Safety Council Cautions Of Holiday Booby Traps
Holiday booby traps should be cleared away before they hurt somebody, a safety official suggested yesterday.

The booby traps are wrapping paper, boxes, excelsior, ribbons, and dried-out trees. All these items around the house during the holidays are fire hazards, Mrs. William N. Cann, vice-president for the Delaware Safety Council, warns.

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E. N. Scarborough Advises On Caring For Yuletide Tree

The appearance of your tree on Christmas morning will reflect treatment it has received since it was cut, according to Ernest N. Scarborough, associate professor of agriculture engineering at the University of Delaware. The safety of the Christmas tree also depends on how it has been kept, Scarborough says.

Christmas trees should be stored outside, or at least in the coolest place available until time for decorating.

Before placing the tree in its stand, a diagonal cut should be made across the trunk about an inch above the base. This cut will make it possible for the tree to absorb more water. The cut surface of the trunk should be completely covered with water at all times. When the tree is in a warm room, it may use a pint of water daily.

Scarborough says keeping the tree standing in water is the most practical, satisfactory, and convenient method in reducing the fire hazard and keeping the needles from discoloring or falling.

Live green boughs and branches make attractive decorations, but they will remain attractive longer if they are arranged in water to keep them fresh and to reduce the fire hazard.

If it is not possible to place greens or trees in water, they may

be made flame-retardant by immersing, spraying or sprinkling with a solution of 9-oz. of borax and 4-oz. of boric acid powder mixed with 1-gal. of warm water. The University of Pennsylvania's business school is sponsoring a business school of public understanding of business.

10 U. of D. Coeds Win Scholarships From TB Society

Ten University of Delaware coeds have been awarded tuberculosis society scholarships for undergraduate studies in nursing.

Dr. Gerald Beatty, president of the Delaware Tuberculosis and Health Society, said that since initiation of the Society's nursing scholarship program in 1953, some \$40,000 has been granted by the group to undergraduates at the University of Delaware.

The University of Delaware offers a four-year program in nursing leading to a bachelor of science degree with a major in nursing. Summers between sophomore and junior years, and junior and senior years include professional training at Delaware Hospital, Wilmington.

As a means of enabling the director to carry out these duties, Neide, Mayor Carl S. Rankin, Councilman Henry R. Folsom Jr., and others devised a new ordinance designed to reorganize the administrative setup in the city government to put more responsibility in the manager's hands, and to define and clarify lines and levels of authority. The ordinance also creates the position of assistant to the manager and gives the manager authority to transfer functions of units, provided he notifies council in writing if a transfer is to be permanent.

The ordinance was brought up for a second and final reading at the last session of council, but was withdrawn temporarily after Councilman William M. Coverdale asked if provisions of the ordinance conflicted in any way with existing ordinances or the charter.

Mayor Rankin said he would have City Solicitor Jan. 2, Bove Jr., search the code and charter, and said he hoped the ordinance can be brought to vote at the Jan. 13 council meeting.

Until this ordinance, or one like it passed, Griesbaum's position is not clearly spelled out. All council has done so far is to include the position in the salary list for city employees.

In the meantime, Griesbaum and Neide both say that it will be some time before he can complete any major projects. He must first acquaint himself with the physical layout of the city and with the people he will have to deal with in his job.

Mistletoe Offers Holiday Trim . . . And Other Things!

No Christmas holiday should be complete without a sprig of mistletoe. Although this traditional green is a familiar sight to millions of people, few are aware of the reasons for its strange distinction, says Dave Tattall, assistant county agent in ornamental horticulture.

Since earliest times the mistletoe has held the interest and awe of various peoples. Many special powers have been attributed to this plant. It has been used in religious rites, including those of the ancient Druids, and in medicinal preparation.

The best known custom associated with mistletoe is that of kissing beneath a suspended sprig. This popular practice reputedly has its origin in Scandinavian mythology.

Numerous species of mistletoe are found in the United States, but the one most commonly used for decoration is the American mistletoe, Phoradendron flavescens. It is a small, shrubby plant, and like all members of the family is parasitic. It has yellowish-green evergreen foliage, and bears clusters of white, pearl-like berries.

The mistletoe plants grows on various deciduous trees, usually in the branches of maples, sycamores, gums, and oaks.

Fire Safety Tips At Christmastime Cited By Walpole

With the holidays, check to see that your family is protected against fire hazards, suggests Ernest Walpole, extension agricultural engineer at the University of Delaware.

Prevention of fires is most important, but knowing what to do if a fire should erupt in your home could save lives and property.

Greens and paper decorations should be placed where there is the least chance of their catching fire or where a fire would not spread easily. Set candles where they will not come in contact with dry, flammable materials.

Check the electric cords on your Christmas tree lights to be sure that they are in good condition, and not frayed or worn in spots. Trees can be sprayed with a commercial product which prevents flash fires, and at the same time, gives longer life to the tree.

It is best to use water to extinguish tree fires if tree lights are disconnected and there is no danger of live electrical current. Water cools, saturates and prevents rekindling of the flames. Walpole explains. This is also true of fires from paper, fabrics and other easily combustible materials.

Do not use water to stop a fire when either electricity or flammable liquids are present. Walpole cautions. Water will spread the fire when liquids are burning, or conduct the current to you in the instance of electrical fires.

Your first step in the event of an electrical fire is to turn off the electricity — then take measures to extinguish flames. Carbon dioxide and dry chemical extinguishers from commercial firms are recommended for most types of fires. They are both non-conducting agents and put out flames by a blanketing action which cuts off their supply of oxygen.

Naomi H. McCann Attends Workshop For Driver-Education

Mrs. Naomi H. McCann, state civic participation chairman for the Business & Professional Women's Club of Delaware, was among 200 civic leaders from 11 states attending the Northeast Regional Workshop on high school driver education at New York last Thursday.

The one-day meeting on the up-to-date campus of New York University was sponsored by the President's Committee for Traffic Safety and conducted by the national commission on safety education of the National Education Association to encourage public support for educating high school students in traffic citizenship.

15 Killed On Highways In Maryland Last Week

Fifteen persons were killed on Maryland highways last week according to the weekly survey published by the Maryland State Police. Eight of those killed were drivers; two were passengers; and five were pedestrians.

Alcohol was a contributing factor in four of the deaths; speed in five; and "driver error" was present in 12 fatalities.

The Yellowjackets finished second to William Penn for the Blue Hen Conference championship last season, and Co-Capt. Harvey Folk is the defending conference champion at 145-lbs.

Folk, quarterback, captain, and All-State choice with Coach Bob Hoffman's Yellowjacket football champions of the past football season, was undefeated as a wrestler at 145-lbs. until the state meet when he lost a 4-2 decision to St. Andrew's Pope last winter.

Delaware Park Adds Rosenna Stake Race To "Big Three" Program For Next Meet

In an endeavor to strengthen individuality of its stakes — particularly the Delaware Handicap and the other filly and mare events — Delaware Park has revised conditions governing its stake races, according to President Donald P. Ross.

For 1964, there will be four filly and mare stakes instead of three, and they will be divided in pairs to emphasize development of three-year-olds on one hand, and to reward outstanding older horses on the other.

The new stake has been named the Rosenna in honor of William du Pont's winning filly of 1937 — first winner of the Delaware Handicap in that inaugural year.

The new Rosenna, carrying \$15,000 in added money, will be a prep for the \$30,000 Delaware Oaks, and these two races will be coupled so that a single entry will entitle a horse to compete in both of these three-year-old races.

Likewise coupled, will be the New Castle and the Delaware for three-year-olds and up, but with emphasis on older mares, and a single nomination will entitle a horse to start in both. The added money will be \$30,000 and \$100,000 respectively.

These changes were made because of reluctance of trainers of three-year-olds to run against older mares at a mile and a quarter in the month of July.

If the Delaware meeting were run later in the year, the situation might be different," Ross said, "but in June and July, the Delaware Racing Association does not want to be in the position of promoting a race which puts undue pressure on a young horse."

William du Pont said that there should be some provision to schedule a race to fit a horse like Kelso. This famous star owned by Mrs. Richard C. duPont, has never been seen by Delawareans since he became a champion. Mr. duPont has no thought of establishing a rival stake that will compete with the great fixtures that now overlap in

Do Farmers Follow Faulty Practice? Agronomists Study Decision-Making

Some of the things farmers do that don't always work for them are being studied by agronomists at the University of Delaware.

Dr. William Crosswhite, a University of Delaware agricultural economist, cites several reasons behind decisions farmers make. He says habit is probably the biggest factor.

"Some farmers have 20 years of experience, and some have one year's experience 20 times," Crosswhite concludes.

He says farmers aren't always convinced that a certain practice will work for them, just because their county agent or a seed dealer says so.

Crosswhite says personal preference and a desire to eliminate risk often enter into the decision-making process.

Farmers prefer a certain kind of livestock or a certain cropping system even though another method will produce more income. Some prefer to reduce their risk by milking cows. Others would rather take the risk of feeding beef cattle than be tied down to a twice-a-day milking routine.
