Hale, Edmansson, Alsip Victors

Republican Everett Hale Wins 14th District HR Seat; Democrats Defeat Hill, Correll For 16th, 24th House Posts; GOP Sen. Margaret Manning Wins In 8th District

Former Newark Mayor Frank M. Durnall, Republican candidate for state auditor, was defeated by Dr. Charles F. Moore of Seaford by 24,808 votes in the contest for state auditor at last Tuesday's national, state, and county election, as President Lyndon B. Johnson was elected at the head of the ticket in the Democratic landslide.

Republican Everett Hale of Newark defeated Democrat

Walter J. Plagens 5,029-3,037 for the 14th district seat in the State House of Representatives, but Democrats Ralph D. Edmansson and William E. Alsip won the local 16th and 24th district House seats over their GOP opponents.

Edmansson defeated LeRoy C. Hill, Jr., 2,993-2,678 in the 16th district; and Alsip won over Rep. Jacob A. Correll by 2,990-2,613 for the 24th district seat.

Republican Senator Margaret R. Manning defeated Frederick Klair 6,196-5,357 for the 8th Senatorial district election, while Sen. Calvin R. McCullough, Democrat, was unopposed for reelection in the 11th Senatorial district.

Williams Wins

U. S. Senator John J. Williams withstood the Democratic vote to be reelected to a fourth consecutive term in Washington, defeating Gov. Elbert N. Carvel by 6,438 votes; Democrat and U. S. Rep. Harris B. McDowell, Jr., was reelected to a fifth term as Delaware's Congressman, defeating James H. Snowden of Wilmington by 26,054 votes; and former Chief Justice Charles L. Turley, Jr., Democrat, defeated Attorney General David P. Buckner by 5,375 votes in the gubernatorial race.

Democrat Leon F. Heller defeated Angelo S. Dellosso by 12,274 votes for the office of New Castle County Sheriff; and Democrat John D. Danello defeated Sheriff Edward J. "Whitely" Michaels by 11,329 votes for the office of New Castle County Levy Court commissioner.

Dr. John W. Shirley, provost and vice-president of academic affairs at the University of Delaware, has been elected as a trustee of the college entrance examination board. Shirley is one of seven elected to three-year terms at the annual meeting of the board in New York on Oct. 28.

The college board supervises preparation of tests to determine student aptitudes and abilities, and results are employed as admissions and advisory tools by colleges throughout the nation.

Dr. Shirley joined the university in 1962. He had served 13 years as dean of the school of general studies and dean of the faculty at North Carolina State College, and taught at the University of Iowa, Michigan State, and the California Institute of Technology.

Francis Orr Family Moves From England  
As Father Accepts Job At Bing's Bakery

"Nice and clean," 28-year-old Francis Orr said concerning his first impression of Newark, after leaving his native Liverpool in England to take a job here with Bing's Bakery.

A credit to his forebears and our founding fathers, Francis Orr has moved with his wife Patricia, and their two children—John, 3½, and Diana, 2½—from their native England to the First State among Britain's former colonies. And while understandingly a bit homesick, Mr. and Mrs. Orr with their two youngsters are residing happily enough with the Ivy Hall Apartments in Newark as their new home.

A baker since he was 17, Francis Orr served 3½-years with the British Merchant Navy, and as a merchant marine cook and baker, sailed pretty much all over the world, including trips to the United States, China, and Australia.

"And I don't mean to low rate England," Francis Orr said loyally. "But there is more opportunity in the United States."

Francis Orr's parents in Liverpool took a dim view of their son's plans to move away from home, but offered no real objections to this bit of 20th century pioneering.

At Sunday Service

The Rev. Robert Heckmann Arrives As New Minister For Our Redeemer Church

The Rev. Robert G. Heckmann will be installed as pastor of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church near Chestnut Hill Estates, Newark, this Sunday with services beginning at 4:30 p.m.

The Heckmann family arrived in Newark last Tuesday from near St. Louis, Mo., and will reside temporarily at 31 Malvern Drive, Chestnut Hill Estates.

The rite of installation will be conducted by the Rev. George H. Mueller, pastor of Concordia Lutheran Church, Wilmington, and vice-president of the southeastern district Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

The liturgy will be read by Rev. H. Douglas Rathjen, pastor of the Wilmington area's newest Lutheran Church, St. Timothy, at Devon, and the choir will be under the direction of Harley S. Hastings, organist and choir director at Our Redeemer, and music coordinator for the Newark school district.

The Rev. William H. Kohn, president of the southeastern district Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, will give the installation sermon.

Dr. Kohn, a native of Winnipeg, Canada, is a graduate of Concordia Seminary, St. Louis and has served in the Baltimore area since 1940. He holds the Bronze Star Medal for service as chaplain from 1943 to 1946 with the 8th Infantry Division in Europe.

Mr. Kohn gave the dedication sermon when Our Redeemer congregation occupied its present church building in July, 1960.

The southeastern district is one of 24 subdivisions of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, and comprises congregations in Maryland, Delaware, Virginia, North and South Carolina.

The local congregation of Our Redeemer joined in 1957 when organized as a mission congregation by the Rev. Duane P. Mehl, Mr. Mehl left Newark for St. Louis last September for an editorial position at Syntex headquarters.

A native of Reisel, Tex., Mr. Heckmann is one of five sons of the Rev. Edwin Heckmann who still serves St. Mark Lutheran Church, Waco, Tex., and who was president of the Texas district of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

Special music is provided by members of the congregation.

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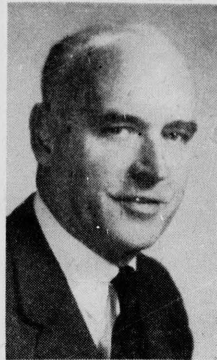
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## Christian Scientist

And we had scarcely finished reading the recently arrived postal, when its author, walked into the Newark Post with the broad smile of a snook fully fed on fresh Florida fish.

"Right after I wrote you that card," said Bob McFarlin, "I went out fishing on that pier at Fort Myers — baited up with a fresh live shrimp, and caught a 3-lb. sheepshead as soon as the bait hit the water. And right after that, I hooked a drum that must have weighed 15-lbs. — and it broke the hook."

"That night," Mr. McFarlin continued, "a school of big snook drifted off the bottom to float close to the surface — I never saw anything like it."

The snook, robalo, or ravalia — great scale-spangled beauties with a broad, single black lateral line stark against their silvery sides — great gamefish from the tip of their long, underslung jaw to the broad, bass-like prop. fin — could be seen both from the lights of the dock, and in the phosphorescence they stirred in the green Gulf of Mexico water — and Bob McFarlin was still enthralled.

Baiting up with a live pinfish, the Newark sportsman tossed his line into the school of snook — the pinfish slashed a phosphorescent streak through the water in a fast try for more amiable companionship — and then the water exploded into a real Fourth of July display of liquid fireworks.

The school of snook shifted into high gear and a foaming welter of phosphorescent fire — the foremost engulfed the hapless pinfish in a mighty maw, and the snook shook Bob McFarlin with its initial, blazing rush.

A snook doesn't display the endurance of a crevalle, or Florida redfish or channel bass, but Olympic Bob Hayes in running the 100, has little left as a miler.

After the first couple of runs interspersed with some aerial acrobatics that might elicit a bit of admiration from a tarpon, the snook is through. But it seems like a long while before he is through.

Bob McFarlin stayed with his fish — prevented a determined charge for the barnacle-covered pier pilings, and finally landed his 8½-lb. snook.

"Some fish!" the Florida fugitive feels fervently.

Two other fishermen wandered into the office at the Newark Post this week — Surfmens Joe Alfes and John N. Wood from the new Ronson plant near Ogletown.

John Wood is a member of the Media Surf Anglers Club, and competed in the Nags Head Surf Fishing Tournament on North Carolina's Outer Banks last year.

## Mullin Discusses Football Officials At TD Club Lunch

Leo "Moon" Mullin, a member of the Eastern Association of Intercollegiate Football Officials, and a star for Coach Bill Murray's University of Delaware football team, was the guest speaker for the Newark Touchdown Club luncheon meeting last Monday at the Horseless Carriage.

The EAIFO is made up of three divisions, Mullin explained, with 100 officials in Division I drawing the major college games — Army, Penn State, Navy — the 325 members of Division II assigned to the Middle Atlantic and other conference contests; and the 50 in Division III officiating at freshman and other football games.

Officials are rated by coaches and by fellow officials with each game. Mullin said, and advancement in the organization is based on such ratings and annual tests.

"The people in it," Moon Mullin said of football officiating, "don't do it for money, but only because they like football."

Concerning complaints of penalties levied, Mullin said "we let the players and coaches go a little bit after a flag is dropped."

A prime rule of officiating, he said, is to "only call what we see." Officials have lots of imagination, Mullin added, "but we don't call an infraction of the rules just because we think we saw it."

Extreme care is taken, he said, with rule violations that may result in injury to the players. "But we don't want to see football turned into a basketball game," Mullin continued. "It's a contact sport, and we intend to keep it that way."

In summary, Moon Mullin said that football officials are "a necessary evil; the four officials know more about the rules than anyone in the stadium; and they are dedicated men, pretty proud of the game, and doing everything they can to keep it on a high plane."

Ben Scott won the weekly football pool last Monday.

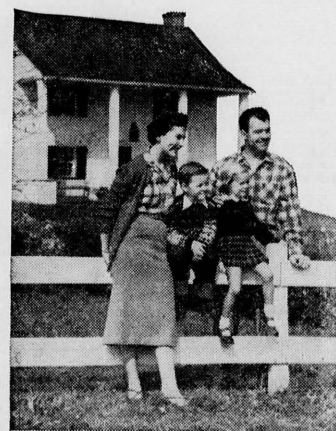

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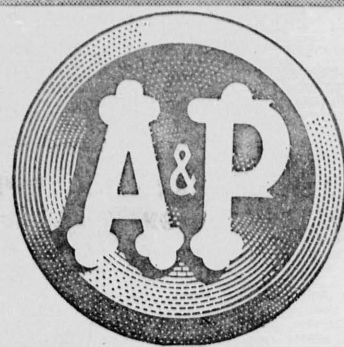
