (b). The Juvenile Courts for Kent and Sussex

Counties do not have a Director.

Senate Bill No. 132 is practically a verbatum copy of Senate Bill No. 131. Senate Bill No. 131 deals with the Family Court of New Castle County which does have a Director. Senate Bill No. 131 has received my approval, and if Senate Bill No. 132 is redrafted. I shall have no objection to approving it.

I have called this to Mr. Hartnett's attention, and he is preparing a corrected bill for reintroduction.

61ST LEGISLATIVE DAY

July 11, 1961

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment at 1:35 P. M. on Tuesday, July 11, 1961. President Pro Tem Reilly presiding.

Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Ray W. Kirwan.

Members present: Donovan, duPont, Hoey, Mayhew, Simpson, Spicer, Watson, Wilgus, Mr. President Pro Tem Reilly—9.

Members absent: Cook, Johnson, Manning, McCullough,

Price, Snowden, Steen, Tull—8.

The Secretary proceeded to read the Journal of the previous day's session when Mr. Donovan moved that so much be considered the reading of the Journal and the Journal be approved as read.

The Chair presented the following House matter, which was given first reading and referred to committee as follows:

HB 225—An Act to Amend Chapter 55, Title 14, Delaware Code, Relative to Appropriating Money to the University of Delaware for the Purpose of Establishing Scholarships at the University of Delaware. (To Education)

On motion of Mr. Watson, the Senate recessed upon call of the Chair at 1:45 P. M. The Senate met at the expiration of recess at 4:55 P. M. Mr. Steen presiding.

Messrs. Cook, (Mrs.) Manning, Price, Snowden, Steen and Tull asked to be marked present.

Mr. Johnson asked to be marked present.

The following bills were introduced, given first reading, and referred to committees:

SB 239—An Act to Amend Chapter 17, Title 14, Delaware Code, by Providing for the Allocation of Unit Appropriations to the Sussex County Vocational and Technical School and by Making a Supplementary Appropriation for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1962. (By Mr. Steen, to Finance)

SB 240—An Act to Amend Chapter 65, Title 3, Delaware Code, Relating to Requirements for Regular License and Financial Responsibility of Poultry Buyers. (By Mr. Steen, to Agriculture)

SB 241—An Act Making a Supplementary Appropriation to the Juvenile Court of Kent and Sussex Counties. (By

Mr. Mayhew, to Finance)

SB 242—An Act to Amend Chapter 3, Title 9, Delaware Code, Relating to the Levy Court Commissioners for New Castle County. (By Messrs. Johnson, Watson and McCullough, to Elections)

On motion of Mrs. Manning, SB 218 with title as follows was taken up for consideration and read a second time by title

in order to pass the Senate:

SB 218—An Act Appropriating Funds for the Payment of Claims of James F. Long and Ray E. Parsons, Arising Out of Water Damage Sustained on August 31, 1960, from a Drain, Maintained by the State Highway Department.

On the question, "Shall the Bill pass the Senate?" the yeas and nays were ordered, which being taken, were as fol-

lows:

YEAS: Cook, duPont, Johnson, Manning, Mayhew, McCullough, Price, Simpson, Snowden, Spicer, Steen, Tull, Watson, Wilgus—14.

NAYS: Donovan-1.

ABSENT: Hoey, Mr. President Pro Tem Reilly-2.

So the question was decided in the affirmative and the bill having received the required constitutional majority, passed the Senate and was ordered to the House for concurrence.
