Wilmer E. Shue, superintendent of the local school district, has come up with what we believe to be a good idea. We don't agree with all of Mr. Shue's ideas, but feel that he has something here.

At a recent National Citizenship Conference attended by more than 1,000 delegates representing 60 public and private agencies throughout the nation, Mr. Shue suggested that the public schools of the nation institute a practical course that would make for better citizens.

It is his idea, which he reports was well received, that each student be required to take the course which would actually teach him the problems and methods of local, state, and national government.

The course would be more than just a "textbook" course, says Mr. Shue, and would include visits to local, county, state, and national agencies to see the workings of our democracy.

In fact, Mr. Shue goes a little farther than we could agree with at this time and says that the course should be made a prerequisite to voting in all elections. In other words, the student would be given a certificate which would entitle him, providing he met the other requirements, to vote in local, county, state, and national elections. Without this certificate, he would not be allowed to vote.

He would take care of these students who do not graduate from high school by offering the course in evening classes so that these people would be allowed to qualify for participation. It is this prerequisite to voting that we cannot quite go along with. The power to determine whether or not a person could qualify for the certificate, and therefore the right to vote, would be in the hands of the local school officials. That is a lot of power.

While talking via long distance this week with Santa Claus regarding his Christmas shopping, we found out that seven-year-old Freddie Waskiewicz of 126 East Park Place was the first local youth to get in his list for Christmas by mail. With respect to his request for a bicycle or train car, something for his mother, and a toy mouse for his cat, Santa reported that he was working on them.

Factories, housing developments, and traffic problems have recently come to our city. In the near future we may have a new church. At a meeting on October 27 at the

home of Russell Stauffer on E. Park Place, local Lutherans will discuss the possibility of establishing a Newark Lutheran Church. All interested persons are invited to attend the meeting.

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Newark Ready For Battle At Wilmington Park With Devils

Last Year's Mythical County Champions To Provide Yellowjackets With Strongest Opposition To Date; Dickie Lawson Takes Over Starting Halfback Post

Newark High School's all-winning football team will face its toughest opposition of the young season tomorrow night when the Yellowjackets travel to Wilmington Park to take on last year's county high school champions, Wilmington High School. The game will get underway at 8:15 p.m.

Both Newark and Wilmington were idle last week end which has given each club an opportunity to concentrate on this important contest. Despite the fact that Coach Spasato's club defeated the Red Devils last season, 13 to 12, the Wilmington club was looked upon as mythical county champion since it was the only team to drop only one, a 7 to 6 loss to Salesianum, but only played an eight-game schedule.

While Newark has walked over its three previous opponents, Elkton, Brown, and Dover, in easy fashion, the Red Devils have yet to win a game. In two previous games they have been defeated by Downingtown and Chester, both Pennsylvania schools.

Coach Spasato and his club are not looking for any easy victory on Friday night, however, and the Newark mentor warned his charges this week that they will have to play better ball against Wilmington than they did in defeating Dover if they hope to keep their winning streak intact.

Ray Ciesinski, assistant Yellowjacket coach, scouted the Wilmington club in its loss to Chester and reported that only a series of untimely fumbles prevented the Red Devils from making it a close contest.

Spasato announced this week that there will be probably only one change in the offensive lineup which has started the last two games and that will find Dickie Lawson starting at the right halfback spot in place of Johnny Edmondson.

Lawson had been looked upon during pre-season practice as the starter in this position but suffered a groin injury which has handicapped him during the early games.

Last year's win over the county champions was the margin of an extra point and the fact that Newark has been far from successful in this department so far this year is causing the Yellowjacket coaches plenty of worry. During the week special emphasis has been placed on this maneuver in an effort to correct the deficiency.
