50% Water Rate Increase Planned By City Council

New Rate Would Mean That Average Consumer Here Will Pay \$5.25 Minimum

At a special meeting on Tuesday night City Council discussed an ordinance which if passed later will increase the city water rates by upproximately 50% effective Jan-iary 1, 1953.

eased water rate plus the evying of a sewer charge of \$1 er month has been planned to inper month has been planned to in-crease city revenue in an amount necessary to liquidate the recent \$500,000 bond issue floated for the purpose of extending and improv-ing the city water and sewer fa-cilities.

City Councilman Carl S. Rarkin pointed out that the proposed rate schedule of 30 cents per 100 cu. ft. for the first 5000 cu. ft. used by 5/8 meters (the standard residential meter) would mean that for \$5.25 the user would get 1750 cu. ft. of water. Previously, the rate was such that the user received 1800 cu. ft. for \$5.50.

The new schedule, said Mr. Rankin, would avoid penalizing the owners of small size meters, would be more favorable to those consumers using large amounts of water, but would penalize those consumers having large meters but using small amounts of water.




