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

After serving 354 days as President of the United States by succession with the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, Lyndon B. Johnson was elected Tuesday to the highest office in the nation with 61.3 per cent of the popular vote—topping the 60.8 per cent acclamation received by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1936.
