One new member was enlisted at the drill on Monday night, bringing the total strength of the company to date to six. The company is composed of twenty-seven enlisted men. Additional men and boys between the ages of 16 and 65 are needed to bring the company to full strength of 80 men.

The cases were classified as follows: prenatal 6, seven visits; maternity cases 1, twelve visits; pneumonia, one, seven visits; asthma two, eight visits; heart disease five, 31 visits; apoplexy four, 39 visits; operations two, five visits; arthritis four, 26 visits; cancer three, nine visits; undulant fever one, seven visits; measles one, two visits; paralysis one, 12 visits; infections one, seven visits; fractured femur one, four visits; intestinal diseases nineteen visits; kidney diseases three, seven visits; treatments 11; miscellaneous cases 12, 18 visits.

USO TAKES OVER LOCAL COMMUNITY SERVICE UNIT

Elkton Staff To Carry On Activities For War Workers

An announcement has been made this week by Mrs. George Hyde, chairman of the Newark Community Service Center Council that the USO is going to continue the work started a year ago by the Newark Community Service Center Council.

The Red Cross Work rooms are located in the Newark New Century Club building at the Corner of Delaware Avenue and Haines Street and are open every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. and on Tuesday evening from 7 to 9 o'clock.
