Sharon Breen of the Newark parks and recreation department said dozens of people from the city of Newark, the University of Delaware and other community organizations help present the activities.

Student members of the Newark High School Key Club will be holiday helpers and take pictures for a small fee as children tell Santa what they hope for this Christmas.

The Newark Lions Club again will be selling roasted chestnuts, while workers from the University of Delaware will have cider and cookies for sale.

"Girl Scouts from 17 troops are caroling up and down Main

Street this year," said Breen. "They're really excited - they get merit badges for it."

Entertainers Alfie Moss and the Capital Brass will perform on the Academy Building lawn during the evening. At 7 p.m., the city's Christmas Tree, donated by a family on Georgian Circle, will be lit on the lawn amidst community carolling.

"We will also have carriage rides again, and people can watch Kirk Clemens doing an ice carving demonstration on Academy Street," Breen said. "Carriage rides are \$3 for adults and \$2 for children."

Members of the Newark Area Welfare Committee will wrap gifts outside Mellon Bank in the lobby of the former Farm and Home building. The service is free but donations are welcome.

Alcohol limit lowered in Newark

MADD supports statewide change to lower point

Newark city council voted unanimously this week for a new municipal ordinance decreasing the Blood Alcohol Content level for drunk driving from .10 to .08.

City solicitor Roger Akin said the BAC level is the number which provides almost an automatic case for drunk driving. "There's no defense to the drunk driving charge if this blood content alcohol level is present," said Akin, "even if the driver can meet all other indications for sobriety like walking a straight line..."

Councilmember John Farrall, sponsor of the amendment, said he believes it is the right thing to do. "If the closest you ever come to an intoxicated driver is an occasional article by a self-proclaimed expert in our state's largest newspaper, then you may need some convincing," said Farrall on Monday night. "If you are a parent, maybe you need to listen to Dolly Banks, the president of the Delaware Chapter of Mothers Against Drunk Driving."

Banks, a resident of Georgetown, addressed city council before the vote and asked them to

be a leader in the state on this issue. "MADD believes up to 500 lives could be saved annually nationwide if all states went to the .08 level," said Banks. "That means a lot of families won't have to go through what my family went through. It's number one on our agenda in Delaware to get this passed to .08."

In response to questions about whether the issue was really whether drinking, Banks noted it takes five drinks in one hour for a 170-pound man to reach Delaware's current legal BAC level of .10 for drunk driving. "To me, that's more than social drinking," said Banks. "Even one less drink in an hour is more than social drinking to me."

Ronald Gardner, former Newark mayor and current co-chair of the Building Responsible Communities Coalition of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, said the new ordinance is not directed at the student population in Newark.

"Contrary to what you might read in the News Journal, this (change) is not silly or pointless...it's not about prohibition, or even about underage drinking," said Gardner. "The level of .10 is the most lenient definition of drunk driving in the free world...and at .10 the fatal crash risk increases 29 times over a driver who has had no alcohol at all. It really is a big deal."

State representative Stephanie Ulbrich (R-Newark South) told city council she has spoken to

District waives K-3 capacity mandate

State only allows 22 students in each classroom

A state law passed just over two years ago has been waived again to accommodate a lack of classroom space in the Christina School District.

School board members voted unanimously at their last regular meeting to again waive a law signed by Governor Thomas Carper in 1998 requiring that only 22 students may be assigned to any K-3 classroom in the state.

According to Dr. Jane Barfield of the Christina District, it was necessary to gain permission to not follow the law because 11 Christina classrooms currently have more than 22 students.

Most of the classrooms with more than the allotted amount of students have only one or two extra students. "It would be beautiful if every grade had just enough students to fill each classroom," Barfield said, "but usually, you're going to have a spillover of four or five students in a grade."

Patrick Dunn, an education associate for the state Board of Education, said a lot of schools just don't have enough space for the amount of students within them. "Sometimes staffing also gets in the way," Dunn said.

Christopher Reed, a Christina District boardmember, agreed with the waiver. "It makes sense, so you're not having to hire an

extra person for those four or five students," he said.

No parents voiced opposition to the waiver before or after the boardmembers' vote.

Before the waiver is instituted, state Board of Education members must also vote in favor of it at their Dec. 20 meeting. If they do approve, the waiver will last until next school year.

State boardmembers will also vote on whether to waive a state law that applies to all district elementary and secondary schools.

Passed in 1998, the law requires that a minimum of 98 percent of the teachers "earned" in a specific school actually be assigned to the schools earning the teachers.

The number of students signed up to attend a school prior to the first day of classes determines its number of earned teachers.

Schools usually project one teacher per approximately 20 students for each school before the official student counts are tallied in late September, Barfield said.

"Sometimes it turns out to be one-tenth of a percent difference, or two or three teachers overall," she said.

There are also district-wide special programs such as orchestra, tutoring or alternative programs that are held in only some school sites, and as a result, that school requires an extra teacher or two. The waiver will allow these programs to continue.

"It isn't always easy to fill those units," Barfield said. "We do have a 'crystal ball' in our projection and we can pull it out and do the best we can, but it isn't always 100 percent accurate."

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Newark Arts Alliance seeks a new area of expression

Cost a factor for non-profit group

Members of the Newark Arts Alliance are looking for a new home - preferably one that doesn't cost too much.

According to information in their most recent newsletter, the non-profit cultural organization has been presented with a new lease, which offers another year at the Art House on Delaware Avenue through Dec. 31, 2001, at an increased rent.

"There is an option to renew, but no guarantee it will be offered," states the report to members. "Our landlord, Commonwealth Management, is encouraging us to find another space."

Members report the increase in rent is "a jump from \$800 to \$1,300 per month." Options considered in the report include buy-

ing or renting another building, as well as concerns about saving the mosaic mural on the current Arts House located in a converted residence.

Commonwealth president Jeffrey Lang said his company needs the space where the Arts House is now for additional parking for tenants in the former Farm and Home building where the Learning Station and other businesses are located.

"We looked all over town for a place to move (the Arts House) itself," said Lang. "We also offered to move them into space vacated by (another business on Main Street) for the same (increased) rent, but they don't want to go there."

Arts Alliance members state the group can cover the rent increase "although it will deplete our savings at a time when we should be building cash reserves."

The organization is also reor-

ganizing their management, according to their newsletter.

"The resignation of our Executive Director exposed weaknesses in our overall management structure. In response, we've taken action to build a committee system that will oversee the seven operations areas, and to form subcommittees to handle specific projects."

Executive Director Terry Foreman has resumed her role; however, some duties of the job have now been assigned to other members. "We determined that we were really asking one person to handle the equivalent of two positions," said the newsletter.

Plans are also underway to strengthen the Alliance's board of directors and starting in November, the board now meets the third Tuesday of every other month.

Employee steals credit card

New Castle County police have arrested two women for credit card theft and conspiracy related offenses after they were stopped by police in a car for an equipment violation.

At 1:15 a.m. on Nov. 20, officers stopped a car for fake tags and for a non-functioning headlight in the area of Wilton Boulevard and Coachlight Court. The driver, Hugh Russell, 23 of Wilmington, was found to be driving with a suspended driver's license. He also was charged with driving an unregistered car, fake tags and multiple counts of conspiracy.

Adele Grubb, 36, of Wilming-

ton, one of the passengers, had possession of a stolen credit card. Through investigation, the police discovered that the other female, Kimberly Lambert, had stolen the credit card from the K Mart Store where she works.

The women allegedly had charged several hundred dollars worth of merchandise in area stores. The officers contacted Probation and Parole who responded after discovering Lambert was supposed to be on "house arrest." Probation Officers helped the County Police with the investigation, which led to several felony arrests.

Police charged Grubb and Kimberly Lambert, 31, also of Wilmington, with multiple counts of forgery, conspiracy, and theft.

Student arrested for bomb threat

Delaware State Police arrested a 12-year-old boy for making a bomb threat at George Read Middle School on Basin Road.

State police arrested the seventh grader on Nov. 21 after he phoned in a bomb threat from inside the school. Dispatchers at the New Castle County "911" Center received a call from inside the middle school around 9:55 a.m.

The caller said there was a bomb in the school and dispatchers traced the call to a pay phone in the school. State Detectives arrived at the school and located evidence implicating the student's behavior to the crime.

The student was arrested and charged with one count of terroristic threatening and was taken to Family Court in Wilmington for arraignment. No information about the boy's bail was available at the time of this release.

Woman arrested for false reporting

New Castle County Police arrested a Middletown woman for falsely reporting her car had been stolen.

Police learned Terra Cale, 30, had knowingly purchased a stolen car and registered it in her name after altering the serial number. The car was later stolen from her. Police arrested her on the evening of Nov. 21 after the car was recovered in Wilmington.

On July 1, Cale reported her 1997 Jeep Cherokee had been stolen from her home in Middletown. Police went to the house and filed a theft report for the car under the serial number provided by the woman.

On Sept. 21, an officer from the Norwell Police Department in

Maine located a Jeep that matched the serial number that was reported stolen in Delaware.

Police say they discovered that the Jeep was legitimately registered in Maine. The officer notified the New Castle County Police investigators who determined Cale had provided a false serial number.

The New Castle County police investigation revealed that Cale's car was stolen from Philadelphia several months ago. Cale has been charged with falsely reporting an incident and was released on \$500 unsecured bail. Additional charges are pending regarding the alteration of the serial numbers.

Teens charged with drug offenses

New Castle County Police have arrested two teenage boys for felony drug offenses after officers stopped them for a traffic violation.

David Powers, 19, of Centerville Road and a 17-year-old boy of the same address were arrested around 11:30 p.m. on Nov. 23, after officers saw a car fail to signal before turning on Route 13 near the Beaver Brook Community.

The officers stopped the car for the traffic violation and subsequently searched the car after seeing marijuana in plain view.

The officers located more than five grams of cocaine, a small amount of marijuana, several prescription pills (Zanax, Naproxen, and Metaxalone) inside the car and in the possession of the two teens.

The teens were charged with trafficking cocaine, conspiracy in the second degree, two counts of possession of a narcotic controlled substance, one count of having drugs not kept in original container.

Maryland teen dies in single-car crash

Delaware State Police Fatal Accident Investigation Reconstruction team investigated a fatal crash in the area of Routes 1 and 273 on Nov. 24 around 1 p.m.

A 1988 Dodge Caravan was traveling southbound on Route 1 from the Christiana Mall when the driver reached down to pick up an object which had fallen onto the floor.

The van veered to the left and struck the guardrail, then veered across both southbound lanes and struck the right guardrail. The right front passenger was ejected from the van.

Crystal R. Eastridge, 14, of Northeast, Md., died of massive head trauma and was pronounced dead at the scene by New Castle County paramedics.

The driver of the van, Bradley A. Miller, 16, of Bear, was treated and released for a head injury at Christiana Hospital.

Passenger Amanda Hall, 15, of Elkton, was treated and released from Christiana Hospital.

Passenger Jessica R. Luzetski, 14, of Northeast, Md., was treated and released for back and leg pain at Christiana Hospital. Luzetski is the stepsister of the deceased.

None of the four people in the van were wearing seatbelts. Delaware State Police are continuing the investigation and charges had not been filed as of deadline.

Girl shot while in bed in drive-by

On Nov. 24 at approximately 1:25 a.m., officers responded to the area of Parma Avenue in New Castle for a report of "shots-fired" in the area. When officers

arrived they found a female victim who had been shot in her lower back.

The victim, who was shot while sleeping in her upstairs bedroom, was rushed to the Christiana Hospital where she was listed in good condition.

Evidence technicians responded to the scene and found bullet holes in two other occupied homes and bullet casings in the area of the shooting.

Investigators learned a large, white car was seen fleeing the area at the time of the shooting.

Drug arrests

New Castle County Police arrested two men for unrelated drug charges as a result of increased patrols in Beaver Brook Apartments area.

Officers assigned to conduct proactive foot patrols of the complex on Nov. 24 saw an occupied, suspicious car in the complex. The officers approached the car and found Thomas Ralph Johnson, 22, inside the car. The defendant allegedly was in possession of 50.87 grams of marijuana. He was charged with possession of marijuana.

Later that evening, the officers stopped two suspicious people in the complex, and during a search of the suspects found 42.85 grams of marijuana packaged in eight individual bags. William Henry Dutton, 18, was arrested and charged with possession with intent to deliver marijuana.

Two more men were charged with drug offenses when officers conducted a traffic stop at the complex. An investigation revealed that a driver was trying to hide a bag of marijuana in his shoe. Kristopher Clark, 20, from Garwood Estates, and a juvenile boy, who was a passenger in the car, were arrested for possession of marijuana.

several members of the State House and Senate about the state's BAC level. "I'm sure the issue will be brought back up during the new legislative session," Ulbrich said.

Fairfield resident Bruce Diehl said he was in favor of the ordinance, "But, could we also revisit the vehicle lockout ordinance which city council rejected awhile ago?" asked Diehl. "I think that deserves another look."

Diehl referred to an interlock device which when installed

under the dashboard of a vehicle will not allow a driver to start the vehicle until proving he or she is legally sober.

Already available under state law, the voluntary interlock program is an alternative penalty for first time DUI offenders, many of whom claim they will lose their job if they lose their license and can't drive for a time.

City council declined to adopt the program in the city alderman's court because they view it as giving drunk drivers a break. Proponents claim it's more about keeping drunk drivers off the roads.

Student morale is a top priority

AS Command Master Chief of the aircraft carrier "Eisenhower," Charles Baldwin was responsible for the discipline and morale of 6,000 men and once interpreted for the ambassador of Italy.

Now in his first year as the principal of Kirk Middle School in Newark, Baldwin said he hopes to accomplish an entirely new, yet somewhat similar mission: to inspire discipline and morale in 960 12-to-14-year-olds.

Baldwin, a 50-year-old husband and father, was born and raised in Illinois and joined the U.S. Navy at age 17. During the 24 years he spent in active service, he eventually rose to the Navy's highest enlisted rank.

"I was responsible for sailors' training and their morale and their discipline — things that are actually very similar to what you do as a principal," Baldwin said.

A few years into his naval career, duty called for Baldwin to travel overseas. He spent three years in Italy before becoming an interpreter for a number of prominent Italian officials, including the Italian ambassador and the president of Italy.

When he was first sent to the country in 1973, Baldwin could not speak a word of Italian. He soon learned that the three years he spent taking Latin classes in high school would benefit him greatly. He was in Italy for only six months before he could speak the language fluently.

"When I got there, all these words started to come to me very quickly and I think it's because of the Latin background," he said. "A lot of Latin words are quite

similar to Italian words. So, if anybody ever tells you that Latin is not important, they're wrong."

While performing his naval services in Italy, Baldwin met a young woman who was working at a resort and lived on the Italian island of Sardinia. Her name was Salvatorica and she and Baldwin eventually fell in love.

"She did not speak a word of English — that just proves how good my Italian skills really were," Baldwin said. "I convinced her to marry me, let's just put it that way. And we've been married now for almost 27 years."

He moved back to the United States with his new wife, but they still keep a ranch house on 80 acres of land in his wife's hometown, and own a few apartments there as well.

The Baldwins and their two children, Antonella, now 26, and William, now 21, moved to Delaware 13 years ago while he was attached to the naval base in Philadelphia.

He was sent there as Command Master Chief and his friends told him he ought to try looking for a home in Wilmington because it was a great place to live. So he found a place and the Baldwin family moved there from Sardinia.

After three years, Baldwin was sent to Norfolk, Va., on an aircraft carrier, and was told that he would be going out to sea for a long time.

"I thought, 'Well, I'll go and my family can stay (in Wilmington),' " he said. "After those three years, my family was so entrenched here, and (the kids) loved the schools that they were at, and they had their friends, so we decided that when it came time to retire, we would stay in the Wilmington area."

"Both of my children attended McKean High School and received a wonderful education in the public school system."

Baldwin said he left the Navy after almost 25 years of service.

He taught junior ROTC at Christiana High School for five years, and was chosen as Teacher of the Year for the school in 1999. He also taught for one year at Seaford High School. During this time, he pursued a master's degree in secondary school administration at Wilmington College.

"I decided the administrative end of public education was the way that I wanted to go, and I love it," Baldwin said. "I was the

assistant principal here last year, I'm the principal this year."

"Middle school-aged children are an interesting group of children to work with — a lot of energy — but I have a lot of energy too and I love the kids."

Baldwin wants to make a difference at Kirk. "This year, certainly, we are to improve the students' performance on meeting the standards. Second, we're going to have a school play (this spring) — the best in the state of Delaware, I'm convinced of it. It's going to be 'Joseph and the

Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat.'"

Baldwin, who sometimes wears his old naval uniform to school, likes to make school fun. "Certainly, it is to be educational, but I want the children to be excited about coming to school each day," he said. "And if they're happy about coming here, education can take place. Love and respect for children are No. 1 issues here at the school; fear and intimidation are not allowed."

God lead them to the spot destined for their new church

THE Word of Life Christian Center has been tucked away in the Blue Hen Office Center amongst businesses for the past eight years, but it will soon have its time to shine.

With a permanent church under development on 14,000 square feet of land at the corner of Route 72 and Old Baltimore Pike, the Christian center has become a highly visible fixture in the Newark community over the past two months.

Jeff Andrews of the development company Daystar Sills said by the time the church is completed in April, it will fit 460 people, have ample parking to the right and back, and will boast an 80-foot dome

in the center.

David Carey, pastor of the Word of Life, said the idea of where to relocate the church came to him — literally — from God.

"It's a fascinating story because my assistant pastor and I stood on that ground eight years ago and I remember saying, 'This is the place. This is where the center belongs,'" Carey said.

The land that he stood on that day was not developed and seemed the perfect place for the church. But, he said, the land belonged to a farmer who had owned the land for quite a long time, and who was not interested in selling his property at the time. Carey said he instead moved the center to the Blue Hen Conference Center on Route 72.

"Then, a couple of years ago, it came time to move — we were outgrowing [the

current location,] — so I called up a Christian realtor from Patterson Schwartz and told him to find me a piece of ground," Carey said. "I told him it had to be in Newark because of the University and everything."

The next day, Carey's realtor called him and said he had found a perfect piece of land for the church right in Newark, but they had to act fast before it was "snatched up."

"It turned out to be the exact same spot we stood on eight years ago," he said. "We were destined to have that ground."

Carey said if they had looked at the property just a few days later, someone else would have already bought it.

"The timing was absolutely astounding," he said. "They called me up and said there was another bidder so we had to

make the decision right then and there. I said, 'Could you at least let me pray for a minute?' So I prayed for a minute and I called back and made them an offer."

Church members paid \$125,000 for the land and hired an engineer, an architect and a contractor. Now, just two months since construction began, the new church is beginning to take shape. The walls are going to be 20 feet high, with an 80-foot honeycomb-shaped geodesic dome in the middle, Carey said.

"It's going to be an absolutely beautiful building. There will be lighting from all around, and windows up top to allow light to stream in, and they will give us circulation if we need circulation when the weather gets warmer," he said. "We hope to be up and running before Easter Sunday."

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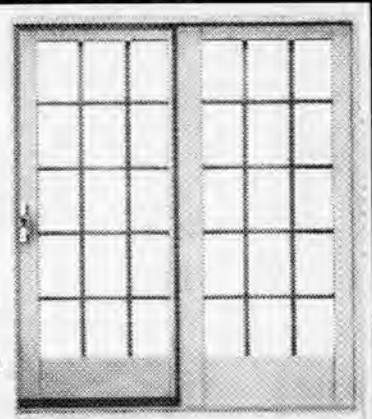

Passing .08 BAC was right move

Despite skepticism and even ridicule from some directions, Newark has become the first municipality in Delaware to institute a Blood Alcohol Content of .08 as evidence of driving under the influence within their jurisdiction.

Citing statistics and incidents from national and local sources, city councilmembers unanimously stated their belief this was a necessary move on their part.

The statistics are daunting: Delaware, one of the smallest states in the country has one of the highest traffic fatality rates at 42 percent; most other countries in the free world already have set a national BAC of .08 as the point for drunk driving; experts believe drivers with a BAC of .10, the current illegal level in most of Delaware, are 29 times more likely to have a fatal traffic accident than a driver with no alcohol in their bloodstream at all.

Not all traffic deaths involve alcohol, of course. However, a representative from Mothers Against Drunk Driving stated traffic fatalities in California dropped by 12 percent after the .08 BAC was passed by the state legislature there.

In some news sources, Newark has been viewed as aberrant in considering this ordinance when the state has not done so. News stories and columnists posited that the push against binge drinking by college students was the basis for the BAC concern here.

We do not believe that is the case, however. As councilmember and New Castle County EMS employee John Farrell noted, anyone riding on any weekend in Delaware with paramedics and emergency response workers can see the traumatic injuries brought on by drinking and driving.

It's not about excessive drinking. Stay put and drink until you pass out if that's your poison. Just don't get behind the wheel of a vehicle and put the rest of us within your bleary-eyed target range.

Now, we just hope that the state legislature will take the issue under serious consideration — if for no other reason than the looming loss of federal transportation funds as of 2003 for those states which do not institute the .08 level.

CHARTER school enrollment has increased, and public school enrollment in three of the New Castle County public school systems has decreased.

It did not take long for people in the academic world, from Valerie Woodruff, State Secretary of Education, right on down to Homer Whitesides, substitute custodian for a local high school, to recognize that the changes in these numbers were probably related in some way. It was reported in the Wilmington News Journal that Woodruff "would need to take a closer look at the numbers to know the exact cause of the decrease" in the public schools.

Unfortunately, the only thing the numbers will reveal to Secretary Woodruff is the fact that more people are turning away from traditional public school systems to meet the educational needs of their families.

The cause of the decline in public school enrollment will not be found in the numbers. Looking for explanations in the enrollment numbers would be like my trying to figure out what is wrong with my car when it won't start by reading the numbers on the speedometer.

Zero tells me nothing. When I want to know what is wrong with my car, I take it

to my mechanic, John Smith, someone who works on cars day in and day out. He is an expert at diagnosing car problems because it is his job and he has been doing it for some time.

Perhaps education officials should follow that analogy and find out what is wrong in the public schools by asking the experts, the people who work in them day in and day out: the teachers.

Unfortunately, very few administrators outside of individual schools ask teachers about anything. On the off chance they do ask, they may hear, but they do not listen. It is much easier to TELL teachers what to do than to work with them in a cooperative endeavor.

It is more likely that an administrator will adopt a "revolutionary" and "innovative" new curriculum program to create a "world-class" educational system after consultation with an education "expert" from a university.

Mercifully, most of these programs have a shorter life span than the common housefly although they are equally annoying.

Since the revolutionary and innovative programs are created by people who never spend any real time in public school build-

ings interacting with public school children and public school teachers, they lack at least one very important component: a reality check.

Another solution, according to Claiborne Smith, a member of the state Board of Education, is for public schools to implement programs that are proving to be successful in charter schools. Mr. Smith just does not get it.

The programs in charter schools are not significantly different from many found in public schools. The difference lies in the educational atmosphere in which the programs are executed. For instance, at one local high school in the Christina School District, there are award winning teachers and award winning educational programs.

However, the students from this school are not climbing the ivy-covered walls of higher education in large numbers as a result.

Why not? An atmosphere conducive to learning needs to be established and maintained.

Parents pull students from public schools to get away from hallway chaos. Food and sodas are available at any time in many schools leading to a "shopping mall" atmosphere. It is against the law to have food and drinks in the stations and trains of the Washington D.C. Metro system, but schools peddle sodas to kids for them to guzzle in school hallways. Go figure.

Parents pull students from public

schools because rules are not enforced and teachers do not receive enough support from school administrators. Vulgar behavior and unbelievably foul language spread with more virulence through the buildings than the latest version of the Asian flu.

Parents pull students from public schools because classrooms are filled beyond capacity, not just beyond the capacity of teachers to provide individual attention to students, but often beyond the capacity of the room to physically house them safely and comfortably.

Finally, parents pull students from public schools because families feel as though they are treated like cattle by callous school board members and administrators who are more concerned with the "bottom line" than the educational welfare of their children.

Secretary Woodruff will have to look very hard at the numbers to find the reasons described above. No amount of squinting, glasses, or radial keratotomy operations will help. I believe a series of unannounced visits to schools with declining enrollments will prove to be more eye opening.

ON Wednesday, Nov. 1, George Read Village lost its oldest resident. These homes were built during World War II for military housing. At that time a young woman named Alice Bingham frequently visited her brother's family at 25 Thompson Circle. On a train trip back home from one of these visits she met a man named Jim Buckley. Jim was in the service and they corresponded with each other by mail.

Jim and Alice got married and then moved to 56 Thompson Circle. After the war, they had

raffles to see who would get to buy the duplexes in George Read. Mr. and Mrs. Buckley won their raffle and bought the 56/58 Duplex for a whopping \$6,500!

She always spoke fondly of her husband. She said he was a good man, and as she talked about him she would get a far off look in her eyes as they became a little moist.

The Buckleys never had children and Mrs. Buckley worked in the produce section of the Aca-me, as she called it, for 23 years. The Buckleys loved animals, and to the dismay of their neighbors, became a refuge for neighborhood strays. They were good people who loved animals.

After her husband's death, Mrs. Buckley continued on,

doing good for those around her. She had always reached out to those in need.

Considering her conduct later in life, this is easy to believe. In the seven years that I knew Mrs. Buckley she always cared for the elderly. These "elders" were always younger than her!

Alice turned 94 on Friday, Oct. 27. Just a month before she died, she spent the whole month caring for a friend younger than her.

The Mrs. Buckley I knew and loved was a woman that hopped the fence as a short cut to the Pathmark. If you can, picture an older lady with a chair on either side of a fence, climbing from one to the other.

This is a lady who, at age 89, had her purse snatched behind

the Pathmark and chased the man to his car, reached in and got the purse back!

In the fall you could hear her, early in the morning, raking all her leaves.

When we went on vacation she took care of our cats. Unfortunately that was the year the it snowed a foot and a half. She shoveled our entire walk in order to reach the house and feed our cats.

Mrs. Buckley never slowed down until shortly before her 92nd birthday when her inebriated neighbor fell, knocked her over and broke her hip. Yes, what that man did was wrong, but the story doesn't end there. Alice Buckley was too strong and determined a woman to allow the carelessness of others

determine her fate.

Alice lived for three years after that. Even though she fell again breaking her hip, she walked without a cane at the end of her life. She continued to read for a friend going blind, and took care of another friend who did not want to go to a nursing home.

I'm glad that Mrs. Buckley died doing what she wanted to do. She was going out to visit a sick friend. That's what she loved and that's what kept her going all those years. She could have listened to the advice of concerned doctors and loved ones. She could have sat in the house and possibly lived for many years to come. But what kind of life is that? We only get one chance at life and Mrs.

Buckley lived life to the fullest.

Christ himself said in Mark 10:44 "An whosoever of you will be the chiefest, shall be servant of all." Mrs. Buckley was a model of that verse and she lived a long, happy life.

People say that we don't have modern day heroes. Mrs. Buckley lived in our neighborhood for 55 years. If the example she has set for us is not heroic, I don't know what is. Reach out to your neighbor today. It will do you and your neighbor good.

State considers speed drop to meet smog requirements

DATA that suggests Delaware is falling behind in its efforts to reduce smog has prompted state officials to consider dropping the speed limit from 65 mph to 55 mph on two highways.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is already reviewing state proposals to bring smog emissions in line with federal

guidelines by 2005. Delaware risks losing federal highway and major transit funding.

"The bottom line is we're driving more, and that's creating a problem with us," said Delaware Transportation Secretary Anne P. Canby.

The emissions of nitrogen oxide and volatile organic compounds in New Castle County and Kent County are above the

limits that must be met by 2005.

State planners attribute much of the problem to increased driving due to suburban sprawl and the higher speed limits on I-495 and Del. 1.

State representative Roger P. Roy said officials might have to reinstate the 55-mph limit during the peak months for smog - May to September.

Ordinance to complete traffic study passed

NEW Castle County Council has passed an ordinance designating \$150,000 for a traffic study in southern New Castle County.

The ordinance to determine present and future circulation patterns for development issues was co-sponsored by county councilmen J. Christopher Roberts and Robert Woods. "This will bring together the county and the state closer together in coordinating roadway improvements and

future development," Roberts said.

According to Roberts, the necessity for such an ordinance became apparent during council members' talks with the Delaware Department of Transportation and the County Land Use Department.

Council members were attempting to resolve the projected bottleneck for Fieldsboro Road (Road 452) near Pine Tree Estates. DelDOT was not com-

fortable requiring roadway improvements in areas where council members and Land Use officials knew that improvements would be available in short order.

"In order to resolve this impasse," Roberts said, "this traffic circulation project will be jointly funded by the county and the state."

The project will take into account the pending development projects and other projections based on the underlying zoning.

World AIDS Day observed today with local programs

WORLD AIDS Day is being observed around the world and throughout the state of Delaware today.

Observed annually on Dec. 1, this year marks the 13th World AIDS Day during which social tolerance and a greater exchange of information on HIV/AIDS is encouraged. Members of several AIDS service organizations in Delaware - currently fifth in the nation per capita in AIDS, with 28.1 cases per 100,000 - have coordinated activities for families, friends and community members.

Locally, Bishop Michael Saltarelli from the Roman Catholic Church celebrated a mass at Christ Our King Church in Wilmington today to pray for all infected and affected by HIV/AIDS. Saltarelli extended an invitation for parish priests to celebrate the mass with him and to bring parish representatives to the observance. Mass was followed by breakfast and a short presentation in the church hall.

Also in Wilmington, the Manna Christian Fellowship Church on Clifford Brown Walk is hosting a World AIDS Day service featuring The Ministry of Marvin and Tangy Major of Hackensack, N.J., and The Manna Christian Fellowship Mass Choir of Wilmington tonight at 6:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served

and AIDS testing will be provided.

AIDS Delaware will host a World AIDS Day Ecumenical Service and Candlelight Vigil at First and Central Presbyterian Church in Wilmington at 6:30 p.m. Immediately following the service, "A Day Without Art" reception and silent auction will be held at the Delaware Art Museum.

Sharon Temple SDA Church will present its fourth annual World AIDS Day concert at Sharon Temple Church on Washington Street in Wilmington from 7 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. today. The event is sponsored by Love Heals Ministry.

According to organizers, this year's World AIDS Day theme is, "AIDS: All Men - Make a Difference," which was chosen to encourage people to help make a difference by speaking out about the issues surrounding the AIDS epidemic and to help in educating others to stop the spread of disease.

Men represent the majority of people living with HIV/AIDS, and the theme urges all men to increase their awareness of the risk of HIV/AIDS for themselves, their partners, and their children and to use their influence in their families, among friends and in communities to help stem the tide of this epidemic.

Revitalize holiday recipes

As you begin to plan the menus for the upcoming holiday get-togethers, try to think healthy. There are some easy ways to adjust your dishes to be yummy and good for you.

Keep in mind that fat adds flavor to most foods and improves texture and tenderness in baked goods. It also promotes flakiness and lightness.

Try reducing the amount of fat by one-fourth to one-third in baked products. For example, if a recipe calls for one cup of oil, try 2/3 cup. This works best in quick breads, muffins and cookies. It may not work as well for cakes.

Cut back, or even eliminate, added fat in casseroles and main dishes. For example, browning meat in added fat is unnecessary because some fat will drain from the meat as it cooks. Instead, use a non-stick cooking spray.

To thicken sauces and gravies without lumping, eliminate fat and instead mix cornstarch or flour with a small amount of cold liquid. Stir this mixture slowly into the hot liquid you want to thicken and bring back to a boil.

Chill soups, gravies, and stews and skim off hardened fat before reheating to serve. Select lean cuts of meat and trim off visible fat. Remove skin from poultry. Bake, broil, grill, poach or microwave meat, poultry or fish instead of frying.

Decrease the portion of oil in homemade salad dressings and try one-third oil to two-thirds vinegar.

Try using low or no-fat dairy substitutions in your recipes or when topping your foods. Also consider low-fat yogurt, buttermilk, or blended cottage cheese instead of sour cream or mayonnaise for sauces, dips and salad dressings. If a sauce made with yogurt is to be heated, add one tablespoon of cornstarch to one cup of yogurt to prevent separation.

Try using skim or low-fat milk instead of whole milk. For extra richness, try evaporated milk.

To reduce fat and cholesterol, use two egg whites or an egg substitute product instead of one whole egg. Use margarine instead of butter. For non-baked good products, you may try margarine in which liquid vegetable oil is the first ingredient.

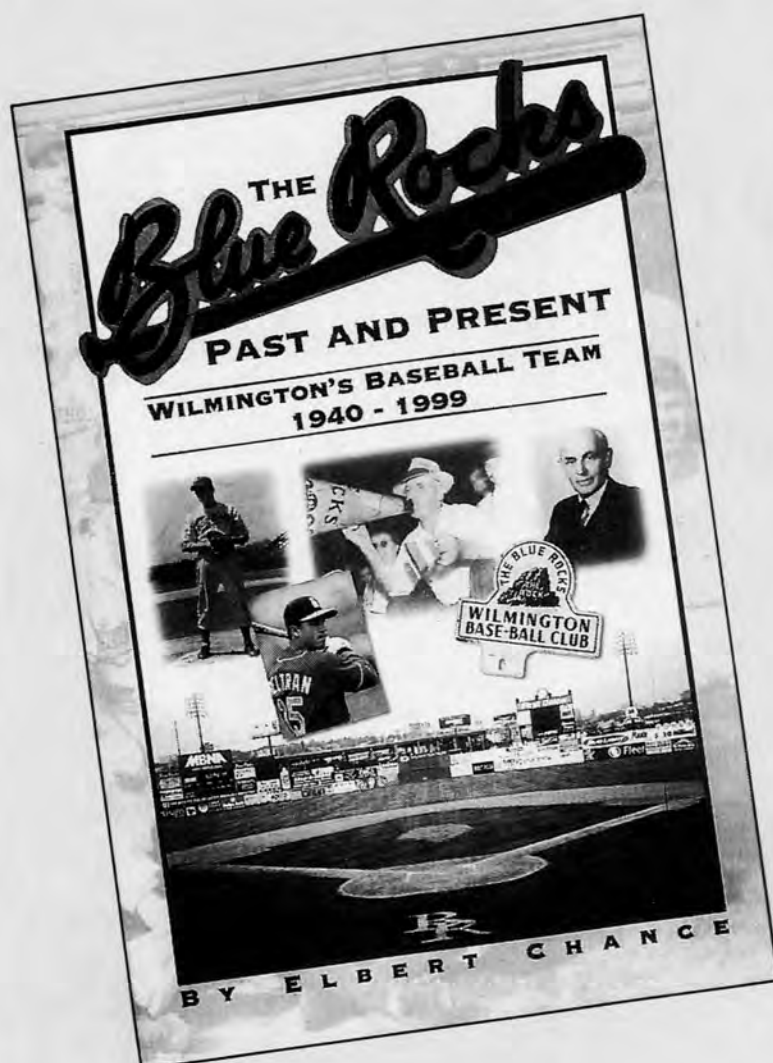
To substitute liquid oil for solid fats, use about one-fourth less than the recipe requires. For cakes or piecrusts, use a recipe that specifically calls for oil because liquid fats require special mixing procedures and different proportions of sugar.

America's pastime in Delaware

Newark resident Elbert Chance gives a wealth of interesting details about the history of two Blue Rocks teams in his recently published book.

Two Wilmington baseball teams have shared the name Blue Rocks, and both have dominated the leagues of their respective eras.

Both teams also have been spawning grounds for future stars of the major leagues.

In his book, "The Blue Rocks, Past and Present," Newark resident and author Elbert Chance recalls the original Blue Rocks of the Interstate League, 1940-1952, and the current Blue Rocks of the Carolina League, 1993-1999.

His account covers the rise and fall of the minor leagues, the difficult years of World War II and the Korean War, and the resurgence of the minor leagues from the mid-1980s to the present.

The original Blue Rocks produced the first major league star in outfielder Elmer Valo. Reading's Carl Furillo, Harrisburg's Billy Cox, Lancaster's George Kell and Nellie Fox, Trenton's Del Ennis and Willie Mays, and Wilmington's Curt Simmons and Robin Roberts soon followed.

In their first seven years, the modern Blue Rocks have sent 40 players to "The Big Show", notably Kansas City stars, Mike Sweeney, Johnny Damon, Mark Quinn and Carlos Beltran, Cleveland's Michael Tucker, the Cubs' John Lieber

and the Mets' Glendon Rusch.

Both teams quickly earned the enthusiastic support of Wilmington fans, both were remarkably successful, and both were consistent challengers for league championships and post-season honors.

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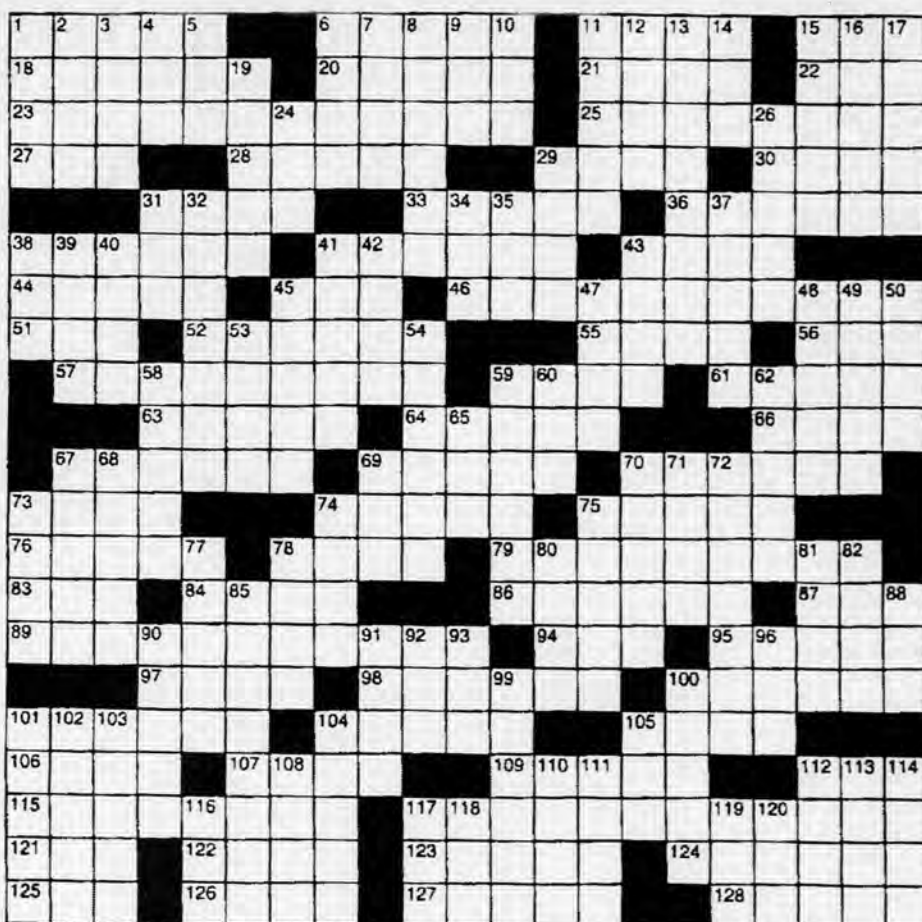

Jungle John attempts record-breaking, spine-tingling feat

Newark's own "Jungle John" will attempt to lie in a plexiglass coffin filled with 20,050 live Giant Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches on network television.

The unprecedented event will occur during the season premiere of the Fox Network television show at 9 p.m. on Dec. 2.

"Jungle John," as he is known to thousands of fans, is John LaMedica, 42. Dressed in a safari outfit and pith helmet, he has performed live reptile shows for more than a dozen years. Young children and the

young-at-heart have been introduced to "Wally Gator," a five-foot American alligator and "Julius Squeezer," a 15-foot albino Burmese python, as well as other amazing creatures.

The Giant Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches, used by LaMedica for some of his reptile shows, are the latest addition to Jungle John's menagerie. What began as a joke between he and his friend soon became a dangerous — but serious — endeavor to overcome nature. Could Jungle John be covered with 20,050 giant cockroaches and survive

without thousands of cockroach bites, or would he be devoured?

The Giant Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches average three to four inches in length. True to their name, they are found on the island of Madagascar, off the coast of East Africa. When they are touched or feel threatened, they "hiss" by releasing air from their abdomen, creating a hissing sound which can be heard up to 12 feet away. Unlike other roaches, they are wingless. The cockroaches eat absolutely anything and live for approximately five years.

Newark reign amazing

Win or lose Saturday afternoon, what the Newark High football program has accomplished over the past six years is amazing.

Saturday will mark the sixth straight year that the Yellowjackets have played in a Division I state championship football game. Sure, Newark has won the last three titles and there's a good chance it will be four by 4 p.m. Saturday.

This isn't the first time I've heard this. It's an idea that has been floating around the high school football community for awhile.

Last time I checked, nearly every player has been with the program from the beginning.

Last time I checked, the state initiated a school choice program. It wasn't Newark High that implemented the policy.

And as long as the policy is in place, isn't it natural that good players would want to come to such a successful program? Isn't also natural that parents might want to send good athletes to a school where one of the most highly recruited players in the country (Orion Harris) is playing? Don't you think a whole lot of colleges will be watching every one of those game tapes? Don't you think that might enhance other players' opportunity to receive attention from colleges?

If there was another school as consistently good as Newark is, it would be getting the transfers and not Newark.

It wasn't that long ago that Newark felt the sting of good players transferring out to other schools (before choice was in place). It's a cyclical thing and will always be.

Yes, Newark has benefited from the addition of Nelson Drew, who transferred

Newark advances to state title tilt

Jackets seek fourth straight championship

If a high school football team is still playing games on Thanksgiving weekend it's a big deal. The traditional holiday also happens to be when the state holds its tournament semifinal games. Newark High has not only played on the last six Holiday weekends, it's won on the last six Turkey Day weekends as well.

The top-ranked Yellowjackets (11-0) battered Caesar Rodney 33-9 on a frigid Friday night at Hoffman Stadium to advance to their sixth straight state championship game. Three-time defending champion Newark will face Sussex Central — a 33-3 victor over Dover — Saturday afternoon at 1 at Delaware State University's Alumni Stadium. The Jackets can become the first team in either Division I or II to win four straight state championships.

As has been the case all year, Newark's big-play ability determined the outcome of the semifinal.

The Jackets scored on a 41-yard fumble return, a blocked punt and touchdown runs of 46, 55 and 36 yards.

"Great players make big plays in big games," said Newark coach Butch Simpson, who will go after his sixth overall state title Saturday. "As I've said all year, we have some good players that are also very passionate about playing."

Caesar Rodney coach John Covalleski, whose fourth-ranked Riders were outscored 71-9 in two games against Newark this season, echoed those feelings.

"They just make big plays," Covalleski. "Nelson Drew turned to three-yard runs into 50-yards."

Before Drew turned his magic, it was All-American lineman Orion Harris that got

Newark on the scoreboard first.

Harris picked up a fumble in the Riders' backfield and rambled 41 yards to put Newark ahead 6-0 with less than two minutes played in the game.

After CR cut the lead to 6-3 on a 37-yard field goal by Megan Collins, Drew struck for the first time.

The senior back ran around the right side, picking his way through Rider defenders and finally breaking loose for the touchdown. John Brayman added the extra-point and Newark led 13-3 with 4:17 left to play in the first half.

With the defense and offense already posting scores, it was the special teams' time later in the half.

Steve Selk took advantage of a bad punt snap by the Riders, blocked a punt and chased the loose ball into the end zone where he fell on it to give Newark a 20-3 halftime lead.

"The ball actually hit me in the face mask," Selk said of the block. "I just saw it rolling it

Delaware romps past Portland State in first round

Senior quarterback Matt Nagy threw for 263 yards and two touchdowns and led an offense that piled up 620 yards of total offense as No. 2 ranked University of Delaware overpowered No. 15 Portland State 49-14 in an NCAA I-AA football first round playoff game Saturday at Delaware Stadium.

The Blue Hens (11-1), in the tournament for the first time since 1997 when they advanced to the semifinals, will host undefeated and No. 10 seed Lehigh (12-0) next Saturday, Dec. 2, in a quarterfinal game at Delaware Stadium. Lehigh upset No. 7 Western Illinois 37-7 Saturday.

Delaware, the nation's No. 2 ranked scoring team (41.4 ppg) and No. 16 ranked team in total offense (445.9), surpassed the 500-yard mark for the fifth time

this season with a balance of 357 yards rushing and 263 yards passing. Four different UD runners rushed for 60 yards or more.

The Blue Hen defense held the high-powered Viking attack to just 338 total yards. Portland State, a former NCAA Division II power, was making its first I-AA playoff appearance after moving up to the classification in 1996.

Nagy completed 14 of 23 passes for 263 yards, his 21st career 200-yard game, and broke his own school record for passing yards in a season at 2,981 yards. He also threw a touchdown pass for a school record 13th straight game and upped his UD record touchdown passes to 27 this season. Junior spread end Jamin Elliott caught five passes for 146 yards and a touchdown and senior halfback Craig Cummings

rushed for a team-high 84 yards and two scores.

"To win like we did today really gives us a lot of momentum heading into

the rest of the playoffs," said Nagy after the game.

"After the Villanova game last week, we wanted to come out and establish ourselves on the first series," said Delaware defensive end Mike Cecere. "Stopping them on their first drive (on a fourth and one) was very big for us."

Portland State tailback Chip Dunn, a Walter Payton Award candidate and the nation's No. 2 leading rusher with 1,792 yards entering the game, was held to just 53 yards rushing and did not score a touchdown.

Quarterback Jimmy Blanchard threw for 272 yards and two

touchdowns with Orshawante Bryant catching 13 passes for 128 yards.

The Blue Hens controlled the game from the outset, jumping out to a 21-0 lead as fullback James O'Neal (83 yards rushing) scored from 15 yards out with 8:33 left in the opening quarter for a 7-0 lead. Nagy hit Brett Veach on a nine-yard scoring pass early in the second quarter and Cummings, who went over 2,000 career yards rushing on the day, scored on a 20-yard run four minutes later for the 21-0 lead.

Portland State, which was averaging 35.6 points and 433.3 yards per game this season, finally got on the board with 6:23 left in the first half on an eight-yard pass from Blanchard to Bryant.

Delaware didn't waste any time in the second half, opening

the third quarter with a 65-yard scoring bomb from Nagy to Elliott just 1:33 into the half. Scoring runs of seven yards by freshman Antawn Jenkins (63 yards) and five yards by Cummings later in the half upped the Blue Hen lead to 42-7.

"Our heads are spinning a little bit," said Portland State head coach Tim Walsh. "They were able to do pretty much anything they wanted to do. They kept us off balance the entire day. The rest of the nation better watch out."

Portland scored with 8:19 left to play on a one-yard toss from Blanchard to Taylor Teigen, but the Hens capped the scoring on an 11-yard run by Butter Pressey with 4:46 left to play.

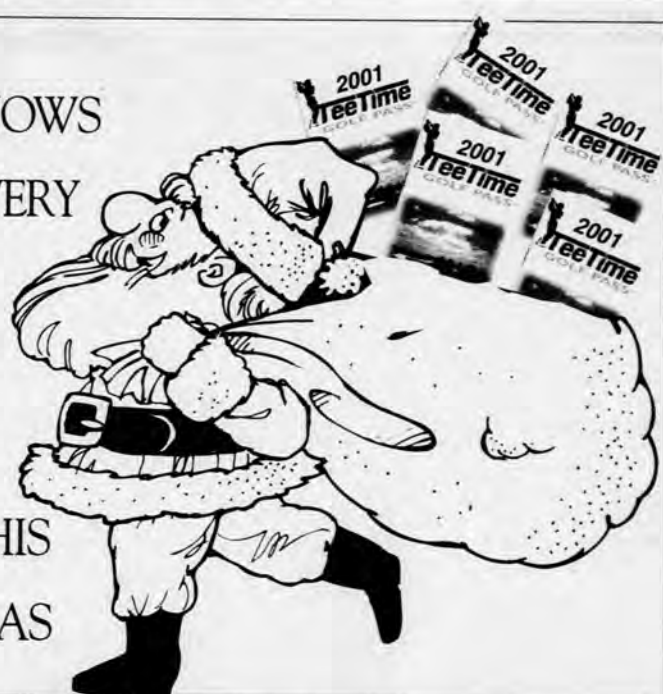

emotional effort as well."

George Mason 73, Delaware 65 - Two-time Colonial Athletic

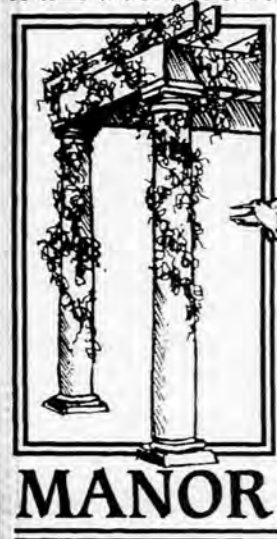

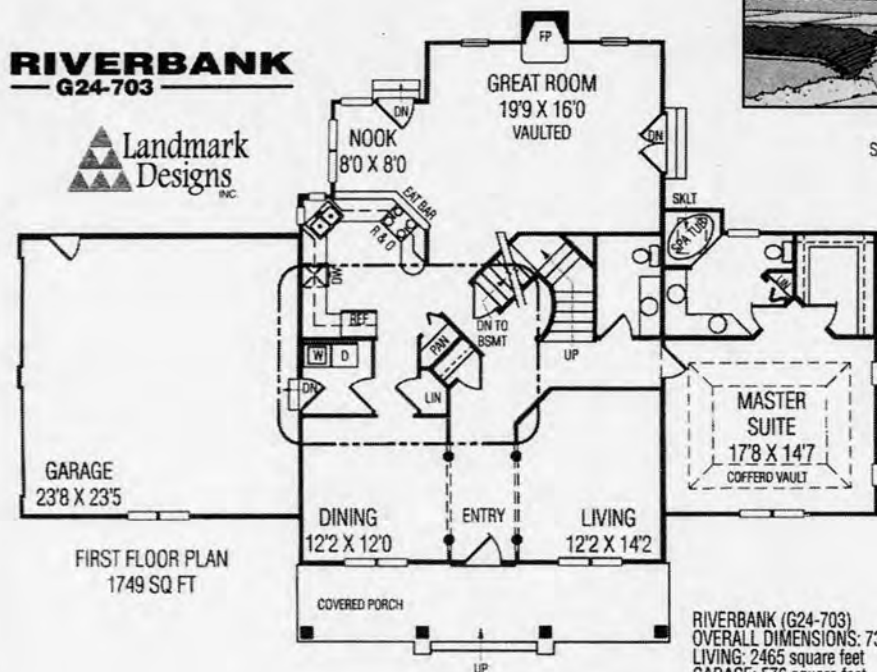

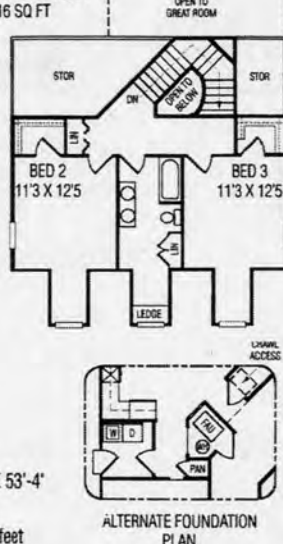
