Christiana High kids kick the habit

Christiana High School students ate lunch Monday in the shadow of a six-foot tall cigarette.

The cigarette, actually a cardboard rendition of the real thing, will be symbolically crushed today during Great American Smokeout ceremonies in Dover.

"What we're asking our students to do is sign the cigarette if they are going to stop smoking (today) or if they pledge not to start," said Carol F. Tasca, health education teacher at

Christiana High School.

Tasca said students are at a critical age for smoking. "Ninety percent of all smokers start before the age of 19," she said.

A former smoker herself, Tasca lives by the information she teaches in her classes.

"Having been a smoker," she said, "everytime I teach this class it reminds me not to start again."

Christiana High School freshman Kim Gray of Newark said she would sign the cigarette. A former smoker, Gray picked up the habit with her friends.

"I quit because of Ms. Tasca's health class," she said. "It took more than just me wanting to quit. It took support."

Tasca began her teaching career in the 1960s, when the American Cancer Society did their first studies on the results of smoking. Tasca said it has taken her the past 30 years to tell a smoker that she does mind if they smoke.

Students still smoke the high school bathrooms, Tasca said. But she has hope for future high school students.

"We're getting to the point where we may be truly smoke free," she

said. "We have strong support from the school district."

The use of tobacco by students is prohibited in Delaware's public schools.

The mock cigarette at Christiana High School was also placed on Main Street Tuesday for people to sign. A total of 138 high school students had already signed it.

Thirteen similar cigarettes have been placed in other businesses and offices in the state for people to sign. All of the cigarettes will be dumped into a garbage truck and crushed.

Gotcha founder rides wave of success

As a child, Michael Tomson spent his days on the beach near Durban, South Africa.

"I grew up on the beach," Tomson said in his British accent. "I was a beach rat — a somewhat studious beach rat."

Tomson began surfing at age 8 and was competitive in the sport at age 12. By 1974, he was competing internationally.

Today, at age 35, Tomson still surfs every day he can and presides over Gotcha Sportswear Inc., a company which has nearly 400 employees and reports annual U.S. sales of \$120 million.

The sandy-haired and tanned Tomson spoke at the University of Delaware Friday, informing students how he started his successful company.

"I had faith in the ideas," said Tomson. "I knew if I could just be tenacious and persistent, ultimately I would succeed."

Tomson went to college in South Africa while he surfed competitively. In 1978, he was ranked fifth in the world and named the International Professional Surfers Association Sportsman of the Year.

His travel to surfing competitions brought him to the United States.

"I had pretty much decided that I wanted to live in America," said Tomson. "I moved here on a permanent basis in 1979."

Life in America was difficult at first, Tomson said. Little things that most Americans take for granted, such as the difference between area codes and Zip Codes, caused him problems.

It didn't take Tomson long, however, to overcome those problems. Shortly after moving to America, he and a college classmate, Joel Cooper, formed Gotcha.

Tomson was responsible for design and marketing of the sportswear. Cooper, who today is chief executive officer of the company, handled finance and production.

Gotcha is now the second largest beachwear company in the United States, a status it achieved only in recent years.

"The first five years we didn't grow much because we were creating a seed," said Tomson. "There isn't such a thing as an overnight sensation."

Tomson, who married University of Delaware graduate Chris Cordrey, said his role in the company has changed from that of a pure designer.

"I plan, I think, I make decisions," he said. "I have to think down the road."

He told the students that an entrepreneur must have patience, planning, persistence and passion.

"It all comes down to a question of the passion for what it is you do," said Tomson. "If you want it, you've just got to go get it."

"It sounds so cliché but it's true."

AIDS Quilt to be shown in Wilmington

The Delaware Art Museum will display a portion of the acres-large national AIDS Memorial Quilt Dec. 1-7 in observance of the World Health Organization's second annual AIDS Awareness Day.

It will be the first showing of the quilt in Delaware.

The museum, located at 2301 Kentmere Parkway in Wilmington, will host an opening preview at 7:30 p.m. Friday, Dec. 1 with a guest speaker from the quilt project.

The 12-by-12 foot section of the quilt includes eight 3-by-6 pieces made by friends and family members of people who have died as a result of AIDS. These eight sections memorialize people from the Mid-Atlantic.

Cleve Jones originated the memorial quilt concept in reaction to a candlelight service in 1985. The project was formalized two years later.

Its goals are to illustrate the impact of AIDS by showing the humanity behind the statistics, to give creative expression to those whose lives have been touched by AIDS, and to raise money for AIDS support and research.

Belafonte, Colbert honored

Every year since 1978, the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts has honored five outstanding artists in a special program at the center in our nation's capital. It is that time of year again and on Sunday, Dec. 3, the 12th annual National Celebration of the Performing Arts will take place with a gala performance in the Opera House.

This year the five distinguished artists to be honored are singer-actor Harry Belafonte, actress Claudette Colbert, dancer Alexandra Danilova, actress-singer Mary Martin and composer-teacher William Schuman. Today I will share news of the first two with you and next week the other three.

When making the announcement at our National Center for the Performing Arts, Center Chairman Ralph P. Davidson said, "With this national celebration of the performing arts, we are proud to continue what has become an American tradition by saluting a groundbreaking singer who introduced third-world music into the cultural mainstream of the United States, two actresses

who reached the pinnacle of their profession — one in films and other on stage, a legendary ballerina and a profoundly influential American composer and educator."

And now to the first recipient, Harry Belafonte. Mr. Belafonte's fascination with the folk music of America and the West Indies has allowed him to create his own unique place in American popular culture. A native New Yorker, born there March 1, 1927, he launched a one man calypso craze in the 1950s with such hits as "Banana Boat Song" and "Jamaica Farewell." His five childhood years spent in Jamaica certainly had a strong influence on his music.

Harry made his professional debut at New York's Royal Roost and that led to a recording contract. He soon gave up

the pop scene for folk and he says he is very glad he did. Perhaps his best known film role was as Joe in "Carmen Jones" in 1954. A year earlier he won a Tony Award for his Broadway work in "John Murray's Almanac." But what brought him stardom was a 1955 CBS television adaptation of his folk song tour, "Three for Tonight."

How to introduce Claudette Colbert? I have selected a quote by Jeanine Basinger from The International Directory of Films and Filmmakers. Basinger writes, "Her glamour is the sort that women attain for themselves by using their intelligence to create a timeless personal style." Well put, Jeanine!

Claudette Colbert was born Claudette Lily Chauchoin in Paris, France, on Sept. 13, 1905

and became famous in the 1930s and 40s for a series of screwball comedies. Her perfect comic timing and her unique ability to portray characters who thrived in whatever situation they found themselves made her a model for many aspiring actresses.

In 1934 she earned an Oscar costarring with Clark Gable in Frank Capra's "It Happened One Night," still very popular on the late night TV circuit and in video stores. She played the role of Ellie Andrews. Remember?

The Chauchoins came to New York when Claudette was six. She attended New York public schools and planned a career as a fashion designer. However, in the 1920s when Broadway beckoned, her success soon brought a Paramount Pictures contract and the rest we will celebrate Dec. 3!
