

## **PROCLAMATION**

I, MICHAEL N. CASTLE, by the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Delaware, pursuant to Article III, Section 16 of the Constitution of 1897, do hereby convene the 134th General Assembly of the State of Delaware into Extraordinary Session. During this Extraordinary Session the respective Houses of the 134th General Assembly During this Extraordinary Session the respective Houses of the 134th General Assembly shall meet at such times as are convenient to the members elected to each House thereof, to wit: Tuesday, December 2, 1986, at 2:00 p.m. for the Senate and Thursday, December 4, 1986, at 2:00 p.m. for the House of Representatives. This Extraordinary Session is hereby convened for the purpose of considering and acting upon legislation to ensure the continued existence of the State Board of Examiners in Optometry and the continued viability of state law regulating the practice of optometry in Delaware. In addition, the Senate shall meet for the transaction of certain executive business, to wit: the nomination of Randy J. Holland, Esquire, to be appointed an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Delaware.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I, MICHAEL N. CASTLE, Governor of the State of Delaware, have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of said State to be affixed hereunto at Wilmington, this 26th day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred eighty-six, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred eleventh.

Pursuant to the above Proclamation, the Senate convened at 2:30 p.m., December 2, 1986, Lt. Governor Woo presiding.

A Prayer was offered by Senator Slatcher.

On motion of Senator Cordrey, Betty Jean Caniford was appointed temporary Secretary of the Senate, Lorilee Harrison was appointed temporary Reading Clerk and Bernard J. Brady was appointed temporary Bill Clerk of the Senate.

A roll call of the hold-over Senators was taken and revealed the following attendance: PRESENT: Senators Berndt, Holloway, Knox, Marshall, Martin, Minner, Neal, Slatcher, Torbert, Zimmerman - 10.

The Chair appointed Senators Marshall and Slatcher as a Committee to receive and examine the Certificates of Election of the newly elected Senators.

At 2:34 p.m. the Chair called a standing recess for the purpose of the examination of the Certificates of Election and the Senate reconvened at 2:36 p.m.

Senator Marshall reported that the Certificates of Election were examined and found to be in order.

Senator Cordrey moved that the reading of one Certificate of Election be considered the reading of all the Certificates. No objection.

Pursuant to the above motion, the Certificate of Election of Senator Adams was read: The State of Delaware Sussex County

Be it remembered, that at the general election held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November, 1986, for Sussex County according to the Constitution and Laws of the State of Delaware, Thurman Adams, Jr. was duly elected Senator to General Assembly from Senatorial District No. 19. which is manifest by calculating and ascertaining the aggregate amount of all the votes given for each person voted for in all the hundreds and election districts of the county according to the provisions made by law in this behalf.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, WE Wm. B. Chandler III and Vincent J. Poppiti, the Judges constituting the Superior Court in Sussex County, who have met and ascertained the state of the election throughout the said county, as the law requires, have hereunto set our hands and caused the seal of the said Superior Court to be hereunto affixed at the Court House in said county on this 6th day of November, 1986.

The Chair declared a short recess to await the arrival of the Governor and the Escort Committee.

At 2:05 p.m., the Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of the Honorable Michael N. Castle, Governor of the State of Delaware.

The Governor was admitted and presented by Senator Holloway, Spokesman of the Escort Committee.

The President of the Senate welcomed the Governor and invited him to the podium.

The Governor addressed the Joint Session as follows:

Lieutenant Governor Woo, Mr. President Pro Tem, Mr. Speaker, members of the Senate and House, elected officials, members of the judiciary and the Cabinet, my father and sister who were kind enough to come down from Wilmington, fellow Delawareans.

It has been the duty of every governor of Delaware since 1776 to report to the General

Assembly on the state of the state.

In fulfilling that duty today, I am happy to report that, if the state of the state is measured by the quality of life we enjoy and our ability to improve it still further, then Delaware -- the First State in 1787 -- remains the First State in 1987.

. . . And we continue to have an impact that belies our size.

A few weeks ago in California, an incredible journey ended when a fragile airplane circled Edwards Air Force Base and landed on a runway that was once the exclusive domain of returning space shuttles.

The pilots of the plane, Dick Rutan and Jeana Yeager, had done the impossible -- they had flown around the world non-stop without refueling.

And once again, Delaware had played its role in American history: technology provided by one of Delaware's leading corporations had helped make this feat possible.

But Voyager's journey took more than technology. It took discipline and courage to make the flight.

It required extraordinary vision to even consider it.

Discipline . . . . . courage . . . . and vision. Those are qualities that have never been lacking in Delaware. They have brought progress to our state, opportunities for our people, and support for those who needed

help.

This year, as we celebrate the Bicentennial of Delaware's ratification of the United States Constitution, it is not enough to simply look back, to celebrate the history and traditions of the state. We must also look forward to the kind of state Delaware will be as America's third century begins.

A decade of progress in Delaware has brought us within reach of the goal that all of

us share -- to make Delaware the best.

Ten years ago the task was certainly different: to reverse rising unemployment; to recover jobs lost as businesses left Delaware; to repair a damaged credit rating; and to control government's appetite for money.

Today . . . the most recent figures -- from November -- show our unemployment rate to be the second lowest in the nation; more Delawareans are working than ever before; our credit rating is solid and government spending is under control.

But the challenges before us are no less difficult.

Instead of combating runaway government spending, we must find ways to make sure that a costly array of social programs improves lives rather than simply supporting lives without opportunity or purpose.

Energy once spent trying to revive a nearly lifeless economy can now be turned to a comprehensive and thoughtful plan to protect our environment as growth continues.

Having reached agreement on how to limit government, we now can turn our attention to improving its management and efficiency.

Having made certain fundamental decisions about public education, we can now concentrate our resources on long-term improvements in our schools.

Indeed, we have reached a point in the life of this state where we have the opportunity to accomplish things no one dared dream a decade ago.

Succeeding . . . . we will touch people's lives in many ways, beginning even before

they're born.

. . . . We will affect their lives as they grow up and are educated. . . . . We will offer a helping hand for the transition to independence and the workplace.

And we will determine the quality of life that will be enjoyed by our children and grandchildren. \* \* \* \* \*

Thomas Jefferson called Delaware the Diamond State because, although small in size, it had great value.

And, indeed, we enjoy advantages other states do not. But the true measure of this state is to be found in how we use those advantages.

It is to be found in the good people who make government work. . .

. . . in Mary Evans, a nurse in the Division of Public Health who has shown dedication and professionalism in her career, and bravery when lives were at stake. Last December it was Mary whose quick actions saved two children locked in a burning car in Milford,

. in the employees of our Division of Corporations who worked until nearly midnight between Christmas and New Years to make sure that our corporate customers all over the world met their year-end deadlines,

. and in Chuck Welch, president of the State Board of Education, who retired after a distinguished career at the DuPont Company but continues to distinguish himself as an advocate and innovator, bringing higher standards to our education system . . . .

It is to be found in the way Republicans and Democrats, upstaters and downstaters,

business leaders and elected officials work together.

It is to be found in the fiscal practices that have made Delaware a success, the laws that limit state spending and the commitment to living within our means that pervades this building -- and the four major tax cuts in seven years those practices have made possible.

The proof is all around us -- in the prosperity Delaware enjoys today, unequaled in our state's history, and the opportunity it presents for tomorrow. . . .

That is the key to Delaware's future:

-- an economy that produces jobs produces revenues for the state, and those revenues make it possible for us to make Delaware better.

A strong and growing economy provides the means to pay our teachers and state employees better, do more for our young children, preserve and protect open space and wetlands, to shelter the homeless, to feed the poor, the comfort the aged.

A strong and growing economy makes all that possible — without imposing a tax burden so great that we destroy individual initiative and shut down the economic engine that has brought Delaware so far so fast.

In the last ten years we have seen how successfully we can harness the energy of that economic engine.

In Sussex County, in Kent County, in New Castle County, we have seen how good policy creates jobs, and how jobs in turn make it possible for the state to do so much.

Virtually every dollar of Delaware's tax revenue, whether personal income tax, corporate income tax, or gross receipts tax, is directly related to employment. Between 1977 and 1986, employment in Delaware increased by 60,000 jobs.

In the 20 months since we set a three-year goal of 18,000 new jobs for Delaware -- a goal which represented the highest rate of growth anyone believed possible -- employment has gone up by over 31,000 positions.

So while we have cut our tax rates, total state revenues have increased because of increased employment -- and we have been able to spend more for better schools, better roads, and better services.

A better educated workforce, a better transportation system and better-run government, in turn, have brought further improvement to our economic climate, attracting even more jobs.

In short, intelligent tax and spending policies have brought unprecedented prosperity to Delaware -- and a future of unlimited possibilities.

But lately some people would rush to judgment, ignore the hardship of a scant ten years ago, forget the lessons of a decade of hard work, and see the state again spend beyond its means.

They would say there have been enough tax cuts. They would say there are problems to be solved, and there is money to throw at them.

They would say state spending should not be so rigid that areas desperately in need of attention are ignored, that tax policy should take second place to social policy, else government wallow in mediocrity.

But if it is wallowing in mediocrity we fear, then the danger comes not from policies of the decade ending, but from the short-sighted decisions and wishful thinking of the decade that preceded it.

I am honestly surprised that people have forgotten so quickly what was at the other end of the road, that they fail to understand that unrestrained spending supported by ill-considered tax policy can reverse the cycle and ruin Delaware's economy, just as it did between 1968 and 1977.

In that decade the consumer price index rose almost 175 percent. At the same time, however, this state increased its spending by almost 300 percent, nearly twice the rate of inflation. Our highest personal income tax rate more than doubled to 19.8 percent, even as we experienced one unbalanced budget after another.

I'm sure that every dollar was spend with the best intentions.

But if massive spending programs represented the solution to society's problems, then in 1977 Delaware should have been on the edge of perfection; instead we were teetering on the edge of disaster.

Those good intentions wiped out paychecks; weakened our highway system; set back our efforts to improve this state and the lives of our people; and brought Delaware to the brink of bankruptcy -- by draining our economy.

The authority to tax and spend was confused with the ability to solve problems. result, the quality of Delaware's schools declined, our infrastructure fell into decay,

our social programs into disarray.

Ten years ago the taxpayers of Delaware were chained to the oars and driven to a financial pace they could not sustain.

Today the ship of state sails on the winds of prosperity and our movement is swift.

- o With the budget I will introduce in two weeks, spending on health and social services will have increased by almost 25 percent in three years. 2 1/2 times the cost-of-living increase projected for the same period.
- With the budget I will introduce in two weeks, we will have increased spending for services to children by almost 48 percent.

We will have increased spending on public education by over 22 percent.

o With the First State Improvement Fund, we made a major commitment to roads and infrastructure, in addition to the 15 percent increase in highway spending represented by this administration's three budgets.

The commitment to addressing Delaware's problems is no less than it was a decade ago. But today we are meeting that commitment by cutting taxes and balancing our budgets, not by raising taxes or overspending.

The difference in the two policies crystalizes in the words of two chairmen of the

DuPont Company, viewing Delaware roughly ten years apart.

The first was made by Irving Shapiro, who in the late 1970's, shocked this state when he was quoted in the Wall Street Journal as saying he would tell fellow business executives to stay out of Delaware, because no state had a worse business climate.

Last year, speaking to the state Chamber of Commerce, Ed Jefferson made his entire speech a tribute to what we have accomplished as a state.

I do not view either man's remarks as simply the observations of an executive concerned with the bottom line.

If Irv Shapiro was shocked and hurt by what Delaware had become, he spoke for all of s. If Ed Jefferson was proud of how Delaware had change, he reflected the pride of every Delawarean.

Before I next appear in this chamber to report on the state of the state, we will have celebrated the 200th anniversary of our birthright as the First State in the nation.

December 7, 1987 will be a time for celebration . . . but in a larger sense it must be also a moment for reflection.

Without the Annapolis Convention, the long, hot summer in Philadelphia, and the three days of debate at Battell's Tavern -- just a few hundred yards from this podium -- the sacrifices at Bunker Hill, Valley Forge and Yorktown would truly have been in vain.

Just as 200 years ago our forefathers refused to accept things as they were, so today duty demands that we view things as they could be. For if history is any guide for the future, then its simplest message is its truest — that past is merely prologue. Long before it was fashionable to discuss "the quality of life", Delawareans enjoyed

it. Land, water and climate combined to provide a comfortable life for our forefathers.

The political leaders of the first state were also leaders of the nation.

Delawareans who emigrated here from France, Sweden, England and other parts of Europe were innovators in commerce and industry.

Their goals were or goals -- simply to make Delaware a good place to live.

Indeed, Delaware is a good place to live because we have maintained a balance -- within government, within industry and within our communities.

That balance has brought prosperity, and prosperity has brought us to the point where we can share Robert Kennedy's vision of an America where we see things as they could be and ask, why not? . . . and then act on that vision.

- o We can assure than every Delawarean has a job by providing training, encouragement and support for those who do not have the skills to work or those whose skills are no longer adequate. With our high tech task force, with efforts to expand Delaware's financial center into the international arena, by making it easier for low-income parents to find quality day care for their children . . . we will meet that goal.
- We must protect our youngest citizens from hunger, abuse and neglect. Through Focus on the First Sixty Months, we are showing the value of prevention. By working with the community and strengthening the efforts of the children's department . . . .we will provide that protection.
- We must break the cycle of poverty and welfare, by convincing young people not to drop out of school, by combining incentives with basis support, by giving people the skills they need to become independent.

We have the means to break that cycle.

There can be no compromise in the fight to assure clean air and clean water. Through the Environmental Legacy program, environmentalist and industrialist are working together to assure that the 21st century our natural resources will be protected and our environment healthy.

There will be no compromise.

I see Delaware as it could be and ask, "Why Not?"

For I, as governor, stand ready to see that teachers are well-paid -- as long as children are well-educated.

As governor, I stand ready to invest the hard-earned dollars of our taxpayers in those who need help -- but they must move from reliance on government to self-reliance.

As governor, I stand ready to champion future economic growth and expansion -- but not at the price of destroying our quality of life.

As governor, I stand ready to cut taxes whenever prudent and justified -- because

those who have made our prosperity possible must share in its rewards. But we must maintain the balance between the need for government to provide services and the need for individual Delawareans to enjoy the fruits of their own hard work.

We cannot pay teachers more or build better housing if one out of ten Delawareans is unemployed and unable to pay the taxes that make a better Delaware possible.

We cannot improve our roads and bridges if Wall Street considers us the worst credit risk in the nation.

We cannot raise the support level of the truly needy, pay our state employees more or improve services to our children if Delaware's corporations are not prosperous and providing the jobs and revenues that fuel government.

Delaware's role in America's history has always been greater than its size.

Without John Dickinson two hundred years ago, the Constitution would never have been written and adopted.

Without Wilmington's Quakers, the underground railroad would not have saved so many from slavery.

Without a small business in the countryside near Frederica, men would not have walked on the moon.

Without Hercules, the Voyager would never have soared around the world.

The challenge to all of us together as we enter our third century is to apply the discipline, courage and vision that will keep belaware first -- just as it made us first.

In September 1787 in Philadelphia, when the work on the Constitution was finished, the delegates filed to the front of the chamber in Independence Hall to sign the document.

Benjamin Franklin, who was 81, who had played such an important role in the birth of

the nation and now in the birth of the Constitution had to be helped to the table, and then back to his seat.

It was said later that, as he wrote his name on the parchment, as he signed the parchment, as he signed the Constitution that now resides in the National Archives in Washington - Ben Franklin wept.

James Madison described what happened next in his notes on the convention. He wrote: "While the last members were signing it, Doctor Franklin looking towards the President's chair, at the back of which a rising sun happened to be painted, observed to a few members near him that painters had found it difficult to distinguish in their art

a rising from a setting sun.

"I have, said he, often and often in the course of the session . . . looked at that behind the President without being able to tell whether it was rising or setting.

"But at length I have the happiness to know that it is a rising and not a setting sun." Today the sun Franklin saw rising over America is still rising. And it shines as bright on Delaware in 1987 as it did in 1787.

We were the First State then, and we are the First State today.

Thank you, very much.

The President of the Senate thanked the Governor and asked the Escort Committee to escort the Governor back to his Executive Office.

On motion of Senator Sharp, the Secretary of the Senate and Chief Clerk of the House

The Governor addressed the members of the General Assembly as follows:

Lieutenant Governor Woo, Mr. Speaker, our new Speaker B. Bradford Barnes of Bridgeville, Mr. President Pro Tem, members of the 134th General Assembly, members of the cabinet, honored guests, and the people of Delaware:

Two weeks ago, I suggested that if the state of the state was measured by the quality of life we enjoy and our ability to enjoy it further, then truly the state of the state is excellent.

Today, I turn to a detailed explanation of how we can improve that quality of life.

The budget and bond bills I present to you today are built on the principles which I outlined two weeks ago -- restraint of overall spending combined with a commitment to meet future responsibilities.

This administration remains committed to a policy of fiscal restraint and controlled growth to ensure the balance between government needs and individual initiative.

The members of this General Assembly have demonstrated time and again they also stand foresquare behind this same policy.

But in this budget, we also address a second commitment — to envision a better Delaware — to ask "why not" — and then deliver on that vision.

We will deliver quality services — to the young, the elderly, the mentally ill, the AFDC mothers struggling to make ends meet and break the cycle of welfare dependence, to the high school graduate trying to finance college.

For, failing to meet their legitimate needs, we fail to keep pace with the future, and that failure can undo all of the good that our policies of restraint have achieved.

A budget message by its very nature tends to be reported in terms of growth percentages, one-time appropriations, tax cut proposals and surplus projections -- and in that focus the true meaning of those numbers is usually lost.

Each set of numbers represents people, programs, and policies. And in discussing the numbers today, I will tell you how they reflect the policies of this administration.

This budget for the first time fully implements a process that began by establishing policy objectives, developed by our cabinet councils and the governor's office, as the foundation for funding decisions.

It is a comprehensive commitment we can make to our citizens today -- with the knowledge that we will be able to honor it tomorrow.

The Delaware Economic and Financial Advisory Council's most recent estimate of revenues for fiscal year 1988 is 986.6 million dollars.

After we add the expected fiscal 1987 surplus, include an increase in Medicald reimbursements, and meet our reserve requirements, 1 billion, 18.2 million dollars will be available.

I am recommending 970.7 million dollars for the fiscal 1988 Of that amount, I am recommending 970.7 milliobudget, plus 11.8 million dollars for grants-in-aid.

I am also submitting today a 94.6 million dollar capital spending proposal, and by doing so providing the General Assembly with a comprehensive picture of total state spending.

There remains unallocated a total of 35.7 million dollars, representing those revenues the state anticipates collecting as a windfall due to the federal Tax Reform Act of 1986, as well as additional revenue growth resulting from the continued strength of our economy.

I recommend that those funds be allocated as follows:

o For major capital expeditures -- 34.0 million dollars;

o For state funding of the Prothonotary's Office -- \$1.6 million.

This will leave \$11.4 million for a tax adjustment effective January 1, 1988.

The basic budget will grow by 4.5 percent over this year's budget.

This was the original growth target set by the budget office and we were able to hit that target. It is a growth rate that provides for both inflationary increases and substantial new funding in key areas.

In addition to program growth funded with new revenues, we have also reallocated funds to new programs by eliminating ineffective or out-dated programs and through more efficient management.

In short, this budget meets the objective of overall spending restraint without handcuffing any department. Spending in key areas such as education, children's health and social services, highways and infrastructure has grown programs. substantially.

In addition, this budget process reflects my commitment to allowing my cabinet secretaries -- the chief advocates for their departments and those served by each department -- to set their own priorities.

Fundamental spending decisions have been left, by and large, in their hands.

To their credit, the agencies were very forthright in discussing what was needed -and what was not needed.

They also told us where we could find duplication of services and services that would be better performed by someone else.

We have supported their actions, and have redirected millions of dollars into

much-needed programs, without increasing overall spending.

I said in my State of the State Address that spending on Health and Social Services has increased by 25 percent in the three budgets I have prepared since taking office -during a time when the cost of living has increased by only about 10 percent.

We have not only funded traditional programs, but have directed additional revenues

to expanding programs.

This real growth in spending has been directed at the primary goal of the department

-- to encourage self-sufficiency.

For decades, government policies have led to unnecessary institutionalization, able-bodied men and women on our welfare rolls, and nursing homes providing long-term care when prevention would have made that care unnecessary.

But now we are reversing the historic trend by caring for people in community settings, providing encouragement and incentives for people to work, and directing our resources toward maintaining healthy lives.

To continue in that direction is one of the chief goals of this budget.

o We will meet this goal by appropriating more than 800 thousand dollars to compensate for lost federal funding for teaching employment skills and placement of AFDC recipients into unsubsidized employment;

o By funding a new job-search program for food stamp clients;

o By expanding medical coverage for pregnant women and their children;

o By increasing reimbursement rates for day-care facilities so that welfare recipients, particularly those with children under two years of age, are able to work;

o And by increasing Aid to Families with Dependent Children for the fourth year in

With each of these programs, we provide support for those who are working their way toward independence and self-sufficiency, but who still need help to reach their goals.

As chairman of the National Governors' Association task force on welfare reform, I have seen this approach repeated in virtually every state in the nation. I have seen few states more successful than Delaware in making it work.

Like Delaware, the other states have realized that we fall short in our responsibility to those who need help if that help does not encourage men and women to achieve self-reliance.

Government's responsibility goes further, of course. There are others who will always depend on us for assistance to some degree; we must make sure that they live a

life of dignity. For many, this can be accomplished by removing them from institutions. For others

it can be accomplished by providing better health services.

This year we will continue to move mentally retarded from institutions to community

placement. Day programs for the mentally retarded will be expanded, outpatient mental health

services will be provided in all three counties, and the Mobile Crisis Unit program will be enlarged.

We will replace lost federal funds for maternal and child health services, and for medical screening for the elderly. And we will double the state's effort to combat sexually transmitted diseases.

We continue to increase our ability to help severely disturbed young adults by fully funding a program to provide education and treatment for many of those young people between the ages of 18 and 21 who currently must be sent to out-of-state facilities.

And we will add twenty-two staff and nursing positions at Delaware State Hospital to provide more and better service.

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Two months ago I was invited to attend a meeting of state legislators in Nashville, Tennessee, to discuss Delaware's Focus on the First Sixty Months.

I described our efforts to help people as an investment in "human capital." By that I meant that every citizen has tremendous potential value, both to himself and to the community -- if it is tapped.

Nowhere is the potential more evident than in a child; or nowhere more fragile. By solving the problems that affect young lives, we increase the chances that our

children will grow up to be productive, happy adults.

There is good economic reason to do so: The better our work force, the stronger our There is good economic reason to do so: economy will be.

There is good fiscal reason to do so: By investing our resources to protect children from abuse and hunger and to assure that they can take full advantage of the education we provide, we substantially reduce the long-term cost of welfare and institutionalization.

And there is the most important reason: it is the right thing to do. To do less is

unconscionable.

The primary objective of our children's programs is to help every child realize his or her own potential as an adult, free from the effects of hunger, abuse, poor health or inadequate education.

To that end, the budget I am presenting to you today:

o Begins to reduce the rate of out-of-home placements

o Expands outpatient child and adolescent mental health programs.

Increases foster care to 100 percent of the standard of need.

o Increases foster care to 100 percent of the Source of Increases payments for group care by over 18 percent. In addition, we will continue the Focus on the First Sixty Months program, by expanding its prevention programs and providing psychological services for several hundred children in Head Start programs.

We are continuing to improve staff training; we continue to fund development of a risk assessment model; and we are increasing the department's ability to handle a growing caseload, thus reducing the potential for any child in need of help to be forgotten or ignored.

While we measure our ability to protect our children in terms of case tracking and

staff retention, it is very important to remember why we are doing this.

In addition we will continue to focus on the First Sixty Months Program by expanding its prevention programs and providing psychological services for those children.

Graham Greene said it best when he wrote, "There is always one moment in childhood when the door opens and lets the future in."

It is our responsibility to make sure that the door indeed opens -- for every child.

But that responsibility is shared by other agencies in this state, most notably by

our public school system.

There have been many groups that have studied education in Delaware, including the Governor's Task Force on Education. All of these groups have recognized the same thing - that our public education system is the key factor in determining Delaware's ability to sustain economic growth.

And all have said that we must concentrate on preparing our young people to meet the

demands of the workplace by providing the fundamental skills demanded in life.

And our teachers are the key to fulfilling these goals.

Over the past three years we have made significant progress in improving teacher

salaries. We must continue that improvement.

Before budget mark-up, the General Assembly should adopt the new teacher pay scale index developed through a cooperative effort by the General Assembly, educators, and my administration.

This simple index is designed to reward both experience and professional training, and offers teachers the opportunity to dramatically improve their salaries as they complete advanced academic work and develop the skills that only years in the classroom can bring

This is a major step toward making our teachers' salaries competitive with salaries

in neighboring states and increasing the quality of teaching in our classrooms.

Upon adoption of that index, I would propose a two-step implementation to bring all teachers to that scale. That would require 11.8 million dollars this year and provide teachers with an average increase of \$1,440, or an average salary of 28,907 dollars before any local increases.

The average starting salary assuming a 30 percent local contribution, which is the

present average, will increase to over \$19,500.

However, there are major needs to be addressed beyond salaries. teachers available in school for a full workday and for additional days of training.

We need to address impediments to good managment that have interfered with our school principals opportunities to run their schools.

We must promote incentives that contribute to the professional growth of our educators by charging the State Board of Education with the responsibility for continuing the work begun by the Christina School District on teacher incentives. Our commitment to increasing salaries and incentives has not changed.

But our demand for quality in the classroom has not changed either.

o In the coming year we will expand the pilot teacher evaluation program.

o We will include administrators in the evaluation process.

o And, through the State Board of Education, we will develop a mechanism to report to the public on the achievements of our schools that they support to the tune of bundreds of millions of deliars a year.

hundreds of millions of dollars a year.

We will also address the needs of at-risk students by continuing our initiative to prevent students from dropping out of school; by increasing our drug and alcohol abuse prevention programs; and by expanding the education aspects of the Focus on the First Sixty Months program.

To ensure that our students are aware of their educational options, I am proposing

additional counselors in our schools, a recommendation of the Vo-tech Task Force.

And to ensure our children have adequate materials and good school buildings, I am recommending a one-time expenditure of \$ 1.0 million, in addition to an increase in the base budget, to replace outdated books and materials.

The most recent statistics available place us ninth in the nation in spending per pupil, yet this year we expect to rank between 15th and 19th in teacher salaries. That tells me we need to re-examine our system so that our resources are directly focused on the classroom.

With this budget, we begin that process.

We have identified \$3.2 million presently being spent in education that can be redirected to teacher salaries and up-to-date books and materials for students. But I believe much more can be done.

If in the past few years we have made progress toward better schools and better educated students, toward higher salaries for teachers and higher classroom standards, it is because we began by asking basic questions about how to make our education system more effective.

Today the challenge for the State Board of Education -- indeed for every one of us who is concerned about our schools -- is to apply that same, healthy skepticism to the finance of education, to question formulas rather than merely accepting them.

Only then can we be sure that education dollars are really spent on  $\underline{\text{teaching}}$  our young people.

Delaware's actions have long reflected our respect for our environment. We were the first in the nation to enact a Coastal Zone law, and since then, we have been a leader in environmental issues.

In recent years we have taken steps to preserve our inland bays; we have strengthened our ability to enforce environmental standards and dumpsite cleanup efforts; and we have aggressively developed underground storage tank safeguards.

Today our record of developing innovative and cost effective strategies for safeguarding our environment prepares us for one of the most complex, yet most important environmental issues we have faced -- land-use planning.

A strong economy, combined with Delaware's natural appeal, has brought growth to our state, and we must be prepared to channel the energies of that growth in the right direction.

I have directed my cabinet secretaries to work together whenever appropriate to coordinate land-use decisions.

In addition, I am recommending funding to provide additional technical resources to review land-use planning in Delaware and the appropriate role of state government in this process.

But this small state's natural resources are finite, and recent events make it clear

that development pressures is intense.

Once lost, these lands are lost forever.

Two years ago we took the first step toward perserving valuable property by establishing Delaware's Land and Water Conservation Fund. Today that fund stands, including private contributions, at over one \$1.1 million.

Today, I recommend that the General Assembly increase the fund by five million dollars, strengthening the state's ability to guarantee the integrity of our most valuable natural resources.

Assuring that rare and valuable natural lands are preserved for our children and grandchildren is only part of our responsibility to the environment, however.

In recent years we have increased the state's ability to respond to threats to the health and safety of our citizens, and in the Environmental Legacy program we have begun the long-range planning needed to assure a clean and healthy environment as we enter the year 2000.

In the budget I am presenting today, in addition to providing on-going funding for important environmental protection programs, we are increasing the state's ability to identify potential hazards in the air we breathe, we are committing ourselves to a full program of soil conservation, and we are upgrading equipment important to the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

And, to compensate for lost federal funds, I am recommending a revamped fee

structure to assure that the Water Resources Division is adequately staffed.

Two centuries ago, when Dover was a hamlet with a population of less than 500 people and Delaware's capital was still in New Castle, the first two buildings planned for The Green were a court house -- and a jail.

They didn't call it corrections then, but corrections was an issue in the earliest

days of this state, just as it is today.

In recent months, we have experienced problems in our prison system. Guards at Gander Hill have been accused of selling contraband to prisoners, and four prisoners escaped from Delaware Correctional Center at Smyrna.

Corruption among our prison guards is unacceptable, even if it is limited to a small number, as I believe it is. The failure of security at any prison is unacceptable.

I appointed a Corrections Security Task Force to investigate security procedures at Gander Hill, and in the wake of the Smyrna escape asked chairman Peter Stone and the other members of the task force to expand their work to include security system-wide.

We received their interim report last month, and I ordered Commissioner Sullivan to immediately implement task force recommendations. On January 15th, he reported that

many of the measures recommended by the task force were in place.

At the same time, the commissioner has been implementing changes long-planned, but

delayed while the joint investigation was underway.

Our review of corrections security is also drawing heavily on the report prepared by the State Police after their investigation of the escape.

To beef up security at DCC, I have already asked you to appropriate funds for new

perimeter security measures to be installed as soon as possible. Perimeter fencing at the new halfway house in Sussex County is also vital before we

begin operation of that halfway house. In combination with those measures, this budget contains the funds necessary to

operate a secure prison system. But I do not believe that the problem with our prisons is a lack of funding; rather,

I believe it is a question of management practices relating to procedures and security.

And I want my intentions to be extremely clear:

While I understand that prisons are full of people who would like to escape -- I will not tolerate sloppy or inadequate security.

We will have an effective prison system, one that our citizens can trust to protect them from those deemed dangerous and violent.

certain we have a secure corrections system is only part of our Making responsibility in ensuring the safety of the citizens of Delaware.

Our State Police officers must have the ability to enforce our laws, our Justice Department must have the resources to prosecute criminals, and our judicial system must be able to handle cases in a timely and effective manner.

To enhance our law enforcement ability, I am recommending the following:

The creation of ten communication technician positions within the Department of Public Safety, freeing ten state troopers now performing emergency dispatch duties for other police activities:

Purchase of Breathalyzer and radar replacement equipment for enforcement of speed

and DUI laws:

Replacement of lost federal funds for the Division of Motor Vehicles to continue its DUI tracking program;

o And funding for new positions within the criminal justice system to assure that the system is not hampered by delays or overwhelmed with cases.

A year ago, I said that if our state personnel system was a boat, it would sink.

It was a system without rational policies, an inefficient and ineffective system that threatened our ability to provide the best services to our citizens.

Last year, with the support of our state employees, and to the credit of the General

Assembly, we took a major step forward in overhauling our state pay plan.

We implemented a new salary schedule in line with other state and local governments and made sure no one was paid below the minimum; we developed a plan to place everyone in the proper job classifications.

This year we will continue to build on those efforts by reclassifying employees who

are incorrectly classified.

I am recommending in this budget a total of \$13 million to increase state employees' salaries. This will include a salary increase of three percent for state employees to take effect July 1, 1987.

In addition, the approximately two thirds of our state employees who are below the midpoint of their salary range will on average receive an additional five percent

increase on January 1st, 1988 to move them closer to that point.

The strides we made last year and our commitment to do even more will ensure that we are able to attract and retain good employees so that we can better fulfill our responsibility to our citizens.

Recent snowfalls have reminded us of the importance of our highway system.

Our commitment to assuring safe, convenient travel throughout the state is reflected in the fact that we are in the midst of an aggressive highway improvement program that

1 see over \$600 million spent on roads in five years.

This program enables us to continue improvements to the Concord Pike, projects on Naamans Road, Route 1 from Lewes to Rehoboth, Ogletown intersection, Route 7 from DuPont Highway all the way to the Pennsylvania Line, Saulsbury-Denny's Road, and Route 141. In addition we are actively analyzing solutions to the east-west routes in Sussex County, and roads in the Metroform Area.

We are addressing Delaware's highway needs more efficiently and rapidly than ever

before in the history of the state. But we can do even better.

I am proposing in this budget the first significant step toward construction of the project that will have a profound impact on Delaware's future . . . the north-south relief route.

Roughly \$480 million will be required to complete the entire project, over a period of a decade or more. I'm recommending that we take the first significant step toward

completion of this new highway by appropriating \$20 million during fiscal 1988. The many people who are concerned with this project have worked hard -- and, more

important, worked together -- to obtain agreement on the location of this roadway, now we may begin the design and construction of those projects that will provide the welcome relief to our citizens.

Efforts to improve our main highways must not be at the expense of secondary and

lesser traveled roads, however. Nor will they be.

To this end, I am also recommending special funding in the amount of \$14.5 million for improvements and resurfacing of secondary roads. Approximately \$8.5 million of this amount will come from the bond bill.

This balanced approach to funding our highway needs will provide for and support quality of life in conjunction with economic development -- a desirable and obtainable goal.

I have spoken at length, both in this address and in the State of the State Address two weeks ago, about the progress Delaware has made over the last decade.

That progress would not have been possible without the General Assembly's increasingly professional and sophisticated approach to fiscal matters, and in particular the work of the Joint Finance Committee and the chairpersons: Senator Nancy Cook and Representative Phil Corrozi.

But the benefits of that approach have been limited by the fact that we focus on the state's operating budget at the beginning of the session, and capital expenditures only

at the end.

Two years ago we began to develop a comprehensive capital spending plan. We set standards for consideration of each project which included examination of their We set long-term costs, their cost-benefit ratio and their effects on the operating budget.

This year we take the final step toward a unified approach to state spending by presenting to you both the budget and the bond bill at the beginning of the session.

I am recommending that we spend \$94,561,713 in this year's capital budget.

This proposal will allow us to support further economic development efforts, maintain and improve school and government buildings, continue to improve roads throughout Delaware, and support improvements to the state's infrastructure.

Recognizing the role economic development has played in strengthening our economy, I am proposing that we fund three projects requested by the Delaware Development Office:

- o Funding to develop the public areas around the Christina Gateway project in Wilmington.
- o Assistance to Harrington in developing a proposed industrial area which will lead to the creation of about 200 jobs.
- o And support for continued development of jobs at the New Castle Corporate Commons. The Department of Administrative Services, which is responsible for addressing asbestos-related problems, has identified more than 300 state-owned buildings and about 150 public schools targeted for asbestos removal by 1990. We will spend \$3 million, a third of which will go to our schools, on this effort in the coming fiscal year.

To allow better coordination among divisions and units of the Department of Services to Children, Youth and Their Families, I am proposing that we move the department's administrative offices, the Division of Child Protective Services, the Licensing Unit, and the Division of Youth Rehabilitation to the Ferris campus.

To ensure that local governments are able to meet state and federal water quality standards, I am recommending \$2.5 million in matching money for sewer construction, an

increase of 33 percent over last year.

And to protect the public from potentially unhealthy water conditions at Lums Pond State Park, I am recommending funding for development of a swimming pool at the park.

- I have also recommended funding for new construction projects to alleviate overcrowding in several of our state buildings, including:
  - o expansion of the Department of Agriculture's administrative building.

o construction of a new building for the Fire Marshall's office.

o and \$1.3 million for a new building for the Delaware Geological Survey at the University of Delaware.

In addition, I am recommending that we continue our work to improve the conditions in our Magistrate Courts.

Overail capital spending in public and higher education totals \$18.5 million, more than 37 percent higher than in fiscal 1987.

Capital spending related to health and social programs is \$8.2 million, a 14-percent increase, and spending for transportation projects is \$81 million, a 32-percent increase.

Total spending for minor capital improvements is nearly \$16.3 million, an increase of 29 percent from the current fiscal year.

These expenditures will allow repair of existing facilities and the long overdue preventive maintenance that will lessen the need for expensive replacement in the future. In each of the last two years, DEFAC's estimate of revenues has grown substantially between January and June because of the continuing strength of our economy.

Record retail sales during the final quarter of 1986, extraordinary growth in revenues from corporate activity during the same period, the ongoing boom in our real estate industry and the continued drop in unemployment — all point to repetition of the same phenomenon this spring.

As we get closer to final budget decisions, I suggest that any new funds be earmarked for major construction projects such as the north-south relief route; secondary roads and improvements to both state and public school buildings.

Beginning in 1979, we embarked on a series of four cuts in personal income tax rates, reducing the top rate from 19.8 percent to 8.8 percent.

These tax cuts have made Delaware competitive as we seek to attract new jobs and industry from other states. They have also restored a measure of fairness to our tax policy.

Last year, Congress enacted a major overhaul of the federal tax system. changes eliminated many deductions and exemptions while simplifying the entire rate structure.

Since Delaware's tax structure "piggy backs" on the federal system, Congress' action will result in the payment of higher state taxes by individual Delaware taxpayers.

Substituting a refund check from the United States Treasury for a personal check

written to the State of Delaware is neither good government nor good tax policy.

If we do not take action to correct this situation, it will largely negate the

effect of last June's 9 percent reduction in personal income taxes for all Delawareans.

In December, DEFAC projections estimated that the State would receive additional revenue in FY 88 because of these federal changes of \$30.9 million. But we can only estimate the impact because the new federal tax rates did not go

into effect until this month.

Some argue that we should not return this money at all but spend it on expanding ongoing state services. Others argue that we must return it dollar for dollar.

As a practical matter it is almost impossible to return those revenues which the state will receive during this calendar year. To do so would require the General Assembly to enact a retroactive tax adjustment or establish of two tax tables for 1987, one for before and one for after July 1st.

Neither of these approaches is practical.

I would therefore propose a compromise based on the work of a group of distinguished Delawareans who have spent several months developing a plan which would allow us to fairly return these revenues to the taxpayers.

This group included three former secretaries of finance -- Pete Nellius, Marna Whittington and Bill Buxbaum -- the chairman of DEFAC, Howard Cosgrove, others in Delaware's banking and financial community, and members of my Administration.

They have presented the recommendations I submit today for your consideration:

First, that we reduce our current tax brackets from fourteen to nine. This will not only simplify our system but will prevent taxpayers from being driven into a higher tax bracket by inflation.

Second, that we exempt the first \$2,000 of taxable income for all Delawareans.

Third, that we increase the standard deduction from \$1,000 to \$1,300 for individuals and to \$1,600 for married couples.

Fourth, that we restore the additional exemption for the blind and elderly which was eliminated at the federal level.

Fifth, combined with the above, we will reduce our top marginal rate to 7.8 percent. These changes in Delaware tax law would become effective January 1, 1988. With these

measures, Delaware tax reform will continue the progress of the last few years.

It will remove almost 30,000 taxpayers from the rolls.

It will return the federal windfall to the taxpayers and, at the same time, keep us competitive as we seek new jobs and industry.

Reducing the number of low income taxpayers, lowering the tax obligations of those who can least afford it, simplifying the structure and reducing our marginal rates will all be accomplished.

During the spring as you review this proposal I invite the leadership of the General Assembly to examine this proposal and discuss the data which supports it with this ad hoc group and members of my Administration so that together we can develop a package as we have always done in the past that is acceptable to all Delawareans.

Today, as I present my budget and capital spending proposals to you, nearly half the states face difficult budgetary decisions.

Already, twenty three states have cut or have announced plans to cut their budgets.

Texas has cut its budget by more than 500 million dollars and still has a shortfall of 600 million dollars -- a combined deficit greater than Delaware's entire budget.

In Alaska, they're asking employees to take a ten percent pay cut and work a longer work week.

In North Dakota the legislature was called into special session in December for a second round of budget cuts; the state already has increased its sales tax and raised personal income taxes.

Other states as well are responding to budgetary shortfalls by raising taxes.

Fortunately for us in Delaware the question today is different.

The question before us is not, "do we reduce taxes or improve our services?" -- but

rather, "how much do we give back <u>and</u> where can we improve."

The budget and bond bill I present can accomplish these objectives because we have been prudent; we have worked together to restrain state spending; we have developed

sensible tax policies that reward individual initiative.

In the next few months, as we continue the budget process, we must continue to build on that same working relationship for the future. The soundness and strength of the state's financial position can only be maintained through cooperative effort.

Doing so, we will meet the legitimate needs of those who need our help -- we will keep pace with the future -- and we will continue a tax policy founded on fairness to all Delawareans.

At the request of Senator Zimmerman the following letter to the Editor of the Delaware State News (June 23, 1986) was read and made part of this Journal:

DON'T CLOSE THE GRAVES AT ISLAND FIELD

Delaware's Island Field burial site is one of the finest archeological exhibits in this country. It is tragic that the General Assembly is about to vote (today) to destroy such a significant cultural and historical area.

I understand that the bill now before the House of Representatives was requested by the nanticoke Indians who want the graves closed because they feel the display shows

disrespect to their ancestors.

It is tragic that the Nanticoke feel this way. Exactly the contrary is true.

The display is tasteful; it is preserved in entirely natural surroundings. Tourists cannot tramp around on the graves; a guide is on duty at all times. Visitors frequently even speak in a whisper there.

The Island Field burial ground encourages understanding and respect for our Delaware Indians because it increases knowledge about their culture and history. Seeing the ancient bones doesn't cause revulsion or irreverence; it causes compassion for their difficult lifestyle and interest in their customs. Because we can see these remains, hundred of years disappear and these early Delawareans become real human beings to use.

Please don't close the graves. Such an act in itself is disrespectful of the

contribution these humble people have made to our civilization.

We don't consider it disrespectful to display the bones and other remains of the saints. Christianity reveres such artifacts and displays them as a sign of the high

esteem we place on these early people.

We don't consider it disrespectful to show the mummies of ancient Egypt or South America. In most cases, these are the remains of pharaohs and chieftains, high-ranking people who demanded much respect and who are accorded places of honor in the finest museums.

And currently in Sweden, archeologists are exhuming the remains of their royalty to learn more about the nation's past. People don't consider it disrespectful; they consider it a contribution to a nation's knowledge about its heritage.

Our future is built on a respect for the past. We are a nation that honors its ancestors. Delaware is a state that has a proud past, one that includes the early people at the Island Field site. Surely the families buried there would be very proud to know that they are an integral part of teaching hundreds of school children and other visitors more about the Indian nation. Surely they would find it important to contribute to better relations for the future by helping to increase our understanding and feeling of kinship to fellow coastal dwellers.

It is fitting that we be respectful of these people. But closing the graves does not increase our respect; in fact, it removes a significant opportunity for people to learn more respect.
